TEHRAN (IRNA) - Deputy Foreign Minister for Political Affairs Abbas Araqchi said Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif's letter has been received by European Union foreign policy chief, Josep Borrell, and we are waiting for the result of his consultations with other parties.

Iran's COVID-19 Fatalities Hit 13,000

TEHRAN - Health Ministry spokeswoman says 203 patients have died of the novel coronavirus in the past 24 hours, increasing the overall death toll to 13,032.

In her press briefing on Monday, Sima-Sadat Lari confirmed 2,349 new cases of COVID-19 infection, raising the total number of infections to 259,652.

The spokeswoman said 222,539 patients have so far recovered from COVID-19, but 3,375 are still in severe conditions of the disease.

She further stressed that so far 1.997,967 COVID-19 tests have been taken across the country.

According to Lari, Khuzestan, West Azarbaijan, Khorasan Razavi, and Mazandaran provinces are considered as "red zones".

Tehran, Fars, Kerman, Alborz, Kohgiluyeh and Boyer-Ahmad, Golestan, Bushehr, Hormozgan, and East Azarbaijan provinces are also in dangerous conditions, she added.

TEHRAN - Foreign Ministry Spokesman Seyed Abbas Mousavi said on Monday that Iran and China have always had common historical ties as well as good relations in various political and economic dimensions in East Asia. Responding to Iran Press' question at his weekly press conference, Mousavi highlighted, "During a trip by the Chinese President to Iran in 2015, the two sides agreed to take a strategic view as well as a road map into consideration. Afterward, Iran and China drafted an agreement several times. Iranian Foreign Minister, Mohammad Javad Zarif delivered the suggestions by the Iranian side to the Chinese during a trip he had to the country. Consequently, the draft agreement was finalized by Iran, and should be delivered to the Chinese side to be finalized."

The spokesman stressed, "The strategic agreement between Iran and China is unbelievable and at the same time unacceptable for different parties. They believe that the Islamic Republic of Iran, through this act, is making the cruel sanctions imposed against the Asian country ineffective which they are right in this case."

Mousavi went on to say, "Iran is ready to define its long-term relations with other countries that have long-standing ties with it. The same procedures have been taken for some countries. Foreign roots have been the causes of the attacks. The Iranian nation is vigilant, and will not be the victim of a smear campaign that has been conducted by the rivals."

Iran is considered as an important country in West Asia and China is considered as an important one in East Asia and relations between two countries has always been peaceful, the spokesman said. He further said that Tehran does not accept the Europeans' middle-course stance between the US and Iran.

"The Europeans' stance is "not constructive", Abbas Mousavi said, adding that Iran clearly announces that Europeans have some commitments they should be loyal to, but they are defeated by the US pressures that is by no means good for their international reputation.

Answering a question about why the details of the draft agreement between China and Iran are not revealed, Mousavi said the accord is still being negotiated. It is a roadmap that should be carefully-wrought. And those trying to sabotage it know "our sensitivity". He said that when finalized, the document will be published and that the hype is for distancing Beijing and Tehran from each other.

Raeisi Urges Follow-Up On Trump's Arrest Warrant



TEHRAN (MNA) - Judiciary Chief underlined that Iran will not stop following up the arrest warrant it has issued for Trump and other criminals for the assassination of Iran's former IRGC Quds Force Commander Lt. Gen. Qassem Soleimani.

Seyed Ebrahim Raeisi said that Tehran's prosecutor and the deputy of the Judiciary for international affairs should follow up on the assassination of martyr Soleimani and the discussed issues by the UN special rapporteur on their agenda.

On July 9, the UN special rapporteur investigating summary executions said that the United States' targeted assassinating of the IRGC Lt. Gen. Qassim Soleimani was unlawful and risked eroding international laws that govern the conduct of hostilities.

Agnes Callamard said that the American drone strike that martyred General Soleimani as he arrived in the Iraqi capital, Baghdad, in January could only be justified in international law as a response to an imminent threat. The United States had provided no evidence to support that position, she said.

"Absent an actual imminent threat to life, the course of action taken by the US was unlawful," Callamard wrote in a report that she presented on Thursday to the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva.

IRGC Commander Underlines Israel Failures in All Arenas

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - A senior Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) commander shrugged off the Israeli psychological war against Iran, saying his main aspiration is to wipe out the "fake and usurping" Zionist regime that has failed in all arenas over the past decades.

In an article published on Sunday, Brigadier General Gholam Hossein Gheibparvar, the deputy commander of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps in Imam Ali (AS) Central Security Headquarters dismissed the Israeli regime's psychological war against Iran in the cyberspace.

Iran Produces 6.5m Masks a Day

TEHRAN (IRNA) - According to the deputy minister of industry, mines and trade, Iran is now producing 6.5 million 3-layered and N95 masks a dav.

Mehdi Sadeqi-Niaraki told IRNA that the until recently the overproduction of N95 was exported but, now, export of masks has been banned.

Sadeqi-Niaraki said that there is no shortage in production of alcohol, nursing protective gowns, disinfectants, and different kinds of detergent inside the country.

He said since the beginning of the coronavirus outbreak. production of masks has increased by 3000%.

Only 200,000 masks were produced then, which has reached 6.5 million. If the production by volunteers, people, and the Armed Forces are added to the number, it will be much bigger than what is now.

The deputy minister added that now that wearing masks in crowded public places is mandatory, exporting the N95 masks is banned.

Zarif made the remarks in a session of the Iranian Parliament's National Security and Foreign Policy Commission on Sunday while briefing the Iranian lawmakers on the landscape for a 25-year Iran-China cooperation plan.

Amouie cited Zarif as dismissing some rumors, including giving away Iran's Persian Gulf Island of Kish for rent to China and bestowing exclusive rights of selling oil to the Chinese companies at low prices.

"Zarif stressed the significance of taking into consideration the national interest in drafting the document," the Iranian lawmaker said.

"The rumors on Iran-China relations are the clear manifestation of the animosity towards the two countries," Amouie quoted Zarif as saying.

Polarized North Macedonia Votes Amid Virus Surge

SKOPJE (AFP) - North Macedonia heads to the polls Wednesday to elect a government in the midst of a resurgence of coronavirus cases, which has fuelled a bitter blame-game between rival camps.

The pandemic has heightened divides in a Balkan state whose acrimonious political scene has lurched from crisis to crisis in recent years. On one side are the Social Democrats led by former prime minister Zoran Zaev, who is touting his success in ushering the country into NATO and getting a green light to start EU membership talks. His right-wing rivals in VMRO-DPMNE, however, argue that the price of a name change was too high -- Skopje added "North" to the country's name last year in order to end a decades-old row with Greece, which claims exclusive rights to the name Macedonia for its own province.

Two Killed in Azerbaijan-Armenia **Border Clashes**



BAKU (AFP) - Arch-foes Armenia and Azerbaijan traded accusations of launching a military offensive using artillery fire along their shared border on Sunday, with Baku reporting two troops killed.

Azerbaijan's defense ministry said Armenia's "offensive" from its northern Tavush region was met with a "counterstrike" and retreated.

"Two Azerbaijani servicemen were killed and five more wounded," it added.

Yerevan, on its part, accused Baku of "using artillery in an attack aimed at capturing (Armenian) positions.

"They were repulsed, suffering losses in manpower. There were no casualties among Armenian servicemen," Armenia's defense ministry spokeswoman, Shushan Stepanyan, said in a Facebook post.

The two former Soviet republics have for decades been locked in a simmering conflict over Nagorny Karabakh, a breakaway territory which was at the heart of a bloody war in the 1990s.

But the Sunday clashes were far from Karabakh, and directly between the two Caucasus states, which happens rarely.

Since a fragile 1994 ceasefire, peace talks between Baku and Yerevan have been mediated by the "Minsk Group" of diplomats from France, Russia, and the United States.

Sunday's clashes erupted days after Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev raised the spectre of a fresh war with Armenia and denounced stalled peace talks.

On Tuesday, Aliyev threatened to withdraw from Karabakh negotiations "if they yield no



Seoul Mayor's Funeral Held Despite Objections

SEOUL (AFP) - The funeral service for Seoul mayor Park Won-soon, who took his own life after being accused of sexual harassment, was held Monday despite a petition against the city-run ceremony signed by half a million people.



He was found dead on a mountain Friday, a day after his former secretary filed a police complaint against him, widely reported to involve sexual harassment.

Polish President Duda Wins Re-Eelection

WARSAW (Reuters) - Polish President Andrzej Duda has won five more years in power on a deeply conservative platform after a closely fought election that is likely to deepen the country's isolation in the European Union.

Nearly final results from Sunday's presidential election put him on more than 51%, giving him an unassailable lead over Warsaw mayor Rafal Trzaskowski, who won almost 49% of the votes, the National Election Commission said.

Duda is allied with the ruling nationalist Law and Justice (PiS) party, and his victory will give the government a new mandate to pursue reforms of the judiciary and media which the executive European Commission says subvert democratic standards.

"I don't want to speak on behalf of the campaign staff, but I think that this difference is large enough that we have to accept the result," Grzegorz Schetyna, the former head of the opposition Civic Platform grouping that fielded Trzaskowski.

Mexico Becomes Country With Fourth-Highest Covid-19 Death Toll

MEXICO CITY (Dispatches) - Deaths in Mexico from the coronavirus pandemic rose above 35,000 on Sunday, with the Latin American country overtaking Italy for the world's fourth-highest death total, according to Reuters data.

But leftist President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said on Sunday that the pandemic was "losing intensity" in Mexico, and blamed what he called 'conservative media" for causing alarm.

Mexico on Sunday recorded 276 additional fatalities and 4,482 new infections to bring its coronavirus death toll to 35,006, with 299,750 confirmed cases. Italy has recorded 34,954 deaths and 243,061 cases. Mexico trails the United States, Brazil and the UK in total deaths. While Italy appears to have tamed the virus, the pandemic is showing few signs of easing in Mexico, where the government has faced criticism for reopening its economy too soon.

Lopez Obrador said he was briefed on the pandemic this past week and was optimistic. "The report is positive, good. The conclusion is that the pandemic is going lown, that it is losing intensity," he said in a video message.

Lopez Obrador also backed Hugo Lopez-Gatell, Mexico's deputy health minister and coronavirus czar, after criticism of his handling of the crisis.

Lopez-Gatell has kept revising his projections for total fatalities and as recently as June forecast up to 35,000 deaths through October. In early May, the estimate was 6,000. The coronavirus death toll per million residents in Mexico, whose population numbers about 120 million, is the 16th highest in the world, according o data by research firm Statista. But Mexican officials say the true toll is likely much higher due to limited testing. A Reuters analysis of funeral-home data in May indicated a toll more than double the reported figures.

Several former officials have criticized Lopez Obrador's administration for its management of the epidemic. Former Health Minister Salomon Chertorivski, who held the

> post from 2011 to 2012, said on Thursday the government had reopened the economy before meeting globally established criteria for doing so. He added that Mexico might need to impose a new lockdown

Backed by PiS, Duda ran an acrimonious campaign, laced with homophobic language, attacks on private media and accusations that Trzaskowski serve foreign interests instead of Poland's. Trzaskowski dismissed the accusations.

Duda's victory opens the way to new clashes between Poland and the European Commission as the EU tries to deal with the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic and rising nationalism across the 27-member bloc.

Before PiS and Duda came to power in 2015, Poland had one of the most pro-European administrations in the bloc's ex-communist east. But it has become increasingly combative, with divisions focusing on climate change and migration, in addition to democratic norms.

Warsaw mayor since 2018, Trzaskowski had said he would seek a more tolerant Poland if elected. He has criticised PiS' rhetoric, vowing to abolish state news channel TVP Info, which critics say gave overt support to Duda in its programming.



Pope Joins Criticism of Turkey Turning Hagia Sophia Into Mosque

VATICAN (AFP) - Pope Francis on Sunday joined an international chorus of condemnation of Turkey's decision to convert Istanbul's iconic Hagia Sophia landmark back into a mosque.

"I think of Hagia Sophia, and I am very saddened," Pope Francis said towards the end of his midday sermon in Saint Peter's Square. It was the Vatican's first reaction to Turkey's decision to transform the Byzantine-era monument back into a mosque, a decision that has already drawn criticism from around the world.

The Vatican newspaper Osservatore Romano on Saturday carried reaction from different countries to Friday's decision to turn the monument from a museum back into a mosque, but without any comment. A magnet for tourists worldwide, the Hagia Sophia was first constructed 1,500 years ago as a cathedral in the Christian Byzantine Empire and it was there they crowned their emperors. It was converted into a mosque after the Ottoman conquest of Constantinople in 1453, then became a museum in 1935. Turkey's President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who critics say is chipping away at the Muslim-majority country's secular pillars, announced Friday that Muslim prayers would begin on July 24 at the UNESCO World Heritage site. Several other Christian leaders have already spoken out against Turkey's decision.

Bishop Hilarion, who heads the Russian Orthodox Church's department for external church relations, described it as "a blow to global Christianity".

The World Council of Churches, which represents 350 Christian churches, said it had written to Erdogan expressing their "grief and dismay".

The head of the Greek Orthodox Church, Archbishop Ieronymos, on Sunday denounced what he described as the "instrumentalisation of religion to partisan or geopolitical ends". "The outrage and the arrogance doesn't just concern the Orthodox Church and Christianity but all of civilised humanity... independently of religion," he added. Greek Culture Minister Lina Mendoni took a similar view, calling Turkey's decision "a provocation to the civilised world". Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis also condemned the move, not just for the damage it would do to relations between Greece and Turkey, but Ankara's relations with "the European Union, UNESCO and the world community".

An all-out war between the two countries could potentially envelop the entire Caucasus, dragging in regional powers --Armenia's military ally Russia and Azerbaijan's patron Turkey -- which compete for geopolitical influence in the strategic region. Commenting on the clashes on Sunday, Aliyev said "Armenia's military adventure is aimed at dragging into the conflict the military-political organisation of which it is a member."

He was referring to the Moscow-led Collective Security Treaty Organization (CSTO). Aliyev accused Yerevan of military buildup along the two countries' border and of "regularly" shelling civilian targets in Azerbaijan.

France's new Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin and his British counterpart Priti Patel met on Sunday in Calais in northern France, a region where migrants have traditionally gathered in a bid to find a way to get to Britain.

"We signed a new agreement to create a joint intelligence cell which will crack down on gangs behind vile people smuggling operation," Patel wrote on Twitter after the meeting. She said they had discussed "the unsustainable levels of illegal migration across the Channel."

The Franco-British unit will allow services to share intelligence quickly and will consist of six British and six French police officers based in Coquelles outside Calais, Darmanin told reporters.

Traffickers "are those who take advantage of the human distress of people who want to cross the English Channel and who, no doubt, are not being punished sufficiently at the moment," said Darmanin. Channel crossing attempts have increased over the last year despite the danger of heavy maritime traffic, strong currents and low water temperatures.

"Together, we must strengthen our security cooperation, in particular in fight against the illegal crossings of the English Channel by migrants risking their lives," Darmanin wrote on Twitter as he hosted Patel.

In 2019, 2,758 migrants were rescued by the French and British authorities while trying to make the crossing -- four times more than in 2018, according to French officials.

The coronavirus pandemic has reinforced the trend, with the reduced number of trucks going through the Channel Tunnel leading migrants to opt for small boats instead. French emergency services rescued 21 migrants in three operations on Saturday after their bids to reach Britain floundered in the Channel, officials said.

Huawei to Request UK to Delay 5G Network Removal

LONDON (Reuters) - China's Huawei Technologies has requested a meeting with UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson to work out a deal to delay its potential removal from the country's 5G phone network, the Sunday Times newspaper reported on Sunday.

The Chinese telecoms equipment maker is seeking to delay its removal from the from the country's 5G telecoms networks until after elections in June 2025, in the expectation that the new government may reverse the decision, the newspaper reported. Huawei will in return pledge to maintain its equipment in the UK, which is also used in the 2G, 3G and 4G networks, the report added.



Hand Demand Outlook Calls for

Easing of OPEC+ Oil Production Cuts

LONDON (Dispatches) - ondon — With oil prices and global demand rebounding, the OPEC+ alliance will stick to its timeline of paring back its landmark production cuts at the end of July, sources familiar with the deliberations told S&P Global Platts.

The 23-country OPEC+ coalition — which together controls about half of the world's oil production — instituted an unprecedented 9.7 million b/d cut accord in May during the depths of the COVID-19 crisis, but expects to downsize the cuts to 7.6 million b/d starting in August, as scheduled, instead of extending them, the sources said. The key Joint Ministerial Monitoring Committee, co-chaired by Saudi Arabia and Russia, the two largest members of the coalition, will convene online July 15 and make a final recommendation. August term volumes for major crude exporting countries have already been set, making it impractical for the coalition to make changes to the deal for the month.

"We are satisfied with what is going on" in the market, one Persian Gulf OPEC+ source said.

Another Persian Gulf delegate said he expects a smooth JMMC meeting, with major economies showing signs of recovery and no significant shutdowns occurring. Disputes over quota compliance have largely been resolved, the source added, asking not to be named due to the sensitivity of the discussions. The International Energy Agency on July 10 said the worst of the pandemic's impact had been weathered and the market was set to tighten significantly and flip into deficit in the second half of the year. But it also warned that a resurgence of the infection, particularly in North and South America, was "casting a shadow over the outlook."

A sustained second wave of COVID-19 cases could undo the economic gains forged over the last few months.

"As OPEC+ plays its part in rebalancing the oil market, economic growth will nonetheless hold the key to allowing oil prices to rise," Harry Tchilinguirian, a senior oil economist at BNP Paribas, said. On the supply side, war-torn Libya remains a wildcard, as forces grapple for control of ports and key oil infrastructure, and the OPEC+ coalition must also guard against members' temptation to overpump their quotas as prices rise. Strong compliance with the production quotas — driven in large part by Saudi and Russian diplomatic pressure — has played a major role in lifting crude oil prices from historic lows in April, when NYMEX crude futures went negative for the first time and ICE Brent slid into the teens. Both benchmarks have traded above \$40/b in recent days. In its upcoming monthly oil market report on July 14, the OPEC secretariat is expected to reveal production data showing that the OPEC+ alliance achieved 107% of its committed cuts in June, according to figures seen by Platts. That resulted in about 10.4 million b/d — more than 10% of pre-pandemic oil demand — being taken off the market.

Though the quotas are set to be eased in August, some of the production gains may be offset by compensatory cuts from Iraq, Nigeria, Kazakhstan, Angola and other OPEC+ members that did not fully comply with their quotas in May and June. Those countries have agreed to make additional cuts in July, August and September equivalent to their overproduction, which officials estimate would total up to about 300,000 to 400,000 b/d, on top of the scheduled 7.6 million b/d cuts those months. With several countries easing COVID-19 lockdown measures and travel picking up, the OPEC+ alliance sees robust oil demand ahead. Seasonal oil-fired power generation in the Middle East, where electricity consumption for air conditioning peaks in the summer, will add significant demand in the coming months.

Lebanon Fencing Off More of Its Economy Against Currency Crisis



BEIRUT (Dispatches) - Lebanon is

seeking to protect more of its economy from the dramatic depreciation in the local currency, fixing a subsidised exchange rate for imported food after deeming a wholesale abandonment of the decades-old peg too costly for now.

The central bank, also known as Banque Du Liban, will provide dollars for imports of food and raw materials and to licensed money changers at a rate of 3,900 pounds per dollar, governor Riad Salameh told reporters this week. Imports of wheat, fuel and pharmaceuticals – considered strategic goods – as well as banking operations will be priced at the official peg of 1,507.5. Savers withdrawing cash from dollar accounts are now given pounds at the 3,900 rate.

The latest measures came after the currency's decline on the black market accelerated, with the pound losing some 60% of its value against the dollar last month alone, briefly nearing 10,000. It's also a step toward unifying the multiple exchange rates, some of which were introduced by the central bank in recent months as the worst economic crisis in decades unfolded.

The International Monetary Fund, with which Lebanon is negotiating a multi-billion dollar rescue package, asked authorities in the initial round of talks to unify the rates. They're reluctant to ditch the peg entirely without securing an aid package first, though, fearing the move would plunge even more people into poverty and erode purchasing power.

Instead, the central bank's betting that a dramatic decline in imports due to the dollar shortage will rebalance the system and allow it to channel what hard currency it has left more effectively. In the first quarter of this year, Lebanon's trade deficit dropped by half to \$2bn from the same period last year. Total imports dropped by an annual 41% in March, according to Blom Bank.

Given the depth of the currency chaos, the slow pace of IMF talks and the dwindling foreign currency reserves, which Salameh said this week had reached about \$20bn, that might not be enough. "They've managed to compress imports so aggressively that a key source of demand for that FX has been reduced but there isn't enough to ensure a unified rate," said Nafez Zouk of Oxford Economics.

About 300 food items, including meat, vegetables and milk, are currently eligible for the special rate. The list will gradually be expanded to cover non-food items that people use on a daily basis.

Food inflation soared 190% in May from a year earlier, reigniting protests and riots, and is likely to have risen further in June due to the currency collapse. With few hard currency inflows from remittances and no aid or investment in sight, the government has become increasingly reliant on the central bank to finance imports and its own needs, seeking to borrow 1.2tn pounds for a social safety fund.

Economists have warned that unless Lebanon takes urgent steps to stabilise the currency and restore confidence, allowing it secure aid and return to the bond market, the country could be headed toward a new bout of hyperinflation and a long period of depressed growth.

"The sharp depreciation of USD/LL in the black market since April suggests that the status quo, whether by policy design, inaction or paralysis, raises the risk of a costly inflation spiral," Bank of America wrote in a research note on Lebanon this week.

Deadly global threats such as terrorism and COVID-19 require us to act together, with a renewed sense of unity and solidarity. As the United Nations marks its 75th anniversary this year, multilateralism is as essential now as it was at the end of the Second World War.

IMF Urges Caution on Borrowing as Global Debt Rises to Record High

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - The International Monetary Fund called on governments to be cautious as they borrow more money to cushion their economies from the blow of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Public debt is now more than 100 per cent of global gross domestic product and has surpassed the record level it reached at the end of the Second World War, according to Vitor Gaspar, director of the fund's fiscal affairs department, and Gita Gopinath, chief economist.

"The need for continued fiscal support is clear, but this begs the question of how countries can finance it without debt becoming unsustainable," the IMF executives said in a blog post. Fiscal deficits this year are expected to be more than five times higher in advanced economies and probably more than double in emerging market economies.

This is a jump in public debt of 26 percentage and seven percentage points of GDP, respectively, relative to the fund's World Economic Outlook forecasts in January.

Governments will benefit from borrowing costs that are at historical lows and projected to "stay that way for a long time".

This allows for the continuity of fiscal responses as policymakers look to strengthen health infrastructure, stem job losses, save smaller businesses and stave off larger bankruptcies.

The pandemic, which forced governments to close borders and shut all but essential businesses, has taken a heavy toll on the world's economy, pushing it into its deepest recession since the Great Depression.

In June, the IMF forecast that the world economy would contract by 4.9 per cent this year, down 1.9 percentage points from its April forecast, before staging a sluggish recovery next year to grow by 5.4 per cent. Two thirds of governments topped up their fiscal support to offset the effects of the pandemic, pumping about \$11 trillion (Dh40.4tn) into their economies, compared to \$8tn in April.

The fund projects a cumulative loss to the global economy of more than \$12tn in 2020 and 2021 as a result of the virus. Although most economies have begun reopening, the rate of infection is still on the rise in the US, Brazil and India.

The virus has infected more than 12.7 million people worldwide and killed more than 567,000, with the US accounting for about 26 per cent of infections worldwide, according to Johns Hopkins University, which is tracking the outbreak.

The IMF executives said while "caution is advised" on public borrowing, "the top priority is still public health".

"While the trajectory of public debt could drift up further in an adverse scenario, an earlier-than-warranted fiscal retrenchment presents an even greater risk of derailing the



recovery, with larger future fiscal costs," Mr Gaspar and Ms Gopinath said.

The IMF said that global public debt - excluding the US and China - is expected to stabilise next year, spurred by low interest rates and an economic rebound. Borrowing costs, however, could increase rapidly, particularly for emerging

economies and frontier markets, as was the case in March. Countries that entered the crisis with high debt and low economic growth will need to find a way back to sustainable fiscal balances, the fund said. "The need for fiscal action does not end here, as we are not out of the woods," Mr Gaspar and Ms Gopinath said.

"Even as many countries tentatively exit the Great Lockdown, in the absence of a solution to the health crisis, huge uncertainties remain about the path of the recovery."

The fund said the international community must ensure vulnerable developing countries that lack the resources to support healthcare systems are given access to concessional financing and, in some cases, grants.

The IMF has so far extended emergency assistance to more than 70 countries battling the pandemic. The fund said poorer nations may require additional debt relief, including through the G20 debt suspension initiative announced in April. The program allows poorer countries to suspend their debt repayments for the

remainder of this year to free up funding to fight the virus.

Last month, the G20's International Financial Architecture working group heard that so far 41 countries had applied for the debt relief.

East Africa Holds Its Ground as Africa's **Fastest Growing Region**

NAIROBI (Dispatches) - East African is holding its ground as Africa's fastest growing region despite the disruption caused by the coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic, according to the African Development Bank's (AfDB) East Africa regional economic outlook 2020 report released this past week.

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Economic disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic has pushed East Africa's growth projection for 2020 down to 1.2 percent, a rate that outstrips other African regions, and is forecast to rebound to 3.7 percent in 2021, the AfDB said in a statement. "The projection is under the baseline scenario that assumes the virus is contained by the third quarter of this year," the bank said.

Prior to the Covid-19 pandemic, the region's economic growth was projected at more than 5 percent, well above the continent's average of 3.3 percent and the global average of 2.9 percent. However, Covid-19-induced shocks and a locust invasion had contributed to job losses and increased humanitarian needs, and would aggravate poverty and income inequality. In the worse-case scenario, in which the pandemic persisted until the end of 2020, growth was projected at 0.2 percent, still above Africa's predicted average of -1.7 percent and -3.4 percent under the two scenarios.

At the launch of the report in Nairobi on Wednesday, Simon Kiprono Chelugui, cabinet secretary of Kenya's labour ministry, said East African countries could overcome the effects of Covid-19 and turn their economies around by mitigating the external and domestic risks. "We need to implement a decisive and coordinated response to contain the spread of Covid-19; mitigate its health and socio-economic effects: accelerate structural transformation; improve the investment climate; and maintain the peace and security of our region," he said. The AfDB said the regional economic outlook indicated that the pandemic would affect East African economies in many ways, such as falling commodity prices and trade and restrictions on travel with a consequent negative impact on tourism. Waning financial flows had affected the region's fiscal and current account balances, while disruptions in supply chains had hurt food production and distribution. With schools closed, an estimated 90 million pupils had been excluded from the classroom. AfDB East Africa regional office director general Nnenna Nwabufo pledged bank support to steer the region out of the crisis. "Our ambition is to address the adverse effects of the Covid-19 pandemic and ensure that social and economic development across the continent is accelerated, including through the creation of an African workforce of the future," she said. She noted that the bank had responded swiftly to provide urgently needed support to address the immediate impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic, including support of US\$212 million to Kenva, US\$165 million to Ethiopia, US\$4 million to South Sudan, and US\$10 million to the Seychelles.

Turkey's Negotiating Window With Greece, EU May Be Closing

ANKARA (Dispatches) -So many urgent issues are undermining Greece-Turkey relations today it's almost a surprise these two neighbours with a history of conflict are not already at war. On Friday, Turkish

President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan finalised the conversion of Istanbul's iconic Hagia Sophia from a museum back into a

mosque, a week after Greece's Foreign Ministry denounced such a move as unacceptable and a breach of the structure's UNESCO World Heritage status.

Built as a cathedral in the 6th century by Byzantine Emperor Justinian, Hagia Sophia holds a special place in the hearts of many Orthodox Christians, particularly in Greece, which sees itself as the heir of the Greekspeaking Byzantines of Constantinople. Greek officials described the reversion as an "open provocation to the civilised world" and said "the nationalism displayed by Erdoğan... takes his country back six centuries".

Underscoring Turkey's continued claims on a number of Greek islands in the Aegean Sea, Turkish Defence Minister Hulusi Akar on Wednesday told the BBC that, despite the Lausanne Treaty barring any militarisation of 23 Aegean



late last year that essentially erased the island of Crete, which lies between the coasts of Libya and Turkey, off the map.

This week, Turkey reserved a vast area of the Eastern Mediterranean between Libya and Crete for naval exercises. Ankara has said it plans to begin drilling soon off the Libyan coast and possibly near Crete.

"The Greek government does hope that they won't dare to go and continue their drilling off the coast of Crete," said Michailidis. "This would create serious complications that might end up in a military confrontation."

Athens has warned that any drilling in its continental shelf will spark a heated response, and moved to strengthen ties with regional ally Israel. The two signed several defence agreements this month, outlining greater collaboration in weapons and training.

There was no Saudi confirmation of where they were intercepted or whether anything was hit.

The Saudi-led coalition, however, claimed on Monday it had intercepted and destroyed the rockets and drones. The coalition did not report any casualties.

The Russian envoy further criticized the European parties' inaction on the U.S. breach of the nuclear deal and their mere expression of regret. "We have told the Europeans that 'you only express regret.' of regret alone is not enough." "Turkey's military and political elites completely disregard that Greece is not just about the mainland," Nikos Michailidis, an assistant professor of anthropology at the University of Missouri-St Louis, told Ahval in a podcast. "We have thousands of islands and this is something they don't want to see, don't want to accept." Last week, the Greek air force intercepted Turkish jets and engaged them in mock dogfights after Turkish fighter planes committed 50 violations of Greek airspace over the

Aegean in a single day, according to the Greek Reporter. Cyprus has been a major source of Turkish-Greek tensions since at least 1974, when Turkish forces invaded the waterlocked nation in an effort to head off a coup plot from Athens. The island has since been divided between the EU-recognised Republic of Cyprus and the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus, recognised only by Turkey. Since early 2019, Turkey has launched six natural gas drilling operations in waters claimed by Cyprus and has said it plans more. On Wednesday, the United States announced that Cypriot soldiers would be able to take part in a major U.S. military training programme – a possible first step toward ending the U.S. arms embargo on Cyprus. Turkey quickly criticised the move.

"Turkey has been bullying Greece," said Michailidis. "It has been bullying Cyprus. It's still occupying Cyprus and they don't want to negotiate a solution based on international law."

Their alliance is also about energy. In January, Greece, Israel and Cyprus signed a deal to build a 1,900-km undersea pipeline to carry natural gas from the Eastern Mediterranean's gas fields to Europe.

Last but not least is migration and refugees. Londonbased research group Forensics Architecture concluded this week that it was highly probable that Mohammed al-Arab, a 22-year-old from Aleppo, was killed by Greek soldiers in March. He was among thousands of migrants seeking to enter Greece after Turkey followed through on Erdoğan's threat to "open the gates" for refugees, possibly repeating the crisis of 2015-2016, when some 2 million migrants entered Europe.

Athens has rejected accusations of using live fire, and many have accused Turkey of weaponising refugees to pressure Europe into providing greater funding for the 3.5 million refugees already in Turkey, or to come to Turkey's aid in Syria's Idlib province, where some 2 million displaced people are living in ad hoc camps along the Turkish border.

Greece and the European Union are now facing calls to investigate al-Arab's death amid fears of increased Greek aggressions along the border. Deutsche Welle and Belllingcat reported in May that Greek police had been forcibly deporting asylum-seekers back into Turkey, as Turkey had reportedly done with Syrians last year. There have also been several reports that Greek security forces have pushed migrant boats back toward Turkey and sent migrants back across the Aegean on windowless inflatable rafts.

ONDON (AFP) - Aston Villa pledged to investigate and Lissue a lifetime ban against a supporter after Crystal Palace's Wilfried Zaha revealed a shocking series of racially-aggravated messages before Sunday's Premier League clash between the two sides.

Zaha posted on Twitter three screenshots of messages containing racial abuse from an Instagram account belonging to a Villa fan. "We deplore the disgusting racist messages sent to @wilfriedzaha," Villa said on the club's Twitter account.

VIENNA (Dispatches) - Lewis Hamilton secured his first win of the season and the 85th of his career with a perfectly-judged victory from pole position as Mercedes delivered a one-two finish in Sunday's Styrian Grand Prix.

Tottenham failed to even muster a shot on target in a dire 0-0 draw at relegation-threatened Bournemouth on Thursday that raised more questions over their direction under Jose Mourinho.

There was more urgency from Spurs from the off as Lucas Moura tested Emiliano Martinez inside the first minute.

Fans Return And Witness 9-0 PSG Rout

DARIS (Dispatches) - Paris Saint-Germain routed second division Le Havre in a friendly on Sunday remarkable not for the 9-0 score, but because it drew the biggest crowd for a match in one of Europe's 'Big Five' football nations since early March.

The French government relaxed the health protocols before the weekend to allow for a total attendance of 5,000, including players, journalists and staff, at games and while the match at Le Havre was not the first to be played, the others involved only lower-division clubs.

Although social distancing rules were in place, fans took a few liberties once they were in the 25,000-capacity Stade Ocean on Sunday.
