Enemies Failed In Overthrowing Establishment

TEHRAN (MNA) - President Hassan Rouhani said that the resistance of the Iranian nation in the face of hostile pressures foiled enemies plot to bring down the Islamic Republic.

"Despite all pressure and difficulties, people showed resistance. The nation tolerated hardships in their lives but did not surrender to the enemy. Enemies sought to push the Establishment to the point of collapse,' Rouhani said in a cabinet session on Wednesday.

The fact that the U.S. is suffering consecutive defeats in the UN Security Council is due to the resistance of the Iranian nation, Rouhani said, adding that had not been for his resilient spirit, enemies would have returned all UNSC resolutions against Iran back in 2018.

Rouhani said that the country saw a 900,000 billion rials (nearly \$40 billion) decrease in revenues but despite all these Iran is still standing strong with its internal markets being more stable than that of even Europe.

"We saw this amid the coronavirus pandemic; they stood in lines [to buy daily supplies] but we didn't, they did not have vacant beds in hospitals and received people in corridors of hospitals but we always have had vacant beds. They faced problems for providing medicine and conducted aerial piracy to acquire face masks while our knowledge-based companies and industrial units were not even one day off and managed to solve the issues very quickly."

Astana Guarantor States Censure Israeli Aggression On Syrian Soil

TEHRAN (Dispatches) - Iran, Russia and Turkey the three guarantor states of the Astana peace process have blasted Israel's continued attacks on Syria as well as the illegal U.S. seizure of the Syrian oil.

In a joint statement after the third trilateral meeting of the Syrian constitutional committee in Geneva on Tuesday, senior diplomats from the three sides condemned the Israeli military attacks on Syrian territory and said the acts of aggression would endanger the stability and security of the region.

The Iranian, Russian and Turkish diplomats stressed that the Israeli attacks violated international law and undermined the sovereignty of the Arab country.

Tel Aviv frequently attacks military targets inside Syria in what is considered an attempt to prop up Takfiri terrorist outfits that have been suffering heavy defeats against Syrian government forces. See Page 7



UNSC Consensus Once Again Proved U.S. Isolation



TEHRAN - Iran says the overwhelming consensus among members of the UN Security Council (UNSC) against the U.S.'s push to reinstate all anti-Iran UN sanctions proves Washington's isolation once again.

The Islamic Republic's mission to the United Nations made the remarks in a statement on Tuesday, hours after the UNSC dismissed the controversial American bid because of a lack of consensus at the highest UN body over the so-called snapback of sanctions against Iran.

"Today, the overwhelming majority of the Security Council members rejected once again the admissibility of the recent letter" submitted by U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo "notifying" the council of Washington's intention to "snap back," or restore, all UN sanctions on Iran.

The statement reminded that "through individual or joint letters addressed to the Council's President, 13 out of 15 members of the Security Council" as well as Iran "have already strongly refuted the legal merit of the US letter." The U.S.'s push comes while it has lost the right to enable re-imposition of the sanctions due to its 2018 departure from a landmark nuclear deal between Iran and other countries --- officially known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) — that has been endorsed in the form of Security Council Resolution 2231.

The UN Security Council dismisses attempts by the U.S. to reinstate all UN sanctions against Iran due to a lack of consensus in the 15-member body over such a move.

The Iranian statement further said, "Given that the stated objective of the U.S. is to destroy Resolution 2231 and the JCPOA, Iran trusts that the Council members will continue preventing that country from undermining the UN, including the Security Council."

Earlier on Tuesday, Indonesia's UN Ambassador Dian Triansyah Djani, the UNSC's president for August, said at a meeting on the Middle East that the 15-nation body was "not in the position to take further action" on the new US push. Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said in a tweet later that the UNSC members had to use a meeting on the Middle East, not Iran, to refute the US attempt "as null and void" after Washington prevented a debate at the Council about its "unlawful notification" a day earlier.

The new anti-Iran bid comes after the UNSC similarly snubbed a resolution drafted by the US to extend an arms embargo against Iran that will expire in October under the JCPOA.

The Iranian mission, meanwhile, pointed to the allegations that the United States has been using against Tehran n order to try and justify its anti-Iran campaigns throughout the world, including at the Security C **`ouncil** Washington ceaselessly accuses Iran of trying to "destabilize" the region and the world, alleging that the Iranian peaceful nuclear program features "diversion towards military purpose" with that end in mind. "Regarding unfounded accusations against Iran raised in the Council meeting by the US, it must be stressed that almost all problems in the Middle East stem from the continued occupation of Palestine by the Israeli regime and its expansionist policies supported by the US, as well as the meddling, destabilizing policies and destructive practices of the United States, which cannot be covered up by no amount of smear campaign," the mission said.



Turkey Floats New Cooperation With Iran After Gas Find

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Turkey says its largest-ever natural gas discovery in the Black Sea could lead to new cooperation with Iran even as Ankara aims not to be just a buyer, but also a producer.

Turkey is dependent on imports for almost all of its energy needs and Iran is a key supplier of Ankara's natural gas purchases which generate nearly 40 percent of the country's electricity production.

"The countries we have been cooperating with for years are Iran and Russia. This new period for Turkey may lead to new cooperation with these countries," Turkish Finance Minister Berat Albayrak said in a televised interview on NTV Tuesday.

Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan said on Friday his country was determined ultimately to become a net energy exporter as he announced the discovery of a 320 billion cubic meter natural gas field that could come on stream as soon as 2023.

Turkey's senior officials and media said the discovery could transform Turkey's dependence on Russia, Iran and Azerbaijan for energy imports. Albayrak said it would help remove a chronic current account deficit which has driven the lira to record lows against the dollar. The discovery, officials hope, could reduce Turkey's energy import bill which stood at \$41 billion last year.

Analysts have said it was not clear whether the 320 billion cubic meters (bcm) Erdogan announced referred to total gas estimates or amounts that could be extracted. See Page 7

Iraq to Import Gas From Iran Until 2025

BAGHDAD (Dispatches) - Iraq's Oil Minister Ihsan Abdul-Jabbar said his country is planning to produce its own gas to meet domestic needs, but imports from Iran will continue for the next five years.

IAEA Urged to Observe Principles of Impartiality, Professionalism

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif says the UN nuclear agency should observe the principles of impartiality and professionalism in its dealings with the Islamic Republic.

Zarif made the remarks in a meeting with Director-General of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) Rafael Mariano Grossi, who is on his first visit to Tehran since taking office in December 2019.

"The Islamic Republic seeks continued cooperation with the Agency under normal circumstances and within the framework of international regulations," the top Iranian diplomat said. He added that Iran's cooperation with the IAEA has always been based on international commitments and within technical and professional frameworks.

"As the IAEA has verified numerous times, Iran has cooperated the most [among all countries] with the Agency with regard to the safeguards, and this path can be followed," Zarif added.

The Iranian foreign minister expressed hope that both sides would continue



cooperation in good faith and based on the safeguards' regulations by resolving the existing disagreements.

Iran has been fully transparent: over 92 percent of IAEA total comparable global inspections were carried out in Iran.

The IAEA chief, for his part, said the agency fulfills its duties in accordance with the principles of neutrality and professionalism.

Grossi noted that past Iran-IAEA cooperation had been beneficial to both sides, saying the trend could continue after overcoming the existing problems.

In a tweet posted after his discussions with the top Iranian diplomat, Grossi said he was "grateful for his (Zarif's) willingness to further work cooperatively with the @IAEAorg."

U.S. Police Brutality Outcome of Racist Way of Thinking

TEHRAN (IRNA) - First Vice-President Eshaq Jahangiri blasted the U.S. police for its brutalities against the American people and said that the U.S.' police behavior is the result of the domination of racist thoughts in that country.

"The U.S. brutalities in the tragic killing of the US black youth is rooted in historical hatred emanating from the racist thoughts and the human conscience condemns such brutalities both overtly and covertly," Jahangiri said in a message.

"Today the human community was once again shocked by witnessing the scene of tragic and painful murder of a black youth by the American police in front of his children; this level of brutality is rooted in the historic hatred and the racist thoughts which have become more prevalent during Trump's era. The presence of double standards throughout the world in dealing with such crimes is the most painful part of the story," he added.

The 29-year-old Jacob Blake was shot by the US police late Sunday (August 23) afternoon. Blake's three sons saw the shooting, a lawyer for the family said.

After being rushed to a hospital, Blake was out of surgery and in stable condition, his father told media on Monday.

Iran's Revenues from Non-Oil Exports Exceed Value of Imports

TEHRAN (IFP) - President Hassan Rouhani has highlighted his administration's success in boosting the export of non-oil products, the income from which has exceeded the value of imports for the first time over the past 60 years.

"Finally after 60 years, our non-oil exports outpaced our imports under this administration. It was unprecedented during 60 years, since the government of late Mosaddegh until now," President Rouhani said in a meeting with the top managers of Iranian news agencies and media outlets.

"It has been unfrequented in 26 years that we'd have single-digit inflation for two years, in 1395 and 1396 (2016 and 2017)," he noted.

The president said his administration's performance in 2016 was so great that Iran achieved the highest economic growth rate in the world.

He also unveiled plans to increase the country's total power generation capacity by 20,000 Megawatts until the end of his administration.

The president finally pointed to his administration's projects in the water industry, saying over 50 dams will have been inaugurated across the country by the end of the administration's term.

Considerable Cargos Shipped To Europe Through Railway

TEHRAN (IP) - Head of the Islamic Republic of Iran Railways said that a hybrid maritime- rail corridor runs from China to Kazakhstan, then to Turkey, and then to Europe.

Saeed Rasouli responded to Iran Press question regarding Iran-Europe railway through Turkey and said that negotiations began last year with Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan and Turkey, and fortunately were concluded in a very short time, and an agreement was signed between the five countries at a meeting in Ankara.

"Part of cargos is transported to Europe via Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan, Iran, and Turkey, and one of its benefits is the agreed price between five countries," he added.

"Another advantage of this agreement is the removal of problems such as rail freezing because the route is entirely railway," Rasouli noted.

"Although the coronavirus outbreak closed the border, the Razi border opened quickly and Turkmen border reopened last month," he noted.

He also referred to the efficiency of the railway network and freight transportation by connecting major centers to this network and said that 16 locomotives and 9 freight wagons have joined this network.


TEHRAN – Head of Iran-Turkey Joint Chamber of Commerce says the trade between Iran and Turkey is recovering and the decline during the first months of the year is being gradually compensated.

Mehrdad Sadat Dehghan said yesterday that the trade volume between Iran and Turkey should be doubled this year because the price of goods have been doubled. He added that despite the decline in trade between both countries due to the coronavirus pandemic, the condition is improving and the decline has been

compensated in recent months. He noted that all joint borders have been reopened for transport of goods and there is no problem for the transit of goods but regarding passengers, he reiterated only

U.S. Slams Turkey's Erdogan For Hosting Hamas

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - The United States said on Tuesday it strongly objected to Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan's recent hosting of two leaders of Hamas in Istanbul.

The State Department said the officials were Specially Designated Global Terrorists and the United States was seeking information about one for his involvement in multiple terrorist attacks, hijackings and kidnappings.

A Turkish government statement on Saturday said Erdogan received Ismail Haniyeh, head of the Hamas Political Bureau, and an accompanying delegation. The State Department said the Saturday meeting was the second time this year Erdogan had welcomed leaders of the armed Islamist group that has controlled Gaza for over a decade, after a meeting on Feb. 1.

Belarus Jails Two Opposition Leaders



MINSK (Reuters) - Belarus jailed two opposition leaders for 10 days on Tuesday as the government pursued a crackdown on the few figures still at large, while schoolteachers led a new protest of thousands against President Alexander Lukashenko.

Despite most major opposition figures being in jail or exile, Lukashenko has so far failed to put down protests against his 26-year-old rule, more than two weeks after an election his opponents say was rigged.

Olga Kovalkova and Siarhei Dyleuski were brought to separate courts where they were each jailed for 10 days. Kovalkova is the main representative still in Belarus of opposition candidate Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya, and Dyleuski has led strikes at Minsk's flagship tractor factory.

Both are senior figures in an opposition Coordination Council, set up last week with the self-described aim of negotiating with the authorities. They were arrested on Monday.

Lukashenko has accused the new council of attempting to seize power, and prosecutors have launched a criminal case.

Wisconsin City Braces for Third Night of Protests

KENOSHA (Reuters) - Authorities in Kenosha, Wisconsin, on Tuesday were readying for a third night of unrest after arsonists torched much of the city's Black business district following the shooting of a Black man in the back by police.

Kenosha County Board of Supervisors member Zach Rodriguez said the board would hold an emergency meeting on Tuesday on seeking federal help, such as U.S. Marshals Service officers, to quell the unrest after some 300 rioters looted businesses and set fire to buildings overnight.

"Essentially, our city was burned to the ground, building by building," Rodriguez told Reuters. "Enough is enough." Smoke billowed over central Kenosha after police in riot gear clashed with protesters as they defied a dusk-to-dawn curfew on Monday night and Tuesday morning, near where police gunned down Jacob Blake, 29, on Sunday. Blake remained in intensive care following surgery and would require more operations, civil rights attorney Ben Crump, who represents the Blake family, told ABC News on Tuesday. Blake's father told the Chicago Sun-Times his son was paralyzed from the waist down. Blake, who had been attempting to break up a fight between two women, was struck by four of the seven shots, all fired by one officer, in front of his sons aged 3, 5 and 8, Crump said.

Video captured by a neighbor shows Blake walking toward the driver's side door of his SUV, away from two officers who were pointing guns at his back. After he opens the door, seven shots ring out, with one of the officers tugging at his shirt. It remains unknown what the officers may have seen inside Blake's car. Crump said there was "no indication he was armed."

The shooting is under investigation by the Wisconsin Department of Justice, which has not released any details. Kenosha police have referred all questions to the state investigators. But the incident, the latest in a litany of cases to focus attention on police treatment of African Americans, unleashed outrage in Kenosha, a Lake Michigan city located north of Chicago and south of Milwaukee. The shooting occurred three months after the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis sparked nationwide protests against police brutality and racism. Firefighters from about 30 fire departments around the region came to Kenosha to help put out the blazes across swaths of the city. He said the county supervisors would meet on Tuesday to seek federal assistance, on the assumption that the city's mayor and Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers would be reluctant to do so.

Pakistan Eager to See Taliban Start Dialogue With Kabul

ISLAMABAD (Reuters) - Pakistan urged the Taliban on Tuesday to start talks soon with the Afghan government to end decades of conflict, telling visiting officials of the group that an intra-Afghan dialogue could help ensure regional stability.

The meeting between Pakistani Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi and a Taliban team comes as Afghanistan's peace process has stalled over disagreements on a prisoner exchange.

"Pakistan is eager to see an intra-Afghan dialogue start soon to ensure regional peace and stability," Qureshi said in a statement after meeting a delegation led by the head of the Taliban's political office Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar.

Assad Tasks Caretaker PM to Form New Gov't

PNA to Form New Gov't DAMASCUS (AFP) - Syrian President Bashar al-Assad Tuesday appointed caretaker prime minister Hussein Amous to draw up a new cabinet as the country grapples with a stinging economic crisis and a coronavirus outbreak.

"President Assad issues decree number 210 for year 2020, which tasks... Hussein Arnous with forming a government," the presidency said in a statement.

Formerly the minister for water resources, Arnous replaced Imad Khamis in June and served as interim prime minister until parliamentary polls were held last month.

Khamis was sacked following a wave of public criticism over the government's handling of an economic crisis that has seen the value of the Syrian pound plummet against the dollar on the black market. He had served as premier for four years. Like Assad and Khamis, Arnous has been the target of U.S. and European Union sanctions.

Kremlin Defies Calls to Probe Navalny Illness

MOSCOW (Reuters) - The Kremlin said on Tuesday it saw no need for now to investigate circumstances leading up to opposition politician Alexei Navalny's grave illness, and that a German clinic's initial diagnosis of poisoning was not yet conclusive. Chancellor Angela Merkel on Monday called for an investigation and for Russia to hold the perpetrators accountable after German doctors found indications of a toxic substance in his body.

Navalny, an outspoken opponent of President Vladimir Putin, was airlifted to Germany for treatment on Saturday after collapsing on a plane while flying back to Moscow from Siberia.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said the German clinic had not conclusively identified the substance behind Navalny's illness and that it was unclear why German doctors were "rushing" to use the word poisoning.

"There must be a reason for an investigation. For the moment, all you and I see is that the patient is in a coma," Peskov told reporters. The foreign ministry said the alleged poisoning was not of benefit to the country's leadership, while Peskov added that any suggestions that Putin was somehow involved in Navalny's illness were untrue and "hot air" that the Kremlin would not take seriously.

Peskov said that if poisoning was definitively established as the cause, "then of course, this will be a reason for an investigation."

In response to the Kremlin's comments, Navalny's spokeswoman Kira Yarmysh said it was "obvious the crime wouldn't be investigated properly and the criminal found." The speaker of Russia's lower house of parliament, a Putin ally, said one of its committees would launch a probe to determine whether foreign forces had played a hand in Navalny's illness in order to fuel tensions in Russia.

Demands from abroad for an independent probe are intensifying. On Monday, top European Union diplomat Josep Borrell asked Russia to investigate, a call echoed on Tuesday by U.S. ambassador to Russia John Sullivan and Sweden's Foreign Minister Ann Linde. A new wave of U.S. measures against Syria that came into force in June has prompted fears of deeper economic turmoil.

Arnous's government will also have to oversee ongoing efforts to combat the country's novel coronavirus outbreak.

Syria has recorded 2,293 cases of infection, including 92 deaths, in government-held areas, but medics and residents say the real number of cases is likely to be much higher.

Arnous, 67, hails from Maaret al-Numan in Idlib province, half of which is controlled by jihadists and allied rebels.

He graduated from the faculty of civil engineering at the University of Aleppo in 1978 and later held several official posts, including governor of the eastern province of Deir Ezzor and then the southern province of Quneitra.

He took over the ministry of public works in 2013 and then the ministry of water resources in 2018.

Assad's government now controls around 70 percent of Syria after nine years of war.

Champagne, in Europe on an official trip, met Wang in a hotel for 90 minutes. The two men previously held face-to-face talks in Japan in November 2019. Wang was in Rome to attend events marking the 50th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Italy and the People's Republic of China, according to the state-run Xinhua news agency.

Ties between the two countries deteriorated in December 2018 after Canadian police arrested Meng Wanzhou, chief financial officer of Chinese telecoms giant Huawei, on a US extradition warrant. Soon after, China detained Canadians Michael Spavor and Michael Kovrig and charged them with spying. It also blocked imports of some canola seed.

"Minister Champagne again reiterated that the cases of Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor remain a top priority ... and that Canada continues to call on China to immediately release both men," the Foreign Ministry said in a statement. Earlier this month, a Chinese court in Guangzhou also sentenced Canadian national, Xu Weihong, to death for drug-related charges.



WASHINGTON (Reuters) - Trump administration officials are satisfied that China is implementing the Phase 1 trade deal with the United States, following a high-level call to review progress, White House Economic Adviser Larry Kudlow said on Tuesday. U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer is "fine" with China's implementation so far and China is buying more farm commodities, which will aid U.S. job growth, Kudlow said on Fox News Channel. "The meeting went quite smoothly. It was a normal review meeting," Kudlow added.

BERLIN (Reuters) - The German economy contracted by a record 9.7% in the second quarter as consumer spending, company investments and exports all collapsed at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the statistics office said on Tuesday.

The economic slump was much stronger than during the financial crisis more than a decade ago, and it represented the sharpest decline since Germany began to record quarterly GDP calculations in 1970, the office said.

Still, the reading marked a minor upward revision from an earlier estimate for the April-June period of -10.1% that the office had published last month.

Consumer spending shrank by 10.9% on the quarter, capital investments by 19.6% and exports by 20.3%, seasonally adjusted data showed.

Construction activity, normally a consistent growth driver for the German economy, fell by 4.2% on the quarter.

"The second quarter was a complete disaster," VP Bank economist Thomas Gitzel said. "Regardless of whether it is about investments, private consumption, exports or even imports -everything was in free fall."

The only bright spot was state consumption, which rose by 1.5% on the quarter due to the government's coronavirus rescue programs, the office said.

The German parliament has suspended the debt brake this year to allow the government to finance its crisis response and fiscal stimulus push with record new debt of 217.8 billion euros.

The fiscal U-turn after years of balanced budgets means that the German state recorded a budget deficit of 51.6 billion euros from January to June, the statistics office said in a separate statement.

That represents a deficit of 3.2% of economic output as measured by the EU's Maastricht criteria.

Employment edged down by 1.3% on the year to 44.7 million in as sign that the government's efforts to shield the labour market from the coronavirus shock with its short-time work programme are paying off.

The relatively mild impact of the crisis on employment helped to stabilize income for many households, which together with the reluctance to consume, led to a considerable increase in household saving.

The savings rate almost doubled to 20.1% in the 2nd quarter compared to the previous year, the office said.

The German central bank expects household spending to drive a strong recovery in the third quarter, though the economy might not reach its precrisis level before 2022.

The government's stimulus measures include a temporary VAT cut from July to December worth up to 20 billion euros, which Berlin hopes will give household spending an additional push.

"The reopening of the economy will give the German economy a strong boost in the period from July to September," Gitzel said, but he added that the moment of truth would come in the autumn and winter months, which could see a wave of bankruptcies.

UK Retailers Cut Jobs by Most Since 2009

LONDON (Reuters) - British retailers have cut the most jobs since the depths of the financial crisis and expect the pace of losses to accelerate, the Confederation of British Industry said, adding to warning signs of an expected sharp rise in unemployment.

Tuesday's data also showed an unexpected drop in sales this month, which contrasted with a recent pick-up in demand by consumers after the coronavirus lockdown was lifted.

"Trading conditions for the retail sector remain tough," CBI economist Alpesh Paleja said.

"...Firms will be wary of deteriorating household incomes and the risk of further local lockdowns potentially hitting them in the pocket for a second time."

Well-known British retailers Marks & Spencer, Debenhams and WH Smith have announced job losses in recent weeks, reflecting a shift in demand to online sales during the pandemic.

Tesco, Britain's biggest supermarket, said on Monday it would create 16,000 permanent roles to meet a surge in home deliveries. Quarterly CBI figures showed the employment balance - which measures job changes over the past 12 months - sank to -45 in August from -20 in May, reaching its lowest since February 2009. A deeper fall is expected later this year. The drop in the monthly retail sales balance was unexpected, falling to -6 in August from July's 15-month high of

+4 and below all forecasts in a Reuters poll of economists.

Figures last week showed the volume of retail sales rose above pre-pandemic levels in July.

Howard Archer, an economist with forecasters EY Item Club, said he still thought consumer spending was headed for a substantial rebound in the third quarter.

Indian Gov't Consumption Key to Growth in Economy Amid Pandemic

MUMBAI (Reuters) - Indian government spending will support the economy during the pandemic, but private consumption will be needed to drive any economic recovery once the coronavirus threat eases, the central bank said on Tuesday.

"An assessment of aggregate demand during the year so far suggests that the shock to consumption is severe, and it will take quite some time to mend and regain the pre-COVID-19 momentum," the Reserve Bank of India said in its annual report. April-June quarter GDP data, set to be released on Aug. 31, is expected to show a contraction of 20%, according to a Reuters poll.

Private consumption will come back gradually with non-discretionary spending leading the way, until a durable increase in disposable incomes enables discretionary spending to catch up, the bank added. "Upticks that became visible in May and June after the lockdown was eased ... appear to have lost strength," the bank said.

This weakening was mainly due to reimposition or tougher imposition of lockdowns, suggesting the contraction in economic activity was likely to prolong into the second fiscal quarter, it added.

Key downside risks to growth are wider pandemic spread, a deviation of seasonal monsoon rains from the predicted normal volume and global financial market volatility, the bank said.

The RBI advised that fiscal incentives for industry ought to be re-aligned in favor of productive labor-intensive companies so as to generate employment.

It also highlighted the need for specialized infrastructure-focused lending companies to help drive funding of major infrastructure projects. It also called for the diversification of financing options for companies, saying capital markets and foreign direct investment offer opportunities to bring in investors with a longer-term view, as also more durable capital. The RBI said the banking sector needs to be freed of risk aversion, which is impeding the flow of credit to productive sectors and undermining the role of banks in the economy. Despite a reduction in banks' bad loans as of March 2020, the system's resilience will be tested by the economic fallout of the pandemic, since measures to alleviate it masked the consequent build-up of stress in the system, the RBI said. "Against this backdrop, a recapitalization plan for public and private sector banks assumes critical importance," it added. In a separate report, the RBI had warned that banks' bad loans could nearly double by the end of this fiscal year, while the capital adequacy ratio could fall to 11.8% in a severely stressed situation. Data in the annual report showed frauds of 100,000 rupees and above at banks increased by 159% in terms of value in 2019/20, but the RBI said the date of occurrence of these was spread out over several previous years.

Belarus Not to Introduce Cap<u>ital</u> Controls to Sto ble Slide MINSK (Reuters) - The Belarusian

A political crisis sparked by mass protests against President Alexander Lukashenko has dragged the rouble to record lows against the euro this week and sent Belarusians scrambling to buy foreign currency at exchange points. On Tuesday, the rouble weakened further, losing 1.2%-1.5% against the dollar and the euro. It has lost 30% so far this year against the euro. But the central bank is not contemplating imposing restrictions, Murin said, adding: "We believe that the introduction of restrictions will have the exact opposite effect.'

Asked if the National Bank of Belarus could return to the obligatory sale of foreign exchange earnings, introduce targeted sales of foreign currency, restrict deposits or foreign exchange settlements, Murin answered in the negative.

Belarus had started lifting such restrictions five years ago.

Belarus plunged into turmoil following Lukashenko's contested victory in an August 9 presidential election. His opponents say the vote was rigged, sparking waves of street protests and strikes that pose the biggest challenge to his 26-year rule. The European Union is gearing up to impose new sanctions on Minsk.

Murin said however the central bank would not artificially keep the exchange rate at any specific level, though he confirmed the central bank had conducted FX interventions in recent days.

The country's gold and foreign exchange reserves stood at \$8.857 billion at the start of August, data shows, but the interventions likely caused these to shrink, Murin acknowledged. Despite declining reserves and some \$3 billion in maturing foreign debt over the next 12 months, Murin saw debt levels as manageable.

"The payments are quite substantial, but at the moment the foreign currency balances of the Ministry of Finance exceed the forthcoming payments by 1.6 times," he said. "Overall, the debt level is within comfortable limits." Murin also said the outflow of deposits from banks remained moderate and if required, the central bank may consider supporting banks with forex refinancing tools.

Murin said he saw no reason for now to raise interest rates but did not exclude that possibility for the future. The main interest rate is at 7.75% and the next monetary policy meeting is due in October.

U.S. Consumer Confidence At More Than Six-Year Low



WASHINGTON (Reuters) - U.S. consumer confidence dropped to a more than six-year low in August as households worried about the labor market and incomes, casting doubts on the sustainability of the economy's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The downbeat survey from the Conference Board on Tuesday overshadowed news that sales of new single-family homes raced to a more than 13-1/2-year high in July. The housing market continues to show strong immunity to the coronavirus crisis, though the second straight monthly decrease in consumer confidence could slow momentum. The ebb in confidence followed the expiration of a \$600 weekly unemployment benefit supplement at the end of July and a flare-up in new coronavirus cases. While new COVID-19 infections have subsided, hot spots remain in some parts of the country. "Today's data are telling us that while some lucky workers are able to buy new homes, millions of others are unable to afford life's necessities and pay the rent especially after the federal government canceled those \$600 checks," said Chris Rupkey, chief economist at MUFG in New York. "The consumer is the most worried they have been all year which pours cold water on the idea that the economic recovery is sustainable.' The Conference Board said its consumer confidence index dropped to a reading of 84.8 this month, the lowest since May 2014, from 91.7 in July. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast the index edging up to a reading of 93 in August. The Conference Board survey's present situation measure, based on consumers' assessment of current business and labor market conditions, tumbled to a reading of 84.2 this month from 95.9 in July. The expectations index based on consumers' short-term outlook for income, business and labor market conditions dropped to 85.2 from a reading of 88.9 in July.

"In addition, the negative consequences of structural change in the automobile industry are becoming increasingly evident," Gitzel said, pointing to many small suppliers in the sector that are struggling to adapt to digitisation and electrification.

Abu Dhabi Returns to Dollar Bond Market With Multi-Tranche Deal

DUBAI (Dispatches) - Abu Dhabi is back in the dollar bond market, extending a debt binge by countries raising cash buffers to weather the pandemic.

The Persian Gulf emirate plans a three-part offering, according to a person familiar with the matter. The indicative pricing on the longest tranche of 50 years is in the three percent area, the person said, who isn't authorised to speak publicly and



asked not to be identified.

With the global economy on a slow path to recovery, corporate treasurers around the world are looking to stockpile cash, even if it means paying more. Abu Dhabi is among the list of many selling bonds to bolster their finances in the face of lower oil and gas prices.

Brent crude, the international oil benchmark, has averaged about \$42 a barrel this year, down about onethird from last year. Prices are still recovering after being hammered earlier this year by a combination of the pandemic and a brief price war between Saudi Arabia and Russia.

Abu Dhabi raised \$7 billion in April also through a three-tranche bond offering and added another \$3bn to it a month later.

COVID-19 Kills 119 More in Iran

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Iran's Health Ministry spokeswoman Sima Sadat Lari said on Wednesday that some 119 more Iranians have died from coronavirus disease (COVID-19) over the past 24 hours bringing the total deaths to 21,020. Sadat Lari said that, with the 119 new victims, the country's

total COVID-19 deaths mounted to 21,020.

Some 2,243 new cases of infection with the COVID-19 were found over the past 24 hours, some 1,121 of whom have been hospitalized, she added.

Sadat Lari noted that a total of 365,606 Iranians have been confirmed infected with the COVID-19, some 314,870 of whom have recovered or discharged from hospital.



China Cosies Up to EU as U.S. Tensions High

ROME (AFP) - China's foreign minister on Tuesday kicked off a tour of a Europe still reeling from coronavirus, as he seeks to shore up economic and diplomatic relations in light of tensions with the U.S.

Donald Trump's administration has stepped up anti-China rhetoric in the run-up to the US presidential election on November 3, despite ongoing trade talks.

On his first European stop in Rome, Wang Yi shied away from naming Washington explicitly, but lamented "provocation and damage from external forces" hitting the EU -- a second favorite punching-bag of Trump's.

"A united, stable and prosperous Europe is important for the whole of the world," Wang added.

Italy was the first G7 country to sign on to China's ambitious "Belt and Road" trade and infrastructure investment plan, and Wang on Tuesday inked two new trade deals with Foreign Minister Luigi Di Maio.

Rome was criticized for last year breaking ranks with other European countries over the investment scheme.

Allies have worried that China's "Silk Road" will destabilize smaller countries by overloading them with debt, boost China's power, and allow key technologies and trade secrets to slip into Beijing's hands.

But Italian leaders now hope boosted export opportunities for the country's main industries -- from agricultural products to machinery -- can help haul it out of a devastating economic crisis brought about by an over two-month lockdown.

Chinese President Xi Jinping visited Rome in March 2019, signing billions of euros in trade deals.

Di Maio said the latest agreements covered natural gas from Snam, Europe's biggest pipelines operator, and the export of "Made in Italy" food products to China, as well as "important partnerships in the energy and transport sector".

But there are clear pitfalls for Wang's stated aim to "consolidate relations" between China and Europe as the top diplomat travels on to the Netherlands, France, Germany and Norway.

Just as the trade deals were being signed, visiting Hong Kong activist Nathan Law urged Italy to condemn China for human rights abuses.

Law met with an Italian foreign affairs delegation and told reporters Di Maio should "address Hong Kong's problems and the human rights violations by China". Italy should "severely condemn" Beijing's human rights record, added Law, who recently fled Hong Kong to London after Beijing imposed a controversial security law on the territory in June.



Law called for a "strong alliance" against Beijing, including "sanctioning" Chinese officials responsible for human rights violations against China's Uighur population in the northwestern Xinjiang province, and in Hong Kong

Wang said China had passed its law "to fill the gaps that had existed in Hong Kong for years.'

"It is a law to combat the violent acts found everywhere and to hinder certain actions of pro-independence Hong Kong people," Wang said.

Di Maio said he had told his Chinese counterpart that Hong Kong's "stability and prosperity are essential."

"It is essential to preserve the high autonomy of the city and the protection of the fundamental rights of its inhabitants," he added.

Even as Wang looked to bolster ties with Europe, China is in the midst of trade talks with an increasingly prickly U.S.

The trans-Pacific atmosphere is far frostier since an initial trade agreement was signed in January.

Tensions have mounted over Trump's charge Chinese leaders allowed the coronavirus to run out of control after it emerged in Wuhan, and the president again dubbed it the "China virus" in a video played during the Republican convention Monday.

The two superpowers are also at odds over technology and China's human rights record.

This week and reacting to his Colombian counterpart's claim that Caracas intends to buy missiles from Iran,

cabinet to keep the plan a secret, noting, "It had not occurred to me.'

In order to herald his ambition to neighboring states, supporters and opponents, he said "What a good idea, to speak with Iran to see what short, medium and long range missiles they have, and if it is possible, given the great relations we have with Iran."

Earlier the Islamic Republic of Iran's Embassy in Caracas had announced that Iran was on the verge of finalizing a trade deal with this Latin American state. Last week, a ceremony marking the 70th anniversary of restoration of ties between Iran and Venezuela was held in Caracas with senior Venezuelan officials and Iran's ambassador in presence. Iranian officials have not reacted to Maduro's remarks on buying missiles from Iran. But regarding this point that political relations between both states are progressing on course to the growth of resistance culture, undoubtedly the Islamic Republic of Iran's response, if it is officially received, would be positive.

Venezuela has actually been the U.S.'s backyard in the Latin-speaking countries and it is still, but since creation of motivation, it has provided Iran with appropriate ground for promoting the criteria for intensifying resistance against anti-justice capitalism. Iran and Venezuela hand in hand will make the future of the Latin America and this motivation will provide the ground for weakening Washington.

Israel seized the Golan Heights from Syria after the 1967 Six-Day War and later occupied it in a move that has never been recognized by the international community.

The Syrian air defenses have responded to the Israeli military's Monday night aggression against the Arab country's army positions, state media reports.

The three countries also expressed on Tuesday their opposition to the US for "the illegal confiscation of the oil revenues and transfers that should return to Syria."

The Astana guarantors censured all unilateral sanctions against Damascus, stating that they are extremely harmful considering the humanitarian situation in Syria, especially in the wake of the covid-19 pandemic.

Iran, Russia, and Turkey have been leading a peace process for Syria known as the Astana process, because Kazakhstan's capital, Nur-Sultan, formerly called Astana, originally hosted the meetings. The Astana talks resulted in two agreements.

A first deal was signed in Kazakhstan's capital, arranging for the creation of de-escalation zones across Syria, including in parts of Idlib. The second one that came about in the Russian resort city of Sochi allowed Ankara to bring in a small number of forces to man the observation posts to reinforce de-escalation.

While the two deals have helped significantly reduce fighting in Syria, the conflict has not entirely ended, due in large part to Turkish failure to separate terrorists from what it calls "moderate" opposition groups in Idlib and Ankara's dispatch of thousands of troops and heavy military hardware into the Syrian province to back the militants. Syria has been gripped by foreign-backed militancy since March 2011. But that conflict has been winding down as the Syrian government reasserts control over parts formerly held by militant and terrorist groups.



MADRID (AFP) - Spain said Tuesday it will call in the army to try to help curb the spread of the coronavirus as parts of Europe and Asia battle new surges, while data from the UN health agency suggested the pace of transmission was easing in many parts of the world.

Governments have been ramping up efforts to contain the disease, which has claimed the lives of almost 814,000 people and infected at least 23 million since late last year.

World Health Organization data said fatality and infection rates were easing in most regions, notably in the hard-hit Americas, except Southeast Asia and the eastern Mediterranean.

But a number of countries are facing new clusters. Spain, one of the worst affected countries in Europe, is to use 2,000 soldiers who are trained in tracking to help regions identify those who have been exposed to infected people. "We can't let the pandemic once again take control of our lives... we must take control and halt this second curve," said Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez, who described rising domestic infections as "worrying". Thousands of miles away, South Korea ordered the closure of all schools and kindergartens in the greater Seoul region and a return to online learning. Another 280 infections were reported on Tuesday, taking South Korea's total to almost 18,000. South Korea's move -- coupled with Mexico's launch Monday of a nationwide televised schooling program -- underlined the effect on young people of a pandemic now dragging into its ninth month.

One of the main gripes of both energy industries is that they were locked out of the group of finance experts that came up with the proposals released in March.

A new EU sustainable finance platform will take over as the European Commission's advisor on taxonomy next month - and both industries are jostling to be included on the panel.

Rebecca Vaughan, an analyst at InfluenceMap, a non-profit whose lobbying data is used by investors, said the platform was probably the gas industry's "last shot" at changing the rules.

All four gas and nuclear lobby groups interviewed by Reuters have applied to be part of the sustainable finance platform, along with more

On Monday, Iran's Minister of Petroleum Bijan Zangeneh said recoverable gas is estimated at 230 bcm, translating to 35 mcm per day once it is produced. This is while Turkey needs 130 mcm a day which it sources from Iran, Russia and Azerbaijan.

"Investing at sea is expensive and requires technology. On the other hand, it takes time and needs a refinery to build," he said. Many officials and analysts have cautioned that it could take up to a decade for gas from the Black Sea find to come online, and would need billions of dollars of investment to build up the infrastructure for production and supply.

According to Turkey's Energy Minister Fatih Donmez, the gas find is located in waters 2,100 meters deep, with drilling extending another 1,400 meters below the sea bed. Through a pipeline, Iran sells about 10 billion cubic meters a year of gas to Turkey under a 25-year supply deal signed in 1996. The pipeline has been the target of occasional attacks by PKK terrorists, but the latest blast in March and Turkey's dithering on repairing it prompted many observers to wonder whether it was a sign of a shift in Ankara's energy policies.

The U.S. Department of Energy in a statement said that Honeywell International, Baker Hughes, General Electric, Stellar Energy, and Chevron had signed commercial agreements worth as much as \$8 billion with the Iraqi ministers of oil and electricity.

U.S. energy companies have been trying to expand their involvement in the oil-rich nation. In 2018, the Trump administration reportedly warned Iraqi officials to forgo a \$15 billion power generation deal with Germany's Siemens and award it to General Electric instead.

According to Bloomberg News, senior U.S. officials warned former Iraqi prime minister Haider al-Abadi at the time that signing the deal with Siemens would seriously jeopardize Iraq's relations with the United States.

"But again, we have to get used to it. I think it's going to be for some time that we're not going to have crowds.

Medvedev was rarely under pressure, saving all three break chances he faced while getting the one early break he needed in each set for an uncomplicated win.

The Russian world number five will next take on Slovenian qualifier Aljaz Bedene, who was 7-6 (5) 7-5 winner over American Taylor Fritz.

In other early action, big-hitting Canadian Milos Raonic blasted 23 aces in 6-3 7-5 victory over Briton Daniel Evans.

A SUNCION (Reuters) - Former world soccer star Ronaldinho Gaucho left Paraguay on Tuesday, hours after a judge liberated him from five months of house arrest over an adulterated passport.

Ronaldinho left the hotel where he had been staying since April in the capital, Asuncion, for Rio de Janeiro on a private flight with his brother Roberto, Paraguayan authorities said.

Hours beforehand on his Instagram account, he thanked his Brazilian lawyer and the team of professionals who advised him in Paraguay, as well as some fans who gave him gifts. He also published a photo with the former defender of the Paraguayan team, Carlos Gamarra.

The departure closes a turbulent chapter in the life of the charismatic striker, who helped Brazil win the 2002 World Cup. They spent 32 days held in a police station along with drug traffickers, policemen and corrupt politicians before paying \$1.6 million in bail to be detained instead in a hotel.

Southgate has previously shown his willingness to get tough with misbehaving players, dropping Manchester City winger Raheem Sterling after he clashed with Liverpool's Joe Gomez in a training ground dispute. Maguire, who has 26 England caps, became the world's most expensive defender following his £80 million (\$105 million) move from Leicester last year.

Bring Joy Back To Tired Juventus

TURIN (Dispatches) - Paulo Dybala will remain at Juventus but fellow Argentinian Gonzalo Higuain will not, new coach Andrea Pirlo revealed on Tuesday, as he vowed to bring joy back to the Italian champions' game.

Former Italy and Juventus star Pirlo took over this month after Maurizio Sarri was sacked after just one season following the club's Champions League last 16 exit to Lyon. Despite his lack of coaching experience 41-year-old Pirlo warned: "I think I'm in the right place at the right time.

"I want to bring back to Juventus some of that enthusiasm that has been lacking recently." Dybala, 26, will remain at the heart of the Juventus attack alongside Cristiano Ronaldo, but 32-year-old Higuain's time in Turin is over.

"He was a great champion, a great player but the cycle is over," Pirlo told his first press conference in Turin.

"We looked each other in the eyes, we talked and we made this decision.

"I admire him a lot, but we have decided that the paths will separate."

Higuain joined Juventus in 2016 from Napoli and had two loan spells at AC Milan and Chelsea before returning to Turin last season.

Pirlo continued: "Dybala has never been on the market. For me he is an important player. As soon as he returns, he will be part of the project.

"We have already chatted with Ronaldo. And we will have time to talk about tactics and roles." Sarri, 61, took over on a three-year contract last summer, but was often criticised for his



Man City Chairman **Confident** Over **Guardiola Future**

ONDON (Dispatches) - Manchester City chairman Khaldoon Al Mubarak is "comfortable" about Pep Guardiola's future as the Spanish boss enters the final year of his contract.

Guardiola is yet to extend his current deal with the Premier League club and speculation about his future is sure to ramp up in coming months.

There were claims that Guardiola might quit City if they did not win their appeal against a two-year European ban, but that legal battle was successful.

Al Mubarak insists there is no rush to resolve the future of the former Barcelona and Bayern Munich manager, but he is not panicking about a potential exit.

"This conversation with Pep is a natural conversation. Pep and I have a very clear understanding about what is right for the club and what is not," Al Mubarak told City's website on Tuesday.

"We have a clear alignment in terms of where we see the future and what we want in terms of success for the club.

"I think, again, it will be a comfortable conversation and it will work out in the best way for Pep, for me and for the club. I'm very comfortable about that."

Guardiola took charge at City on an initial three-year deal in 2016 and extended that by a further two seasons in 2018.

The 49-year-old has won six major trophies with City, including two Premier League titles. Despite City finishing 18 points behind Premier League champions Liverpool last season and crashing out of the Champions League against Lyon, Guardiola still has Al Mubarak's trust.
