Tehran Condemns Bahrain's Shameful Normalization Deal With Israel

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran has strongly condemned a normalization agreement between Bahrain and Israel. saying the Manama regime sacrificed the Palestinian cause against the occupation for the upcoming US presidential election through the "shameful" treaty.

In a statement released on Saturday, Iran's Foreign Ministry said the Bahraini regime had committed a "fundamental mistake" by turning its back to its own people instead of gaining legitimacy form them. It had also sought refuge from the regime occupying Jerusalem al-Quds and sacrificed the Palestinian cause for the domestic US election, the statement added.

The Foreign Ministry stressed that Iran considers the announcement on the establishment of diplomatic ties between Israel and Bahrain as "a shameful and humiliating act" on the part of the latter, which sacrificed decades of Palestinian struggle and suffering for the U.S. vote.

"The oppressed and right-seeking people of Palestine and the freedom-seeking Muslims of the world, without doubt, will never accept the normalization of relations with the usurping and lawless Israeli regime, and this shameful act will remain in the historical memory of the oppressed and downtrodden Palestinian nation and the world's freedom-seeking nations," it said.

Iran Will Make **Enemies Regret** Their Miscalculation

TEHRAN (MNA) - Iranian Army's first-in-command warned the enemies to not make any miscalculation in the region as the Iranian armed forces enjoy the utmost readiness.

"The message of the military drill for enemies and those who have bad thoughts in their minds is that they should never test the Islamic Republic of Iran and never follow their miscalculations because they will regret the response; we displayed part of this response as far as it could be displayed," said Army Commander Major General Seyyed Abdolrahim Mousavi on Saturday after the massive 3-day Zolfaghar-99 military drill was wrapped up in the southern regions of the country.

Iranian armed forces cannot even be compared to a year before, he said, adding, "Our defense industries and universities are consistently helping to build new and updated equipment and collaboration [among forces] are increasing and thanks to God, we have the best readiness."

Home-grown 'strategic' equipment, continued the Major General, has been successfully tested during the drill which has achieved all its pre-determined goals. "We managed to successfully integrate Iran-made submarines and drones into operation based on determined missions," he said, adding that Fateh submarine and Simorgh drone are signs of the authority of the country in the region.

The message of the drill for Iranians is that armed forces are fully ready to defend the country, its interests, and ideals, added the commander.



White House Has No Sense of Humanity

TEHRAN - President Hassan Rouhani has condemned U.S. sanctions which have obstructed Iran's access to medicines amid the coronavirus pandemic, saying the White House knows nothing about humanity.

Speaking during a meeting of the national task force for fighting the coronavirus on Saturday, Rouhani slammed Washington for blocking a request by the Iranian government for a loan from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to combat the deadly outbreak.

'We requested a \$5 billion loan from the IMF and all members agreed, but America does not allow us to get the loan for medicines and treatment," he said. "They have distanced from humanity as far as this. The White House today has no sense of humanity. If it had a sense of humanity, it wouldn't have done this," he said.

The Iranian president also lashed out at what he called "friendly countries" that have frozen Iran's money in their banks. "We have countries that are also our friends and our money is in their bank, [but] they have locked it three times and are not willing to release our money for our needs. They say that the Americans have pressured" them against

unfreezing Iran's money and that they had retreated in the face of the US oppression, Rouhani said. Such a crime is unprecedented in history, with a country not being able to draw off its money deposited in a bank in a bid to cover its people's health needs, he underlined.

The Americans, he added, are angry about how the Iranian government is managing the country, so they are mounting their pressure despite the country's fight against the highly contagious virus. Iran has been contending with the deadliest pandemic the world has seen in many decades amid US sanctions,

which have seriously hampered efforts to contain the outbreak. More than 397,801 Iranians have been infected with COVID-19 in Iran. More than 22,913 have died, while

342,539 have recovered. President Rouhani went on to say that a top priority for the government is to provide medicines for people amid the tough economic situation caused by sanctions.

"At a time when enemies have even banned [companies from sending] medications needed by the people as part of their unfair and illegal sanctions, a high priority for the country is to meet needs for medicines," he said.

He made the remarks during a conversation with Governor of the Central Bank of Iran Abdolnasser Hemmati, who presented a report on the trend of procurement of raw materials for pharmaceutical companies.

Hemmati said some \$900 million have been allocated to the import of medicines and medical equipment over the past six months.

Maduro Says "American Spy" Captured Near Venezuelan Oil Refineries

spy" with heavy weapons and money near two refineries in the country, which is gripped by an acute fuel shortage crisis as a result of illegal U.S.-imposed sanctions.

"Yesterday we captured... an American spy who was spying in Falcon state on the Amuay and Cardon refineries," Maduro said in a televised address in capital Caracas on Friday.

The individual, Maduro said, was a member of the U.S. Marine Corps who worked with the CIA in Iraq, and was captured with "heavy, specialized weapons and a large amount of cash" in the northwestern state. The arrest took place after authorities had "discovered and dismantled" a "plan to cause an explosion" at El Palito refinery in Carabobo state, west of the capital. Venezuelan authorities have stepped up security at all refineries in the Latin American country after the incidents.

Two former members of the U.S. military were detained in Venezuela earlier this year after a group of mercenaries attempted to intrude into the northern state of La Guaira on speedboats. The Venezuelan military foiled the attack, killing eight of the armed men and arresting several others. Venezuela sits on the world's largest oil reserves and its refineries can produce more than 1.3 million barrels per day (bpd) of fuel, but they are working at less than 20% of their capacity mainly due to power outages and lack of spare parts amid U.S. sanctions.

The government announced on Friday a new fuel distribution initiative and said it was planning new refining projects in the face of long lines stretching for kilometers by Venezuelans to fuel up their vehicles.

Venezuela descended into political turmoil after opposition figure Juan Guido unilaterally declared himself "interim president" in January last year, followed by a US-backed botched putsch against the elected government. There was also an attempt at assassinating President Maduro in a drone strike in 2018.

Guaido's self-proclamation and his coup attempt received backing from the U.S. administration. Ever since, Washington has imposed several rounds of crippling sanctions against the oil-rich South American country

aimed at ousting Maduro and replacing him with Guaido. The sanctions, which include the illegal confiscation of Venezuelan assets abroad and an economic blockade, have caused enormous suffering for millions of people in the country.

Iran Exports \$2.5b **Products to Arab States**

TEHRAN (MNA) - Director general of Trade Promotion Organization (TPO)'s Office of Arabian and African Countries revealed that \$2.5 billion worth of non-oil goods was exported to Arab states in West Asia in first five months of current year.

Farzad Piltan made the remarks in an interview with IRNA on Sat., and reiterated, "Islamic Republic of Iran exported about \$2.5 billion worth of non-oil goods to the Arab countries in the Persian Gulf and West Asian

Iran's non-oil products were exported to the countries including Iraq, United Arab Emirates (UAE), Oman, Kuwait, Syria, Qatar, Jordan, Lebanon and Bahrain in this period, he said, adding, "Accordingly, Iran has not exported any product to Saudi Arabia and Yemen during the first five months of the current year.'

Elsewhere in his remarks, Piltan pointed to the spread of the coronavirus global pandemic and added, "Iran's exports value registered some \$3.5 billion decline due to the spread of coronavirus and closure of Iran's borders with neighboring countries as well as stoppage of trade ties across the region and globe."

Zolfaghar-99 Military **Exercise Wraps Up**

TEHRAN (MNA) - The Grand Joint Zolfaghar-99 military exercise ended its work in eastern waters of Strait of Hormuz yesterday with a parade of surface and subsurface vessels.

As held in the presence of Iranian Army Commander Major General Seyyed Abdolrahim Mousavi and some of senior commanders of the Iran's Army Force as well as observers from Khatam al-Anbiya Defense Base, a variety of surface and subsurface submarine units of the Navy including destroyers, missile launchers, and submarines of 'Tariq, Ghadir and Fateh-class submarines' marched and showcased their strength and power to the world.

In this ceremony, aircrafts of Iran's Army Air Force accompanied the surface and subsurface units.

The three-day exercise, dubbed Zolfaghar-99, kicked off on Thursday under the command of the Army's Zolfaqar base, condenamed "Sheyed al-Shohada" and with the participation and cooperation of four-unit Army Force and Air Defense Base on the area of two million square kilometers in the eastern waters of the Strait of Hormuz, Makran coast, Oman Sea and North Ocean India up to 10 degrees north. Pakistan Gov't Bans **Import of Iranian Vegetables**

LAHORE (Dispatches) - Pakistan's federal government's Department of Plant Protection (DPP)'s quarantine unit, which is responsible to keep a check on import and export of edible goods, has banned the import of potatoes and tomatoes from Iran due to which there is a fear of price hike and shortage of the two staple vegetables across the country.

Per sources, a ban was imposed on the import of tomatoes and potatoes coming to Pakistan through the Taftan border of Iran, which has led to a nationwide shortage of these items. The shortage can turn more serious in the next few weeks.

Food factories manufacturing potato chips in Pakistan import a large quantity of Agria, a special type of potato from Iran, but due to the ban, these companies have started buying local potatoes in bulks to stock them in the factories. Owing to that, the demand and price system has come under severe pressure and there is a risk of a sharp rise in the price of potatoes in the coming days as well as a decrease in its availability.

Judiciary Sentences Own High-Ranking Official to 31 Years in jail

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Judiciary has sentenced a high-ranking official in its executive branch to a total of 31 years in prison over involvement in a major financial corruption case.

Judiciary spokesman Gholam-Hossein Esmaeili announced the ruling on Saturday and said Akbar Tabari, the former deputy head of the Judiciary for executive affairs, had been found guilty of eight corruption counts in the high-profile case. "Mr. Tabari has been sentenced to 31 years in prison and confiscation of property resulting from bribery and permanent dismissal from government services and a fine of more than 430 billion rials for forming a multi-member bribery network," Esmaeili said. The spokesman said the verdict issued for the defendant is not final and subject to appeal in the country's Supreme Court.

Two other people involved in the case were also given 15 and 10 years in jail.

In another development on Saturday, Navid Afkari was executed after being convicted of stabbing to death a government employee in the southern Fars province in 2018. Afkari was executed "this morning after legal procedures were carried out at the insistence of the parents and the family of the victim," the head of the Justice Department in Fars province was quoted as saying by state media. The 27-year-old fatally had stabbed Hassan Turkman, a water supply company employee, in the southern city of Shiraz during riots over fuel prices in 2018.

Bahrain's Agreement With Israel, Betrayal to Islamic Cause and Palestinians

TEHRAN - Majlis Speaker's special aide for international affairs condemned Bahrain's agreement with the Zionist regime to normalize relations as a great betraval to the Islamic cause and Palestinians.


schemes. Pointing to the U.S.-cooked plot regarding the UAE to normalize ties with the Zionist regime, he advised them to learn from history.

Iran Exports of **Construction Materials Topped \$7b**

TEHRAN - Minister of industry, mine and trade says the country earned nearly \$7 billion from exports of various materials used in construction activities in the year ending March 2020, adding that steel and cement contributed to the largest share of revenues gained from shipments.

Ja'far Serqini said that Iran's output of construction materials is nearly double the domestic demand, adding that producers keep tapping into various markets inside and outside the region to find customers for their high-quality products.

"Today our country is a major exporter of steel in the region and a leading exporter of cement in the world," said Serqini, adding that Iran had increased its supply of glass, tile and ceramics to foreign customers in recent years.

The minister said construction materials accounted for 70 percent of total exports of \$10 billion from Iran's mining industry over the past calendar year.



Iran's massive mining and metals sector has expanded in recent years mainly because sanctions imposed by the U.S. on the country's direct sale of crude have led to more activity across the sector.

The government has also raised tariffs on exports of raw minerals as it seeks increased local production for finished products.

That comes despite a decision by Washington in May 2019 to introduce a series of comprehensive bans on Iran's trade of metals.

However, the bans have largely failed to disrupt the flow of out of Iran of products like steel and copper as customers find them increasingly competitive compared to regional and international rivals.

PGPIC Sets New Records in **Global Rankings**

TEHRAN - ICIS announced the top 100 Petrochemical Companies in 2020, and The Persian Gulf Petrochemical Industries Company (PGPIC), which is under the most severe sanctions, is ranked 40th in the world and second in the region.

According to the report released by the ICIS, which examines companies' performance reports in 2019, the sales change of the top 100 petrochemical companies in the world due to increased competition in the market and excess production capacity in 2019 compared to the previous year. The sales change decreased by 4.9 percent, which reduced the sales of 34 companies by more than ten percent.

Also, the operating profit of the top 100 petrochemical companies has decreased by an average of 17.4% and their net income is inclined by 46.5% compare to 2018 as the profit margins of these companies have been critically affected.

Ten of the top 100 companies in the report of 2018 have identified losses in 2019. The performance of Persian Gulf Petrochemical Industries Company (PGPIC) as the only Iranian company in the list is impressive compared to the average of the top 100 companies. PGPIC operating profit change percentage is much better than the average list and also its regional rival SABIC.

Also, the PGPIC is ranked second in the Capex changes for the second year and stands after BASF, which shows the constant investment to maintain and develop the company's competitive advantage in global markets.

Also, in R&D and the total assets change, PGPIC is among the top 15 companies in the list of 2019, which will lead to risen production and sales in the following years.

The ranking of Persian Gulf Petrochemical Industries Company in this list in 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018 was equal to 34, 44, 38, and 35. PGPIC maintains its position in the list as the top 40 companies despite unjust sanctions on the activities of the petrochemical industry in Iran and its activities as well as limited access to the international financial resources. Difficulties in selling and transporting products and a sharp decline in the price of Rials against foreign currencies that leads to a decrease in sales in 2019 were other crucial problems of this company.

Loading, Unloading **Non-Oil Goods Almost Doubled in Chabahar Port**

CHABAHAR (IRNA) - Loading and unloading non-oil shipments in Chabahar Port has increased by 97% in the current Iranian year compared to the same period last year, Managing Director of Ports and Maritime Organization of Iran (PMO) Behrouz Aqaee said on Saturday.

Chabahar, Iran's only ocean port, which is located by the Sea of Oman, is being developed further with Indian investment. Importing basic commodities through Chabahar has increased by 330%, Aqaee said, adding that the port's unique offers to the importers and exporters, as well as shipping lines, have driven investors toward Chabahar.

The strategic location of Chabahar has encouraged Iranian and foreign investors to use it for transport of goods, Aqaee said. He said that Chabahar is well-equipped and modern, adding that the highest number of import of basic goods was that of wheat with 479,000 tons.

He said that compared to the same period last year, the volume of export through Chabahar Port has become 37-fold. Construction material, farming products, and perishable goods that are exported in refrigerated containers are a big part of exported goods through Chabahar Port. Transit of goods has become 157-fold, which includes farming products, wheat, sugar, and food, he said, adding that Chabahar offers a 30% discount for Terminal Handling Charges (THC) for loading and unloading and a 50% discount for foreign transit containers, which is just a part of the ports offers.

Chabahar also offers an 87% for storage costs of transit containers and a 75% for storage costs of imported goods containers, also empty containers to load exported or transit goods have a three-month long exemption from storage costs, said the PMO managing director. Aqaee also said that the government of Iran is paying special attention to further develop Chabahar Port and completing its infrastructures.

IME Witnesses Growth In Weekly Trade

TEHRAN - While over 923,380 MT of commodities worth over \$2,000m were traded last week on the Iran Mercantile Exchange (IME), the trading volume and value experienced growth of %98 and %70, respectively.



According to the report from IME International Affairs and PR, on the domestic and export metal and mineral trading floor of IME, 477,117 MT of various products worth close to \$1,300m were traded.

On this trading floor, 462,825 MT of steel, 6,540 MT of aluminum, 8,180 MT of copper, 120 MT of molybdenum concentrates, 12 MT of precious metal concentrates, 140 MT of zinc ingot as well as 10 kg of gold bullion were traded by customers.

The report declares that on domestic and export oil and petrochemical trading floors of IME, 440,856 MT of different commodities with the total value of \$712m were traded.

On this trading floor, 106,400 MT of VB feed stock, 165,124 MT of bitumen, 69,771 MT of polymer products, 42,229 MT of chemical products, 39,500 MT of lube cut oil, 1,310 MT of insulation, 2,107 MT of base oil, 140 MT of argon as well as 14,275 MT of sulfur were traded.

Furthermore, 5,407 MT of commodities were traded on the same trading floor.




China's Foreign Ministry did not specify the measures, which it described as reciprocal.

Israel, Bahrain Agree to **Establish Full Diplomatic Ties**

MANAMA (Dispatches) - Bahrain and Israel have agreed to establish full diplomatic relations, U.S. President Donald Trump announced Friday, hailing the deal as "a historic breakthrough".

In a joint statement, the United States, Bahrain and Israel said the agreement was reached after Trump spoke with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Bahrain's King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa on Friday.

"This is a historic breakthrough to further peace in the Middle East," the statement reads.

The deal comes after Israel and the United Arab Emirates announced a similar agreement last month. Bahrain will join Israel and the UAE for a signing ceremony at the White House on September 15, Trump told

reporters on Friday. "It's unthinkable that this could happen and so fast," he said about the Israel-Bahrain deal.

Trump's son-in-law and senior White House adviser, Jared Kushner, hailed the agreements as "the culmination of four years of great work" by the Trump administration.

"We're seeing the beginning of a new Middle East, and the president has really secured alliances and partners in trying to pursue that," Kushner said.

In a Hebrew-language statement, Netanyahu said he was "moved" to announce the agreement with Bahrain, which he said "adds to the historic peace with the United Arab Emirates".

Palestinian leaders have criticised Arab states for normalising ties with Israel while it continues its military occupation of Palestinian lands, saying such deals threaten to cement the status quo. The Palestinian Liberation Organization said Friday that the Bahrain-Israel deal was "another treacherous stab to [the] Palestinian cause".

Al Jazeera's Nida Ibrahim. reporting from Ramallah in the occupied West Bank, said Palestinians have unequivocally condemned Friday's announcement.

Ibrahim said Al Jazeera spoke to a Palestinian official close to Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas who said that peace between Arab countries and Israel "will not happen without the Palestinian issue being resolved".

She said the official also said he did not believe Israel's deals with Bahrain and the UAE would have happened "without regional backing".

Kushner, speaking to reporters in a call from the White House soon after the announcement said the UAE and Bahrain agreements "will help reduce tension in the Muslim world and allow people to separate the Palestinian issue from their own national interests and from their foreign policy, which should be focused on their domestic priorities".



China, India Agree to Disengage Troops on Contested Border

BEIJING (Reuters) - China and India said on Friday they had agreed to de-escalate renewed tensions on their contested Himalayan border and take steps to restore "peace and tranquillity" following a high-level diplomatic meeting in Moscow. Chinese State Councillor Wang Yi and Indian Foreign Minister S. Jaishankar met in Moscow on Thursday and reached a five-point consensus, including agreements that troops from both sides should quickly disengage and

ease tensions, the two countries said in a joint statement. The consensus, struck on the sidelines of a Shanghai Cooperation Organisation meeting, came after a

confrontation in the border area in the western Himalayas earlier this week. "The two Foreign Ministers agreed that the current situation in the border areas is not in the interest of either side. They agreed therefore that the border troops of both sides should continue their dialogue, quickly disengage, maintain proper distance and ease tensions," they said in the statement. Jaishankar told Wang that the immediate task would be for troops to step back from the "areas of friction" so that things do not get worse, an Indian source said. Troops are barely a few hundred

metres apart at some points.

U.S. Expects to Identify Belarus Sanctions Targets in a Few Days

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - The United States signaled on Friday that it will soon punish individual Belarusians with sanctions for election fraud and a brutal crackdown on protests as Washington urged Russia to tell Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko to step down.

Lukashenko denies rigging the country's Aug. 9 election, which official results said he won by a landslide. He also has refused to talk to the opposition, accusing them of trying to wreck the former Soviet republic squeezed between

Speaking to reporters during a conference call, U.S. Deputy Secretary of State Stephen Biegun said Washington is coordinating sanctions with the European Jnion but made clear neither would wait for the other to impose penalties.

"We are looking at targeted sanctions aimed at the individuals who are most responsible for ... the violence as well as the theft of the election," Biegun said, adding wider sanctions might be considered later but Washington was loath to do anything that would hurt the broader population.

A senior U.S. State Department official told Reuters on Sept. 1 Washington was weighing sanctions on seven Belarusians.

Biegun said Lukashenko, who has been in power for 26 years and is to meet Russian President Vladimir Putin on Monday, is increasingly reliant on Moscow to maintain his rule, saying this could turn Belarusian public opinion against Russia.

"It risks turning the Belarusian people, who have no grievance with Russia, against Moscow," he said, adding that he hoped the Kremlin would voice concern about the

violence against protesters in Belarus and the abductions of opposition figures.

"A free and fair election will allow Belarusian people to select who will be the next president of Belarus," he said. "Ultimately we hope the message from Moscow to Minsk is that the ruler needs to give way to the will of his people."

China and India accused each other of firing into the air during the confrontation, a violation of long-held protocol not to use firearms on the sensitive frontier.

Wang told Jaishankar the "imperative is to immediately stop provocations such as firing and other dangerous actions that violate the commitments made by the two sides," China's foreign ministry said in a statement on Friday.

Wang also told Jaishankar all personnel and equipment that have trespassed at the border must be moved to de-escalate the situation.

In June, tensions erupted into a frontier clash in which 20 Indian soldiers were killed and China suffered an unspecified number of casualties.

Shares of defence-related firms fell in China on Friday after the news of progress in the talks, with the CSI National Defense Industry Index down 1.2% and on track for its steepest weekly decline since Oct. 12, 2018. Tongyu Heavy Industry shares tumbled as much as 16.4% at one point.

Russia Votes in Local Elections Targeted by Stricken Navalny

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Russians vote in an array of local elections on Sunday that will test the ruling United Russia party's grip on power less than a month after the suspected poisoning of outspoken Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny.

The elections had been targeted by Navalny, who was urging his followers to vote tactically against the party that backs President Vladimir Putin before he fell gravely ill in what Germany and his allies say was an attempt to kill him. Putin looks unassailable as president despite his approval

rating slipping to two-decade lows earlier this year. But the results will be parsed for signs of protest voting spurred by frustrations over years of falling wages, the government's handling of the pandemic, and the ensuing economic fallout.

The elections are seen by the Kremlin as a dry run for parliament elections next September and will elect 18 regional governors and a slew of local parliaments and city councillors. Early voting began on Friday.

The rating of United Russia, which dominates politics across Russia's 11 time zones, dipped last month to 30.5%, its lowest since 2006, according to the state pollster VTsIOM, but it still remains much higher than that of Russia's other parliamentary parties.

Before he fell ill, Navalny was promoting a strategy he said aimed to disrupt a political system that often bars the Kremlin's staunchest foes from elections, while allowing softer candidates from the parliamentary parties to compete. The strategy, which his allies are pressing ahead with, calls on supporters to back specific candidates - often from the Communist or LDPR nationalist parties - to hurt United Russia.

The anti-corruption campaigner also has dozens of allies running in elections for the city councils of Novosibirsk and Tomsk in Siberia. He was flying back to Moscow after meeting them when he collapsed suddenly last month.

These are the first elections since constitutional reforms were passed allowing Putin to run for two more six-year terms in the Kremlin, potentially extending his rule until 2036, instead of stepping down in 2024.

Weighed down by a lockdown that inflicted economic pain on some households, Putin's approval rating dipped to 59% in April, a two-decade low, but then recovered to 66% last month, according to the Levada opinion pollster. There have been some signs of anti-Kremlin discontent in the regions.

Mass rallies in the far eastern city of Khabarovsk show no sign of abating two months after they flared over the arrest of a popular local governor who defeated United Russia's candidate in an election upset in 2018.



Several Killed In Suicide Bombing 🥒 In Somalia

MOGADISHU (Dispatches) - At least six people have been killed in a suicide bombing outside a mosque in the Somalian port city of Kismayo, according to a regional official.

"A suicide bomber wearing a heavy vest of explosives targeted the Muslim congregation at the Qaadim mosque in the centre of the town as people were leaving the mosque after performing Friday prayers," Abdinasir Gulled told the dpa news agency.

Another 20 people were injured in the attack, which may have been aimed at a provincial politician, Gulled said.

Al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the attack on their Radio Andalus. The armed group, which has ties to al-Qaeda, regularly launches attacks on government officials, journalists and prominent businessmen, as well as civilians, in the volatile nation in the Horn of Africa.

The incident comes after three people were killed and seven were injured in a suicide attack at a Mogadishu restaurant on Wednesday. Information ministry spokesman Ismail Mukhtar Omar said the attacker walked into the Blue Sky restaurant near Mogadishu National Theatre before blowing himself up.

At least three Somali special forces soldiers were also killed and an American officer was wounded in a car bombing and mortar attack outside a military base in Somalia's south on Monday. Al-Shabab said it was behind the attack and put the number of dead at 20.

A Somali soldier was also wounded in the attack in Janay Abdalla village, some 60km (37 miles) from Kismayo - which is also Jubaland state's administrative capital.

Somalia has faced near-continuous conflict for almost 30 years, while the internationally-backed government in Mogadishu has been fighting al-Shabab since 2008.

In August, 10 civilians and a police officer were killed in a gun-andbomb attack by al-Shabab on an upscale beachfront hotel in the capital.




India Plans to Restrict Copper, Aluminum Imports

NEW DELHI (Reuters) - India is planning to raise surveillance of copper and aluminum imports while developing policies to curb shipments from China and other Asian nations to protect domestic producers, said two government sources and an industry official.

Officials in New Delhi are expected to soon ask importers to register with authorities as a first step towards tighter controls that would require permits for individual shipments of the two metals, government sources said. The sources declined to be identified due to the sensitive





LONDON (Dispatches) - The deal, which has so far only been agreed upon in principle and for which details are thin, will increase commerce with Japan by around 15 billion pounds (\$19 billion) and expands upon a recently signed deal between the EU and Japan, the U.K. said.

"The agreement we have negotiated — in record time and in challenging circumstances — goes far beyond the existing EU deal, as it secures new wins for British businesses in our great manufacturing, food and drink, and tech industries," said Britain's international trade secretary, Liz Truss. The government said U.K. businesses would benefit from tariff-free trade on 99% of exports to Japan and that it would give British businesses a gateway to the Asia-Pacific region.

Skeptics say no amount of such trade deals can mitigate for the losses Britain would suffer in the event of a 'no-deal' outcome with the EU, given that trade with the 27-nation bloc accounts for around half the country's total.

While the U.K. left the EU this year, it is still trying to agree on new trade relations when current deals expire at the end of the year.

Concerns over a post-Brexit deal have risen in the past few days as relations between the U.K. and the EU soured. The announcement from the British government that new legislation breaches parts of the withdrawal agreement, which allowed for the country's smooth departure from the bloc, has prompted a furious reaction from the EU and raised the prospect of an imminent collapse in the talks.

Even before the standoff, the trade discussions had made little progress, with the two sides seemingly wide apart on several issues, notably on business regulations, the extent to which the U.K. can support certain industries and over the EU fishing fleet's access to British waters.

The EU has been particularly insistent on ensuring that Britishbased businesses don't have an unfair advantage as a result of laxer social, environmental or subsidy rules in the U.K.

British businesses are worried about a collapse in the talks that could see tariffs and other impediments slapped on trade with the EU at the start of next year. Though the U.K. left the bloc on Jan. 31, it is in a transition period that effectively sees it abide by EU rules until the end of this year. The discussions are about agreeing the broad outlines of the trading relationship from the start of 2021.

Most economists think that the costs of a "no-deal" outcome would fall disproportionately on the U.K.

Supporters of Brexit have said that one of the benefits of unshackling the British economy from the EU is that it allows the country to sign trade deals with whomever it wishes — the EU negotiates trade deals on behalf of all its members.

The concern over future trade ties comes at a time when the British economy continues to recover from a deep recession

caused by the shutdown of businesses to limit the coronavirus pandemic. The Office for National Statistics said the economy grew by a month-on-month rate of 6.6% in July as many sectors started reopening after months of being idle. Despite the increase, the economy remains 11.7% smaller than it was in February. Economists think the recovery will moderate as new virus infections have picked up again, leading the government to put new limits on social gatherings and travel.

The looming end of a salary-support scheme and heightened uncertainties over a trade deal with the EU are also expected to weigh on growth and, as a result, most economists think the economy will end the year about 8% smaller than it was before the pandemic.

"The big risk to the U.K. upswing remains a disorderly hard exit from the EU single market," said Kallum Pickering, senior economist at Berenberg Bank.

Cuba Plans First Official Peso Devaluation Since 1959 Revolution

HAVANA (Reuters) - Communist-run Cuba will soon devalue the peso's one-to-one exchange rate with the U.S. dollar for the first time since the 1959 revolution, according to three sources who requested anonymity due to the sensitivity of the subject.

As part of the reforms, due before the end of this year, authorities will also unify Cuba's two domestic currencies, according to two Cuban sources and a foreign businessman, all with some knowledge of the plan. The peso will be kept and the convertible peso, which is fixed on par with the dollar for state business but

xchanged with the public at 24 pesos to buy and 25 pesos to sell, will be eliminated, the sources said. Cuba's government has said it will respect the peso's current rate with the public for a time to allow residents

o change their convertible pesos for pesos and do so automatically for convertible peso bank accounts. 'The most important measure is going to be changing the official exchange rate used by the state

companies," Omar Everleny, one of Cuba's best-known economists, told Reuters. "There are several proposals. It will never be one on one ... It is between 10 and up," he said.

The peso's value versus the Canadian dollar, euro and other convertible currencies also is expected to be idjusted downward based on international market rates.

The Cuban economy is largely owned and run by the state, and exchange rates are set by the government. The measures are part of a package of reforms aimed at fighting an economic crisis caused by tough U.S. sanctions under President Donald Trump and exacerbated by the coronavirus pandemic and the bureaucratic inefficiency of the island's Soviet-style economy.

Iraq Debates Its Contribution to OPEC+ Oil Cuts

BAGHDAD (Reuters) - A debate within Iraq over whether it should ask to be exempt from OPEC+ oil supply cuts has resurfaced as low prices squeeze its finances, challenging a government struggling to tackle the destruction of years of war and rampant corruption.

between OPEC and its allies led by Russia.

"Iraq always believed they were not properly treated in December 2016 when they were not exempted. As the economy continues to reel from low prices this issue keeps resurfacing," said an OPEC source.

Iraq's economy and oil sector were battered by years of wars, sanctions and a stubborn Islamist insurgency triggered by the U.S. invasion. Baghdad complained it had struggled to revive its stagnating oil industry, at a time where other OPEC members benefited and boosted their market share.

Iraq relies on oil to fund 97% of its state budget. Iraqi Finance Minister Ali Allawi told parliament on Wednesday that reforming Iraq's economy would take five years of work and that state debt amounted to 80-90% of national product, while foreign debt was at \$133 billion.

From May 1, the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and allies, a grouping known as OPEC+, made a record cut of 9.7 million bpd, or 10% of global output, after the coronaries destroyed a third of world demand. From Aug. 1, the cut tapered to 7.7 million bpd until December.

Iraqi politicians have criticized the pact which was signed by the previous caretaker government under which Baghdad had committed to a big cut in its output.

With oil prices currently trading at around \$40 a barrel, opposition to the oil cuts is rising behind closed doors and talks of reviving old calls to review the size of the reductions have resurfaced. Iraq and OPEC sources told Reuters.

A senior Iraqi official with knowledge of the talks said there were differing views between the oil ministry and the prime minister's office over whether to fully comply with the cuts or ask for an exemption for next year.

Lockdowns have eased and there has been a "sharp rebound of output, consumption and employment," they said in Foreign Policy magazine, adding, "this crisis, however, is far from over." "The recovery remains very fragile and uneven across regions and sectors. To ensure that

the recovery continues, it is essential that support not be prematurely withdrawn." They argued that businesses, even insolvent firms, will continue to need help to prevent

destruction of millions of jobs. But they also warned that governments need to be cautious about the way they distribute their scarce resources, noting, some companies are expected to fail, especially in industries

like travel that are unlikely to survive or will be curtailed in a post-pandemic world. Speaking to the World Economic Forum, Georgieva said that rapid government action "put a floor under the world economy," which helped everyone without "differentiating between...

winners and losers.' She went on to say that policymakers will need to make wise investments in areas that have the greatest benefit which include green jobs like training workers to make buildings more energy efficient - and "accelerating digital transformation" but in a way that will minimize inequalities.

"In other words, support programs that take the countries towards growth that is green,

smart and inclusive," the IMF chief said. Nevertheless, the two writers cautioned in the essay that "Though the world has learned to

live with the virus, a full recovery is unlikely without a permanent medical solution."

There are currently 128 coronavirus vaccines currently under development, they said, noting there might be a solution, but again, they added, "we must urgently devise multilateral solutions" to ensure adequate supply and distribution.

So far, over 28,029,000 have been infected with the virus and more than 908,000 have died globally.

India Tanks to 105th Spot From 79th In Global Economic Freedom Ranking



NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - India's ranking in economic freedom tumbled to 105th among 162 countries in 2018 from 79th the previous year. It should be noted that this drop cannot be attributed to the Covid-19 crisis, whose impact would become evident only two years later.

A major disappointment for India came on the parameter of "freedom to trade internationally", on which India ranked 139th, compared with 137th in 2017, showed the 'Economic Freedom of the World' report — it measures how policies and institutions of countries support economic freedom - released today by Centre for Civil Society and Canada's Fraser Institute.

Another key disappointment was India's ranking on "regulation", where it stood 122nd in 2018, against 114th a year earlier.

However, the country gained one place to 88th on "sound money" in the latest report, against 89 in the previous one. It retained its position at 79th on 'legal systems and property rights". On the size of the government, a major claim of the Narendra Modi government, the country's ranking declined to 54th in 2018 from 36th the previous year.

India reported a fall in each component of economic freedom. While a score closer to 10 indicates a higher level of economic freedom, the country's score fell on each — to 7.16 from 8.22 the previous year on the size of the government, to 5.07 from 5.17 on legal system and property rights, to 8.34 from 8.37 on sound money, to 5.71 from 6.08 on freedom to trade internationally, and to 6.53 from 6.69 on regulation of credit, labor and business.

Parth J Shah, president of the Centre for Civil Society, said: "The Centre and state governments have initiated business process re-engineering to simplify business registration and compliances. No doubt that some of these efforts have had a bearing on India's score."

\$2.1b Asiana Airlines Takeover Collapses

SINGAPORE (Dispatches) - A \$2-billion-plus deal for a South Korean property developer to take over lossmaking Asiana Airlines collapsed Friday in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic, with state-owned banks mounting a bailout to try to save 9,000 jobs. The global travel restrictions imposed to try to control the virus have wreaked havoc on the airline industry, but Asiana was

In December, a consortium led by HDC Hyundai Development agreed to buy a controlling stake in the airline from its biggest shareholder Kumho Industrial and pump in fresh cash in a deal totalling 2.5 trillion won (\$2.1 billion).

But Asiana reported operating losses of 268 billion won in the first six months of this year -- with its debts soaring to 11.5 trillion won. It has cancelled most of its international flights and since April has put all its 9,000 employees on unpaid leave for 15 days a month as it tries desperately to stay airborne.

HDC repeatedly sought to carry out further rounds of due diligence on the airline, in what was widely seen as an attempt to force a price cut.

"Kumho Industrial has notified HDC of the deal termination," Choi Dae-hyun, vice president of Asiana's main creditor Korea Development Bank (KDB), announced Friday. KDB and another state-owned lender Export-Import Bank of Korea will inject another 2.4 trillion won into the carrier to

help keep it flying, he said. They are expected to become its biggest shareholders and Choi said they would seek a new buyer after restructuring the airline.

But Asiana has already received state cash injections totalling 3.3 trillion won since the beginning of last year. And Kim Dae-jong, a business professor at Sejong University in

Seoul, said it would be hard to find a willing acquirer. "With Asiana's debt 22 times more than its assets, it will be really difficult for any company to show interest in buying it," he told AFP.

"The government has kept it afloat with rescue funds because it doesn't want to see massive layoffs happening," he said. "But it can't continue doing that forever," he added, suggesting the best option would be for Asiana to be merged with flag-carrier Korean Air, its biggest rival.

Iran Sends Back 1000 Illegal Pakistani Immigrants

ISLAMABAD (IRNA) - Iran handed over at least 1,000 illegal Pakistani immigrants last week to local authorities at Taftan border, Pakistani English Daily, 'Dawn' said on Saturday.

'Dawn' said that officials of border Levies Force received these deported Pakistanis between Sunday and Thursday as Iranian authorities handed over 200 migrants each day. Majority of these migrants hailing from different parts of country, particularly from Punjab, tried to reach European countries via Iran without having valid traveling documents, the sources said, adding that the illegal immigrants preferred rugged ways along the Pakistan-Iran border to cross the border with the help of organized human traffickers.



China's Expanded Export Controls Pose Fresh Challenge to Global Tech Industry

SHANGHAI (Reuters) - The latest additions to China's list of controlled technology exports could upset a broad range of industries and raise the possibility that some global tech giants might have to split off their Chinese operations, legal experts said.

The new list of technologies under export controls announced on Aug. 28 came as an unwelcome surprise to an industry already grappling with the uncertainty posed by trade tensions between China and the United States.

The move was initially seen as a means of giving Beijing a say in any sale of video app TikTok, but advisers to Chinese and foreign firms say the potential consequences go much further.

"The rules were a surprise to many in the market, and there is a lot of tension in the tech space at the moment," said Alex Roberts, a corporate counsel at the Shanghai office of law firm Linklaters.

In addition to recommendation algorithms such as those used by ByteDance-owned TikTok, the new list of "partially restricted exports" includes drone and cybersecurity technology, voice recognition software, and handwriting scanning software.

The revisions could also affect a bevy of multi-national companies that conduct research and development inside China, adds Nicolas Bahmanyar, cybersecurity senior consultant at LEAF law firm in Beijing.

"It's very probable that a company with R&D centres in China are going to face a choice - keep their R&D centre in China, just for China, or leave China so they can use the tech they develop anywhere in the world" he said

use the tech they develop anywhere in the world," he said.

The Ministry of Commerce was quick to respond to speculation that the new rules were aimed mainly at TikTok, saying they were not targeted at any one company.

Lawyers that have looked closely at the changes say their broad scope means they

could hit a wide range of companies across different business sectors.

They could change the thinking of companies such as Microsoft, consumer drone manufacturer SZ DJI Technology Co Ltd, video streaming service Zoom Video Communications, and Tencent Holdings, which exports games worldwide and has a fast-growing overseas cloud-service business.



A Tencent source, which has a slew of overseas subsidiaries and invested companies, said the company was waiting for clarification on what the rules would mean for technology-sharing with these units.

"In general it will impact Chinese companies' overseas businesses, mainly involving those that provide cross-border services," said Raymond Wang, managing partner at Beijing law firm Anli Partners.

Zoom, for example, employs roughly 500 people in China as engineers working on product development, according to its prospectus. Microsoft houses Microsoft Research Asia in Beijing, which has been the origin of a number of advances in AI.

Much More Work Needed to Hit Net-Zero Emissions Target



LONDON (Dispatches) - The transformation of the power sector will only get the world one-third of the way to a goal of achieving net-zero emissions by mid-century, a report by the International Energy Agency (IEA) said on Thursday.

Global carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions are expected to fall this year by eight percent from 2019 - their lowest level since 2010 - as slower economic growth due to the COVID-19 pandemic slashed energy demand.

However, the trend is not forecast to continue.

The transport, industry and building sectors currently account for more than 55 percent of CO2 emissions from the energy system and that is expected to grow due to more vehicles being electrified, metals recycling and heat production for industry and homes, the IEA said.

Electricity generation would need to be around 2.5 times higher in 2050 than it is today, requiring a rate of growth equivalent to the entire US power sector every three years.

Annual additions of renewable electricity capacity, meanwhile, would need to average around four times the current record, which was reached in 2019, the report said.

The report analysed more than 800 technology options to examine what would need to happen for the world to reach net-zero emissions by 2050.

The IEA said between a third and a half of cumulative emissions reductions needed come from technologies which are not commercially available today - for example, low-carbon hydrogen, which is produced by electrolysis powered by renewable energy, and technology to capture carbon emissions released to the atmosphere - and store them.

A large amount of additional power generation is needed for low-carbon hydrogen, which is increasingly being viewed as a way for industries such as steel to decarbonise.

The global capacity of electrolysers needs to grow to 3,300 gigawatts (GW) from 0.2 GW today. To produce enough hydrogen to reach net-zero emissions, the electrolysers would consume twice the amount of electricity which China generates, the IEA said.

UNICEF Chief Urges Firms to Fight COVID-19 With Public Sector Partners

PARIS (Reuters) - Firms should look toward public-private partnerships in the fight against COVID-19, the head of United Nations' children's agency told business leaders on Thursday.

The pandemic could provide a rare opportunity for companies and public bodies to come together to improve access to education and vaccines, UNICEF Executive Director Henrietta Fore told

the WomenCorporateDirectors (WCD) conference, a convention of corporate leaders taking place online.

"We don't make the vaccines, we can't do that without big public-private partnerships - and so we put out common bids," Fore said. The largest buyer of vaccines in the world, UNICEF said last week it would help lead efforts to procure and distribute COVID-19 vaccines as part of a plan to provide equitable accessible to shots.

On the other hand, tomatoes under cultivation in Sindh have been lost to heavy rains last week and now the new batch will be harvested in December. What is more, the limited tomato crops cultivated in Balochistan will be consumed by October. Tomatoes from Iran meets the needs of the whole country but after the ban, there is a possibility that prices may increase up to Rs200 per kilogramme.

In the light of the upcoming shortage, officials of Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Traders Association met the secretary agriculture on Wednesday, September 9, and apprised him of the situation, after which the Punjab Agriculture Department sent an emergency letter to the Ministry of National Food Security and Research and demanded it to review the ban on import of potatoes and tomatoes from Iran.

Talking to The Express Tribune, Punjab Agriculture Department's Special Secretary Punjab Waqar Hussain said that the quarantine unit of the DPP has imposed a sudden

ban which may lead to a crisis in the availability of potatoes and tomatoes.

"We have requested the federation to lift the ban. At the same time, we are taking steps to increase the supply of tomatoes by contacting the Balochistan government," he said. "We will also contact the federal authorities on this issue."

When contacted, Anjuman e Arthian Association's General Secretary Haji Ramzan said that the suspension of import could lead to a critical food shortage in the country.

"The quarantine department has imposed an unwarranted and sudden ban and allegations have surfaced that some quarantine officials stationed at the Taftan border had made some "demands" from importers," Ramzan said. "Most of the importers rejected the undue demands of the quarantine officials due to which a ban was placed." He added that if the ban is not lifted, potato and tomato prices could rise by 100% to 150%.

Lakers Take 3-1 Lead Over Houston

L OS ANGELES (AFP) - The Los Angeles Lakers are one win from entering the Western Conference Finals and five games away from the NBA Finals.

The Lakers dominated the Houston Rockets on defense and offense to win 110-100 and grab a commanding 3-1 lead in their second-round Western Conference series in Orlando. Anthony Davis scored 29 points and had 12 rebounds, five assists, and two blocked shots, while LeBron James finished with almost a triple-double – 16 points, 15 rebounds, and nine assists — for the Lakers.

James Harden had 21 points on 2-for-11 shooting and 10 assists for the Rockets. Russell Westbrook chipped in 25, Eric Gordon added 19, and Austin Rivers scored 14.

Houston trailed in the fourth but Westbrook and Gordon sparked a rally to narrow the gap to seven. A free throw by Harden whittled the lead to five but a triple by Alex Caruso in the right flank from a LeBron assist pulled the Lakers to victory.

The Lakers can secure a spot in the West Finals with a win Saturday.

The winner of this series faces either the Denver Nuggets or the Los Angeles Clippers. The Clippers are ahead in this series 3-1.

The NBA is investigating Houston forward Danuel House Jr. for allegedly allowing a female COVID-19 testing official into his hotel room.

House did not play in Game 4 which the Rockets lost and put them into the brink of elimination. What House and the woman did in the hotel room has not been disclosed.

Serena to Continue Record-Equaling Chase At French Open

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - Serena Williams plans to dust herself down after the disappointment of another failed attempt at a record-equaling 24th Grand Slam singles title and continue her chase at Roland Garros this month.

Williams crashed out of the U.S. Open semi-finals on Thursday, blowing a set lead to lose in three hard-fought sets to former world number Victoria Azarenka.

"It's obviously disappointing but at the same time I did what I could today," a weary-looking Williams told reporters.

"It feel like other times I've been close and I could have done better and today I felt like I gave a lot," she added.

It has been more than three years since Williams won her 23rd singles tennis major title at the 2017 Australian Open — when she was already pregnant with daughter Olympia.

The 38-year-old has come close since, reaching four major finals only to come away empty handed, and needs one more to match Margaret Court's record of 24.

Many commentators suggested that this week at Flushing Meadows presented her with her best opportunity due to a depleted field caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

A bevy of top players, including world number one Ashleigh Barty, world number two Simona Halep and Canadian Bianca Andreescu -- who stunned Williams in last year's final -- skipped the event because of coronavirus concerns or injury.

James Rodriguez Backs Everton to End Trophy Drought

London (Dispatches) - Everton new-boy James Rodriguez believes the Premier League club are ready to end their 25-year trophy drought.

James joined the Merseysiders from Real Madrid on Monday as the Colombia midfielder reunited with Toffees manager Carlo Ancelotti.

The 29-year-old, who previously worked with Ancelotti at Real and Bayern Munich, is the most high-profile of the manager's close-season signings and his arrival has raised expectations at Goodison Park.

"Leeds United are pleased to confirm Marcelo Bielsa has signed a new one-year deal with the club to remain as head coach for the 2020/21 season," Leeds said in a statement.

After finally leading Leeds back into the top-flight, Bielsa's side faced the daunting task of beginning their Premier League campaign away to champions Liverpool.

The Argentine has a history of walking out early in the campaign after leaving Marseille just one game into the 2015/16 season and lasted just two days in charge of Lazio a year later.

However, he eased Leeds fans' fears on Thursday by signalling his intention to remain at Elland Road for another season.

"I will be working next season with Leeds United," he said.

Guardiola Hails De Bruyne as World's Best Midfielder



NEW YORK (Dispatches) - Dominic Thiem of Austria will play Germany's Alexander Zverev in the U.S. Open final for their first Grand Slam titles after they won their last-four matches in contrasting styles Friday.



Earlier, Zverev came from two sets down to complete a remarkable comeback against 20th-seeded Spaniard Pablo Carreno Busta and reach his first tennis major final.

The 23-year-old German won an error-strewn, scrappy encounter 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3 in 3hr 23min, also on the famous Ashe court.

It marked the first time in Zverev's career that he came from two sets behind to win. "I actually looked at the scoreboard when I was down two sets to love," Zverev said.

"I was like, 'I can't believe it. I'm playing in a semi-final, I'm supposed to be the favourite and I have no chance, I'm playing that bad." Zverev made 36 unforced errors in the first two sets compared to just 12 for Carreno Busta as the nerves of the occasion seemed to get the better of him.

But Zverev began to cut down on his mistakes in the third set, upping his service game and taking control of rallies with more powerful, accurate groundstrokes. "I started taking the ball more on the rise. I started giving myself the chance to be the one that is aggressive," said the German, adding: "I'm through to my first Grand Slam final and that's all that matters."

Nadal Finding His Feet on Roman Clay

MADRID (Dispatches) - Rafael Nadal, absent from the U.S. Open, is preparing for his return to competition after a six-month break at the Foro Italico in Rome, the organisers of the Italian Open tweeted on Thursday.



"Rafa Nadal is already here, doing his first training sessions," said the tournament's official account with a photo of the Spaniard, while videos posted by fans showed Nadal hitting on the statue-lined clay court with Stan Wawrinka.

Nadal posted a photo of the clay with the statues in the background on his Instagram account with the caption "Here we are!"

The Spaniard has won the Roman clay court tournament, normally played in May, a record nine times. This year's event begins on Monday.

"It will be my first tournament after a very long period without playing," Nadal said on Tuesday. His last tournament was in Acapulco at the end of February, where he won. He opted out of the ongoing U.S. Open citing concerns over the coronavirus and slamming tennis's "barbaric" revised calendar.

The Rome tournament finishes six days before the French Open, which reigning champion Nadal has won 12 times and begins of September 27.

It features a stellar line-up of players including world number one Novak Djokovic, who was dramatically disqualified from the US Open on Sunday after striking a female lines judge with a ball. Organizers said on Thursday that the men's entry list featured 19 of the world's top 20 players, with the only major absence the injured Roger Federer.
