IRGC Opens New Naval Base at Strait of Hormuz

TEHRAN - The Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) has opened a new naval base at Sirik, a coastal Iranian town east of the strategic Strait of Hormuz in the Persian Gulf. The new base, named after Martyr Rahbari, was launched in a Wednesday ceremony attended by IRGC

Chief Commander Major General Hossein Salami. The base, whose construction started six years ago, has been built in an area of 31 hectares with the aim of giving the country full control over the arrival and departure of ultra-regional vessels in the Persian Gulf, Strait of Hormuz, and the Sea of Oman.

Addressing the opening ceremony, General Salami said the naval base has been built in the country's most strategic region, and serves both defensive and offensive purposes in the strategic region of Persian Gulf and Strait of Hormuz.

"With the opening and unveiling of this base, the country's combat operations, ship operations, reconnaissance as well as defensive and offensive operations in the Persian Gulf will further develop," he added. See Page 7

Tehran Rejects U.S. Envoy's Comments on Its Role in Afghanistan

"The Islamic Republic of Iran has officially and openly supported the launch of negotiations between the Afghan government and the Taliban and has expressed readiness to help advance the process of real and sustainable peace in that country,' he added.

Iran-EU Trade Down by 16%: **Germany Major Trade Partner**

TEHRAN - Iran's trade with EU state has stood at 2.6b euros in the first seven months of 2020 which shows over 9 percent decline comparing to the same period in 2019 as Germany is currently Iran's major European trade partner. According to the Iran Chamber of Commerce's recent study and its released report, Iran's trade volume with EU countries hit 2.6b euros in first seven months which indicates over 9 percent slump.

According to the report, Iran's overall trade with the EU nations fell in seven months to July although export increased slightly

The spread of the coronavirus pandemic and new U.S. sanctions caused a drop in trade between Iran and the European Union countries in the first seven months this year although Iran sent more shipments the EU over the same period, shows a new report.

The report published Thursday by Tehran chamber of commerce (TCCIMA) said that imports from the EU fell by over 11 percent compared to January-July 2019 to stand at €2.209 billion in value terms.

The report said, however, that Iranian exports to the EU were up nearly five percent at €440 million although non-oil exports had declined by 11 percent over the period.

Germany remained Iran's top trading partner in the EU region and was responsible for nearly 41 percent of all Iran-EU exchanges worth €2.649 billion reported over the seven months to July, it said, adding that trade with Germany and the Netherlands grew against a decline recorded in exchanges with France and Italy.

Iran's trade with France has declined by 37 percent in seven months comparing to the same period last year as the figure shows Iran's trade with France has declined the most among with European states.

April was the worst month on record for Iran-EU trade as pandemic restrictions in both Iran and across the EU caused a decline in exchanges, showed the figures by the TCCIMA.

Iran's imports from the EU reached its lowest point in July with a 29-percent decline year on year, said the report, adding that trade boomed significantly in January before the pandemic and fresh round of American sanctions imposed on Iran caused a visible decline in the value and volume of the shipments.

Trade between Iran and the EU has been flowing despite a raft of sanctions imposed by the US which seek to cut Iran's economic relations with the rest of the world, especially with U.S. allies in Europe.



A-Bomb Economically Wise?

The world economic growth is on the decline due to the outbreak of the coronavirus and some people in the world sleep the nights with empty stomachs and wait in miles-long lines to get a piece of food from the food banks. In such a condition, governments have increased the expenditures for expanding their arsenals. While the U.S. and Zionists have been talking for over 30 years about Iran's so-called secret nuclear activities and probable production and stockpile of nuclear bombs in order to deviate the public opinion and to deceive the international community and members of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), reports indicate that they themselves have been expanding their capabilities in production and stockpiling weapons of mass destruction, and just the U.S. alone has produced and stockpiled over 6,200 A-bombs with nuclear warheads.

Reports from the reliable sources show that Zionist regime, too, has boosted its arsenal in the past three years and it has increased the number of its A-bombs with nuclear warheads from 77 to 100. Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) has been founded for conducting research on international peace and its authentic and accurate reports has provided the ground for valid statistical belief. The Swedish think-tank in its recent report, which was released in Stockholm and major important part of it has been covered by the international mass media, has announced that today in the end of 2020, nine countries have stockpiled 13,865 A-bombs that one-fourth of it is enough for annihilating the world.

Following SIPRI's report, Israeli newspaper the Jerusalem Post in an article wrote, "Israel has close to 100 nuclear warheads." While Israel continues its old policy of keeping silence on its nuclear arsenal, according to the Swedish think tank's report released some three years ago (2017), this country has some 30 gravity bomb (without guidance system) which can be delivered by fighter jets. Some of these fighter jets are believed to be equipped for nuclear weapon delivery. Irregardless of the number of Israel's gravity bombs in 2017, the country has had approximately 50 warheads, that can be delivered by land-based ballistic missiles such as the Jericho III intermediate-range ballistic missile. Russia Dismisses U.S. Threats on Iran Cooperation

MOSCOW (Dispatches) - Russia on Thursday dismissed the threat of U.S. sanctions and attempts to isolate Iran, saying it intended to trade with Tehran once a UN arms embargo expires next month.

The embargo on conventional arms shipments to Iran is set to expire on October 18 after the United States failed to win support for a new UN resolution.

The administration of U.S. President Donald Trump says it has decided to unilaterally reinstate virtually all of the UN sanctions on Iran lifted under a 2015 nuclear accord with Tehran.

Washington has said it will seek to prevent Iran from purchasing Chinese tanks and Russian air defence systems. Speaking alongside visiting Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif, Russia's top diplomat Sergei Lavrov dismissed those threats as illegal. "Russia will in no way build its policies on the basis of these aggressive illegal demands which have no legal force," Lavrov said.

He expressed hope that other countries cooperating with Iran would follow suit.

"The fact that the United States threatened to introduce sanctions on all those who will contradict the U.S. interpretation of the current situation once again confirms that Washington wants to behave like a bull in a china shop," Lavrov added. "In my opinion, the current (U.S.) administration has lost diplomatic skills almost beyond retrieve," Lavrov said. He added however that Russia and European countries continued talks with Washington on the subject. Meanwhile Zarif said that the Iranian and Russian presidents are seriously pursuing the implementation of

agreements and the process of boosting cooperation between the two countries.

In a joint press conference with his Russian counterpart Lavrov, he hailed growing collaboration, saying that mutual cooperation would also improve in fighting coronavirus. "In today's meeting, we reviewed the cooperation between the two countries in the fields of transportation, visas, and the movement of students and businessmen," he said.

"During the talks with the Russian foreign minister, we discussed issues related to energy, economy, banking and holding meeting of the Joint Commission for Economic and Trade Cooperation," he said. JCPOA was also discussed during the meeting, he said, blasting U.S. attempts to reinstate UN sanctions against Iran. The U.S. suffered a defeat and Russia and China played a key role in the process, Zarif said. Washington's attempts to restore anti-Iran sanctions drew global opposition, Zarif reiterated.

U.S. Grants Iraq New 60-Day Waiver To Import Iranian Gas

BAGHDAD-(Dispatches) - The U.S. has granted Iraq a 60-day extension to a sanctions waiver allowing it to import Iranian gas for its crippled power grids, an Iraqi official told AFP.

Baghdad relies on gas and electricity imports from its neighbor Tehran to supply about a third of its electricity sector, worn down by years of conflict and poor maintenance. The U.S. blacklisted Iran's energy industry in late 2018 but has since granted its ally Baghdad a series of temporary waivers to stave off countrywide blackouts. In May, Washington granted Iraq a four-month extension as a gesture of goodwill toward Mustafa al-Kadhimi, who had just formed a cabinet seen as more U.S.-friendly than its predecessor.

The U.S. has pressured Iraq to use the waivers to become independent from Iranian energy, specifically by partnering with American firms, and had been frustrated by the slow progress under the previous premier, Adel Abdul-Mahdi.

While Kadhimi's Cabinet has sought to fast-track such deals, it has been unable stem the near-daily rocket and IED attacks on Western military and diplomatic interests.

President Felicities National Day of Armenia

TEHRAN (MNA) –President Hassan Rouhani congratulated National Day of the Republic of Armenia in separate messages to the president and prime minister of the country.

In separate messages to the Armenian president and prime minister, Rouhani felicitated the arrival of the National Day of Armenia and expressed hope that Tehran-Yerevan relations expand further in the future. In a message to Armenian President Armen Sarkissian, Rouhani noted, "I hope that considering the historical, cultural

and social ties between the two countries, and in the light of the efforts made by officials of the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Republic of Armenia, we will see the expansion of bilateral relations to ensure the interests of both nations."

U.S. Must Compensate For Damage Caused To Iranian Nation

TEHRAN - Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said that the U.S. must compensate for the damage it caused to the Iranian nation.

In an interview with Sputnik News on Thursday, Zarif noted that the U.S. must compensate for the damage it caused to the Iranian nation, as well as for measures taken by Washington to undermine the nuclear deal, Sputnik News reported.

"The return of the United States to the nuclear deal is the first step that they should take. For this return, [the U.S.] must compensate for the damage it caused to the Iranian nation, as well as for measures taken by the U.S. to undermine the nuclear deal and promise to not do it again," Zarif added.

Zarif added that every country has a right to the peaceful use of nuclear energy, but the West has double standards about different states' nuclear programs.

"We believe that all of the countries have the right for the peaceful use of the nuclear energy, including [uranium] enrichment, and this right must be exercised in a transparent manner in line with regulations issued by the IAEA. The Western countries have double standards in this regard. If a similar control, which is carried out toward Iran, is introduced on other countries that want to have an advanced nuclear program, the international community will be in peace," Zarif said.



Relations between the U.S. and Iran have sourced considerably due to President Donald Trump's campaign of so-called maximum pressure, stipulating tough sanctions against the Islamic Republic, launched after the US unilaterally withdrew from the Iranian nuclear deal.

Iran is ready to exchange prisoners with dual citizenship who are being held in the country for Iranian prisoners held in the U.S., Zarif added. The minister noted that at present Iran has no American prisoners with single citizenship.

Zarif made clear that Iran was not yet ready for direct negotiations with the U.S. government and would be using other governments, such as the Swiss, "that wish to play a positive role in this regard", as an intermediary.

Bahrain and the United Arab Emirates backstabbed Palestine by reaching the normalization deals with the Zionist Regime, but the ceremony in the White House was not a big issue anyway, since The Zionist Regime and the Arab nations have maintained contacts during up to 20 years, Zarif believes.

"What happened in the White House was not a major development, but rather an opportunity to photograph and uncover the relations that have existed for 15 or 20 years between the Arab countries along the southern coast of the Persian Gulf and the Zionist regime. These relations indicate that the slogans voiced by these countries in support of the Palestinian people are untrue, but are in actual fact a stab in the back for the Palestinian cause," Zarif said.

Iranian, Swedish Diplomats Discuss Ways to End Yemen War

TEHRAN (IFP) - Ali-Asghar Khaji, the Iranian foreign minister's senior assistant in special political affairs, has held virtual talks with Sweden's special envoy for Yemen.

In the Wednesday talks, the two sides conferred on the latest developments and situation in Yemen including the difficult conditions caused by the outbreak of the novel coronavirus, the ways to resolve the existing problems, and possible avenues for dispatching food and medical aid to the Yemeni people.

They also underlined the need for finding a political solution to end the Yemen war by holding intra-Yemeni negotiations.

Khaji described the bombings and military attacks against the innocent people of Yemen and the blockade imposed on them as an inhumane move in violation of international principles and regulations, and called on the international community to prevent its continuation.

Guardian Trying to 'Blackwash' Its Human Rights Situation

TEHRAN - Foreign Ministry spokesman has rejected the recent reports published by the Guardian newspaper, saying it is quite clear why such custom-tailored reports try to blackwash the situation of human rights in Iran, especially at this juncture.

In a statement on Wednesday, Saeed Khatibzadeh said Iran believes the politically-motivated behavior and selective moves of the U.S. and certain European governments have always dealt the heaviest blow to the principle of human rights.

He also described the approach, remarks, and moves of certain European countries as an instance of interference in Iran's internal affairs, and said authorities at the relevant level have taken, and will continue to take, necessary measures in reaction to the move.

"It is quite surprising and unbelievable to us that these countries have not only refused to show any reaction to the blatant violation of the Iranian nation's rights caused by the US' inhumane policy of maximum pressure and its cruel and anti-human sanctions, but are also fanning its flames and practically joining it through their inaction," he added. His comments came after Guardian claimed France, Germany and the UK are summoning Iranian ambassadors in a coordinated diplomatic protest against Iran's detention of dual nationals and its treatment of political prisoners. Guardian says it has seen a letter handed to the Iranian ambassador to the UK, Hamid Baeidinejad, which claims "Iran's policy of arbitrary detention" is seriously undermining its international standing.

The report says the Iranian envoy had been summoned by the Foreign Office on Tuesday to meet senior officials, and the Iranian ambassadors in Paris and Berlin are also being called in this week.

The letter claims British citizens, including dual nationals, are languishing in Iranian prisons, often under harsh conditions and without justification. It argues they have been arbitrarily detained and deserve to be reunited with their families.

Iran Air Force Unveils New Homegrown Radar

TEHRAN (Tasnim) – The Islamic Republic of Iran Air Force (IRIAF) during a ceremony on Thursday unveiled a new radar system dubbed Soroush.

The radar system that has been designed and developed by the IRIAF experts joined the country's integrated air defense network at the ceremony, which was attended by Commander of the Iranian Army's Air Defense Force Brigadier General Alireza Sabahifard.

It can detect targets with small cross-section area (RCS) at low and medium altitudes within a range of 220 kilometers.

Using semiconductor technologies in the radar system's design has enabled Soroush to carry out missions in all weather conditions. Another radar system dubbed Misaq, which is a smart system incorporating a mix of both primary and secondary radars, was also unveiled at the ceremony.

Iran has in recent years made great headways in manufacturing a broad range of military equipment, including air defense systems that use cutting edge technologies.

Iran-Russia **Trade Volume** Hits \$1.8b

TEHRAN – Head of Iran-Russia Joint Chamber of Commerce Mr. Hadi Tizhoosh-Taban says the current trade volume of Iran and Russia is around \$1.8b and Iran's share of exports from this figure is \$500m to \$600m.

Speaking to ILNA, Mr. Tizhoosh-Taban denied reports that Russian banks are not even to trade with Iran on Russian national currency, rouble, adding that in any part of the world, every country is interested in settling counts with its own national currenc and in Europe it is euro, in the U.S it is dollar and in Russia it is rouble which is the base for trade and this is a global law but it is only in Iran where the settlement should be in dollar and even the national currency rial is not accepted. He added that what is exported to Russia is paid in rouble and it can be exchanged with rial but Iran's Central Bank should activate the necessary infrastructures in cooperation with Russian bank and it will economic activists to take advantage of it. He then said currently the trade volume between Iran and Russia is around \$1.8b and Iran's share of exports is between \$500m to \$600m. Tizhoosh-Taban noted that most of Iran's imports from Russia is wood and livestock feeding which are of the country's major needs and Iran's exports to Russia are dried fruits, vegetables, fruits, light industries and the citrus He predicted the current trade between Iran and Russia to decline due to the forex disputes, adding that he also believes that the earned forex from exports should be repatriated to the country but the Central Bank should prepare the infrastructures in a way that economic activists would not suffer losses.

Iran Obtains Technology to Turn Methanol to Propylene

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran's petrochemical industry has attained a major achievement by obtaining the know-how to turn methanol into propylene (MPT), a technology which authorities say was previously ring-fenced by two countries.

The development came on Thursday during the inauguration of a semi-industrial petchem plant in southern Iranian port city of Mahshahr where some 120,000 metric tons of propylene will be produced each year from methanol and independently of the original feedstock.

Seyyed Omid Shahidinia, a local Oil Ministry official said during the inauguration ceremony that the commercial use of MPT had been monopolized by two countries which he would not identify.

"(they) would not let us have the technology due to the sanctions, and now Iran is the third country which has obtained this technical expertise," said Shahidinia, making a reference to American sanctions that have sought to hamper Iran's efforts to develop its energy sector.

Concurrent with the inauguration, Oil Ministry officials in Tehran awarded a contract to Fateh Petrochemicals for commercial use of MPT in Iran.

The contract, which is related to the petchem plant in Mahshahr, would enable Iran to significantly increase its propylene output in the upcoming years, according to Behzad Mohammadi, a deputy oil minister and CEO of Ian's largest company in the sector, namely the National Petrochemical Company (NPC).

Mohammadi said Iran had eyed a propylene output of two million tons per year for 2025 but he insisted that the figure would increase to 4 million tons by 2026 through implementing various schemes including the use of MTP technology.

The senior official said Iran's current propylene output is nearly one million tons per year, adding that total production capacity for all petrochemical products has reached around 70 million tons per year.

Mohammadi said actual petchem output in Iran reached 30 million tons worth \$15 billion in the year to March 2020 of which some \$10 billion worth of products were sold to foreign customers

Kosovo War Crimes Tribunal Arrests First Suspect

THE HAGUE (Reuters) - The Kosovo Specialist Chamber, a war crimes court based in The Hague, said on Thursday that a former KLA insurgent commander, Salih Mustafa, had been arrested by prosecutors in Kosovo and he is being transported to the Netherlands.

Mustafa was a Kosovo Liberation Army (KLA) commander during the 1998-99 Kosovo conflict. The court said in a statement it had confirmed an indictment and arrest warrant against Mustafa, though it did not detail what charges he may face. Under international law, Mustafa is presumed innocent until proven guilty. The court did not release details of his arrest and it was not clear whether he has yet been appointed a lawyer.

Fatah, Hamas Say Deal Reached **On Palestinian Elections**



GAZA (Dispatches) - Gaza's rulers Hamas and their Fatah rivals in the occupied West Bank agreed Thursday to hold the first Palestinian elections since 2006, united by their opposition to Arab-Israeli normalisation deals.

Polls will be scheduled within six months under a deal reached between Fatah leader Mahmud Abbas and Hamas political chief Ismail Haniyeh, officials from both sides told AFP.

"We have agreed to first hold legislative elections, then presidential elections of the Palestinian Authority, and finally the central council of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO)," said Jibril Rajub, a senior

Fatah official. The last Palestinian parliamentary elections in 2006 saw Hamas win an unexpected landslide.

Saleh al-Arouri, a top Hamas official, said the deal was reached during meetings held in Turkey.

"This time we reached a real consensus," he said, speaking to AFP by phone from Istanbul.

"Divisions have damaged our national cause and we are working to end that," Arouri added.

The recent talks have come after two Arab states -- the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain -- normalised their relations with Israel.

Despite peace deals with Egypt in 1979 and Jordan in 1994, the new accords broke with decades of Arab consensus that further ties with the Jewish state should not be normalised



Indian Farmers Intensify Protests Over New Grain Bills

MUMBAI (Reuters) - Indian farmers intensified their protests over three new bills that they believe could pave the way for the government to stop buying grain at guaranteed prices, leaving them at the mercy of private buyers such as traders and retailers.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government has defended the legislation - recently approved by India's parliament - as reform measures that will help rid India's vast agriculture sector of antiquated laws. Modi and some of his ministers have said that the new bills would help remove middlemen from farm trade, allowing farmers to sell to institutional buyers and large retailers like Walmart.

Louisville Tense as New Protests Expected



LOUISVILLE (Reuters) - Louisville braced for a second night of protests on Thursday after two police officers were shot during demonstrations over a decision by a grand jury not to file homicide charges against police in the fatal shooting of Breonna Taylor.

Protests erupted in the Kentucky city on Wednesday after the state attorney general announced that a grand jury did not bring any charges for the six police bullets that struck Taylor, a Black woman, but instead lesser charges against one of the policemen for stray shots that hit the neighboring apartment.

Civil rights activists decried the outcome as a miscarriage of justice and part of a nationwide pattern of unwarranted police violence against minorities.

The demonstration that started peacefully on Wednesday night turned violent after dark when the two officers were shot and wounded. Police arrested

Maduro Calls U.S. Most Serious Threat to Global Peace

CARACAS (Dispatches) - Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro has called on the international community to rally against unilateral U.S. sanctions against various countries and characterized Washington as the "most serious threat" to global peace and stability.

In a video speech at the United Nations General Assembly on Wednesday, Maduro censured the illegal sanctions by an "intransigent and hostile" Washington, and urged the UN member states to counter U.S. sanctions imposed on his country, as well as its Latin American allies, including Cuba and Nicaragua. "We must demand the cessation of all unilateral coercive measures, of all the

alleged sanctions, and that they allow our people to exercise their own rights," Maduro said in his virtual address to the UN Underlining that the U.S. is the "most serious threat to peace in this world,"

the Venezuelan president said the illegal sanctions were endangering the stability of his country and the region, and called on Washington to respect the sovereignty of nations.

Maduro blasted the U.S. for the billions of dollars that have been taken from Venezuela and "frozen and held" in bank accounts in the United States and Europe. "Any company or government that commercializes any good or service with our country, be it food, medicine, fuel, additives needed to produce gasoline - which our people need — is being persecuted," the president said.

Thai Protesters Angered After Parliament Delays Charter Reform

BANGKOK (AFP) - Thai lawmakers delayed a decision on constitutional reform Thursday, sparking anger among protesters outside parliament demanding changes to the kingdom's military-scripted charter and reform of the unassailable monarchy.

Lawmakers had been expected to vote on setting up a draft reform committee in response to a burgeoning pro-democracy movement that mobilised 30,000 demonstrators last week -- the largest show of force in the kingdom since the 2014 coup. But the move was delayed when the ruling party

proposed a parliamentary committee to further study the six proposed amendments.

Among the more than thousand protesters outside parliament, organiser Tattep "Ford" Ruangprapaikitseree said the government was attempting to "buy time" with the move.

"This 'inauguration' directly contradicts the will of large parts of the Belarusian population, as expressed in numerous, unprecedented and peaceful protests since the elections, and serves to only further deepen the political crisis in Belarus." the former Spanish foreign minister said.

The EU stands for the right of Belarusians to be "represented by those they freely choose through new inclusive, transparent and credible elections," he said. The EU again threw its full support behind the peaceful Belarus protests and their calls for new elections "despite the brutal repression of the Belarusian authorities," he said.

The EU renews its calls on the authorities in Minsk to "immediately refrain from any further repression and violence directed against the Belarusian people and immediately and unconditionally release all those detained, including political prisoners," said Borrell.

"The EU remains convinced that an inclusive national dialogue and responding positively to the demands of the Belarusian people for new democratic elections are the only way forward in finding a way out of the serious political crisis in Belarus that respects the wishes of the Belarusian people.

Coronavirus Will Weigh on Some Economies for Years

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - The coronavirus crisis is lasting longer than expected and it will take some countries years to return to growth, the No. 2 official at the International Monetary Fund said.

The Fund has provided some \$90 billion in total financing to 79 countries, including 20 in Latin America, since the start of the health crisis, an IMF spokeswoman said.

Managing Director Geoffrey Okamoto told an online event

hosted by the Center for Strategic and International Studies. "We're trying to preserve our financial firepower," Okamoto said. "We're talking about a ... return to growth that's going to take a few years, and many countries along the way that are probably going to need assistance."

Latin American and Caribbean economies are the hardest hit in the world by the pandemic, reporting around 8.4 million coronavirus cases, and more than 314,000 deaths, both figures being the highest of any region.

Okamoto told the event that Fund officials were in talks with the Group of 20 major economies about extending a temporary halt in official bilateral debt service payments by low-income countries under the Debt Service Suspension Initiative (DSSI), and how to kickstart private sector participation.

The G20 initiative approved in April expires at the end of the year, but experts and government officials in many countries have backed extending it into 2021, with a decision expected in coming weeks and months.

The issue could come up when finance ministers from the Group of Seven advanced economies meet online on Friday. In August, the ministers agreed to consider extending the DSSI.

United Nations officials and others have urged the G20 to expand their efforts to include middle-income countries and island nations hit by the collapse of tourism.

The issue of debt sustainability was "top of mind" for Fund officials, Okamoto said, noting that many countries in Latin America had debt distress before coronavirus, which had exacerbated those pressures.

The DSSI is giving the IMF more time to assess the full debt picture for these countries, he said. "It's lasting longer than we anticipated, and so that is going to change a bit the dynamics of what we think is sustainable in the long run."

He said the Fund was continuing to ask rich countries to fund two specific Fund programs that lend to poor countries.

The United States, the largest shareholder in the IMF, has signalled it hopes to contribute, but no funds have been provided for those programs so far.

Sri Lanka Scraps \$1.5b Japan-Funded Light Rail System

COLOMBO (Dispatches) - Sri Lanka's president has ordered the termination of a \$1.5-billion Japanese-funded light rail project, saying it is not a "cost-effective solution" for the congested capital Colombo, officials said Thursday.

The deal signed under the previous government is the largest single foreign-funded infrastructure project in Sri Lanka, and was seen as a sign of the island nation reducing its dependence on China.

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, elected last year, told the transport ministry to "terminate this project and close the project office with immediate effect", top aide P.B. Jayasundara said in a letter to the ministry.

There was no immediate comment from the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), which in March last year loaned 30 billion yen (\$285 million) to finance the first phase of the Light Rail Transit (LRT).

Japanese technology including rolling stock was to be used on the rail system, which included 16 stations over 15.7 kilometres (9.8 miles).

Detailed planning and land acquisition for the project in Colombo, which has some of the worst traffic ongestion in South Asia, had already been completed and initial construction was under way.

The Japanese loan carries an interest rate of 0.1 percent and is repayable over 40 years with a 12-year grace period. Japan has already funded sections of new expressways and a key bridge to reduce traffic congestion n and out of the capital.

Under former president Mahinda Rajapaksa -- the incumbent's brother -- Sri Lanka borrowed billions of dollars from China for projects including ports, highways and railways.

But several ended up as white elephants and left the country facing a mountain of debt -- mainly to China stoking fears about Beijing's "Belt and Road" masterplan for overseas infrastructure.

Unable to service its loans, the then government of prime minister Ranil Wickremesinghe leased a Chinese-built port at Hambantota in the island's south to a Beijing company for \$1.12 billion in 2017.

Indian Economy May Not See V-Shaped Recovery

MUMBAI (Dispatches) - The Indian economy may have some growth spurts that look like a fast recovery but it would take until the

September quarter of 2023 for the country and the world to be back to pre-Covid-19 levels, said Kevin Sneader, Global Managing Partner, McKinsey & Company.

Sneader was speaking at the ET Global Business Summit.

He said there are nine scenarios that could play out on how the global economies would recover, even so it would take at least till the third quarter of 2023 for world economies to reach where they were in December 2019. Sneader said that many economists have been talking about 'V', 'U' and 'K' shape recoveries ever since the Covid-19 pandemic began. Yet, in all likelihood, there could be an 'X' shaped recovery for global economies, including India. "Perhaps we are at a crossroads (like X). and this (pandemic) is resulting in a different set of economic impacts in different parts of the world, largely because the health situation is different ... The extent to which the economies are able to combine saving lives and saving livelihoods is also different." he said. Talking about the Indian economy, Sneader said because of the huge growth contraction, even a small spurt could look like a big leap, as the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) base for the country remains low. India's GDP growth contracted 23.9% in the April-June quarter. "So, given the steeper decline, small changes will start to look like a more accelerated return. One of the challenges many countries face is that if you are not far enough, anything can look like a V," said Sneader.

technology is needed globally if countries are to meet net-zero emissions targets designed to slow climate change, the International Energy Agency (IEA) said on Thursday

A growing number of countries and companies are targeting net zero carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions by around the middle of the century in the wake of the 2015 Paris climate agreement.

To reach that, the amount of CO2 captured must rocket to 800 million tons in 2030 from around 40 million tons today, the IEA, which advises industrialized nations on energy policies, said in a report.

Up to \$160 billion needs to be invested in the technology by 2030, a ten-fold increase from the previous decade, it added.

"Without it, our energy and climate goals will become virtually impossible to reach," the IEA head Fatih Birol said in a statement.

The global economic downturn caused by the COVID-19 pandemic risks delaying or cancelling projects dependent on public support, the IEA said.

An oil price slide had also reduced revenues for existing CCUS facilities selling CO2 for so-called enhanced oil recovery (EOR).

However, the IEA added: "Economic recovery packages are a unique window of opportunity for governments to support CCUS alongside other clean energy technologies." Referring to a major investment to build two carbon capture plants and an offshore CO2

storage facility, Birol said: "Norway showed its leadership in Europe by making a major funding commitment to the Longship project. "Nonetheless, the story of CCUS has largely been "one of unmet expectations", marred by lack of commercial incentives, large capital costs and public opposition to storage, especially onshore, the IEA said.

In 2009, the IEA called for 100 large-scale CCUS projects to be built by 2020 to store around 300 million tons of CO2 per year. To date, just 20 commercial projects are in operation, capturing around 40 million tons per year.

Iraq Denies Deal To Up Oil Exports



CAIRO (Reuters) - Iraq's oil ministry on Thursday denied a media report citing Oil Minister Ihsan Abdul Jabbar as saying an agreement was imminent with the OPEC+ group to increase Iraq's crude oil exports

State news agency INA had quoted Abdul Jabbar as telling state-owned daily newspaper al-Sabah that he expected to reach an agreement soon with OPEC and its allies - known as OPEC+ - over increasing Iraq's crude oil exports

"The oil minister did not make these comments and did not meet the newspaper's reporter," oil ministry spokesman Asim Jihad told Reuters.

U.S. Business Activity Slows, House Price Inflation Accelerates

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - U.S. business activity cooled in September, with gains at factories offset by a retreat at services

"We need to stay with it ... the recovery will go faster if there is support coming both from Congress and the Fed," Powell said. Data firm IHS Markit said its flash U.S. Composite PMI Output Index, which tracks the manufacturing and services sectors, slipped to a reading of 54.4 this month from 54.6 in August. A reading above 50 indicates growth in private sector output. Though the private sector continues to expand, this month's dip in the index was in line with views that the economy's momentum was ebbing.

Gross domestic product is expected to rebound at as much as a record 32% annualized rate in the third quarter after tumbling at a 31.7% rate in the April-June period, the worst performance since the government started keeping records in 1947.

The coronavirus crisis wiped out more than five years of growth, and economists are calling for another aid package from the government to help the fragile recovery. The economy slipped into recession in February. "The question now turns to whether the economy's strong performance can be sustained into the fourth quarter," said Chris Williamson, chief business economist at IHS Markit, noting that the uncertainty over the Nov. 3 presidential election had also risen. "Risks therefore seem tilted to the downside for the coming months, as businesses await clarity with respect to both the path of the pandemic and the election."



Moderation in business activity was not confined to the United States. Euro zone business growth ground to a halt this month amid a renewed downturn in the dominant services sector, a separate survey from IHS Markit showed on Wednesday. Six months after the COVID-19 pandemic started in the United States, coronavirus cases remain high, with the death toll in the country exceeding 200,000 on Tuesday - by far the highest number of any nation.

The survey's services sector flash PMI fell to 54.6 this month from a reading of 55.0 in August. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast a reading of 54.7 this month for the services sector, which accounts for more than two-thirds of the U.S. economy. The services industry has been hardest hit by the virus and remains below its pre-pandemic level.

The reduction in exports resulting from the OPEC+ cuts has squeezed Iraq's finances, challenging a government struggling to tackle the fallout from years of war and rampant corruption. Iraq relies on oil to fund 97% of its state budget.

Iraq's economy and oil sector were battered by years of wars, sanctions and a stubborn Islamist insurgency triggered by the U.S. invasion. Baghdad has complained it struggled to revive its stagnating oil industry, at a time when other OPEC members benefited and boosted their market share.

Iraq's total exports averaged 2.6 million barrels per day (bpd) in August, down from 2.763 bpd in July. OPEC+ has been reducing production since January 2017 to help to support prices and reduce global oil stockpiles. It increased the cuts to a record 9.7 million bpd from May to July after demand plunged due to the coronavirus crisis.

Europe Is Facing a Double-Dip Recession

BRUSSELS (Dispatches) - Europe is now grappling with a second wave of coronavirus infections that could once again wreak significant damage on the region's economy.

The euro zone, the area that shares the single currency, saw its economy tank by 11.8% in the second quarter of 2020, hit by strict lockdown measures used to contain the spread of the virus.

Economists predicted a rebound in the second half of 2020 but are now questioning those forecasts. Many governments are announcing new lockdown restrictions, or a slowing of reopenings, as they deal with a significant uptick in cases.

"The likelihood of a double dip, i.e. another contraction in the fourth quarter, has increased significantly," Carsten Brzeski, a chief economist at ING, told CNBC Wednesday. He expects more regional lockdowns in the coming weeks such as those already seen in Madrid, Spain, and Lyon, France.

The European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control said that as of Sep. 22, there had been 2.9 million confirmed infections in Europe with Spain and France now seeing daily cases rise above the 10,000 mark.

There is a "big risk of a double dip" in the fourth quarter, Chris Williamson, the chief business economist at IHS Markit, told CNBC's "Street Signs" on Wednesday.

Data out this week showed that the recovery has stalled in the euro zone in September. The flash euro zone PMI (purchasing managers' index) composite index which measures both manufacturing and services — stood at 50.1, just marginally pushing into expansion territory. This latest preliminary number points to a threemonth low in economic activity for the region.

"As we head through to (the) fourth quarter, there's obviously a lot more restrictions in place and that's really going to curb growth," Williamson added.

Concerns on the economic shock of further restrictions sent European equities into sell-off mode earlier this week. "The pandemic poses the key risk to our call for a tickshaped recovery from the March/April plunge in economic activity," Holger Schmieding, chief economist at Berenberg said in a note Tuesday. "The risk is rising." The warnings are similar for the U.K., where the government announced Tuesday

that pubs and restaurants needed to close early and people should work from home if possible, rather than commuting to the office.



Cathal Kennedy, RBC's European economist, said that the new measures will again primarily affect the services sector" and that will lead to slower business activity in the coming months.

The flash composite index for the U.K. came in at 55.7 in September, new data out on Wednesday showed. This was a three-month low and highlighted that the economic recovery has also started to lose momentum on the other side of the English Channel.

British scientific advisors have said there could be 50,000 new infections a day by mid-October and Tuesday's announcements by Prime Minister Boris Johnson were seen as a direct response to those stark warnings

"It seems apparent once more that higher infections will impede the recovery of the services sector and suggests a difficult road ahead for the U.K.," Ambrose Crofton, global market strategist at JPMorgan Asset Management, said in an email Wednesday.

China Has a New **Richest Person**, With Jack Ma Dethroned



LONDON (Bloomberg) -- A bottled-water and vaccine tycoon has become China's wealthiest person in a day also marked by massive losses among the world's tech elite.

Zhong Shanshan's net worth reached US\$58.7 billion on Wednesday, US\$2 billion more than Jack Ma's, according to the Bloomberg Billionaires Index. Zhong is now Asia's second-richest person, behind India's Mukesh Ambani, and is the 17th wealthiest in the world, ahead of Charles Koch and Phil Knight.

Nicknamed "Lone Wolf" for his eschewing of politics and clubby business groups, Zhong's fortune has jumped US\$51.9 billion in 2020, more than anyone else in the world except Amazon.com Inc.'s Jeff Bezos and Tesla Inc.'s Elon Musk. Both suffered heavy declines on Wednesday as tech stocks stumbled

Poverty, Joblessness Drives Wildlife Poaching in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG (AFP) - Most people convicted for wildlife poaching and trafficking in South Africa commit the crimes due to poverty and joblessness, a study by an international wildlife conservation group has shown. A report published Thursday and compiled after interviews with 73 convicted wildlife offenders incarcerated in South Africa's jails, concluded that 70 percent of them were forced into crime just to make a living. "A variety of reasons led offenders to become involved in illegal wildlife trade, one frequent motivation being a desire to provide for their families given the lack of viable legal economic alternatives," said TRAFFIC. One study respondent told TRAFFIC: "I just wanted to give my children a better life than I had". Another said he just wanted to send his "first born to school so that he could get education. I wanted him to have the opportunity which I was denied as a child".

The naval base was opened a few days after a U.S. aircraft carrier for the first time in ten months sailed through the Strait of Hormuz and entered into the waters of the Persian Gulf, as Washington has threatened to illegally extend an expiring arms embargo on Iran.

Martinez Hands Bayern "Dream" UEFA Super Cup W

BUDAPEST (Dispatches) - Javi Martinez admitted it was "a dream" to be able to write more UEFA Super Cup history for Bayern Munich on Thursday as his header in extra time sealed a 2-1 win over Sevilla in Budapest.

Having equalised with a crucial 120th-minute goal seven years ago when Bayern won the 2013 Super Cup on penalties against Chelsea in Prague, Martinez struck on 104 minutes at the Puskas Arena to hand the Champions League winners a fourth title in 2020.

There were a smattering of travelling Bayern and Sevilla fans among the 15,180 crowd in Budapest as both clubs played for the first time in front of spectators since the Covid-19 pandemic first hit Europe in March.

After Lucas Ocampos converted an early penalty for Sevilla, Leon Goretzka equalised for Bayern, who had two second-half goals disallowed before substitute Martinez, 32, struck from a late corner. Bayern head coach Hansi Flick praised his team for "pulling through with their mentality. In the end, my players went through the pain barrier to win.'

Having replaced Goretzka on 99 minutes, it was Martinez - linked to a return to Spain after losing his first-team place - whose header extends Bayern's winning streak to 23 games dating back to February. "Whenever I wear the Bayern shirt, I always try to give my best and I showed that once again today," Martinez told Sky.

"I always want to help the team by scoring a goal. It's a dream come true.

"I'm really happy to win this trophy for a second time after also scoring in 2013."

After also sweeping the Bundesliga, German Cup and Champions League trophies, Bayern can win a fifth title this year when they host Borussia Dortmund in Munich for the German Super Cup on Wednesday.

Heat Top Celtics, Move a Game **From NBA Finals**

AKE BUENA VISTA (AP) — The Lyoungest player on the floor helped the Miami Heat move a game away from the NBA Finals.

Tyler Herro — still just 20 years old scored a Heat rookie-record 37 points, Jimmy Butler had 24 and Miami beat the Boston Celtics 112-109 on Wednesday night in Game 4 of the Eastern Conference finals.

Goran Dragic added 22 and Bam Adebayo had 20 points and 12 rebounds to help the Heat take a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series. They can close it out Friday night in Game 5.

Jayson Tatum scored all 28 of his points in the second half for the Celtics. They erased a double-digit deficit to take a one-point lead in the fourth — then saw the Heat run away again. Jaylen Brown scored 21 points, Kemba Walker added 20, Gordon Hayward had 14 and Marcus Smart finished with 10 points and 11 assists.

Brown's 3-pointer with 16 seconds left cut Miami's lead to 107-104. Herro

Sevilla midfielder Ivan Rakitic said Bayern goalkeeper Manuel Neuer made the difference with two superb late saves to deny Youssef En-Nesyri.

Just six minutes after the break, Lewandowski had the ball in the net after being set up by Thomas Mueller, but the VAR spotted the Poland striker was offside.

With an hour gone, Bayern winger Leroy Sane was left frustrated after his shot powered past Sevilla's Moroccan goalkeeper Bono, but the VAR spotted Lewandowski had fouled a Sevilla defender in the build up.

With 90 minutes almost up, Manuel Neuer underlined his status as one of the world's best goalkeepers with a finger-tip save to deny En-Nesyri after Sevilla attacked from the edge of their own penalty area.

Sevilla made a great start to extra-time with Bayern in all sorts of trouble, as Ocampos had a shot blocked while En-Nesyri's shot clipped the post after crashing off Neuer's leg. However, the scene was set for Martinez, a veteran of the side which won the 2013 Champions League final in London, to add to his chapter in Bayern's folklore.

"I was so happy when the coach brought Javi on, because I know how good he is with his head from set pieces," said Bayern captain Neuer.

PARIS (Dispatches) - Paris Saint-Germain winger Angel Di Maria received a four-match ban on Wednesday for spitting during this month's fiery Marseille game which saw five players red-carded and claims by Neymar of racial abuse.

The world's most expensive player was served with a two-match ban last week for that incident in the September 13 fixture at the Parc des Princes.

Also last week PSG defender Layvin Kurzawa incurred a six-match ban for kicking out at Marseille left-back Jordan Amavi, who was hit with a suspension of three games after he too was dismissed. And Leandro Paredes was banned for two games after he was sent off for a clash with fellow Argentine Dario Benedetto, who was also red-carded and suspended. Marseille won the game 1-0.

ONDON (Dispatches) - Lewis L Hamilton pledged on Thursday to grow the number of black people in motor racing, announcing members of his Hamilton Commission that aims to tackle the lack of diversity at all levels of the sport.

The British six-time Formula One world champion, who has been vocal in his support of the Black Lives Matter movement, launched the initiative in June. The 14-member body includes Hamilton's former McLaren boss Martin Whitmarsh, former sports minister Tracey Crouch and Hayaatun Sillem, the chief executive of the Royal Academy of Engineering. Hamilton, who will attempt to equal Michael Schumacher's record of 91 Grand Prix wins in Russia this weekend -- is the only black driver in Formula One.

Red Bull's British-born Thai Alexander Albon is the sport's only other non-white competitor. "What is more concerning is that there are still very few people of colour across the sport as a whole," Hamilton said in a statement. "In F1, our teams are much bigger than the athletes that front them, but representation is insufficient across every skill set -- from the garage to the engineers in the factories and design departments."

Hamilton said change was not coming quickly enough and it was important to know why. "This is why I wanted to set up the commission," he said. "And I'm proud to be working with the Royal Academy of Engineering and our incredible board of commissioners to identify the barriers facing young black people to take up STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) careers in motorsport.

And De Bruyne Nominated For UEFA Player Prize

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Bayern Munich duo Robert Lewandowski and Manuel Neuer have been nominated alongside Manchester City's Kevin De Bruyne for the UEFA Men's Player of the Year prize for last season, European football's governing body announced on Wednesday.

The winner will be announced -- along with the UEFA Women's Player of the Year -- on October 1, when UEFA hold the draw for this season's Champions League group stage at their headquarters in Nyon, Switzerland. Lewandowski and Neuer starred as Bayern won the Champions League, beating Paris Saint-Germain 1-0 in the final in Lisbon in August. Polish striker Lewandowski scored an astonishing 55 goals in 47 games as Bayern won the treble of Champions League, Bundesliga and German Cup. He top-scored in the Champions League with 15 goals. Goalkeeper Neuer also played a key role in Bayern's triumphant campaign, while Belgian playmaker De Bruyne scored or set up 33 goals in the English Premier League and was nominated despite City finishing second to Liverpool domestically and going out of the Champions League in the quarter-finals to Lyon.

Barcelona's Lionel Messi just missed out on being shortlisted, coming fourth in the vote by a jury comprising the 80 coaches of the clubs that participated in the group stages of last season's Champions League and Europa League, along with 55 selected journalists, one from each of UEFA's member associations. England star Lucy Bronze is a contender to win the women's prize for the second year running after helping Lyon win the Champions League for the fifth season in a row before recently signing for Manchester City.
