World Urged to **Press Saudi to Implement IAEA Safeguards**

TEHRAN - Iran has called on the international community to press Saudi Arabia to immediately implement the Comprehensive Safeguards Agreements of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in full.

Heidar Ali Balouji, Iran's permanent envoy to the United Nations General Assembly First Committee (also known as the Disarmament and International Security Committee), said Riyadh's failure to implement the IAEA safeguards regime comes as the Arab country's ambitious program allows it to hide some of its nuclear activities and not be inspected by the IAEA. "Concerns about Saudi Arabia's leaked nuclear

activities and identification of its nuclear sites hidden in desert require international collective efforts, so much so that Saudi Arabia be held accountable for the consequences of its behaviors," he added.

Balouji said a "steady" rather than "selective" implementation of the Safeguards will serve the international community in the long run." See Page 7

Iran Economy **On Right Track Despite Cruel Sanctions**

TEHRAN (MNA) - Iran's envoy to the UN General Assembly's second committee said the Islamic Republic has made significant progress in developmental indexes despite challenges posed by sanctions and the coronavirus pandemic.

"2020 is considered a turning point in our journey towards development. We face a formidable global challenge that threatens the lives and livelihoods of people all over the world in an unprecedented way," Hajilari said on Monday at the 75th Session of the UN's Economic and Financial Committee (Second Committee).

"The intensity of this challenge has undermined the achievements made in decades of efforts."

Referring to the challenges caused by the U.S.' economic terrorism, he stressed, "Unfortunately, in such a critical situation where the world needs solidarity and unity more than ever, we face a surplus of unilateral approaches and a shortage of multilateral solutions. See Page 7

Baghdad Agrees to Release Tehran Frozen Funds

TEHRAN - Iraq has agreed to release Iranian funds blocked in the Arab country because of American sanctions for Iran's purchase of staples and basic goods, the Central Bank of Iran (CBI) governor Abdolnasser Hemmati said after meetings with senior Iraqi officials in Baghdad on Monday.

Hemmati said in a post on his Instagram page that some "good agreements" had been reached on the issue in a trilateral meeting involving him and his Iraqi counterpart as well as the CEO of Trade Bank of Iraq (TBI) where the Iranian funds are blocked.

Iran has billions of dollars in a TBI account which processes Iraq's payments for imports of natural gas and electricity from Iran.

However, the funds have been blocked because of U.S. sanctions on Iran which restricts the use of dollar for transactions involving Tehran.

The assets held in Iraq belong to the Central Bank of Iran, which is the main supplier of the basic demands in various sectors such as industry, agriculture and healthcare, he explained, saying Tehran would begin to withdraw money from those funds according to its needs.

The commodities that are categorized as basic needs are exempted from the cruel and unilateral sanctions imposed by the U.S., the Iranian official noted.

Hemmati said Iraqi Prime Minister Mustafa Al-Kadhimi had welcomed the agreement to use the funds to reimburse Iran's basic goods imports.

"In the meeting with the Iraqi premier ... he issued the required orders to the Iraqi central bank and the TBI to speed up the implementation of the agreement," said Hemmati, adding that Kadhimi had vowed to personally follow up the case on a weekly basis.

Hemmati made a first visit to Baghdad in June to pursue the case of blocked funds in Iraq. The CBI governor had expressed optimistic remarks about the release of funds in Iraq on that occasion but a final decision on the issue has been waiting reportedly because of growing American pressure on Baghdad.

A high-ranking trade and banking delegation accompanied Hemmati in his Monday trip to Iraq. The top banker said the visit would bolster the already growing trade relations between the two countries.

Iraq is only second to China in purchase of goods and services from Iran with recent figures showing Iranian

The day before, one of my congregation friends sent a message to me via WhatsApp and when I read it, I felt anybody who has compiled this item has both been aware of the current U.S. internal condition and has actually compared the behavior of Mir Hossein Mousavi and Mehdi Karroubi during the Green Movement in the 2009 presidential unrests in Iran with U.S. President Donald Trump's behavior today.

Famous American political analyst Thomas Friedman, after circulation of these comments of Mr. Trump in the newspapers by referring to the dangers and concerns created by Trump's remarks which is repeated after any pretext, expressed his concerns and emphasized that the U.S. in the upcoming presidential election and in the last months of 2020 could be headed to a full-scale civil war.

In this regard and in order to assure the American society, senior officials in the Pentagon have said that they are concerned about the post-presidential election, and in case unrests erupt, President Trump will order the U.S. Army to go to streets for suppressing people.

But Chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff General Mark Alexander Milley in reaction to the extreme concerns of the Congress and American people about Trump's decision and probable civil war wrote a letter to the Congress and stipulated in his letter that the U.S. Army was determined not to have any intervention and role in the 2020 presidential election dispute.

Germany Reiterates Full Commitment to JCPOA

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Germany has reiterated its full commitment to a multilateral nuclear agreement signed between Iran and major world powers in 2015, saying the United States' move to pull out of the agreement is "regrettable." In a post on its Twitter page on Monday, Germany's mission to the United Nations said Berlin "remains fully committed to preservation & full implementation" of the nuclear deal, officially known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), and UN Security Council Resolution 2231, which endorses the accord. It added that the U.S. "withdrawal from the "JCPOA & its re-imposed sanctions [against Iran] are regrettable." The mission further expressed Germany's concern about measures by Iran "contrary to key nuclear-related provisions in JCPOA," referring to Tehran's suspension of some of its commitments under the deal, in response to the failure of the other signatories to live up to their obligations stipulated in the accord.

U.S. President Donald Trump, a hawkish critic of the landmark nuclear deal between Iran and six world powers - the United States, Britain, France, China, Russia and Germany -- unilaterally withdrew Washington from the agreement in May 2018, and unleashed the "toughest ever" sanctions against the Islamic Republic in defiance of global criticism.

Following its much-criticized exit, Washington has been attempting to prevent the remaining signatories from abiding by their commitments and thus kill the historic agreement, which is widely viewed as a fruit of international diplomacy.

German Chancellor Merkel describes a return to the 2015 Iran nuclear deal as the only way to defuse tensions in the Middle East.

Iran remained fully compliant with the JCPOA for an entire year, waiting for the co-signatories to fulfill their end of the bargain by offsetting the impacts of American bans on the Iranian economy.

But as the European parties failed to do so, the Islamic Republic moved in May 2019 to suspend its JCPOA commitments under Articles 26 and 36 of the deal covering Tehran's legal rights.

Iran Defense Chain Ready To Respond to Any Threat

TEHRAN (MNA) - Deputy Navy Commander for Coordination Rear Admiral Hamzeh Ali Kaviani said that Iran's defense chain in the south of the country is ready to respond to any threat.

He made the remarks at the welcoming ceremony of Iran's 69th naval flotilla which returned to the southern port city of Bandar Abbas on Tuesday after a 67-day mission in the international waters.

"The presence of foreigners in the Persian Gulf is of no use to them, we declare to the enemies that Iran will respond to any threat to its waters and interests," said Kaviani.

"In order to defend the interests of the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Navy has a bold presence in international waters," he added, saying, "Security and protection of international waterways and escort of Iranian ships are among the duties assigned to the Army."

"The 69th fleet of warships of the Iranian Navy has also been successful in carrying out its orders and plans," Kaviani highlighted.

He stressed, "Our presence in the seas will be continuous and authoritative, and this presence is a continuation of the implementation of the orders of the Supreme Commander of the Armed Forces."

Iran Unaffected by U.S.' Hollow Threats

Iran Prioritizes Relations With Neighbors, Eurasian States

TEHRAN (IRNA) - President Hassan Rouhani said here on Tuesday that Tehran gives priority to strengthening relations with China, neighbors and Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) member states in all areas including energy and technology.

The country should make special planning for fostering those relations in economic, energy and technological issues, President Rouhani said at a meeting held in Tehran focusing on the issue of economy.

Iranian government is after acceleration of following up implementation of agreements with regional countries, the president said underling the importance of activating joint economic commission meetings.

He further said the issue of export is of paramount importance.

Governor of Central Bank of Iran Abdolnasser Hemmati, who was present in the today meeting, presented a report on the efforts taken to make use of the country's foreign assets and the recent travel to Iraq.

About Hemmati's report, the president stressed the importance of having access to Iranian assets blocked out of the country.

Although the U.S. sanctions have created difficult conditions for economic transactions, efforts to use the assets have been fruitful, President Rouhani noted. Also, Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif elaborated in the today meeting on his recent visit to China.

As Zarif said, the two countries have reached agreement on financial transactions. At the end of the meeting, the president highlighted cooperation with

TEHRAN - The chief of staff of the Iranian president has commended Russia for its mediation in the fighting between the Republic of Azerbaijan and Armenia, saying Tehran welcomes a ceasefire and an end to the fighting in the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region.

In a thread on his Twitter account on Monday, Mahmoud Vaezi said Iran praises Russia's efforts to mediate between Baku and Yerevan and welcomes the ceasefire and an end to the war in the Nagorno-Karabakh region.

"We hope that the peace talks would begin as soon as possible and the results of negotiations would conform with the internationally-recognized rights of the two countries (Azerbaijan and Armenia), so that it would not lead to another war," Vaezi added.

The Iranian official also noted that the region has the necessary capacities for the settlement of problems and guaranteeing peace and security.

"Moscow's talks with the foreign ministers of Azerbaijan and Armenia are a good sign of the potential of the independent regional powers, and Iran is fully prepared for cooperation and assistance in the process of peace and stability in accordance with the international law," he stressed.

After a series of talks, brokered by Russia and held in Moscow on October 9, the Republic of Azerbaijan and Armenia have agreed on a ceasefire in the Nagorno-Karabakh region for the exchange of detainees and retrieving the bodies of victims of armed clashes. A new round of fighting between the Republic of Azerbaijan and Armenia broke out on September 27, with intense battles raging in the disputed region of Nagorno-Karabakh.

DM Unveils Domestic Ultrasound Screening Device **Drone Crashes in Northwestern Iran**

TEHRAN (MNA) – The Iranian Defense Ministry unveiled the first domestically-produced ultrasound screening machine on Tuesday.

The device, designed and built by Iranian experts and scientists, was unwrapped in a ceremony attended by Deputy Defense Minister Second Brigadier General Ghassem Taghizadeh at Tehran's Chamran Hospital. According to Taghizadeh, the machine is equipped with advanced, modern software with menus for measuring and estimating gestational age, advanced imaging and image processing technology, remote management and data transmission software, color Doppler and power Doppler system, 15-inch LED display with high resolution, and a frequency range from 2.5 to 14 MHz.

Unlimited storage of images on a USB hard disk, different working modes, the portable and fixed modes, ability to connect to a printer as well as the light weight and high image resolution are the other prominent features of the new device.

Taghizadeh referred to the mobility of the device, saying it can be used in field hospitals and in critical and emergency situations. Noting that the ultrasound screening machine has obtained the necessary approvals from the Ministry of Health, he said, "the Ministry of Defense is ready start the mass production of the device at the request of health officials in order to meet the needs of the country's healthcare system." TEHRAN (IFP) - An unmanned aerial vehicle, which is said to be an Israeli-made drone belonging to the Azerbaijani military, has crashed in Parsabad Moghan County in Iran's Ardabil Province.

A deputy governor-general of Ardabil said the crash has left no casualties or damages. The drone, which military experts say is an Israeli-made IAI Harop, crashed near the Iranian border with the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region, where Armenia and Azerbaijan Republic are fighting.

Local sources believe the drone belongs to the Azerbaijani army, as Baku regularly purchases weapons and military equipment from Israel.

However, the provincial official says investigations are underway to determine whether it is Azeri or Armenian.

Iran has repeatedly asked for settlement of the conflict and urged cessation of hostilities in Nagorno-Karabakh.

Dispute over Nagorno-Karabakh started in 1988 and led to a military conflict in 1992.

A couple of days ago, Armenian and Azeri foreign ministers agreed on a Russia-brokered ceasefire but violation of the truce suggests it is fragile.

Coronavirus Unable To Stop Producing Oil, **Gas for a Single Day**

TEHRAN - Oil Minister said on Tuesday that the coronavirus pandemic has not stopped the production of the Iranian oil and gas even for a single day.

Bijan Namdar Zanganeh noted that if oil and gas are not produced, electricity and water will not be produced either.

Under the Covid-19 pandemic and the U.S. cruel sanctions exploration operation in Iran is meant to continue in order to ensure the increase in oil production.

Iranian oil officials believe that the ongoing exploration activities will be the mainstay of future oil production growth while increasing the country's oil reserves is in itself a lever of power that can be used in trade bargaining and obtaining OPEC quotas.

Zanganeh announced in mid-July that his country plans to increase its oil output capacity to take its share back from the market in case of the U.S. sanctions termination.

"It's true that our output is low because of cruel and illegal sanctions, but things won't stay the same," Zanganeh said at the time.

"We need to increase our production capacity to be able to return to the market in



full force and restore our share whenever necessary."

He also said the U.S. is telling a lie that it has not targeted Iranian nation and its sanctions are aimed at pressuring Iranian nation.

Zanganeh also praised personnel of the ministry who risked their lives during the pandemic to retain oil and gas production.

On the sidelines and talking to reporters, he reiterated that he does not intend to run for president, adding that after finishing his term in the ministry he will never come back to the government jobs.

He added that political retirement has no meaning but he is not interested in returning to the government job.

He noted that the ministry is fighting in different fronts as enemies are exerting the toughest pressure on Iran.

He termed sanctions a crime against humanity that Iranians are facing it.

Gov't Cancels Fare Hikes

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iranian airlines would not be allowed to increase fare prices despite lower demand for air travel and restrictions imposed on the number of passengers booked for flights to curb the spread of the coronavirus pandemic, says the country's chief aviation authority.

Iran's civil aviation authority said in a Monday statement that ticket price hikes announced last week by the Association of Iranian Airlines (AIA) would be halted until at least early December.

The statement said more discussions will be needed between representatives of the airlines and the government to sort out fare price issues.

IAI increased ticket prices by nearly two-fold in a bid to help airlines cope with lower demand amid the spread of the coronavirus in Iran, one of the worst hit countries by the disease in the Middle East region.

That comes as Iran's transportation ministry has imposed a cap of 60 passengers per flight to observe social distancing rules needed to curb the spread of the virus.

Airlines have also been insisting on fare hikes as they grapple with rising costs related to devaluation of the local currency.

However, the price hikes sparked widespread concerns that the commercial aviation in Iran would become a luxury only available to the rich

TEHRAN (FAO) - World Food Day 2020 marks the 75th anniversary of FAO in an exceptional moment as countries around the world deal with the widespread effects of the global COVID-19 pandemic. It's a time to look into the future we need to build together. In this regard, FAO calls on all involved stakeholders across the world to link arms to urgently address the nutritional and livelihoods gaps that have engulfed the most vulnerable groups of populations amid COVID-19 pandemic, on the occasion of the World Food Day.

Recent estimates released by the Organization indicate that the COVID-19 pandemic and its collateral economic consequences may add between 83 to 132 million individuals to the total number of undernourished people in the world in 2020; the nutritional status of the most vulnerable population groups is likely to further deteriorate due to the health and socio-economic impacts of COVID-19.

Slovak Far-Right Leader Sentenced to Four Years Jail

PRAGUE (Reuters) - Slovakia's far-right leader Marian Kotleba, whose party holds 14 seats in parliament, was sentenced to four years and four months jail on Monday for spreading hatred by holding a charity stunt that the court concluded had a Nazi theme.

Kotleba, a member of parliament and former regional governor who founded a far right party, was accused of distributing cheques to poor families for 1,488 euros at an event marking the anniversary of the founding of Slovakia's Nazi-era puppet state.

Protesters Knock Down Roosevelt, Lincoln Statues in Portland



PORTLAND (Dispatches) - Protesters overturned statues of former Presidents Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln in Portland, Oregon, night in a declaration of "rage" towards Columbus Day.

Protest organizers dubbed the event "Indigenous Peoples Day of Rage," in response to Monday's federal holiday named after 15th-century Italian explorer Christopher Columbus, a polarising figure who Native American advocates have said spurred centuries of genocide against Indigenous populations in the Americas.

The group threw chains around Roosevelt's statue, officially titled "Theodore Roosevelt, Rough Rider". They threw red paint on the monument and began using a blowtorch on the statue's base, news outlets reported.

The crowd pulled down the statue just before 9pm local time (04:00 GMT). The group later turned their attention towards Lincoln's statue, pulling it down about eight minutes later. Historians have said Roosevelt expressed hostility towards Native Americans, once saying, "I don't go so far as to think that the only good Indians are dead Indians, but I believe nine out of every 10 are." Protesters spray-painted "Dakota 38" on the base of Lincoln's statue, referencing the 38 Dakota men Lincoln approved to have hanged after the men were involved in a violent conflict with white settlers in Minnesota.

After toppling the statues, the crowd began smashing windows at the Oregon Historical Society and later moved onto the Portland State University Campus

Public Safety office. Police later declared the event a riot

and ordered the group to disperse. Police said anyone involved in "criminal behavior, including vandalism" was subject to arrest. It's unclear if any arrests were made.

The monuments are the latest statues to come down in a wave of removed monuments and protests sparked by the May 25 death of George Floyd in Minneapolis police custody.

Anwar Ibrahim Meets King In Challenge for Leadership

KUALA LUMPUR (Dispatches) - Malaysia's opposition leader Anwar Ibrahim met the Southeast Asian nation's king on Tuesday morning in an attempt to prove he has the parliamentary support needed to replace Prime Minister Muhyiddin Yassin who took power in March.

Anwar added a fresh twist to the country's political drama last month after he declared that he had secured a "strong majority" from federal politicians to form a new government.

Nagorno-Karabakh Ceasefire Strained by Recriminations

BAKU (Reuters) - Azerbaijan and ethnic Armenian forces accused each other on Monday of launching new attacks in and around Nagorno-Karabakh, increasing strains on a two-day-old humanitarian ceasefire intended to end heavy fighting over the mountain enclave.

Russia, which brokered the ceasefire, appealed for both sides to respect it and Luxembourg repeated European Union calls for Turkey, an ally of Azerbaijan, to do more to secure an end to hostilities that have killed hundreds of people. The fighting, the deadliest over Nagorno-Karabakh in more than 25 years, is being watched closely abroad partly because of its proximity to Azeri gas and oil pipelines and the risk of regional powers Turkey and Russia being dragged in. tmsnrt.rs/2SLS5ID

Both Ankara and Moscow are under growing pressure to use their influence in the region to end the fighting. Trump Says He feels Powerful after COVID Recovery

SANFORD (Reuters) - President Donald Trump returned to the campaign trail on Monday for the first time since he announced his COVID-19 diagnosis, touting his management of the pandemic as opinion polls showed him losing more ground to Democratic rival Joe Biden.

Trump arrived at the outdoor rally in Sanford, Florida, the first of six planned for this week, without a protective mask. He tossed out masks to thousands of supporters standing shoulder to shoulder, most without protective face coverings, and repeatedly talked about his recovery from the coronavirus.

"I went through it now. They say I'm immune. I feel so powerful," Trump told the crowd during his hour-long remarks. "I will kiss everyone in that audience, I will kiss the guys and the beautiful women, I will give you a big fat kiss."

Trump's return to his signature campaign rallies kicked off a three-week sprint to the Nov. 3 election. The Republican president, 74, is seeking to change the dynamics of a race that national opinion polls and some key state polls show he is losing to Biden, who is 77.

The airport rally in Sanford indicated that Trump had not reshaped his campaign approach or outlook since contracting the coronavirus, which has infected more than 7.8 million people in the United States, killed more than 214,000 and put millions out of work.

He told supporters that coronavirus safety lockdowns had done great damage to the economy and were too drastic.

"It's risky, but you gotta get out," he told supporters, who chanted: "We love you." Critics have faulted Trump for failing to encourage supporters at campaign events, and White House staff, to wear protective masks and abide by social-distancing guidelines. At least 11 close Trump aides have tested positive for the virus.

As Trump was holding his rally, top U.S. infectious disease expert Anthony Fauci told CNBC the United States faced a "whole lot of trouble" if it did not encourage universal wearing of face masks and populated by ethnic Armenians. But the ceasefire has frayed quickly. Azerbaijan said on Sunday it had launched air strikes against an Armenian regiment, following what it said was an Armenian rocket attack on an apartment building in the second biggest city of Ganja. Armenia denied carrying out such an attack.

On Monday, Azerbaijan's defence ministry said Armenian forces had tried to attack its positions around the Aghdere-Aghdam and Fizuli-Jabrail regions, and were shelling territories in the Goranboy and Terter regions inside Azerbaijan.

Nagorno-Karabakh said its forces had inflicted losses on Azeri forces and that large-scale military operations were continuing in the Hadrut area of the enclave.

Reuters could not independently verify the reports.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Russia, which has a defence pact with Armenia, was monitoring the events and asked Azeri and ethnic Armenian forces to respect the ceasefire.

North Koreans Rally Wearing Masks After Military Parade

SEOUL (AFP) - Thousands of North Koreans have packed into Pyongyang's Kim Il Sung square to pledge their support for the government -- all of them wearing masks, unlike at a military parade only two days earlier.

Authorities held the rally on Monday at the start of an "80-Day Campaign", a mass mobilisation drive to boost the economy ahead of a ruling party congress in January. Such efforts, often dubbed "battles", feature extra-long work hours and additional duties and are commonplace in North Korea in the lead-up to major events.

Troops, workers and students, all of them wearing

emerged in neighbouring China, and at the parade -when the North showed off its latest missiles -- Kim insisted there had not been a single case in the country, thanking citizens for staying healthy.

Kim -- along with other officials -- was also pictured unmasked watching a "Mass Games" propaganda display on Sunday, while spectators were seen wearing face coverings.

The ruling party anniversary comes during a difficult year for North Korea with the coronavirus pandemic and recent storms adding pressure to the country, which is subject to international sanctions over its banned nuclear weapons and ballistic missile programmes. Against Guinea's President

CONAKRY (Dispatches) - Over 90 people have been killed in a crackdown on protests against Guinea's President Alpha Conde's bid to seek a controversial third term in elections at the weekend, a leading opposition group said Monday.

The 82-year-old is bidding for re-election on October 18, after pushing through a new constitution in March that critics say was designed to sidestep a two-term limit in the West African country.

Opposition to a third Conde term brought tens of thousands of Guineans to the streets from mid-October last year. The protests often turned violent, however, and dozens were killed. The constitutional referendum in March was also marred by violence.

On Monday, the anti-Conde coalition FNDC published a tally of 92 protesters killed since mid-October.

Some 45 of those protesters were shot dead, the National Front for the Defence of the Constitution (FNDC) said, and eight remain unidentified. facemasks, packed into the square, holding slogans including "Let's keep pace with the steps of our dear leader, Comrade Kim Jong Un".

It was a change from the military parade the North held at the weekend as part of the commemorations for the ruling party's 75th anniversary, when neither Kim nor any other participants had their faces covered.

to spread in the hope of achieving so-called herd immunity, saying this was "unethical".

Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said during a virtual press briefing on Monday that "herd immunity is a concept used for vaccination, in which a population can be protected from a certain virus if a threshold of vaccination is reached". He pointed out that for measles, for instance, it is estimated that if 95 percent of the population is vaccinated, the remaining five percent will also be protected from the spread of the virus.

For polio, the threshold is estimated at 80 percent, he said.

"Herd immunity is achieved by protecting people from a virus, not by exposing them to it," Tedros said.

"Never in the history of public health has herd immunity been used as a strategy for responding to an outbreak, let alone a pandemic," he insisted, calling the strategy "scientifically and ethically problematic".

"Allowing a dangerous virus that we don't fully understand to run free is simply unethical. It's not an option."

Tedros pointed to a lack of information on the development of immunity to COVID-19, including how strong the immune response is and how long antibodies remain in the body.

He also pointed out that it has been estimated that less than 10 percent of the population in most countries is believed to have contracted the disease.

"The vast majority of people in most countries remain susceptible to this virus," he said. Tedros also noted that countries had reported record-high daily figures of COVID-19 to the United Nations health agency for the last four days, citing surges in Europe and the Americas in particular.

"There are no shortcuts and no silver bullets. The answer is a comprehensive approach – using every tool in the toolbox," the WHO chief said.

BP Starts Oman's Giant Ghazeer Gas Field

LONDON (Reuters) - BP BP.L has started production at Oman's giant Ghazeer natural gas field, which is set to underpin the company's oil and gas output for years as it shifts to renewables.

The London-based firm said Ghazeer, the second phase of the development of Block 61, started four months ahead of schedule. BP is in the midst of the largest overhaul in its history after Chief Executive Bernard Looney set out a path to shift rapidly towards renewable power and reduce BP's oil and gas production by 1 million barrels per day (bpd) by 2030. But oil and gas is set to help pay for the move.





BEIJING (Reuters) - China's exports likely posted a fourth straight month of gains in September as more trading partners reopened their economies, a Reuters poll showed, while imports are also expected to have edged back into growth.

Exports have not been as severely affected by the global slowdown as some analysts had feared, due in part to record shipments of medical supplies and robust demand for electronic products, adding to hopes for a sustained economic recovery.

In September, exports are expected to have risen 10% from a year earlier, according to a median estimate of a Reuters poll of 24 economists. Imports likely rose 0.3% on year, improving after back-to-back decline in July and August.

Exports in August rose a solid 9.5% year-on-year, the strongest gain since March 2019.

Stronger exports could signal a faster and more balanced recovery for the Chinese economy, which is rebounding from a record first-quarter slump thanks to domestic stimulus measures.

A manufacturing survey showed total new orders in September recorded the strongest increase since January 2011, and a gauge for new export orders--which were hit hard by the global outbreak of the coronavirus--rose at the fastest pace in over three years.

"We expect both export and import growth to accelerate further in September. Global growth has continued to recover and strong global housing activity in recent months should support Chinese exports of furniture and appliances," Goldman Sachs analysts said in a research note last week.

"Import growth may improve in September as well on the back of the solid expansion of domestic activities," they said. However, external demand could suffer if virus control

measures are re-imposed by trade partners due to a resurgence in infections. China is meanwhile looking to reduce its reliance on overseas markets

for development as U.S. tensions and the pandemic increase external risks that could hamper long-term progress.

Already heightened U.S.-China hostilities are expected to escalate ahead of the U.S. presidential election next month.

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue earlier this month warned China may fall short of annual agricultural product purchasing commitments made in its Phase 1 trade deal with the United States.

U.S. Election Outcome Will Not Impact Bullish Energy Outlook

NEW YORK (Reuters) - Goldman Sachs said the outcome of U.S. elections would not impact its bullish oil and natural gas outlook and that an overwhelming Democratic victory could be a positive catalyst for these sectors

Goldman reiterated its bullish 2021 view for both natural gas and oil, saying drivers for higher prices upersede the potential outcomes of the U.S. election.

"The recent gyration in oil prices, rallying on days of higher expected stimulus and weakening dollar, uggest that a Biden election and blue sweep could in fact prove a bullish catalyst for oil," the bank said, adding that natural gas prices could rally too.

Opinion polls show presidential candidate Joe Biden with a substantial lead over President Donald Trump nationally, although with a narrower advantage in some of the states that may decide the Nov. 3 election.

Headwinds to U.S. oil and gas production would rise further under a Biden administration, with the potential for regulations raising the cost of shale production and reducing recoverable shale resources. Goldman added.

Biden's climate priorities also point to a faster deployment of renewable sources of energy than currently expected, Goldman said, adding such an agenda would require new infrastructure, which alongside a likely large initial fiscal stimulus, would lead to higher oil demand in coming years.

EU Leaders to Insist on Tough Enforcement Powers in Brexit Deal

LONDON (Reuters) - French President Emmanuel Macron and other EU leaders will insist on tough enforcement rules for any trade deal with Britain, warning that Prime Minister Boris Johnson's bid to override the

Brexit treaty has shown Britain's word cannot be trusted, the Financial Times reported.

EU diplomats said leaders at a summit starting on Thursday would call on EU chief Brexit negotiator Michel Barnier to ensure that "level playing field" guarantees for European businesses competing with British companies are backed by the right for Brussels to take rapid retaliatory action if Britain breaches its commitments, the FT reported on Monday.

G20 May Agree to Only 6-Month Debt WASHINGTON (Reuters) - Some

G20 creditor countries are reluctant to broaden and extend another year of coronavirus debt service relief to the world's poorest countries, so a six-month compromise may emerge

this week, World Bank President David Malpass said on Monday. Malpass, speaking to reporters as the World Bank's and International Monetary Fund's

virtual annual meetings get underway, said G20 debt working groups have not reached agreement on the two institutions' push for a year-long extension of the G20 Debt Service Suspension Initiative (DSSI).

"I think there may be compromise language that may be a six month extension (and) that it can be renewed depending on debt sustainability," Malpass said.

Finance ministers and central bank governors from the G20 major economies are scheduled to meet by videoconference on Wednesday. In May, they launched an initiative to allow poor countries to suspend payments on official bilateral debt owed to G20 creditor countries until the end of 2020, which Malpass said has freed up \$5 billion to bolster coronavirus responses so far.

Malpass and IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva have been warning that far more debt relief is needed for poor and middle-income countries, including principal reduction, to avoid a "lost decade" as the pandemic destroys economic activity.

Malpass said the two institutions would propose a joint action plan to reduce the debt stock for poor countries with unsustainable debts.

But he said debtor nations needed to more strongly demand debt relief for more progress to be made.

"Leaders of the debtor nations have been deferential to the creditors," Malpass said. "It's been very important that leaders of poorest nations speak up and speak out about the need for a lighter debt burden from the creditor nations. That dialogue hasn't been as robust yet as I think is necessary to move this process along."

A new World Bank debt study published on Monday showed that among countries eligible for the G20 debt relief program, external debt climbed 9.5% in 2019 to \$744 billion before the pandemic hit.

The poorest countries' official bilateral debt to G20 countries reached \$178 billion in 2019, with 63% of the total owed to China. The study said China's share of this debt stood at 45% in 2013, the year Beijing launched its global Belt and Road infrastructure drive.

A Collapse of Global Tax Talks Could Cost \$100b



PARIS (Reuters) - The global economy could shed more than 1% of output if international talks to rewrite cross-border tax rules break down and trigger a trade war, the OECD said on Monday, after countries agreed to keep up negotiating to mid-2021.

Nearly 140 countries agreed on Friday to extend talks, after the pandemic outbreak and U.S. hesitation before the presidential election squashed hopes of reaching a deal this year. Public pressure is growing on big, profitable multinationals to pay their share under international rules after the COVID-19 pandemic strained national budgets, the countries said in an agreed statement. The aim is to update international tax rules for the age of digital commerce, in particular to discourage big Internet companies like Google GOOGL.O, FacebookFB.O and Amazon AMZN.O from booking profits in low-tax countries like Ireland, regardless where their customers are. In the absence of a new international rulebook, a growing number of governments are planning their own digital services taxes, which has prompted threats of trade retaliation from the Trump administration. "The alternative to finding an agreement would be a trade war ... The last thing you want at this time with COVID-19 is to have to deal with further trade tensions," OECD Secretary General Angel Gurria told journalists. In such a worst-case scenario, trade disputes could knock global GDP back by more than 1%, the OECD, which has been steering the global tax talks, estimated in an impact assessment. Conversely, new rules for digital taxation and a proposed global minimum tax would increase global corporate income tax worldwide by 1.9% to 3.2%, or about \$50 billion to \$80 billion per year. That could reach \$100 billion when including an existing U.S. minimum tax on overseas profits. amounting to 4% of global corporate income tax, the OECD said. Meanwhile, any drag on global growth would be no more than 0.1% in the long term.

Japan September Wholesale Prices Slump, Heightening Deflation Risk

TOKYO (Reuters) - Japanese wholesale prices fell 0.8% in September from the same month a year earlier, data showed on



Monday, marking the seventh straight month of year-on-year declines and heightening the risk the country will slide back into deflation.

Squeezed mostly by soft global demand for commodities and Japanese machinery goods, the weakness in wholesale prices highlights the challenge Tokyo faces in cushioning the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on the world's third-largest economy.

The 0.8% fall in the corporate goods price index (CGPI), which measures the price companies charge each other for their goods and services, was bigger than a median market forecast for a 0.5% drop. It followed August's 0.6% year-on-year decrease.

Wholesale prices also slid 0.2% in September from August, marking the first on-month drop in four months, the data released by the Bank of Japan (BOJ) showed.

"With the global economy still reeling from the pandemic's pain, the pace of its recovery remains modest. That will weigh on Japan's wholesale inflation," a BOJ official told a briefing.



The drop in wholesale prices adds to headaches for the BOJ, which frets that sluggish consumption, particularly for services, will push consumer inflation further away from its 2% target.

Core consumer prices - the BOJ's key inflation measurement - fell 0.4% in August from a year earlier, marking their fastest year-on-year drop in almost four years.

The slew of soft price data may increase the chance the BOJ will cut its inflation forecasts at this month's rate review, when it also conducts a quarterly review of its projections. Japan suffered its biggest economic slump on record in the second quarter as the pandemic crippled demand. Analysts expect any rebound to remain modest as fears of a second wave of infections weigh on consumption.

France and other fishing nations in the EU will emphasise their determination to preserve quota rights in British waters, leaving Barnier with limited space to tease out a deal, the newspaper reported.

The EU wants to secure consistent rights to fish in British waters, an important issue for France where coastal fishing communities are politically influential. Britain wants a deal more like that of non-EU member Norway. under which quotas are set each year.

Johnson has set a deadline of the Oct. 15 EU summit for agreement on a deal, and an EU diplomat said on Friday Barnier wants a few more concessions from Britain before entering the last intense phase of negotiations on a trade deal.

Johnson told German Chancellor Angela Merkel on Sunday that progress must be made in post-Brexit trade talks with the European Union in coming days to bridge "significant gaps", in particular in the areas of fisheries and the level playing field, his office said.

Johnson repeated his belief that "while achieving a deal in the coming days would be beneficial for both sides, the UK was also prepared to end the transition period on Australia-style terms".

Iran to Extend Flights To Int'l Routes

TEHRAN (ISNA) - The head of the Iran Aviation Organization announced the possibility of increasing flights to international routes.

"Flights in foreign routes are being operated by the Islamic Republic of Iran Airlines," Touraj Dehghani Zanganeh stated referring to the latest situation of foreign flights.

"Routes are extended by adding flights to Germany last week," he added.

Referring to flights to Turkey, he says that there are 2 daily flights from Iran to Turkey and 2 flights from Turkish Airlines to Iran. "If the negotiations are concluded, the number of flights will increase next week."



IEA Nudges Up 2020 Gas Demand Forecast

OSLO (Reuters) - The International Energy Agency (IEA) has nudged up its global gas demand forecast for this year, but still sees the biggest fall on record due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Paris-based agency said on Monday it now expected gas demand to drop by 3% year-on-year, or 120 billion cubic metres (bcm), to 3,886 bcm.

In June, it forecast a 4%, or 150 bcm, fall.

"Global gas demand has been progressively recovering since June, driven mainly by emerging markets," IEA director Fatih Birol said in a statement, after the agency published its "Global Gas Security Review 2020".

However, he warned against assuming a return to "business as usual, as the current crisis could have long-lasting repercussions."

The resurgence of COVID-19 cases and the prospect of a prolonged pandemic clouded the outlook for 2021, the IEA said.

It currently expects demand to rebound by 3% year-on-year, or around 130 bcm, to 4,014 bcm next year. The IEA said the liquefied natural gas (LNG) market had played a key role in adjusting to the drop in demand, with global LNG exports plunging 17% between January and July.

"In this extraordinary context, LNG contracting activity has collapsed from its high of 95 bcm in 2018 to about 35 bcm in the first nine months of 2020," it said.

Challenges also lie ahead for the LNG sector, with one-third of active contracts, or 190 bcm, due to expire over the next five years, the agency said.

Over the same period, global liquefaction capacity is expected to increase by 20% from projects currently under development, it added.



"These two factors will strongly impact the structure of LNG supply, and create new opportunities for buyers and challenges for marketers in a context of demand uncertainty."





YORK (Dispatches) - Two American NEW economists, Paul R. Milgrom and Robert B. Wilson, were awarded the Nobel in economic science on Monday for improvements to auction theory and inventions of new auction formats - innovations that have had huge practical applications when it comes to allocating scarce resources.

The pair, close collaborators who are both affiliated with Stanford University, have pioneered new auction formats that governments have since used to auction off radio frequency.

"They haven't just profoundly changed the way we understand auctions — they have changed how things are auctioned," said Alvin E. Roth, a Nobel laureate himself who was one of Mr. Wilson's doctoral students. "The two of them are some of the greatest theorists living in economics today."

Auctions help to sell a variety of products, including art, minerals and online advertising. They can also take on various characteristics: Objects can have a shared, common value for all bidders (such as commodities like oil) or private values that vary across bidders (like art). Bidders may know exactly what the object's value is, or they may have imperfect information. Bids can be open, meaning everyone can see them, or closed.

Mr. Wilson "was the first to create a framework" for auctions of items with a common value, according to the prize committee. In his work, he explained that bidders will offer less than they think the object or service is worth because they are afraid of overpaying - the winner's curse — even more acutely when they are at an information disadvantage. But in most auctions, bidders have both common and private values - when buying a house, for instance, shoppers think about both what they personally like about the amenities and what the market value of the home might be. Mr. Milgrom came up with a theory to deal with that mix of common and private value, and he examined how the "winner's curse" plays out in such instances. He found that people underbid by less in so-called English auctions, in which prices start low and are raised, than in Dutch auctions, where they start high and are reduced. Yet the pair's "best-known contribution," according to the committee, is their work in designing new auction formats for complex situations, including the format that governments now use to allocate radio frequencies to telecom operators. Radio bandwidth was once allocated by "beauty contests" in which operators made a case for why they should get it - leading to intense lobbying. In the 1990s, the Federal Communications Commission pushed, and Congress permitted, a switch to lottery-based allocation of bandwidth. Initially, though, the new approach also worked poorly: The lotteries were held locally, leading to fractured networks for national operators, among other problems.

India Announces Economic Stimulus to Boost Demand by \$10b

NEW DELHI (Reuters) -India on Monday announced steps to stimulate consumer demand, including advance payment of a part of the wages of federal government employees during the festival season and more capital spending as it tries to bolster the pandemic-hit economy. The government will

allow its employees to spend tax-exempt travel

allowances on goods and services, Nirmala Sitharaman, India's finance minister told a news briefing.

She said the government will also shore up investment by spending extra 250 billion rupees (\$3.41 billion) on roads, ports and defence projects, and offering 120 billion rupees in interest-free 50-year loans to state governments for spending on infrastructure before March 31.2021.

"All these measures are likely to create an additional demand of 730 billion rupees (\$9.96 billion)," Sitharaman said, adding the proposals would stimulate demand in a "fiscally prudent way."

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government, which



to stem the spread of the coronavirus in March, is pushing ahead with a full opening to try to boost the economy ahead of the usually high-spending festival season, which runs from October to March.

The latest package would not require any extra borrowing by the federal government, Tarun Bajaj,

India's federal government said last month it would stick to revised borrowing target of 12 trillion rupees (\$163.78 billion) in the current fiscal year ending March, against an earlier estimate of 7.8 trillion rupees. The Reserve Bank of India left key policy rates unchanged on Friday, while retaining an accommodative monetary stance to support an economy that is projected to contract by almost 10% in the current fiscal year.

TEHRAN (MNA) - Study of performance of 22 subsidiary units of Iranian Mines and Mining Industries Development and Renovation (IMIDRO) indicates that 15,568,069 tons of sponge iron was produced in first half of current year.

15,568,069 tons of sponge iron was produced in the first six months of the current Iranian calendar year (from March 21 to Sept. 22), showing an eight percent growth as compared to the last year's corresponding period.

Accordingly, 2,681,177 tons of sponge iron was produced in the Iranian month of Shahrivar (August-September), registering a 12 percent growth as compared to the same period of last year.

Age Just a Number For Nadal, Fe Add Djokovi

PARIS (Dispatches) - Rafael Nadal's 13th French Open was hailed as "one of sport's greatest achievements" by close friend and rival Roger Federer, but for tennis's flagging chasing pack, it was another dagger in the heart of their ambitions.

Nadal, who has now gone level with Federer on 20 career Grand Slams, has won six since turning 30.

World number one Novak Djokovic has captured five of his 17 since leaving his 20s while even Federer, now 39, claimed four after his 30th birthday.

They are statistics which illustrate even more starkly how big the gap remains between the sport's 'Big Three' and the rest.

Nadal's staggering 6-0, 6-2, 7-5 win over Djokovic in the Roland Garros final allowed him to join the Serb in winning majors in three different decades.

The 34-year-old Spaniard insists that he won't become obsessed with ending his career as the all-time greatest Slam winner.

"I would love to finish my career being the player with more Grand Slams," he said after winning his 100th match at Roland Garros against just two losses in 15 years.

"But I'm not going to be thinking all the time Novak has this one, Roger is winning the other one. "You can't be always unhappy because your neighbour has a bigger house than you or

Tokyo to Host Four-Nation Gymnastics Contest

TOKYO (AFP) - Tokyo will host a one-off international gymnastics tournament next month, organisers said Monday, in what could serve as a practice run ahead of the postponed Olympics.

Thirty-two gymnasts from China, Russia, the United States and Japan will face off at the November 8 event -- the first major multinational sporting contest Japan has held since the coronavirus pandemic hit earlier this year.

The competition, which has been under discussion for months, will have strict anti-infection measures in place.

It is still unclear exactly how the Tokyo Olympics, which were forced back a year by the Covid-19 crisis to July and August 2021, will go ahead.

With many countries experiencing fresh waves of contagion, big questions -- including whether spectators will be allowed -- remain unresolved.

But Morinari Watanabe, president of the International Gymnastics Federation (FIG), said next month's contest could provide a reference point for Olympic bosses. "This is being organised as our way to uplift the world, which has been driven down by the coronavirus," Watanabe told an online press conference. it means a lot to share this number with Roger. Federer, who missed the US Open and Roland Garros to recover from knee surgery, believes that he and Nadal have "pushed each other to become better players".

Nadal is the oldest Roland Garros champion since Andres Gimeno in 1972.



Djokovic, at 33, is the youngest of the three giants of the sport.

Despite his loss on Sunday, which cost him the chance to become the first man since Rod Laver in 1969 to win all four majors twice, he believes the 20-Slam mark can be bettered.

"If I thought it was too late I would have ended my career today," the world number one told Serbian media after his seventh loss in eight meetings with Nadal in Paris.

"Myself, Nadal, Federer have been written off many times but we keep coming back and proving that we are still the best in the world."

"My goals remain the same - the historic number one ranking and Grand Slam titles." Djokovic will start his 289th week as world number one on Monday with Federer's all-time high of 310 comfortably in his sights.

The iron-grip on the Slams of Nadal, Djokovic and Federer is another source of frustration for the young pretenders who have constantly come up short. From Federer's first Slam triumph at Wimbledon in 2003, 57 of the 69 majors have been won by the 'Big Three'. Only six finals have failed to feature at least one of them.

The most recent even carries an asterik as Dominic Thiem's win over Alexander Zverev at the US Open last month came after Nadal and Federer opted not to play and Djokovic was defaulted.

Until Sunday, that was Djokovic's only loss of 2020 compared to 37 wins.

Greek world number six Stefanos Tsitsipas, who lost in five sets to Djokovic in the semi-finals at Roland Garros, believes there will be a changing of the guard. However, the 22-year-old was conservative on the timeframe.



LONDON (Dispatches) - (Reuters) - Former world number one Andy Murray and three others have been elected to ATP's Player Council to replace the Novak Djokovic-led group who resigned from the body to form a breakaway union, the governing body of men's tennis announced on Monday.

Briton Murray, Canada's Felix Auger-Aliassime, Australian John Millman and Frenchman Jeremy Chardy will replace Djokovic, John Isner, Vasek Pospisil and Sam Querrey -- who stepped down to form the Professional Tennis Players Association (PTPA). Murray joins 20-time Grand Slam champions Roger Federer and Rafa Nadal on the council.

The ATP was set up by players in 1972 to represent the men's athletes but its board now includes representatives of tournament owners as well.

Besides the ATP and the women's WTA, the sport is also controlled by the International Tennis Federation and the boards of the four Grand Slams.

World number one Djokovic described the PTPA, which he said has already attracted the support of more than 200 players, as a platform for the views of the athletes that can co-exist with the ATP.

In response to the formation of the PTPA, the governing bodies had issued a joint statement calling for unity at a time when tennis has been ravaged by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hamilton to Keep Racing Until He Turns Grey

LONDON (Dispatches) - Lewis Hamilton issued a clear warning to his rivals after his record-equalling 91st career win at the Eifel Grand Prix when he said he wants to keep chasing records until he turns grey.



The runaway series leader and six-time world champion equalled Michael Schumacher's total of wins and moved closer to levelling him on seven drivers' titles with his victory at the Nurburgring on Sunday.

It was his first win at the circuit for Mercedes and the team's first triumph at the historic venue since Juan-Manuel Fangio's victory in 1954. "Of course, I can set goals and I will continue to charge on and see what is possible," said Hamilton. "I love the sport – the smell of it, the whole aura and atmosphere it creates – and it is going to be difficult to let it go.

"While I am older now than these guys, I feel as young as them in spirit. That will change when I start seeking grey hairs, but for now I am good."

Hamilton achieved his landmark win after 260 races while Schumacher, whose 21-year-old racer son Mick gave him one of his father's helmets to mark his achievement, raced in 246. The German won his 91st race 14 years ago at the 2006 Chinese Grand Prix.

Hamilton, who grew up watching Schumacher win races during his and Ferrari's domination, can move one clear of that total if he wins the inaugural Formula One race at the Portimao circuit in Portugal on October 25.

"I could never fathom equalling his records and it is beyond my wildest dreams to be here now – I feel humbled by the moment," said Hamilton.

"Michael is, and always will be, a legend of the sport."

Bottas Vows Never to Give Up

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Valtteri Bottas admitted he needs a miracle to stop Lewis Hamilton claiming a recordequalling seventh drivers' world title, but said he intends to battle on at every race and has no intention of conceding defeat.



The Mercedes driver, who was forced to retire on lap 19 of Sunday's Eifel Grand Prix after suffering a power failure, is now 69 points behind his team-mate after the six-time champion equalled Michael Schumacher's record 91 wins.

It was Hamilton's seventh win in 11 races this season and, remarkably, extended his record run of consecutive finishes in the points to 44, a statistic that will probably cause more dismay for the Finn. "I understand the gap to Lewis is now pretty big in the points," he said, with characteristic understatement. "So, I would definitively need a miracle, but, as always, there's no point in giving up. "I have to keep the bar high for me and keep trying… I think that's the best mind-set -- there's no point now to non-stop calculate the points for Lewis because it's quite a big gap.

"I just have to set the target for each weekend and then do everything I can for that. So, for me, the mind-set is to never give up. It's still with me so -- no chance to get out of it. Obviously, in a couple of months, we'll be a lot wiser about how the season pans out." With six races remaining, starting in Portugal in two weeks' time, Hamilton has such a luxurious cushion that he is only likely to let a seventh title slip if he has at least three non-finishes – a prospect that his amazing consistency makes unlikely.

Having won in Russia, Bottas arrived at the Nurburgring in confident mood and claimed pole position. He fought off an attack from Hamilton at the race start and appeared to be in control until a rainstorm led to him locking up at Turn One on lap 13.
