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Tehran Has Nothing To Hide About Ukrainian Plane Incident

TEHRAN (MNA) - Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister for International and Legal Affairs Baharvand said that Iran has nothing to hide about Ukrainian plane incident and is ready to honestly inform the Ukrainian delegation about the details.

The second round of the related talks over the flight 752 tragedy started at the place of the Iranian Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Tehran on Monday.

During the meeting, head of Iranian delegation Mohsen Baharvand expressed sympathy with the families of the victims in the Ukrainian plane incident, saying, "The Ukrainian plane had been downed due to human error and the Islamic Republic of Iran will try to reassure the Ukrainian side."

Stating that the approach of the Islamic Republic of Iran is based on transparency, he added, "Iran has nothing to hide about Ukrainian plane incident and is ready to honestly inform the Ukrainian delegation and people about the details of the incident."

Baharvand called the Islamic Republic of Iran and Ukraine two friendly countries that unfortunately witnessed this incident and now have to reach an agreement at the negotiating table. See Page 7

Navy Sees Iran Arms **Embargo as Only a Joke**

TEHRAN (MNA) - Referring to the end of Iran arms embargo, Commander of the Iranian Navy Rear Admiral Hossein Khanzadi said that Iran Navy has no need to buy weapons today, and arms embargo is considered a joke for the Navy.

Stating that at one time Iran was in dire need of spare parts and weapons and it was looking for a country to give it torpedoes, cannons and weapons or the teach the technology of building a float, Khanzadi said, "But today, I dare say that the lifting or continuation of the arms embargo is not effective for Iran Navy because we made everything we wanted from all kinds of cannons, torpedoes and floats."

Referring to the torpedoes issue in naval weapons, he added, "Until a few years ago, we had to buy torpedoes from some countries, but with the arrival of native torpedoes and their successful testing, this need has been also completely met."

"The native Iranian torpedo, which was tested for the first time in 2017, has made considerable progress both in its range and the ability to destroy and accuracy," Khanzadi said, adding, "We even designed the caliber of the torpedoes to be tactical rather than cost-effective." See Page 7

TEHRAN - Iran recorded its worst day of new deaths since the start of the coronavirus pandemic, with 337 confirmed dead on Monday.

The grim milestone represents a significant spike from the previous single-day death toll record of 279. The Health Ministry also announced 4,251 new infections, pushing the total count to 534,630.

Fatalities have soared in recent weeks, as authorities struggle to contain the virus's spread months into the pandemic. Health officials say the capital, Tehran, has run out of intensive care beds.

Yesterday the Spokeswoman for Iran's Ministry of Health, Sima Sadat Lari, announced in her presser that 534,631 people in the country have been infected with the coronavirus, and 431,360 of the total infected people have recovered. According to definitive laboratory findings from yesterday to October 19, 2020, newly diagnosed patients with

COVID-19 reached to 4,251 cases out of whom 1,948 of patients were hospitalized, Lari stated. She added that in the past 24 hours, 337 COVID-19 patients had lost their lives, bringing the total death toll to 30,712. 4,771 COVID-19 patients are in critical condition.

"So far, 4,540,455 COVID-19 diagnosis tests have been conducted across the country," the Health Ministry Spokeswoman noted. She pointed out that Provinces of Tehran, Isfahan, Qom, East Azarbaijan, South Khorasan, Semnan, Qazvin, Lorestan, Ardabil, Khuzestan, Kermanshah, Kohgiluyeh and Boyer-Ahmad, Gilan, Bushehr, Zanjan, Ilam, Khorasan Razavi, Mazandaran, Chaharmahal and Bakhtiari, Alborz, West Azarbaijan, Markazi, Kerman, North Khorasan, Hamadan, Yazd, and Kordestan are regarded as red zones.

According to the Health Ministry Spokeswoman, provinces of Hormozgan, Fars, and Golestan are on alert. Meanwhile yesterday, Director-General of Drugs and Controlled Substances of Iran's Ministry of Health Heidar Mohammadi said on Monday that Iran has joined the World Health Organization's initiative for fair and equitable distribution of vaccine doses.

Mohammadi said that the Ministry of Health has signed the letter of Iran's joining the COVAX initiative and has officially become a part of it.

He added Iran will have its share of the vaccine doses whenever the vaccine is produced.

The initiative plans to ensure COVID-19 vaccines are available worldwide to both higher-income and lower-income countries. Earlier, Deputy Minister of Health Ali-Reza Raeesi had said that the WHO had given sufficient time to Iran to

No Iranian Assets **Frozen in China**

TEHRAN - Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Saeed Khatibzadeh denied reports of blocked Iranian assets in China.

Speaking at a weekly press conference on Monday, Khatibzadeh rejected the "untrue" reports about the relations between Tehran and Beijing, saying, "No (Iranian) money is blocked in China."

"Many (such) reports (about Iran-China ties) are incorrect. We are in constant talks with the Chinese,' he stated.

There are resources in China that are being used for Iran's economic cycle, the spokesman said, adding that those resources are different from the frozen Iranian assets in Japan, Iraq and elsewhere.

Last week, President Hassan Rouhani said Iran has stepped up efforts to use its foreign currency reserve assets frozen in other countries despite the U.S. pressures.

Reacting to U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo's remarks, Khatibzadeh said that unilateral sanctions have not been successful. See Page 7

Trade With Saudi Arabia "Zeroed"

TEHRAN (ILNA) - The Director General of Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO)'s Office of Arabian and African Countries Farzad Piltan announced that Iran's trade with Saudi Arabia has reached "zero" in the last six months.

The Iranian official said that \$8.16 of Iran total export was exported to 15 neighboring countries in the six months of the current Iranian calendar year beginning March 20, 2020.

"Among this group of countries, Iraq and the UAE are ranked first and second, and Oman, Kuwait, and Qatar are ranked eighth to tenth after Afghanistan, Turkey, Pakistan, Russia, and Azerbaijan.'

He continued "In this list, Bahrain and Saudi Arabia are ranked 14th and 15th, after Kazakhstan and Turkmenistan", adding that Iran's exports to Bahrain were \$ 3 million and exports to Saudi Arabia were zero during this period.

Also, in the field of imports, 16.78 billion dollars in the amount of 16 million and 524 thousand tons of goods have been imported into the country during this period, he said. See Page 7

More than 160 countries have joined the program. China and the U.S. have not joined yet.

More than 140 medicine companies are trying to make the vaccine, some of which in the U.S., Europe, and China have had some achievements and have entered the phase of trials on humans.

Iran's Minister of Health Saeed Namaki has said that Iran is trying to make the vaccine as well, adding that the trials in animals, such as monkeys, have been successful and that the vaccine will be tested on humans in the near future.

Nearly all Mideast Economies Hit by Pandemic Recession

DUBAI (Dispatches) - The coronavirus pandemic has pushed nearly all Mideast nations into the throes of an economic recession this year, yet some rebound is expected as all but two - Lebanon and Oman - are expected to see some level of economic growth next year, according to a report published Monday by the International Monetary Fund.

This comes as the IMF estimates that the global economy will shrink 4.4% this year, marking the worst annual plunge since the Great Depression of the 1930s.

Well before the coronavirus swept across the globe, several Mideast countries had been struggling with issues ranging from lower oil prices and sluggish economic growth to corruption and high unemployment.

The IMF projects the Lebanese economy will see one of the region's sharpest economic contractions this year at 25%. The pandemic has only pushed the country further to the brink after a wave of anti-government anger before the virus struck. Lebanese demonstrators were protesting government corruption, foreign exchange shortages, hyperinflation, constant electricity cuts and increasing poverty. The currency has dropped by 70% compared to the end of last year, with people struggling to afford basic goods. A devastating explosion at Beirut's main port in August killed at least 180 people, injured more than 6,000 and destroyed entire neighborhoods. The blast left hundreds of thousands of people homeless.

While Mideast nations have seen fewer confirmed cases and deaths from the virus than countries in Europe and the U.S., the region still faces challenges in containing the disease. See Page 7

Russian Diplomat Urges Pompeo to Stop Provoking Iran

TEHRAN (PressTV) - A senior Russian diplomat says U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo must stop provoking Iran and pumping weapons in the region if he wants a peaceful Middle East.

Dmitry Polyanskiy, the first deputy permanent representative of Russia to the UN, said Pompeo is expected to contribute to [a] peaceful Middle East by stopping to provoke Iran and to pump region with arms.

"And please change [the] words 'sanctions' and 'punishment' in your vocabulary to 'dialogue' and 'engagement'. That would help a lot! Make US respected again!" he added.

He made the comments in a post on his Twitter account, in which he quoted a tweet by Pompeo threatening those who may trade weapons with Iran.

"No nation that desires a peaceful Middle East should contemplate arms sales with Iran," Pompeo said. "We are prepared to use domestic authorities to sanction individuals or entities contributing to these arms sales." Earlier in the day, Pompeo had released a statement in this regard, in which he threatened to impose sanctions on any individuals and entities that get engaged in arms transfer to and from Iran.

Dubai-Lengeh Port Ferry Route Resumes Operation

TEHRNA (MNA) - The ferry route between Lengeh Port in Iran's Hormozgan province and Dubai has resumed operation, after eight months of closure due to the coronavirus pandemic.

According to the Islamic Republic of Iran Shipping Line (IRISL) Group, following negotiations between the Iranian and Emirati sides, the marine line will transport passengers between the two port cities on a weekly basis with all health protocols in place. Passengers are required to have a printed negative COVID-19 PCR test certificate to be accepted on board.

Prior to the coronavirus spread, ferry boats were operating regularly between Iran's Shahid Bahonar Port in Bandar Abbas and the UAE's Sharjah as well as between Hormozgan's Bandar Lengeh and Dubai.

President Accuses U.S of Trying to Abuse Afghan Peace Talks

TEHRAN (MNA) - President Hassan Rouhani warned that U.S. President Donald Trump is trying to abuse the Intra-Afghan peace talks to reach his presidential election goals.

Rouhani made the remarks on Monday in a meeting with Abdullah Abdullah, the head of Afghanistan's High Council for National Reconciliation (HCNR), who is in Tehran to hold talks with senior Iranian officials during an official three-day visit.

He stressed that the U.S. intervention and presence as an aggressor country in Afghanistan was not in line with the will and the public opinion of this country, adding that the U.S. government, which has failed several times in its policies in the region and the world, seeks its own political and electoral goals in the country.

The Iranian president added that the Islamic Republic supports the Intra-Afghan peace talks as the key to solve the country's political problems.

Expressing hope for the success of the efforts to establish peace and stability in Afghanistan, the Iranian president added, "It is important that the people of Afghanistan achieve a real peace after years of war and conflict."

He added, "Sustainable peace, stability and security in Afghanistan as a neighbor and brother country is of special importance for the Islamic Republic of Iran." Referring to the good relations between Iran and Afghanistan as two friendly and neighboring

countries, Rouhani stressed the development and deepening of Tehran-Kabul relations. He pointed to the Khaf-Herat railway, saying that project will come on stream

in the coming days.

"Iran is ready to connect gas and oil pipelines to Afghanistan to provide our neighboring nation with energy products," he added. Rouhani stressed, "We have always stood along with the people of Afghanistan, and we will continue to support this country and all aspects."

Abdullah Abdullah appreciated the supports of the Islamic Republic of Iran regarding developments and efforts to establish lasting peace and security in this country and said, "The Islamic Republic of Iran is a good friend and neighbor of Afghanistan."

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - China's Ambassador to Iran Chang Hua praised the Islamic Republic as a strategic partner of his country, stressing the need for closer cooperation in various fields and in countering the U.S.' unilateralism.

Chang Hua said China and Iran are "comprehensive strategic partners", expressing his country's willingness to promote cooperation and links with Iran in all arenas, including the fight against the coronavirus pandemic.

China believes that positive interaction among all countries could safeguard multilateralism and counter unilateralism and hegemony, he said.

Collective cooperation would also protect international justice and equality for the fulfillment of common interests of the developing nations, the envoy added.

The ambassador also pointed to the growing political, economic and cultural interaction between China and Iran on the basis of mutual respect and interests, saying the two states have also joined hands in the efforts to tackle the coronavirus pandemic. Asked about the U.S.' failure to trigger the snapback mechanism of the JCPOA and its intensified sanctions against Iran, the Chinese ambassador said Washington has disregarded the UN Charter and violated the international law by imposing economic and financial sanctions or resorting to unilateral and punitive measures against other nations. Such American policies amount to an onslaught on the international political and economic system, Chang Hua said, adding that the US sanctions have impaired the improvement of livelihood of people in the sanctioned states and have ignored the basic rights of innocent people, including children, women and the elderly. On the prospect of the U.S. presidential election, the Chinese ambassador said it is a domestic issue of the U.S., adding, "China's policy on the United States is a fixed policy." "As regards the U.S., we are committed to the principles of non-conflict and non-confrontation, mutual respect, and win-win cooperation. At the same time, we will defend our country's national sovereignty, security, and interests in the process of development.3

Iran Can Meet 90% of Defense Needs Domestically

TEHRAN (IFP) - Iran's defense minister says the country is capable of producing 90 percent of its defense needs domestically, and that is a bitter pill to swallow for Washington. Brigadier General Amir Hatami said

Iran has developed such capability on the back of self-sufficiency.

"When we came under sanctions during the Holy Defense era (the eight years of the Iraqi-imposed war on Iran in the 1980s), we adopted a strategy and realized the importance of self-reliance given [other countries'] refusal to sell arms to us," said the defense chief in a televised interview on Sunday night.

"We need to rely on ourselves in order to safeguard the country's territorial integrity," he said.

The top general underlined that U.S. sanctions turned out to be an opportunity for Iran to stand on its own feet. "The pressure and sanctions imposed on us by the

U.S. for years led us to move, so much so that we can now produce and provide 90 percent of our defense needs inside the country," he said.

General Hatami said Iran's defense capabilities are a bitter pill to swallow for Washington.

"It is very hard for the Americans to see Iran has developed such a capability," he said.

The senior commander said the White House has tried its utmost to strip Iran of its legitimate rights.

He underscored the U.S. had been trying over the past year to extend the UN arms embargo on Iran, which expired on October 18, 2020.

"The Americans asked the UN Security Council repeatedly to keep the restrictions in place or impose new restrictions, but they were discredited,"



whatever we need in the world legally and in accordance with the UN Security Council's approval, and we can also provide other countries with what they need," he noted.

Hatami said despite the U.S. and its arms-producing allies which only think about profit, Iran will sell weapons only to those who do not abuse it, and those who are

despised by the U.S. "Many countries have already talked to us; we have held negotiations with some countries, and the grounds are totally prepared for exchanges [of weapons], both for selling [arms to other countries] and for supplying certain needs [buying weapons]," he noted.

"Of course our sales will be much more extensive [than our purchases]," he added.

General Hatami said all nations have the right to defend their territorial integrity, and Iran will be a good and successful actor in this regard as it seeks to preserve peace.

He said Iran's goal is first to become self-sufficient and powerful in terms of defensive capabilities, and second to support the countries that seek to defend their existence.

Meanwhile, he gave an assurance to regional countries that the Islamic Republic wants peace, stability and security for the region and the world. "This is the clear defense policy of the Islamic Republic of Iran."

"You can't find any move against this policy in the past four decades Wherever we took action, it was meant to create peace, help establish security and stability in the region. We honestly showed it to the

entire world in the course of fight against the terrorists

said the defense chief.

"Today, all bans on weapons sales were lifted and trained by the Americans," Hatami said.

Afghan officials say that the railway project will be inaugurated within the next few months which they say will be a breakthrough in trade relations between the



two neighboring countries.

Construction of Harat-Khaf railway, which is underway in four parts and is 193 km, began in 2007

Meanwhile Chairman of Afghanistan's Peace Council Abdullah Abdullah, for his part, said that if peace is restored in Afghanistan, the country can take advantage more of these cooperation opportunities.

He added that both countries can cooperate on wind energies and both countries are studying the grounds for cooperation in this field.

He expressed hope Afghanistan's internal and financial problems would be resolved soon.

Earlier in October, Ardakanian held talks with Afghan Acting Foreign Minister Mohammad Haneef Atmar through video conference on the development of cooperation in various energy sectors while considering issues that could be raised in the joint committee meeting.

In the last six months, Iranian steel companies produced 14 million and 392,000 tons of steel ingots (billets, blooms, and slabs), which shows a 10% increase compared to the same period last year (13 million and 89,000 tons).

Also, the production of steel products (beams, rebars, angles, studs, and sheets) in the last six months has been 11 million and 3,000 tons, which indicates an 8% increase of this product compared to the figure in the same period last year (10 million and 173,000 tons).

According to the report, the production of sponge iron in the last six months has been 15 million and 562,000 tons, which shows a 10% increase compared to the figure produced in the same period last year (14 million 185 thousand tons).

of trade between the two countries." Mahmoud for his part

praised the efforts of the heads of the Iran chamber of commerce and the Iran-Syria Joint Chamber of Commerce to improve the level of trade relations between the two countries. The official pointed to the

The two countries have been exchanging numerous trade delegations in the past few months and Iranian private companies are investing in different areas like providing construction materials especially cement and working on several reconstruction projects in Syria.

Iran Ranks First in Attracting Patient Participation in Coronavirus Studies

TEHRAN (IP) - In the World Health Organization's COVID-19 clinical trial study, Iran was ranked first among 30 countries in terms of its participation in the Solidarity Clinical Trial, a global effort to find an effective treatment for COVID-19.

Reza Malekzadeh, Deputy Minister of Health of Iran and a member of the Executive Committee for the Study of the World Health Organization for COVID-19 (Solidarity Clinical Trial for COVID-19 Treatments), said that in the meantime, Iran, by registering 3,500 patients, has succeeded in gaining the first rank in the 'number of patients participating' in the clinical trial study of the World Health Organization for the treatment of the disease.

Malekzadeh added: France, as the second rank in the study, has managed to register less than a thousand participating patients.

Complying With FATF to Expose Iran's Efforts to Evade Sanctions

TEHRAN (PressTV) - An economic expert says complying with FATF rules would harm Iran's efforts to get round U.S. sanctions.

Iran would enjoy almost no benefit if it fully complies with the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), an international bloc to fight money laundering and terrorism financing, says a senior expert who believes such a move would even harm Iran's efforts to evade illegal and inhumane sanctions imposed by the United States.

However, critics say Iran's financial sector in its entirety has come under US sanctions and remaining in the FATF's blacklist, an status that began in February, would pile no additional burden on the country's banks and financial institutions. "I'm concerned that by giving out this information, eventually to the US

government, we will be no longer able to evade sanctions that we have managed to circumvent until today," said Khosravi.

Saudi Arabia Restarts Prayers in Mecca

MECCA (AFP) - Saudi Arabia opened Sunday Islam's holiest site for prayers for the first time in seven months, and expanded the umrah pilgrimage to accommodate 15,000 worshippers as it relaxed coronavirus curbs.

Mask-clad Saudi citizens and residents of the kingdom were allowed to pray inside the Grand Mosque in the holy city of Mecca, amid what authorities called extensive health precautions.

"Citizens and residents have performed Salat Al-Fajr (dawn prayers) at the Grand Mosque today as (authorities) start implementing the second phase of the gradual resumption of umrah," the official Saudi Press Agency reported.

Churches Burnt as Chile Anniversary Rallies Turn Violent



SANTIAGO (Dispatches) - Tens of thousands of Chileans gathered in the central square of Santiago to mark the one-year anniversary of mass protests that left over 30 dead and thousands injured, with peaceful rallies on Sunday devolving by nightfall into riots and looting.

People gathered early in the day in demonstrations downtown and in cities throughout Chile that gained size and fervor through the evening. Many touted signs and rainbow colored homemade banners calling for a "yes" vote next Sunday in a referendum over whether to scrap the country's dictatorship-era Constitution, a key demand of the 2019 protests.

The demonstrations, while largely peaceful early on, were marred by increasing incidents of violence, looting of supermarkets and clashes with police across the capital later in the day. Fire truck sirens, burning barricades on roadways and fireworks on downtown streets added to a sense of chaos in some neighborhoods.

Interior Minister Victor Perez spoke late in the evening, praising the early, peaceful rallies while blasting the late-night mayhem. He called on Chileans to settle their differences by voting in the upcoming Oct. 25 constitutional referendum.

"Those who carry out these acts of violence do not want Chileans to solve our problems through democratic means," Perez told reporters, vowing to punish those who crossed the line Sunday.

Early in the day, an angry mob jeered and threatened a Communist Party mayor. Later, masked individuals firebombed a police headquarters and church. Vandals attacked another Santiago church in the early evening, setting its spire aflame and choking side streets with smoke.

More than 15 metro stations were temporarily closed amid the unrest. Police fired tear gas and water cannons



Global Coronavirus Cases Surpass the 40 Million Milestone

LONDON (Reuters) - Worldwide coronavirus cases crossed 40 million on Monday, according to a Reuters tally, as the onset of winter in the northern hemisphere fuelled a resurgence in the spread of the disease.

The Reuters tally is based on official reporting by individual countries. Experts believe the true numbers of both cases and deaths are likely much higher, given deficiencies in testing and potential under-reporting by some countries. The Reuters data shows the pace of the pandemic continues to pick up. It took just 32 days to go from 30 million global cases to 40 million, compared with the 38 days it took to get from 20 to 30 million, the 44 days between 10 and 20 million, and the three months it took to reach 10 million cases from when the first cases were reported in Wuhan, China, in early January,

Thai Democracy Protesters Defy Ban for Fourth Day BANGKOK (AFP) - Tens of thousands of

protesters defied a ban on gatherings of more than four people to mass at a major Bangkok landmark Sunday, carrying posters portraying activists detained in four straight days of strident anti-government rallies.

The youth-led movement has suffered several blows this week, with scores arrested after demonstrators surrounded a royal motorcade and flashed "democracy salutes" at Queen Suthida.

The government reacted with emergency measures -- including banning gatherings of more than four people in Bangkok -- and the arrest of protest leaders who have called for the removal of Prime Minister Prayut Chan-O-Cha, a former military chief brought to power in a 2014 coup. Police also used water cannon on demonstrators in Bangkok's central shopping district Friday in an escalation of tactics that sparked outrage across Thai society. But the crackdown has served only to embolden the movement's mostly young supporters, who have turned up in

large numbers to rallying points announced at short notice in a

Ersin Tatar Elected New Turkish Cypriot Leader

ANKARA (Dispatches) - Right-wing nationalist Ersin Tatar has won a leadership runoff vote in the self-declared Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC). With all of the ballots counted, the Ankara-backed Tatar secured 51.74 percent of the vote on Sunday, ahead of the incumbent Mustafa Akinci, at 48.26 percent, according to official media.

Tatar, who favors stronger ties with Turkey, had won 32.5 percent of the vote in last week's first round, with Akinci closely following with 29.84 percent.

Tatar appears to have benefited from a higher turnout in the runoff. He managed to rally supporters from the approximately 200,000-strong electorate who may not have voted in the first round.

Akinci conceded his defeat.

Ahmet Sozen, the chairman of the department of political science and nternational relations at the Eastern Mediterranean University, told Al Jazeera from Famagusta that the close results point to a split in the society.

"There will be a split, a polarization in the society between those who supported a federal solution and those who are saying that we shouldn't lose ime on federal solution, we should look for alternative solutions," he said.

The TRNC is recognized as an independent state only by Turkey. Other countries consider it part of Cyprus.

The island's internationally-recognized government has its seat in the Greek Cypriot south and is a member of the European Union.

Cyprus has effectively been partitioned since 1974 when Turkish troops seized its northern third in the wake of an Athens-backed coup by Greek Cypriots seeking union with Greece.

He added getting a quick-count poll out -- which involves tallying votes at the voting stations themselves -- would take time.

Bolivia's conservative interim president Jeanine Áñez implored citizens to be patient. "We should all be patient to wait for the election results without engaging in any type of violence," said Áñez, who took over in a power vacuum last year after Morales resigned.

"I assure you that we will have credible results."

Arce, who earlier this week suggested the only way his rivals could win was "through fraud," also moved to calm rhetoric that has led some to worry about a return of violence that rocked the country last year and left scores dead.

Thai CB Extends \$16b Soft Loans For Smaller Firms by Six Months

BANGKOK (Reuters) - Thailand's central bank extended its 500 billion baht (12.41 billion pounds) soft loan program by six months to help small- and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) cope with the impact of the coronavirus pandemic, according to a statement on its website.

The Bank of Thailand (BOT) also allowed listed SMEs to participate in the programme, which started in April as part of a

larger 1.9 trillion baht coronavirus response package.

The BOT has approved about 119 billion baht of loans so far and has twice said it planned to extend the program by six months. Southeast Asia's second-largest economy suffered its deepest contraction in 22 years in the second quarter as the pandemic battered tourism and domestic activity.



The BOT predicts a record economic contraction of 7.8% this year.



To Help Virus-Hit Economy

MILAN (Reuters) - Italy has approved a new stimulus package in its 2021 budget to foster an economic rebound from the recession caused by the coronavirus crisis, a government statement said on Sunday after a late-night cabinet meeting. The ruling coalition, led by the anti-establishment 5-Star Movement and centre-left PD party, agreed a preliminary version of the

stimulus package, a government source said, leaving final details to be hammered out.

Among measures to support the health and education system, the government will set up a 4 billion euro (\$4.7 billion) fund to compensate companies worst hit by coronavirus lockdowns.

The budget also extends temporary lay-off schemes for companies with workers on furlough and offers tax breaks to support employment in the poor south of the country.

Italian Prime Minister Giuseppe Conte is expected on Sunday to also announce new measures to curb the steady spike in COVID-19 cases over recent weeks.

One of the European countries worst hit by the pandemic, Italy has forecast a 9% economic contraction for 2020 and a budget deficit equating to 10.8% of gross domestic product.

The expansionary package is expected to keep Italy's deficit next year to 7% of economic output, up from a 5.7% forecast in April, reflecting the additional spending. Italy has forecast economic growth of 6% in 2021.

Expansionary measures next year will total 40 billion euros, including cheap loans and grants from the European Union's Recovery Fund, Gualtieri told lawmakers this month.

China Passes Export-Control Law Following U.S. Moves

government to act against countries that abuse export controls in a way that harm's China's interests, state media said.

The Xinhua news report late on Saturday did not name any target countries, but the United States last month angered Beijing with curbs on exports to Semiconductor Manufacturing International Corp, China's biggest chipmaker, and it has taken various steps against Huawei Technologies Co and other companies.

China and the United States have clashed over issues including trade, human rights, technology and the new coronavirus, which was first detected in China.

The new Chinese law, passed on Saturday by the National People's Congress Standing Committee, the country's top legislative body, will take effect on Dec. 1, Xinhua said.

Controlled items include military and nuclear products, as well as other goods, technologies and services and relevant data, according to a statement on the National People's Congress website. It said the law was "formulated for the purpose of safeguarding national security and interests."

In August, China's commerce ministry issued a revised list of technologies that are banned or restricted for export.

South Korea's Trade Dependency Slips in 2019 Amid Sluggish Reports

SEOUL (Dispatches) - South Korea saw its trade dependency level slip for the first time in three years in 2019, as its export volume dropped amid global factors, data showed Sunday. The country's trade dependency index -- the total trade volume proportion out of the gross domestic product -- came to 63.51 percent, according to the Korean Statistical Information

Service run by Statistics Korea.

This was down 2.57 percent from a year earlier and the lowest since the 60.11 percent observed in 2016. The export dependency marked a 12-year low at

32.94 percent, while the import dependency came to 30.57 percent, the lowest in three years.

Due to the limited size of the domestic market and industrial structure, Asia's fourth-largest economy has always seen a relatively higher trade dependency than other major economies. Ås of last year, Korea's trade dependency was the second-highest among the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, next to Germany's 70.82 percent. In contrast, the United States and Japan -- both marked with high populations and large domestic markets -- saw their corresponding figures stand at 19.34 percent and 28.08 percent, respectively. As a high trade dependency level includes higher volatility to external variables, the Korean government has for years made balancing efforts to increase household income and to boost domestic consumption. The problem is that last year's decreased trade reliance was mostly due to sluggish exports, which felt the impact of U.S.-China tensions, a chip business slump and low oil prices. According to the Ministry of Trade, Industry and Energy, Korea's exports totaled \$542.41 billion last year, down 10.3 percent on-year, marking the first double-digit dip since the global financial crisis "(Korea's) economic structure should be improved in a way to both expand export and to increase resilience," said Kim Kyung-hoon, researcher at the Korea International Trade Association.

Britain faced a sharper peak-to-trough contraction than any other Group of 20 economy due to the severity of its COVID-19 outbreak, the size of its services sector, hammered by social-distancing rules, and the risk of further outbreaks, it said.

The downgrade was another blow for Johnson who is under fire from opposition parties and lawmakers in his Conservative Party for his handling of the pandemic, which has killed more people in Britain than anywhere in Europe.

Moody's said Britain's failure to reach a broad trade deal with the EU would compound the damage caused by COVID-19.

Johnson said earlier on Friday there was currently no point in continuing the trade negotiations. "Even if there is a trade deal between the UK and EU by the end of 2020, it will likely be narrow in scope," Moody's said.

It also said Britain has lost budgetary discipline and its high debt levels were unlikely to come down quickly.

"The UK effectively has no fiscal policy anchor," it said.

Spending cuts were likely to be politically difficult and tax increases could choke off the economic recovery.

Britain's government responded by saying it had no choice other than to ramp up spending to soften the pandemic's impact.

"Over time and as the economy recovers, the government will take the necessary steps to ensure the long-term health of the public finances," a finance ministry spokesman said.

Greek Central Bank Chief Warns of 9.4% Economic Slump

ATHENS (Reuters) - Greece's recession-hit economy could shrink at a rate closer to its central bank's worst-case scenario if the coronavirus pandemic deepens, the head of the Bank of Greece said.

The central bank has forecast the economy to contract by 7.5% this year under a baseline scenario, faring worse than a previous forecast of a 5.8% decline in gross domestic product.

The bank's adverse scenario predicts the economy to shrink by 9.4%.

"A possible worsening of the pandemic, coupled with more restrictive measures in the fourth quarter, could bring the economy closer to the central bank's adverse scenario," bank Governor Yannis Stournaras told Ta Nea newspaper.

That would mean a 9.4% decline in economic activity this year and a weaker rebound in 2021, he said. Under the adverse scenario, additional targeted fiscal measures need to be considered without risking fiscal stability, Stournaras said.

"In economies with high public debt, the combination of large fiscal deficits and slow recovery leads inevitably



to higher risks as regards debt sustainability, with negative effects on long-term growth prospects," he told the paper.

Greece's economy shrank at an annual 0.5% in the first quarter and by 15.2% in the next three months to June 30.

Greece has seen a steady rise in infections since August but is still faring better than other European countries where infections have climbed more rapidly. Still, authorities have warned the relative stability is "especially fragile."

Greece reported 508 new confirmed infections on Friday, topping the 500 daily mark for the first time, with health authorities worried that a drop in temperatures may intensify epidemiological trends as winter months approach. ultra-easy monetary policy all the more necessary, European Central Bank board member Fabio Panetta has told a Greek newspaper.

The ECB expects the bloc's economy to return to its pre-crisis level by the end of 2022 - but Panetta said this projection was now at risk, a comment likely to reinforce expectations that the ECB will expand its stimulus efforts in December.

"The return to more stringent containment measures that we are observing in a number of euro area countries may push this horizon even further away," Saturday's daily Kathimerini quoted Panetta as saying.

"This reinforces the need for prolonged economic support from macroeconomic policies."

Having already agreed to buy up to 1.35 trillion euros of debt through mid-2021 under an emergency purchase scheme, the ECB is not under pressure to act quickly - but investors are still looking for a commitment to bigger and longer debt buys.

"In view of the sheer size of the downside risks, there should not be any doubt about our determination to preserve price stability," Panetta added.

He said the slowness of the recovery risked exacerbating the recent divergence between the weaker and stronger members of the 19-country single currency zone, and so widening inequality.

The ECB next meets on Oct. 29, but policy action is more likely at the following meeting on Dec. 10, where new economic projections are due to be unveiled.

Persian Gulf Currency Pegs Offer Silver Lining in Era of Weaker Dollar

DUBAI (Dispatches) - With oil and gas priced in dollars, the pegs have helped shield the countries from the volatility of energy markets and allowed central banks to accumulate foreign-currency reserves in the good times.

More than a decade ago, Persian Gulf Arab nations struggled to preserve their currency pegs as the dollar went into retreat. This time, the link to a sliding greenback may give reassurance.

Back in 2007 and 2008, the weak dollar sent the cost of imports spiralling and allowed inflation to take hold. Now, the sluggish domestic demand has put a lid on price growth, while the dollar declines could give a boost to non-oil industries like tourism once the pandemic eases.

Also out of the picture are the inflationary hot-money flows to the region when Brent crude was near \$150 12 years ago.

"The decline in the dollar will be positive for the Persian Gulf Cooperation Council (PGCC) once the impact from the Covid-19 pandemic softens," said Monica Malik, chief economist at Abu Dhabi Commercial Bank in the United Arab Emirates. "The dollar pegs still remain an important anchor to the economy and for capital inflows."

The six PGCC members have been running managed foreign-exchange regimes since the early 1970s. The system has survived successive years of low oil prices in the 1990s, a period of dollar weakness before the financial crisis in 2008 and another crude crash in 2014. Only Kuwait decided in May 2007 to link the dinar to a basket of currencies as inflation accelerated.

Earlier this year, devaluation bets mounted in forwards markets as the price of oil dropped to near 18-year lows, battering the regions' economies and raising questions about their foreign-currency reserves. Traders have since pared those wagers as Persian Gulf states cut spending and subsidies, and turned to debt markets to fund their budget deficits.

"The more important consideration for PGCC countries' exchange rate pegs is not short-term fluctuations in the value of the US dollar but rather access to adequate foreign-currency assets over the medium term," said Robert Mogielnicki, a resident scholar at the Arab Gulf States Institute in Washington.

China Beefs Up Laws To Handle Epidemics



BEIJING (Dispatches) - China has passed a new law to improve its handling of disease outbreaks -including protecting whistleblowers -- following a cascade of criticism over its coronavirus response and accusations of an early cover-up.

The new biosecurity law, approved by lawmakers on Saturday, flags the right to report "acts that endanger biosecurity" and calls for risk prevention systems, ranging from active monitoring to emergency plans.

It takes effect from April 15 next year.

"Any work unit or individual has the right to report acts that endanger biosecurity," the regulation said.

"When a report is required according to the law, no work unit or individual shall conceal (it)... or hinder others from making a report," it added on infectious diseases and epidemics.

China's approval of the law comes in the face of Western criticism on the coronavirus, over accusations that it covered up the initial outbreak and silenced early whistleblowers.

But China has been trying to reshape this narrative, with authorities seeking instead to model the country as a vanguard in the pandemic fight.

Russia and Saudi Arabia Step Up Oil Diplomacy

RIYADH (Dispatches) - Russia and Saudi Arabia held a second, and unusual, phone call this week to discuss the OPEC+ agreement after officials from the group warned on Friday of the potential for a weaker oil market in 2021. President Vladimir Putin and Saudi Arabia Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman spoke in what the Kremlin said was a continuation of an October 13 conversation. The two discussed the OPEC+ cooperation "extensively", the Kremlin said in an emailed statement.

"Both sides reiterated their readiness for further close coordination in this area in the interest of maintaining stability in the world energy market," the Kremlin said. The latest call came two days before several OPEC+ ministers are set to discuss the implementation of production cuts during a meeting of the so-called Joint Ministerial Monitoring Committee. The steering group meets monthly to analyse the market, with their recommendation later reviewed by the whole group. The next full OPEC+ ministerial meeting is scheduled for November 30 and December 1.

In the statement, he claimed that arms sales to Iran would violate UN resolutions and result in sanctions, hours after Tehran announced that the longstanding UN embargo on arms trade with the Islamic republic had expired. "The United States is prepared to use its domestic authorities to sanction any individual or entity that materially

contributes to the supply, sale, or transfer of conventional arms to or from Iran," Pompeo said in a statement. The U.S. secretary of state also claimed that, "Every nation that seeks peace and stability in the Middle East.. should refrain from any arms transactions with Iran."

Mikhail Ulyanov, the Russian ambassador to international organizations in Vienna, said his country's defense sector has already got "all imaginable U.S. sanctions" and there is nothing left to be worried about.

"Do you really think that we will take care about U.S. decisions?" he asked. "Our policy will be guided by other factors in their entirety, not by threats from you, guys," he tweeted, reacting

to the threat of sanctions in case of selling arms to Iran.

Iran, for example, recorded its highest daily death tolls from the virus last week. Its economy shrank by 6.5% last year and is projected to contract by another 5% this year. The IMF, however, expects Iran's economy to rebound with 3.2% growth next year, based in part on the government's future capacity to manage the virus, which it thus far as has struggled to do.

"Iran was among the first countries to become an epicenter of COVID-19 and we are now in the third wave of the pandemic, and this was on top of an economy that has been underperforming because of (U.S.) sanctions," Jihad Azour, director of the Middle East and Central Asia Department at the IMF, told The Associated Press. Meanwhile, wealthy Mideast oil exporters are expected to see their economics contract by 6.6% in 2020, the IMF said. Persian Gulf Arab states, however, are expected to see average economic growth of 2.3% next year. The IMF says it projections are based on assumptions that the price of oil averages \$41.69 a barrel in 2020 and will rise to \$46.70 a barrel in 2021. The IMF revised its gloomy estimate of Saudi Arabia's economics, the kingdom took the bold step this year of trying to shore up more revenue by tripling value-added tax to 15% and increasing customs duties. Egypt was the sole outlier in the region, experiencing modest growth of 3.5% this year after more than 5% growth annually for past two years as lower energy prices help it as an oil importer. Still, Egypt faces challenges with its massive population and as tourism revenues remain sluggish.

In response to a question about the lifting of Iran's arms embargo, he said: "It was a great victory for the resistance and the Iranian nation. What happened yesterday was the repeal of resolutions that our friends Russia and China also voted in favor of lifting the arms embargo on Iran. The Western and U.S. sides were basically reluctant to talk about arms embargoes, and it was the first step that Iran said it would not negotiate regarding the arms embargo."

Regarding foreign policy developments over the past week, he stated: "On October 13th, Zarif had a telephone call with his Japanese counterpart regarding bilateral, regional, and international issues. The issue of Iran's access to its financial resources in Japan was one of the serious issues in this consultation, and we hope that the Japanese side will fulfill its obligations in the international legal system." Asked about the bullets fired from the clashes between Armenia and the Republic of Azerbaijan, the official said: "Our red line is the security of the citizens. Some explanations from the other side have been heard and have not been accepted, and we have said that any attack on Iran will be answered."

Khatibzadeh noted that Iran is following developments on its borders with the Republic of Azerbaijan and Armenia with concern. Referring to the coronavirus outbreak in different parts of the world, he said: "Once again, COVID-19 has taken over the world from east to west, from Europe to America, and we hope to overcome the disease and its wave with the cooperation, empathy, and gratitude of the services of the medical staff." The spokesman also said about Zarif's trip to Europe: "Zarif's trips to foreign countries are subject to a certain criterion in the current situation."

He described Governor of Central Bank of Iran Abdol-Naser Hemmati's visit to Iraq in line with the agreements reached between the Central Bank of Iran and Iraq and described the visit as successful. Referring to the talks of the Ukrainian delegation with the Deputy Foreign Minister of Iran, he said: "A very unfortunate incident happened and it is Iran's duty to realize the rights of the victims and compensate for this issue. Canada is not part of it."

Although doctor Li Wenliang who alerted colleagues to the new coronavirus in late December was at first reprimanded, a national outpouring of grief and anger over his death prompted Beijing to redirect criticism to local officials and subsequently paint him as a hero.

President Xi Jinping in February raised the need to speed up establishing the biosecurity law, urging for reforms of mechanisms to prevent major outbreaks.

Under the new law, those who conceal information, omit making reports or prevent others from reporting infectious diseases could be given warnings or suspended.

The new law also calls for systems including to regularly monitor biosafety risks, and to trace the origins of incidents.

Disease prevention agencies are also to help predict the occurrence and prevalence of emerging diseases. Based on these predictions, authorities should announce warnings and adopt prevention measures.

Although Beijing established an information system after the 2002-2003 SARS outbreak that allowed for real-time reports of outbreaks, provincial authorities came under fire during the coronavirus outbreak for perceived incompetence, including delays in announcing the public health emergency.

The new biosecurity law also takes aim at the management of research facilities, flagging the need for emergency plans for biosafety incidents.

The IMF, known for its bullish stance on taxes and subsidy cuts, has largely suspended its calls for belttightening austerity measures as people struggle under the weight of lockdowns and job losses. The IMF said "in general, tax increases would be more effective after the crisis" as such measures "will likely be a drag on the recovery and invite larger fiscal costs in the future."

The international lender is calling on countries to focus their immediate priorities on ensuring adequate resources for health care and correctly targeting support programs to the most-vulnerable people.

Meanwhile, other Mideast oil exporters like the United Arab Emirates, home to Dubai and Abu Dhabi, will see an economic contraction of more than 6% this year, while Oman's economy is projected to shrink by 10%. Iraq faces a recession of 12%, the IMF said. The World Bank estimates the pandemic has thrown between 88 million and 114 million people into extreme poverty, which is defined as living on less than \$1.90 a day.

According to the International Labor Organization, working hours in Arab states declined by 1.8% during the first quarter of 2020, equivalent to about 1 million full-time jobs. That number jumped to 10.3% in the second quarter, equivalent to about 6 million full-time jobs. While Mideast states have rushed to provide various forms of support to their own citizens amid the pandemic, the impact from the virus has been acutely felt by many of the millions of low-wage laborers who hail mostly from South Asia and reside in the region. Their families back home rely on their salaries for survival.

Azour said Persian Gulf Arab states alone provide 18% of global remittances. He said these countries should use the moment "to modernize labor laws" by providing support to all laborers in their countries.

Spurs Rocked On Bale's Retur

ONDON (Dispatches) - West Ham ruined Gareth Bale's Tottenham return with a Lystunning late fightback from three goals down to rescue a thrilling 3-3 draw, while Fulham's Aleksandar Mitrovic endured a penalty nightmare in a 1-1 draw at Sheffield United on Sunday.

Tottenham were leading 3-0 when Bale came on as a 72nd minute substitute for his first appearance since joining on a season-long loan from Real Madrid.

But Bale suffered a debut to forget as Tottenham capitulated in astonishing fashion. The Wales star was one of the main Tottenham culprits as he missed a golden opportunity to wrap up the points before West Ham's Manuel Lanzini snatched a stoppage-time equaliser.

Tottenham took the lead with just 45 seconds gone when Son Heung-min and Harry Kane combined to create a goal for the seventh time this season.

Kane was the catalyst, dropping deep into midfield before unfurling a majestic long pass that found Son, who cut into the West Ham area and curled his shot into the far corner. It was Kane's turn to get on the scoresheet in the eighth minute as he nutmegged Declan Rice and fired into the bottom corner from the edge of the area.

Tottenham's sizzling start featured a third goal in the 16th minute, with England captain Kane heading in from Sergio Reguilon's pin-point cross for his 10th goal of the season. Having crushed Manchester United 6-1 in their last game before the international break, Jose Mourinho's side looked odds on for another emphatic victory.

Back at Tottenham seven years after leaving for Real in a then world record deal, Bale hopes to prove he is still a world-class talent despite a long spell out of favour with

Madrid boss Zinedine Zidane.

But it was West Ham who were the dominant force after Bale's introduction to replace Steven Bergwijn.

Fabian Balbuena nodded in from Aaron Cresswell's cross after 82 minutes and Davinson Sanchez's headed own goal from Vladimir Coufal's delivery three minutes later left Tottenham panicking.



Bale should have scored in stoppage-time, but he shot wide after bursting into the area and Lanzini made him pay with a brilliant 25-yard blast into the top corner.

It was just the third time in Premier League history that a side has avoided defeat despite trailing by at least three goals going into the 80th minute.

At Bramall Lane, Fulham's Mitrovic fired over with his second half penalty after Jack Robinson handled.

On-loan Leipzig winger Ademola Lookman put Fulham ahead in the 77th minute with a superb solo effort, beating two men before firing into the roof of the net.

But Serbia international Mitrovic was penalised for a high foot on Robinson in the 85th minute following a VAR check and Billy Sharp made him pay as he drove his penalty down the middle.

Mitrovic is the first player to commit the unwanted penalty double in the same Premier League game since Mikel Arteta for Arsenal against Fulham in 2012.

Fulham at least moved off the bottom of the table after taking their first point at the fifth attempt, following last season's promotion from the Championship. United also avoided defeat for the first time in five games this season.

Alexis Mac Allister's first Premier League goal gave Brighton a dramatic 1-1 draw at rivals Crystal Palace.

Palace took the lead in the 19th minute when Tariq Lamptey was harshly adjudged to have pulled down Michy Batshuayi in the penalty area.

Ivory Coast forward Wilfried Zaha sent Brighton keeper Mat Ryan the wrong way from the spot for his fourth goal of the season.

But, after a poor clearance from Palace defender Joel Ward, Argentine substitute Mac Allister fired home via a slight deflection from the edge of the area in the 90th minute.

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Russian third seed Andrey Rublev won his fourth ATP Tour title of the year when he beat Croatia's Borna Coric 7-6(5) 6-4 to lift the St Petersburg Open trophy on Sunday.

Having also won tournaments in Doha, Adelaide and Hamburg this year, Rublev is now tied with Novak Djokovic for most titles in 2020 and the 22-year-old is also three wins shy of the world number one's 37 victories.

It was deja vu for Coric as he finished runner-up in St Petersburg to a Russian again after a straight sets loss to Daniil Medvedev last year. Rublev was flawless on his serve and never gave Coric a break point opportunity. After the opening set went with serve, Rublev clinched it on the tiebreak despite being 2-5 down before converting a break point in the second to emerge victorious.

Victory also gave Rublev a big push in his quest to qualify for next month's season-ending ATP Finals for the first time and the Russian will move up to eighth in the world rankings. Two spots remain to be filled as Rublev leads Argentina's Diego Schwartzman, who currently occupies the final qualification position.

World number one Novak Djokovic, French Open champion Rafael Nadal, U.S. Open winner Dominic Thiem, Stefanos Tsitsipas, Daniil Medvedev and Alexander Zverev have already qualified for the ATP Finals.



OLOGNE (AFP) – U.S. Open runner-up Alexander Zverev clinched the Cologne ATP title on Sunday beating Felix Auger-Aliassime 6-3, 6-3.

The German world number seven claimed his third ATP Tour win on home soil as third seed Auger-Aliassime lost his sixth successive final.

"I had a very tough final in New York and the next final I played here I wanted to come out and obviously play my best tennis, finish the match," 23-year-old Zverev said. "Felix, you're an unbelievable player. I know it doesn't mean much right now,

but I'm sure you are not only going to win one title, you're going to win multiple, multiple titles in your career, bigger titles than this," he added.

Auger-Aliassime, 20, overcame second seed Roberto Bautista Agut in the semi-final but failed to repeat his performance against Zverev.

His run of losses stretches back to his maiden ATP final in February 2019 at the Rio Open. "I just played bad from start to finish," Auger-Aliassime said.

Zverev will also be top seed for next week's Cologne Championships tournament where he is joined in the draw by French Open semi-finalist Diego Schwartzman and Auger-Aliassime who will be fifth seed.

The former world number one revealed ahead of the French Open last month that he had been forced to rest following a second-round loss at the US Open because of tendinitis in his left psoas muscle, which connects the spine to the femur.

Murray said he had felt good physically once he began training on clay but he suffered a chastening first-round loss to Stan Wawrinka in Paris and was then beaten by Fernando Verdasco in his opening match in Cologne.

The Scot had been due to stay on in the German city for this week's second tournament, the bett1HULKS Championships, where he had been drawn to face Serbia's Danilo Petrovic, but his body once again is not cooperating.

In a message on his Facebook page, Murray said: "I've been dealing with tendinitis in my left psoas, which has kind of been on and off since the US Open.

"I've been trying to deal with it in training and the matches. Unfortunately after my match here this week it's flared up again. I've been practising the last few days and trying to manage it but, after playing some points today, I decided that it was not going to be good enough to play.


"I'd like to thank the tournament for giving me the opportunity to come and play here, I'm sorry it hasn't worked out. See you on the court soon."

It now appears very unlikely that Murray will compete at the Erste Bank Open in Vienna starting on October 26 but the Paris Masters the following week is understood to be a possibility.



Knee Ligament Damage for Van Dijk

ONDON (Dispatches) - Liverpool's Premier League title defense was rocked on Sunday with the news Virgil Van Dijk must undergo knee surgery amid reports the Dutch defender could miss the rest of the season.



"The centre-back damaged knee ligaments following an incident involving Blues goalkeeper Jordan Pickford after six minutes at Goodison Park," Liverpool said in a statement.

"Van Dijk was required to be substituted and further assessment on the injury has revealed an operation will be needed.

"No specific timescale is being placed upon his return to action at this stage." Van Dijk has been pivotal to Liverpool's resurgence under Jurgen Klopp since making a then world record £75 million move for a defender from Southampton in January 2018. The 29-year-old has started every league game for the past two seasons as the Reds won the Champions League in 2019 and ended a 30-year wait to win a league title earlier this year. "Virgil played for us I don't know how many games in a row. He plays with pain, he plays with pretty much everything, but he couldn't play on. That's not good," said Klopp

Prior to Van Dijk's arrival, Klopp's time at Anfield had been beset by defensive collapses. Now the German must find a solution to the huge hole left in his defence without the chance to dip into the transfer market with the window not open again until January.
