President Says Distribution of Coronavirus Vaccines Unfair IRAN NEWS NATIONAL DESK

TEHRAN - President Hassan Rouhani urged the people of Iran to keep observing the health protocols amid the coronavirus pandemic considering the limited vaccine output and its uneven distribution in the world.

In remarks at a meeting of the Coronavirus Fight National Headquarters on Saturday, the president cautioned people to avoid underestimating the situation and continue to abide by the COVID-19 restrictions. See Page 7

India Likely to Start Full Operations at Chabahar Port by May End

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - India expects to start full-scale operations at Iran's Chabahar general cargo port it has built by the end of May, the country's shipping minister said in a boost for regional trade.

India has been developing a part of the port on Iran's south-eastern coast along the Gulf of Oman as a way to transport goods to Iran, but also Afghanistan and central Asian countries, and avoiding rival Pakistan.

But U.S. sanctions on Iran slowed down the port's development and Indian officials are now counting on a thaw in relations between Washington and Tehran under President Joe Biden to move forward with near \$500 million of investments.

"I am expecting to visit Iran in April or May for the inauguration of full operations," Mansukh Mandaviya, India's ports and shipping minister, told Reuters.

India is developing two terminals at the port including the Shahid Beheshti complex and under an agreement signed with the Iran, it would run the terminal for 10 years.

Mandaviya said the port had already commenced operations in a limited way and the growth potential was evident. Chabahar port had handled 123 vessels and 1.8 million tons of bulk and general cargoes from February 2019 to January 2021, he said. "This is much higher than our expectations. Imagine the scale of operations and freight saving once it is fully operational," he said. See Page 7

Trio of Persian Gulf Islands Are "integral" Part of Iran



TEHRAN (PressTV)- Iran's Foreign Ministry has dismissed the Arab League's "fruitless claims" about three Persian Gulf islands, saying those territories are an "integral" part of the Iranian soil.

"It is unfortunate that some Arab countries are trying to divert the public opinion from their wicked and destructive actions by creating an imaginary enemy instead of addressing the main problems gripping the Arab world, such as letting the occupying tension-creating Zionist regime into the region, not doing enough regarding the Palestinian cause, continuing the oppressive war against Arab people in Yemen, creating the most heinous humanitarian crisis of the present era, and supporting terrorism and terrorist groups for years," Foreign Ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh said.

Khatibzadeh made the remarks, two days after foreign ministers of the Arab League made groundless accusations against the Islamic Republic in a resolution adopted during their meeting in the Egyptian capital of Cairo.

The Arab League resolution alleged that Iran's "occupation" of the Persian Gulf islands of the Greater Tunb, Lesser Tunb and Abu Musa violates "the UAE's sovereignty" in a way that destabilizes the region and threatens international peace and security.

"The countries, which have the blood of innocent people on their hands and their devastating act of aggression has destroyed Yemen's infrastructure and left millions of people hungry, sick, displaced and impoverished over the past six years, are seeking to absolve themselves of responsibility for the crimes by leveling baseless accusations at others," Khatibzadeh added.

The strategically-positioned islands have always been part of Iran, the proof of which can be found in and corroborated by countless historical, legal, and geographical documents in Iran and other parts of the world.

"The repetition of the fruitless claims regarding the three Iranian islands does not and will not change the existing historical, geographical and historical facts. These islands are an integral part of the Iranian territory," Khatibzadeh said. He also stressed that Iran's principled policy towards its neighbors is based on good neighborliness, mutual respect and non-interference in their internal affairs.

The spokesman expressed hope that the Arab League and certain regional states would move towards regional dialog and cooperation, instead of issuing empty and provocative statements that only prolong the current destructive trend.

Tehran Warns of **Consequences of Any Move by Israel**

TEHRAN (PressTV) - A top Iranian diplomat has warned of consequences of any possible miscalculated measure by Israel over an explosion that damaged an Israeli ship in the Sea of Oman last week.

Iranian Ambassador to the United Nations Majid Takht Ravanchi made the remarks on Friday, in a letter addressed to UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres on Friday.

The letter came a week after an Israeli-owned cargo ship said it had been crippled by a suspected blast while it was in the Sea of Oman, claiming that it suffered holes in both sides of its hull.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu hastily accused Iran of attacking the ship. Iran categorically rejected the charge.

"The incident has all the characteristic of a complicated false flag operation carried out by actors in order to pursue their malign policies and to advance their illegitimate objectives," wrote Takht Ravanchi in his letter to the UN. See Page 7

Iraq Settles Part of Iran Energy Debts

TEHRAN (Dispatches)- The Deputy Head of Iran-Iraq Joint Chamber of Commerce said on Friday that the Arab country has started repaying its energy debts to Iran and part of the dues has been settled.

"This achievement is the result of diplomacy and pursuit of the governor of the Central Bank of Iran (CBI), the energy minister and the head of the Judiciary," Hamid Hosseini told IRNA.

According to Hosseini, a part of the mentioned resources will be used to import basic goods into the country

MOSCOW (Dispatches) - Russia's foreign minister says a window of opportunity for saving a 2015 multilateral nuclear deal signed between Iran and major world powers remains open, expressing hope that all sides will return to the full implementation of the agreement in its original form.

"We hope that it will become possible to improve the situation in the near future and to return the JCPOA [the nuclear deal - officially known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action] implementation process to the initially coordinated framework," Sergei Lavrov said in an interview with the Russkaya Mysl magazine published in the UK. He added that the revival of the JCPOA is possible only if all parties to the agreement fully implement their commitments.

"Tehran has repeatedly spoken in favor of its willingness to completely unfreeze all of the JCPOA's provisions that it had suspended as soon as the forfeited balance of interests is restored," the top Russian diplomat said, referring to Washington's sanctions and unilateral withdrawal from the agreement and Iran's subsequent countermeasures in the face of US hostility.

He emphasized that Moscow is "closely" cooperating with all the JCPOA participants to secure their full compliance with the deal and said, "For example, we also maintain regular contact with European partners for elaborating possible decisions to rectify the current situation."

Former U.S. President Donald Trump withdrew the US from the JCPOA on May 8, 2018 and imposed what he called the "maximum pressure" policy on Tehran. In response, Iran gradually reduced its nuclear obligations under the accord starting on May 8, 2019, but declared that its measures will be reversed as soon as the U.S. honors its JCPOA commitments. The measure was taken as part of a law, passed by the Iranian Parliament last December, requiring the government to suspend more of its commitments under the nuclear deal, should the US fail to lift its sanctions by February 21.

Elsewhere in his interview. Lavroy emphasized that not everything depends on Russia or the European parties to the JCPOA. "The position of [new U.S.] President Joe Biden's administration on the nuclear deal is an essential aspect. In our opinion, Washington's steps sending a message to Tehran showing serious US intentions to rejoin the JCPOA could help resolve the situation concerning Iran and its nuclear program," the Russian foreign minister said.

When asked whether it was possible to restore the Iran nuclear deal in cooperation with European countries, he expressed Russia's readiness to "help reach the relevant agreements in every way."

Biden Renews U.S. National Emergency, **Sanctions Against Iran**

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - President Joe Biden has extended for another year the US national emergency declared in 1995 with respect to Iran as well as comprehensive sanctions against the Islamic Republic. In a letter sent to U.S. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi on Friday, Biden said, "I have determined that it is necessary to continue the national emergency declared in Executive Order 12957 with respect to Iran and to maintain in force comprehensive sanctions against Iran to respond to this

threat," according to the White House. He also claimed that the actions and policies of the Iranian government pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States. The U.S. president further alleged that Tehran is proliferating and developing "missiles and other asymmetric and conventional weapons capabilities," supporting "terrorist groups" and maintaining what it called "network and campaign of regional aggression."

Vaccination Alone Not To Defeat COVID-19

TEHRAN - The spokesman for the National Task-force for combating Coronavirus on Saturday urged for paying more public attention to managing and controlling coronavirus, saying vaccination would yield results in long run.

Alireza Raisi said that one of the concerns of the World Health Organization was the negligence of people to the management and control of coronavirus with the start of vaccination.

Explaining the latest situation of COVID19 in the world and in Iran on Saturday, Raisi stated that people and governments should continue to focus on managing and controlling coronavirus because the vaccination would be effective when 70% of the world's population were vaccinated adding that it would take a long time for the vaccine to work.

"Apart from vaccination, health protocols must be followed properly, and the minds of people and governments must focus on managing and controlling COVID-19," Raisi said.

The health official also stated about the situation of COVID-19 in Iran and said that the disease spreading trend in almost all provinces of the country has been almost stable, but the circulation of the UK coronavirus has occurred in most provinces.

Raisi stated that the situation in Khuzestan province was different and the trend of coronavirus in this province has an upward slope, therefore in such circumstances when the number of patients was high, the mortality was high.

He emphasized that the people of Khuzestan province must follow the health protocols properly and fight the mutated Coronavirus vigorously.

Raisi added that defeating the UK coronavirus variant required strict adherence to health protocols and should be carefully monitored so that the situation in Khuzestan province was not repeated in other provinces.



He stated that in the northern provinces of Iran with good management, the trend of COVID- 19 is decreasing and strictly only the necessary trips were allowed.

Meanwhile the spokesman for the Food and Drug Administration of Iran announced that over 180 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine would be provided for Iran within a year, which was beyond the country's needs.

Kianoosh Jahanpour, the spokesman of the Food and Drug Administration of Iran, said on Saturday: "The comprehensive vaccination program of coronavirus in Iran, considering the possible conditions, had 4 parallel routes to supply the vaccine needed by the country from the beginning.'

He added: "With the follow-up of all 4 routes, more than 180 million doses of vaccine will be provided to the national vaccination mobilization in a year, which is beyond the estimation of the country's needs."

According to Jahanpour, the four strategies of direct purchase, import through COVAX, co-production, and home-made production of vaccines are successfully continuing at the predicted level, and accordingly, the one-year vaccination in Iran will be finished even earlier than planned. "21 million doses of coronavirus vaccine have been purchased through direct purchase and COVAX, which will gradually enter the country according to the schedule and the production capacity of the producers," he added.

Jahanpour said that Iran can also help other nations and communities that need the corona vaccine.

Tehran, Madrid **Discuss Expansion of Library Cooperation**



LONDON (IRNA) - Iranian cultural attaché in Madrid and the head of the National Library of Spain stressed expansion of library cooperation between the two countries and presented some suggestions in this regard.

Mohammad Mehdi Ahmadi and Ana Santos Arambuoro met on Thursday.

Ahmadi made two suggestions in the meeting. First, he demanded that Iranian researched be granted access to the books regarding Iranian studies and Islamic studies in the Spanish libraries and in exchange Iran will grant Spanish researchers access to the books regarding Spain in and the Spanish speaking world. Second, he suggested the same kind of mutual access to historical documents. The director of the National Library of Spain, Aramburo, said that Iran and Spain do not have a common history but are culturally related. She said that a large part of the archive of the National Library of Spain has been digitalized, to which Iranian researchers can be given access. At the suggestion of the Iranian party, it was decided in the meeting that joint cultural programs and specialized meetings with the head of the National Library of Iran be held in the future. The National Library of Spain was established in 1712 in Madrid and now it has 44 million documents, 15 million books, 4.5 million graphic works, 600 thousand audio files, 510 thousand music pieces, 500 thousand micro documents, 500 thousand maps, and 30 thousand manuscripts.

Zarif, Armenian Counterpart Discuss Regional Security

TEHRAN (MNA) - Foreign Minister and his Armenian counterpart stressed the significance of addressing regional challenges in a phone talk on Saturday.

Iran Sets 0.8% Economic Growth for 9 Months

TEHRAN (FNA) - Iran's Statistics Center announced on Friday that the country's 9-month economic growth has been 0.8% despite the US illegal sanctions and the pandemic restrictions.

Statistical figures indicate that Iran's economic growth for (March 20- December 20, 2020) period was 0.8% with oil revenues taken into account.

The figures showed that the economic growth rate stood at 0.2% with oil revenues not being taken into account.

The agricultural crops witnessed an increase of 5.5%, the industry and mining sector rose by 3.7% while the service group decreased by -1.8% as compared to the same period last year.

Rescue Operation Underway to Contain Blaze at Afghan-Iran Border

TEHRAN (PressTV) - An Iranian official says efforts are underway to put out a fire at a customs outpost in western Afghanistan on the border with Iran, but winds are fanning the flames across the region.

Director of Mahiroud Border Terminal, Ali Akbar Mazidi, told IRNA that the blaze started at the Abu Nasr-e-Farahi border crossing point in Afghanistan's western Farah province at 10:30 a.m. local time (0500 GMT) on Saturday, and swept through two tankers loaded with 500 metric tons of fuel. He said strong winds helped the fire grow bigger and spread farther to two more fuel tankers.

Mazidi noted that fire brigades from Iran's eastern South Khorasan Province rushed to the border area to assist their Afghan counterparts in extinguishing the massive fire.

Farah provincial governor Taj Mohammad Safi later said the major fire broke out at a fuel reservoir in the customs point, noting that four fuel trucks have been damaged and the fire is extending.

He said that efforts have started to extinguish the fire.

Back on February 13, dozens of fuel tankers were damaged in a massive explosion at the Islam Qala crossing in Afghanistan's western Herat province.

Reports showed that at least 60 people had been injured in the blaze. Others said many lorry drivers were feared dead. At that time, Iranian customs officials said a key crossing on the eastern border with Afghanistan had not been affected by the massive blaze.

A senior official from Iran's Razavi Khorasan province said that the fire in Afghanistan's Islam Qala border crossing had not spread to Iran's Dogharoon post.

- Central Banks Urged to Boost Barter Trade Between Iran and Armenia

IRAN NEWS ECONOMIC DESK

TEHRAN – The central banks of Iran and Armenia have been urged to support more of barter trade mechanism between the two states.

Deputy Head of Iran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (ICCIMA) for International Affairs Mohammad-Reza Karbasi met with Director of Union of Manufacturers and Entrepreneurs of Armenia (UMEA) Gagik Makaryan and during the meeting both sides explored economic capacities of the two countries for the future cooperation.

The two sides in the meeting emphasized barter trade as the major way for enhancing trade exchanges between Iran and Armenia and they called for more supports from the central banks of both countries for this mechanism.

In the meeting, Karbasi expressed hope that due to the positive approach of statesmen of Armenia and Iran for strengthening ties, hidden capacities of the two countries would be exploited and economic activists of Iran and Armenia would make the most of this opportunity.

He then briefed the Armenian officials about the actions of ICCIMA as well as the Iran-Armenia Joint Chamber of Commerce for strengthening bilateral relations of both countries.

Karbasi then pointed to the establishment of Iran-Armenia Joint Chamber of Commerce and its actions, saying that one of the important goals behind the launch of the joint chamber has been to identify capacities ahead of economies of Iran and Armenia.

He reiterated that Iran enjoys high potentials for production and commercial and agro capacities which can complete the capacities of Armenia and they can be used favorably in line with bilateral interests of both countries.

He went on to say that Armenia as a member of Eurasian Economic Union can be a land gateway for Iran for its access to the Eurasian member states, and through



launching joint venture companies in the transportation sector, Iran can use this capacity for faster transfer of goods to Eurasia.

Karbasi added that agro and fishery are two intact sectors by both countries and announced readiness of Iran for joint cooperation in the aquatic sector. He also pointed to the strong capabilities of Iranian companies active in the technical and engineering sector and announced readiness for implementing joint projects with the Armenians.

He then reiterated that barter trade can be a good and important mechanism for boosting bilateral trade and urged the central banks of both countries for supporting this mechanism.

Then Makaryan, for his part, explained the reason for the launch of the UMEA and said that the goals of the union are in close cooperation with Armenian government, reiterating that international cooperation and developing exports are of the major priorities of the union.

He termed exchange of technical knowhow is of the most important fields for joint cooperation between Iran and Armenia, reiterating Iran's capacity in this field is very important for Armenia.

He also urged ICCIMA to prepare a list of Iranian companies which are keen to be active in Armenia. He emphasized that currently there are some dormant factories in Armenia and through cooperation with these companies, the factories can resume their activities, production of joint goods and their exports could be shaped through cooperation between Armenian and Iranian partners.

Tehran, Islamabad Discuss Establishing Joint Border Market



TEHRAN (MNA)- Iran and Pakistan have held an online meeting to discuss issues related to developing border trade and reached an agreement to establish the two countries' first joint border market, an official with the Iranian Trade Promotion Organization (TPO) announced.

"A virtual meeting was held to discuss a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on the establishment of joint border markets between Iran and Pakistan, and agreements were reached in this regard," IRNA quoted Reza Seyed Aqazadeh as saying.

According to the official, following the preparation of the draft for the mentioned MOU in December 2020, additional negotiations were made for finalizing the memorandum in the online meeting which was held at the level of deputy ministers. Ivory Coast Heads Into Elections

ABIDJAN (AFP) - Ivory Coast went to vote in a parliamentary ballot on LIBERIA Saturday in a key test of stability after presidential elections last year marked by violence.

Grappling with a deep political crisis, President Alassane Ouattara has offered an olive branch to his former rival, Laurent Gbagbo, whose party has now lifted a decade-long boycott of elections.

His Ivorian Popular Front (FPI) is the driving force of a centre-left coalition named Together for Democracy and Solidarity (EDS). More than 1,500 candidates are vying for the votes of roughly seven million people in a contest for the 255-seat National Assembly.

Pope Urges Iraq To End Violence



BAGHDAD (Reuters) - Pope Francis began his most risky foreign trip on Friday, flying into Iraq amid the tightest security ever seen for a papal visit to appeal to the country's leaders and people to end militant violence and religious strife. The country has deployed thousands of security personnel to protect him during the visit, which comes after a

spate of rocket and suicide bomb attacks and a spike in COVID-19 cases.

Even before he landed, Francis told reporters on his plane that he felt duty-bound to make what he called an "emblematic" trip despite the difficulties because the country "has been martyred for so many years".

At the official welcome in the presidential palace, the 84-year-old Francis, limping from what appeared to be a fresh flare-up of his painful sciatica, made an impassioned call for Iraqi to finally give peacemakers chance. "May the clash of arms be silenced ... may there be an end to acts of violence and extremism," he said.

President Barham Salih thanked the pope for making the first-ever papal visit to Iraq "despite the many recommendations to delay" because of the pandemic and other challenges in "our wounded country".

The fact that the pope came anyway "multiplies the value of this visit for the Iraqi people", the president said. Hundreds of people gathered in small clusters to see him being driven into Baghdad in bulletproof BMW, a departure for a pope who normally insists on using small, normal cars.

A motorcade of dozens of vehicles accompanied him out of the airport compound, which recently came under rocket fire from militia groups. In his speech at the palace, Francis, looking tired at the start of his first foreign trip in 16 months, criticized factional and foreign interests that have destabilised Iraq and the wider region

and hit ordinary people the hardest. 'Iraq has suffered the disastrous effects of wars, the scourge of terrorism and sectarian conflicts often grounded in a fundamentalism incapable of accepting the peaceful coexistence of different ethnic and religious groups," Francis said. He later paid tribute to people killed in attacks motivated by religion, visiting a Baghdad church where Islamist gunmen killed about 50 worshippers in 2010.

UN Envoy Calls for Action Against Myanmar Junta

NEW YORK (Reuters) - The United Nations special envoy on Myanmar called on the U.N. Security Council to take action against the ruling junta after the killings of protesters who have continued to defy security forces at demonstrations against last month's coup.

The Southeast Asian country has been plunged into turmoil since the military overthrew and detained elected leader Aung San Suu Kyi on Feb. 1, with daily protests and strikes that have choked business and paralysed administration.

More than 50 protesters have been killed according to the United Nations - at least 38 on Wednesday alone. Protesters demand the release of Suu Kyi and the respect of November's election, which her party won in landslide, but which the army rejected. "How much more can we allow the Myanmar military to get away with?" Special Envoy Christine Schraner Burgener told a closed meeting of the 15-member U.N. Security Council on Friday, according to a copy of her remarks seen by Reuters. "It is critical that this council is resolute and coherent in putting the security forces on notice and standing with the people of Myanmar firmly, in support of the clear November election results." A junta spokesman did not answer calls requesting comment. The army says it has been restrained in stopping threaten stability.

On Saturday, in the southern town of Dawei. protesters chanted "Democracy is our cause" and The revolution must prevail". Protesters were also gathering in the biggest city, Yangon.

People have taken to the streets in their hundreds of thousands at times, vowing to continue action in a country that spent nearly half a century under military rule until democratic reforms in 2011 that were cut short by the coup.

"At least 30,000 organizations across the United States -- including a significant number of small businesses, towns, cities and local governments -- have over the past few days been hacked by an unusually aggressive Chinese cyber espionage unit that's focused on stealing email from victim organizations," Krebs wrote in the post.

He reported that insiders said hackers have "seized control" of thousands of computer systems around the world using password-protected software tools slipped into systems. Microsoft said early this week that a state-sponsored hacking group operating out of China is exploiting previously unknown security flaws in its Exchange email services to steal data from business users.

The company said the hacking group, which it has named "Hafnium," is a "highly skilled and sophisticated actor." Hafnium has in the past targeted U.S.-based companies including infectious disease researchers, law firms, universities, defense contractors, think tanks, and NGOs.

In a blog post on Tuesday, Microsoft executive Tom Burt said the company had released updates to fix the security flaws, which apply to on-premises versions of the software rather than cloud-based versions, and urged customers to apply them.

Hyundai Profit Hit After Electric Car Recall

SEOUL (Reuters) - A large global recall of electric vehicles has led Hyundai Motor Co to sharply revise down fourth-quarter operating profit, although reports said battery maker LG Chem Ltd would bear the bulk of the costs.

LG will assume 70% of the estimated \$900 million costs to replace battery systems in some 82,000 electric vehicles globally, according to Yonhap news agency and other South Korean media. But Cho Hyun-ryul, an analyst at Samsung Securities, said he estimated LG's burden was slightly lower at 62% of the costs.





OPEC+ Squeezes Oil Production Tight to Protect Price Recovery

LONDON (Dispatches) -Saudi Arabia and its OPEC+ allies shocked the oil market with a decision to keep supply in check, sending prices surging and adding inflationary pressure to the global economy as it emerges from the pandemic.

One year on from the outbreak of a bitter price war that sent crude below zero, the kingdom showed that its priority is preserving the hard-won oil recovery rather than worrying about tightening the market too much.

"I don't think it will overheat," Saudi Energy Minister Prince Abdulaziz bin Salman told reporters after Thursday's meeting. Last year "we suffered alone, we as OPEC+" and now "it's about being vigilant and being careful," he said.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and its allies had been debating whether to restore as much as 1.5 million barrels a day of output in April. From trading houses in Geneva to Wall Street banks, much of the oil world was in agreement that global markets

could use some more barrels to temper a rapid run-up in prices. But after being urged to "keep our powder dry" by Prince Abdulaziz, OPEC+ members agreed to hold steady at current levels -- with the exception of modest increases granted to Russia and Kazakhstan. Saudi minister went one step further, saying the additional 1 million barrel-a-day voluntary production cut the kingdom introduced last month was now open ended.

That means the cartel will still be withholding about 7 million barrels a day from the market -- equivalent to about 7% of global demand -- even as fuel consumption recovers in many countries.

"OPEC+ definitely risks over-tightening the oil market," said Amrita Sen, chief oil analyst at consultant Energy Aspects Ltd. in London. Brent crude rose as much as 5.7% in London.

Brent has already rallied about 30% this year to almost \$68 a barrel. Throughout the first quarter, OPEC+ has kept production below demand in order to drain the glut that built up during the worst of the Covid-19 lockdowns. Without additional supply, that deficit will widen significantly in April, according to the cartel's internal estimates.

"We expect oil prices to rise toward \$70 to \$75 a barrel during April," said Ann-Louise Hittle, vice president of macro oils at consultant Wood Mackenzie Ltd. "The risk is

these higher prices will dampen the tentative global recovery. But the Saudi energy minister is adamant OPEC+ must watch for concrete signs of a demand rise before he moves on production.'

With the bond market already on edge for signs of inflation, the aggressive move from OPEC+ could become a headache for the U.S. Federal Reserve and the European Central Bank. And it's not just oil that's surging. From copper and steel to corn and soybeans, the prices of many commodities are rapidly rising.

Strengthening economies, the rollout of coronavirus vaccines and continued government stimulus are among the reasons financial markets are anticipating an acceleration in price growth, although such forces are countered by weak labor markets.

"We should closely monitor to avoid overheating of the market," Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak said in an interview with state TV Rossiya 24 after the meeting.

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - U.S. job growth likely accelerated in February as more services businesses reopened amid falling new COVID-19 cases, quickening vaccination rates and additional pandemic relief money from the government, putting the

China Sets Low Bar for GDP Growth, Pledges More Jobs

BEIJING (Reuters) - China on Friday set a modest annual economic growth target, at above 6%, and pledged to create more jobs in cities than last year, as the world's second-biggest economy planned a careful course out of a year disrupted by COVID-19.



In 2020, China dropped a gross domestic product growth target from the premier's work report for the first time since 2002 after the pandemic devastated its economy. China's GDP expanded 2.3% last year, the weakest in 44 years but making it the only major economy to report growth.

"As a general target, China's growth rate has been set at over 6% for this year," Premier Li Keqiang said in his 2021 work report. "In setting this target, we have taken into account the recovery of economic activity." But the 2021 target was significantly below the consensus of analysts, who expect growth could beat 8% this year. Chinese shares fell.

China's conservative growth target reflects a public effort to demonstrate a return to economic stability after last year's COVID-19 upheaval, policy advisers said, while also keeping a lid on appetite for debt and risk.

"It's obvious this year's growth will be over 6%. The purpose is to tell people that we should focus on higher quality growth," Yao Jingyuan, an adviser to China's cabinet, told Reuters.

While the low GDP target does not mean the government will rush to tighten policy, with many parts of the economy still struggling, it will give planners more room to push reforms. Premier Li pledged to spur domestic consumption and innovation, as part of a plan to reduce reliance on overseas markets and technology for long-term development. As such, China plans to boost annual research and development spending by more than 7% every year until 2025.

"The target should be a bottom line. We should have more room for pushing forward difficult reforms," said Xu Hongcai, deputy director of the economic policy commission at China Association of Policy Science. In 2021, China will aim to create more than 11 million new urban jobs, Li said in

> his report delivered at the opening of this year's meeting of parliament, up from last year's goal of over 9 million and in line with recent years.

> The government is targeting a 2021 budget deficit of around 3.2% of GDP, less than a goal of above 3.6% last year, though giving room to fund infrastructure and aid small firms. Iris Pang, chief economist for Greater China at ING, said continued fiscal latitude was a more meaningful target than the growth target. "The very low GDP growth target is like there is no target at all because the consensus is 8% and my forecast is 7%," Pang told Reuters. "I believe that most of the money will be used for technology R&D and continue to provide some buffer for job stability just in case COVID will have a comeback," she added.

The quota on local government special bond issuance was set at 3.65 trillion yuan (\$563.65 billion), down from 3.75 trillion yuan last year.

Palm Oil Row Fuels Swiss Vote On Indonesia Trade Deal



ZURICH (Dispatches) - Switzerland votes Sunday on a free trade deal with Indonesia but the agreement, which opens up a vast potential market, could slip up over the issue of palm oil imports.

Under the deal, tariffs would be gradually removed from almost all of Switzerland's biggest exports to the world's fourth most populous country, while the Swiss would abolish duties on Indonesian industrial products. Anyone importing Indonesian palm oil must prove that it meets certain environmental and social standards. But controversy around palm oil and its sustainability fuelled enough concern in Switzerland to trigger a public vote. Two separate polls in February put support for the deal at 52 percent, with 41 to 42 percent against. The agreement was signed in 2018 and approved by the Swiss parliament in 2019, but opponents were especially critical of Bern's move to reduce import duties on palm oil. The deal contains exceptions for agricultural products, notably to protect Switzerland's sunflower and rapeseed oil production. For palm oil, customs duties will not be removed but instead reduced by between 20 percent to 40 percent. These reductions will only be granted on a volume limited to 12,500 tonnes per year -- and importers will need to prove that the palm oil has been produced in a sustainable manner. Campaign posters backing the economic partnership agreement show a Swiss bear hugging a tiger, while those against show an orangutan and baby clinging to a tree trunk, surrounded by flames. The agreement aims to boost ties with Indonesia, which despite its population is only Switzerland's 44th biggest economic partner, and only its 16th biggest export market in Asia. In 2020, Swiss exports to Indonesia amounted to just 498 million Swiss francs (\$540 million, 450 million euros).

BOJ Stresses Need to Keep Bond Yields "Stably Low

TOKYO (Dispatches) - Bank of Japan Governor Haruhiko Kuroda stressed the need to keep long-term borrowing costs stably low to underpin an economy hit by the coronavirus pandemic, signaling that widening an implicit band for its yield target was hardly a done deal.

Markets are rife with speculation the BOJ will widen to 60 basis points from the current 40 points the band at which it allows 10-year bond yield to move around its 0% target. Kuroda said the BOJ has not reached a conclusion yet on whether t will widen the band, saying "much more debate" was needed before deciding at the March review of its policy tools. "It's a difficult decision. The economy remains under pressure from the COVID-19 pandemic," Kuroda told parliament. "While we need to enhance bond market functions, it's also important to keep the yield curve stably low for the time being," he said on Friday.

The BOJ caps the 10-year bond yield around zero under a policy dubbed yield curve control (YCC), and currently allows the benchmark yield to move 40 points around its 0% target.

Expectations of a strong post-pandemic recovery have pushed up global yields including those for Japan, where the 10-year yield crept near the BOJ's implicit 0.2% ceiling.

Allowing yields to move more flexibly around the BOJ's target would make YCC more flexible, one of the key goals of a review of its policy framework scheduled on March 18-19.

The challenge, however, would be to make the tweak without giving markets the BOJ is tightening policy. At the March review, the BOJ will also look at ways to make its purchases of exchange-traded funds (ETF) more flexible.

Bangladesh Is Becoming South Asia's Economic Bull Case

DHAKA (Dispatches) - Bangladesh has won plaudits from The Wall Street Journal for the economic strides it has made in recent years in the wake of its graduation from the UN's least-developed-country categorization.

The South Asian nation received the UN Committee for Development Policy's recommendation to be elevated to the developing country category as it gears up to enter the 50th of its independence.

In an article titled, 'Bangladesh Is Becoming South Asia's Economic Bull Case',

the New York-based newspaper credited Bangladesh for being 'the closest proxy for the successful development models seen at various stages in South Korea, China and Vietnam.' Export-led development has the best modern track record of moving countries from very low-income levels into middle-income status, according to WSJ.

The article also highlighted the progress made by Bangladesh in terms of exports and GDP per capita in comparison to India and Pakistan which have seen a marginal decline in these measures

WSJ points out that the 80 percent growth in exports in the past decade is driven by the country's booming garment industry. It attributed a very young demographic structure, a continued competitive edge in terms of wage levels, strong and rising female labour-force participation especially relative to the rest of South Asia to the success of Bangladesh's development model. Nevertheless, the country's economic growth remains well below that of Vietnam or Cambodia, where exports have more than tripled and more than doubled respectively over the past 10 years. Another caveat is that India's exports had also boomed in the early 2000s before stagnating, meaning that there is no guarantee of a continued upward trend, according to WSJ. Moving forward, Bangladesh should look to emulate Vietnam by transition toward highervalue forms of manufacturing and exporting, according to WSJ. Bangladesh's export industry is heavily reliant on garment manufacturing while its economic complexity, ranked by Harvard University's Growth Lab, is 108 out of the 133 countries measured. While the country remains outside of major Asian trade blocs, diversifying its manufacturing exports would require greater participation in intra-Asian supply chains and a closer economic relationship with its neighbors to the east, the article says.

labor market recovery back on firmer footing and on course for further gains in the months ahead.

The Labor Department's closely watched employment report on Friday will, however, also offer a reminder that as the United States enters the second year of the coronavirus pandemic the recovery remains excruciatingly slow, with millions of Americans experiencing long spells of joblessness and permanent unemployment.

Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell on Thursday offered an optimistic view of the labor market, but cautioned a return to full employment this year was "highly unlikely."

"We will probably see more people having gone back on payrolls," said Sung Won Sohn, a finance and economics professor at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. "Many will be related to service jobs, but that will not mean a rapid increase in jobs. It's a slow progress toward eventual full recovery."

Nonfarm payrolls likely increased by 182,000 jobs last month after rising only 49,000 in January, according to a Reuters poll of economists. Payrolls declined in December for the first time in eight months.

Economists saw no impact from the mid-February deep freeze in the densely populated South as the winter storms hit after the week during which the government surveyed establishments and businesses for the employment report.

But unseasonably cold weather last month, especially in the Northeast, and production cuts at auto assembly plants because of a global semiconductor chip shortage likely shortened the average workweek. The labor market has been slow to respond to the drop in daily coronavirus cases and hospitalizations, which helped fuel a boost in consumer spending in January that prompted economists to sharply upgrade their gross domestic product growth estimates for the first quarter.



Historically, employment lags GDP growth by about a quarter. But economists believe the catching up started in February, a year after the economy fell into recession at the start of the U.S. COVID-19 outbreak. A survey last week showed consumers' perceptions of the labor market improved in February after deteriorating in January and December. In addition, a measure of manufacturing employment increased to a two-year high in February.

Though millions are unemployed, companies are struggling to find workers, which is contributing to holding back job growth. A survey on Wednesday showed employment growth in the services industry slowed last month, with businesses reporting they were "unable to fill vacant positions with qualified applicants."

Zali stated that one of the main features of the 'Riske Man' application was being indigenous and it could be used in other countries as well.



Uzbekistan, India Moving Swiftly to Partner on Chabahar

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - India and Uzbekistan are swiftly moving to strengthen their partnership to develop connectivity in Central Asia via the Chabahar port. Last week, the Foreign Minister of Uzbekistan, Abdulaziz Kamilov, had visited New Delhi and met External Affairs Minister, S. Jaishankar, to discuss various aspects of bilateral cooperation.

Kamilov invited Jaishankar to attend an international conference on regional connectivity in Tashkent in July this year. This was preceded by the India-Uzbekistan Virtual Summit between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Uzbekistan President Shavkat Mirziyoyev in December last year.

The two high-level meetings are significant in view of the change in the administration in the US. Unlike the Donald Trump administration which followed a strong pro-Israel line, alienating Iran, the recently elected government of Joe Biden in the US is keen on re-engaging with Tehran. It is likely that Biden may revive the U.S.-Iran nuclear deal which had been signed under the Barack Obama administration but was revoked by his successor Trump.

A land-locked country, Uzbekistan is interested in the Chabahar port that India is developing in Iran. Soon after Biden was elected in the US presidential elections, Uzbekistan, India and Iran held their first trilateral meeting for the joint use of the port.

Home to almost half of Central Asian population, Uzbekistan is a fast growing economy which has picked up pace under President Shavkat Mirziyoyev's economic reforms. This has created huge demand for investments. Because of the lack of connectivity to sea, the oil and gas-rich Central Asia remains largely dependent on China's market.

The coronavirus pandemic related shutdown brought in a realisation across the world that over dependence on China for essential and manufactured goods was fraught with grave dangers. As a result, President Mirziyoyev has been keen on exporting to diverse markets, including India, via the Chabahar port.

For India, the historically hostile Pakistan, has been a stumbling block to access the oil and gas resources through land route in Central Asia. Amid this blockade, China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), which runs through Central Asia, poses greater economic competition.

To overcome the two-pronged challenge, New Delhi has invested \$500 million in the Chabahar port, which connects India with Afghanistan and Central Asia,



bypassing Pakistan. India's budgetary allocation to Chabahar doubled in 2020-21 from the previous year.

In the meantime, Uzbekistan has built a 75-km railway line between Mazar-i-Shareef and Hairatan town on the Uzbek-Afghan border. Tehran has also built the first railway link between Afghanistan and Iran. India and Uzbekistan under the 2011 Ashgabat Agreement are to build a transit and transport corridor between Central Asia and the Persian Gulf.

Given the significance of the partnership with Tashkent on Chabahar, New Delhi confirmed a \$448 million Line of Credit for the development of connectivity related infrastructure, information technology and energy in Uzbekistan. Both the countries have also signed several agreements in various sectors apart from actively cooperating in the regional platforms like the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) and the India-Central Asia Dialogue (ICAD).

it is not possible to produce vaccine for the whole population. Moreover, the distribution of vaccine is not fair either," he noted, stressing that vaccine rollouts would not mean an end to the challenge.

Brazil Economy Faces Headwinds After Worst Plunge in Decades

RIO DE JANEIRO (Dispatches) Brazil dodged the most dire economic forecasts in 2020, but official figures released Wednesday show the COVID-19 pandemic still battered the nation and it continues to dim the outlook for recovery.



Brazil's gross domestic product contracted 4.1% in 2020, the biggest annual recession since the series began in 1996, according to Brazil's official statistics institute, known as IBGE. Still, the result is better the 5.3% plunge forecast by the International Monetary Fund in April last year.

Since the beginning of the health crisis, Brazil's President Jair Bolsonaro has been adamant that the economy must keep running, arguing that lockdowns and restrictions would inflict greater hardship on the population than the disease. That position, which flew in the face of public health experts' recommendations, helped stave off an even deeper recession, at least in the short term — as did a generous pandemic welfare program.

But the country is once again recording more than 1,000 daily deaths from COVID-19, which could cause further economic slowdown.

"The worsening COVID-19 outbreak is casting a dark cloud over the outlook for the next few months at least," William Jackson, an economist at Capital Economics, wrote in a report published Wednesday. Jackson pointed to a plunge in retail sales and likelihood of tighter measures to limit the virus' spread.

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Brazil is ill surging, with a new record high 1,641 deaths

Singapore Is World's Freest Economy

SINGAPORE (Dispatches) - Singapore's economy has been ranked the most free in the world this year in The Heritage Foundation's 2021 Index of Economic Freedom, the second year in a row it topped the list. The Republic scored 89.7

points, with its overall score up by 0.3 point from last year, mainly due to an improvement in points gained for government spending, the conservative Washington think-tank said yesterday.

Its score placed it far ahead of both the regional average for 40 countries in the Asia-Pacific (60.2) and the world average (61.6).

It was followed by New Zealand, Australia. Switzerland and Ireland, in that order, with scores ranging from 83.9 (New Zealand) to 81.4 (Ireland).

The United States ranked 20th with a score of 74.8, and Germany was 29th with a score of 72.5.

Thailand took the 42nd spot with a score of 69.7, and China was No. 107 with a score of 58.4.

Hong Kong, which had topped the list for 25 of the last 26 years, was left out of this year's index as it has come under the direct control of Beijing, The Heritage Foundation said.

The city's ties to Beijing are increasingly "forged in steel" and "traditions of English common law, freedom of speech and democracy have weakened significantly", Dr Edwin J. Feulner, founder of The Heritage Foundation, wrote in the Wall Street Journal on Wednesday.

"The loss of political freedom and autonomy by Hong Kong over the past two years has made that city almost indistinguishable in many respects from other major Chinese commercial centres like Shanghai and Beijing." The index ranks 12 indicators under four categories: rule of law, size of government, regulatory efficiency and open markets. Mr Anthony Kim, research manager at The Heritage Foundation and editor of the index, told The Straits

"Efficient government provides good public services with low tax rates. The regulatory environment is flexible and transparent, encouraging vibrant commercial activity. "A strong tradition of openness to global trade and investment has long boosted productivity while facilitating the emergence of a more dynamic and competitive financial sector."

Last year amid the pandemic, India used the Chabahar port to send 75,000 tons of wheat as humanitarian assistance to Afghanistan and 25 tons of the pesticide malathion to Iran to deal with a locust invasion.

The second batch of 25 tons has recently reached Chabahar.

As part of the agreement with Iran, India would provide six cranes and other equipment worth \$85 million to equip and operationailse the Shahid Beheshti terminal. So far, India has supplied two of these Mobile Harbour Cranes (MHC) and four others will be delivered over the next few weeks.

"Chabahar Port has emerged as the connecting point for the region to deliver humanitarian assistance during the Covid pandemic," Mandaviya said. India also plans to set up an around 600 km railway line from Chabahar port to Zahedan, the provincial capital of Sistan-Baluchestan in Iran close to the Afghan border, at a cost of \$1.6 billion to facilitate the movement of goods to Afghanistan. New Delhi has also proposed inclusion of Chabahar port in the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC)- connecting Mumbai with Moscow, the minister said, referring to discussions at a virtual summit on Chabahar port on Thursday. The INSTC project, proposed by India, Russia and Iran in 2000, and later supported by 10 other central Asian countries, envisions a 7,200 km-long multi-mode network of ship, rail and road for freight transport, aiming to cut carriage costs by about 30% and transit time from 40 days to about 20 days.

Iranian Energy Minister Reza Ardakanian visited Iraq in late December 2020 to meet with senior officials from the country and discuss the country's energy debts to Iran.

Tsitsipas started brightly, but Khachanov bounced back from a 0-2 deficit with a high level of tennis. The Russian secured the 46-minute opener after Tsitsipas hit a forehand into the net.

Tsitsipas hit 17 winners in the second set, rushing out to a 5-0 advantage after the Greek tightened up his serve. Khachanov had three points for a 4-1 lead in the third set only to see Tsitsipas recover.

Tsitsipas clawed his way back and his forehand did the damage to break Khachanov at 5-5 in the decider en route to his ninth win in 10 matches this season.

Barcel<mark>ona Ditching Suarez Was a "Huge Mistake"</mark>

MADRID (Dispatches) - "Of course it was a huge mistake," Diego Forlan says. "As soon as Barcelona said he was for sale, I knew it was a mistake."

Forlan goes back a long way with Luis Suarez, to 2007 when he set up Suarez's first goal for Uruguay and to 2013, when Suarez set up Forlan's last. "I was the old one when he started so he was always coming to me and asking questions," Forlan tells AFP. "Now it's the other way round."

They spoke last summer when Barcelona decided in the wake of the 8-2 mauling by Bayern Munich that Suarez would be let go, not sold but released, and not to a team far away but to Atletico Madrid.

"All I know is it wasn't about his performances on the pitch," said Forlan.

"I messaged him and said, 'listen you're not the first and you won't be the last. You have to keep being vourself. You don't have to prove anything to anyone so just keep doing it at Atletico Madrid.' "But when you get punished for something you didn't do, when you're still in great shape, playing well, of course your aim is going to be to show that you can still perform.' Suarez has played like proving them wrong is everything, his 16 goals filling Atletico's goalscoring gap and propelling them to the top of La Liga.

The Egypt international made no secret of his annoyance at being withdrawn just after the hour mark at Anfield on Thursday as the champions slipped to a fifth successive home league defeat for the first time in their history.

Liverpool are languishing in seventh place in the Premier League and are four points behind fourth-placed Chelsea ahead of Sunday's home game against lowly Fulham. Klopp said he could not make substitutions on the basis of what reaction it created, adding he took off the Premier League's leading scorer because he thought he was feeling the intensity of the game. "I'm not even sure if this situation is now a reason for a 'proper talk' about it," he said on Friday.

"We are 1-0 down, that makes no player happy. You go off and you react in different ways because you are not happy.

"You get subbed, you are a striker and you think you should stay on the pitch. That's all completely clear and not an issue, it is just normal life."

Klopp said managers were forced to make quick judgements on the basis of what they saw on the pitch.

"We make these decisions in the moment and not with any thoughts in behind, the problem only is you only have to explain it after the game and the day after the game," he said.

"These kind of stories (rumours of unhappiness) so far didn't happen. I cannot guarantee for the future and for all times it will never happen but these kind of discussions we never had."

ONDON (Dispatches) - Thomas Tuchel Lasays his Chelsea players should take the credit after masterminding a 10-match unbeaten run since he replaced Frank Lampard as manager.

Chelsea's 1-0 win against Liverpool on Thursday lifted them to fourth in the Premier League table and put them on course to qualify for next season's Champions League.

The Stamford Bridge side were languishing down in ninth place when Tuchel took over in late January. German boss Tuchel has refused to take credit for that resurgence however, insisting the players must receive the plaudits.

Asked to explain his role in Chelsea's revival. Tuchel replied: "I am flattered but I will just give the flowers to the players and to the club.

"It is proven that Chelsea is an organisation and a club that has everything that you need to be successful as a coach and as a football team, so now it is my job to bring out the very best of myself, together with the team." Tuchel inherited a Chelsea squad lacking direction as Lampard's reign stuttered to a frustrating end.

The former Paris Saint-Germain boss has quickly tightened up the team's defence and they have conceded just twice on his watch.

Tuchel will pit his wits against Carlo Ancelotti when Chelsea host Everton on Monday. The fifth-placed Toffees are a point behind Chelsea but have a game in hand.

"I am happy to be on the sideline," said Tuchel. "I feel an attitude, an unbelievable attitude towards training, towards games, I feel the bond that is necessary.

"In the whole world when football is played, the teams that stand out are the teams that fight for each other, are ready to sacrifice, are happy for each other, push each other from the bench and this is exactly what I found. I found a lot of talent."
