Amnesty Urged to Report Hardships of Iranians Under U.S. Sanctions

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran's mission to the European Union has called on Amnesty International to compile a report about the harmful impact of illegal American sanctions on the livelihoods of Iranians, especially at a time when the country is grappling with a deadly coronavirus outbreak.

In a chain of tweets on Friday, Iran's Embassy in Belgium — which hosts the EU's headquarters — drew attention to the difficulties that over 80 million Iranians have been facing under America's unilateral sanctions, saying those problems have been compounded by the spread of COVID-19, the disease caused by the virus.

Along with one of the tweets, the diplomatic mission posted a recent Amnesty report on "deliberately divisive and destructive policies that have perpetuated inequality, discrimination and oppression and paved the way for the devastation wrought by COVID-19."

The Iranian mission said "as Agnès Callamard correctly observed in an Amnesty report 'the pandemic has cast a harsh light on the world's inability to cooperate effectively in times of dire global need." See Page 7

Iran Marks National Nuclear Day With Unveiling 123 New Achievements

TEHRAN - Iran has unveiled 133 new nuclear achievements made by the country's experts in different areas of the nuclear industry, including quantum, enrichment, heavy water and deuterium compounds, radiopharmaceuticals, lasers, and etc. In a video conference call on Saturday, President Hassan Rouhani unveiled the nuclear achievements in the provinces of Tehran, Markazi, Isfahan, Alborz and Qom to mark the 15th anniversary of the National Nuclear Technology Day.

On his order, Iranian experts began injecting gas to a new generation centrifuges in Natanz enrichment complex and also the mechanical testing of IR-9 centrifuge was started and the assembly center of the new generation centrifuges was put into operation.

Iran showed to the world the peaceful nature of its nuclear program by signing the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) with six world states — namely the US, Germany, France, Britain, Russia and China — in 2015. The nuclear deal was also ratified in the form of a UN Security Council Resolution 2231.

Addressing Saturday's event, Rouhani said one of the honorable effects of the JCPOA was that it completely legalized the nuclear industry in Iran.

"I reiterate that all our nuclear activities are peaceful and for civilian purposes. As Leader [of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei] has repeatedly stated, in our religion, pursuing a weapon that can be a great danger to a large community is forbidden," he noted.

The president also thanked Ali-Akbar Salehi, head of the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI), and the staff of the organization, for the 133 nuclear achievements made over the past year.

"Today, a chain of 164 IR-6 centrifuges was launched. It can provide us with products 10 times more than those of the previous chain. This means that the previous centrifuges were at most 1 SWU (Separative Work Units), but this new series is 10 SWU," he said.

"Even today, we have developed the IR-9 centrifuge with the capacity of 50 SWU in terms of technology, i.e. they provide us products 50 to 60 times more than those of the old centrifuges."

being Rouhani note that, "Radiopharmaceuticals are one of the products which are used for diagnostics and are very important in medicine."

Iran Starts Injecting Gas Into Next Generation Centrifuges

TEHRAN (MNA) – Iran has officially started injecting gas into next-generation centrifuges at Natanz Nuclear Facility, in a ceremony attended by President Hassan Rouhani through videoconference.

Marking the National Day of Nuclear Technology on Saturday, the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran unveiled133 new achievements in the field of nuclear technology.

Accordingly, the AEOI started injecting gas into nextgeneration centrifuges and began the mechanical test of the IR-9 centrifuges at Natanz Nuclear Facility.

Moreover, an assembly line for next-generation centrifuges was also inaugurated at the facility.

The AEOI chief, Ali-Akbar Salehi, said on Saturday that adhering to international regulations, Iran seeks to increase its nuclear achievements. He noted that despite all the restrictions and sanctions, various projects in the field of nuclear science and technology have been pursued.

Salehi named manufacturing of centrifuges required by the Blood Transfusion Center, industrial production of medical-grade titanium used in the manufacture of implants in the human body, and the production of several new radiopharmaceuticals as the obtained achievements. See Page 7

Vienna Talks Constructive, But Rocky Road Ahead

TEHRAN (PressTV) - A senior Iranian diplomat has described as positive the atmosphere of the recent talks held in Vienna among members of the joint commission of the 2015 nuclear deal, officially known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), but says there is a bumpy road ahead.

"It was a busy week. Back-to-back consultations were going on between all sides," said Deputy Foreign Minister for Political Affairs Abbas Araqchi.

"We have separate meetings with the three European countries as well as Russia and China, which helped move forward with the negotiations," he told the state TV on Friday.

"I can say we are on track, but there is a rocky road ahead," Araqchi noted.

"It is difficult. It needs work. The United States needs strong willpower to decide to lift its sanctions. We hope it will be fruitful," he added.

The Iranian official highlighted that talks are being held amid the COVID-19 pandemic. See Page 7

Impossible to Trust U.S. After 4-Years Economic War Against Iran

TEHRAN (MNA) –Foreign Ministry Spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh said that it is impossible for Tehran to trust Washington after four years of relentless economic war against the Iranian people.

"The process in Vienna is on the right track, and the P4 + 1 has taken positive steps in the Vienna talks, and the Vienna talks have shown that progress is possible, said Khatbizadeh in an interview with CNN.

"The positive move created by the P4 + 1 in the Vienna talks can be sustained if the United States is ready to fulfil its obligations under Resolution 2231," he added.

Emphasizing the need for the Biden administration to distance itself from Trump's failed policies against Iran, the spokesman said, "It seems that members of the current US administration are much more committed to Trump-era sanctions [against Iran] than to the Obama nuclear deal."

"I think Biden has to make a political decision about whether he intends to jeopardize the nuclear deal with Trump's failed sanctions policy, or whether he wants to distance himself from those failed policies," Khatibzadeh noted. He went on to reiterate Iran's position on the JCPOA, "Iran has always had a clear position on the JCPOA. Serious negotiations took place between Iran and the P5 + 1 [to reach the JCPOA]. After the JCPOA was signed and sealed, we implemented this agreement and since then we have always made it clear that everyone must abide by their obligations. Iran, even after the withdrawal of the United States from the JCPOA, was in good faith and fully committed to its commitments."

SANAA (Dispatches) - Yemen's army and popular committees have carried out a drone attack on Abha International Airport in southwestern Saudi Arabia in retaliation for Saudi-led strikes on their country.

According to Yemen's al-Masirah television network, the spokesman for the Yemeni Armed Forces, Brigadier General Yahya Saree, said that the attack had targeted a "sensitive site" at Abha airport on Friday afternoon.

He added that a Qasef-2k UAV had been used in the strike, which hit the target accurately. Saree said the attack was a legitimate response to Saudi Arabia's escalating aggression against Yemen. On Thursday, Yemen's air force successfully targeted warplane hangars at Jizan Airport also located in southwestern Saudi Arabia.

Saudi Arabia and a number of its regional allies launched a brutal war on Yemen in March 2015. The war was launched to suppress an uprising that had toppled a Riyadh-friendly regime. The U.S.-based Armed Conflict Location and Event Data Project (ACLED), a nonprofit conflict-research organization, estimates that the war has claimed more than 100,000 lives.

The United Nations (UN) says more than 24 million Yemenis are in dire need of humanitarian aid, including 10 million suffering from extreme levels of hunger. The world body also refers to the situation in Yemen as the world's worst humanitarian crisis. The Saudi war has also taken a heavy toll on Yemen's infrastructure, destroying hospitals, schools, and factories.

Seven Iranian Fishermen Released, Returned Home

TEHRAN (IP) – Iran's Foreign Ministry spokesman said that seven Iranian fishermen were released and returned to the country on Thursday. Saeed Khatibzadeh stated that seven Baluch fishermen who were rescued by the Coast Guard and transported to the country due to a storm last March on Comoros' shores were released and returned home on Thursday. He thanked the humanitarian actions and assistance of Comoros' government and people.

Delay in Removing Sanctions Benefits Iran, Harms West

TEHRAN (PressTV) - The spokesman for the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) says any foot-dragging in removing US sanctions on the Islamic Republic is in the interests of Tehran and to the detriment of the Western countries.

"Iran is moving fast in the nuclear industry, and time is on its side. In this regard, if no progress takes place in the negotiations, we are still making progress technically," Behrouz Kamalvandi said on his Instagram account.

Talks were held in Vienna earlier this week between Iran and the P4+1 group of countries - Britain, France, Russia, and China plus Germany - within the framework of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) Joint Commission. Tehran says Washington, as the first party that reneged on its commitments, should take the first step towards unconditionally remove all the anti-Iran sanctions in a verifiable manner. Kamalvandi said, "Now, the situation is such that as long as the Western side dithers, it will benefit Iran and harm the other side. The number of our centrifuges and the amount of enriched material is rising fast."

The official said Iran will not act until the sanctions are removed and the process is verified. "We have no trust in the other side. The list of 1,600 sanctions as well as demands mentioned in the JCPOA but not met in practice have now been brought up by Iran.



No measure will be taken by Iran until these issues are resolved," he said. The AEOI spokesman stressed that nuclear power is very important to Iran's progress, adding it is a driving force behind the development of the country's industries. Kamalvandi said Iran's nuclear industry has become completely indigenous and the country has made great progress compared to previous years.

On the sidelines of the visit, he said that the strategy of the petrochemical industry is to produce catalysts required by the industry with Iranian technical savvy with the aim of reducing imports, adding: "Last year, the technical knowhow for the production of polypropylene from natural gas was unveiled at the Mahshahr Bureau of PRTC. It is based on this technical knowledge that the implementation of the GTPP project of Islamabad-West Petrochemical Plan has begun."

The CEO of the National Petrochemical Company stressed the value of the ongoing projects in the three centers of Tehran, Arak and Mahshahr of PRTC for the petrochemical industry.

The two new catalyst plants will become operational in weeks, he added. The projects will make Iran selfsufficient in production of the items.

Majlis Reviewed Iran-China Strategic Agreement

TEHRAN (IP) - The spokesman of the presiding board of the Iranian parliament said the MPs held several sessions during the recent days in various aspects of monitoring, development of foreign relations in lifting sanctions, and discussion of the Iran-China strategic agreement.

Mohammad-Hossein Farhangi stated that due to the fourth COVID-19 wave, parliament's open sessions would be held in three different halls.

MPs Visit Four Nuclear Sites

TEHRAN (TASNIM) - In order to monitor the implementation of the Strategic Plan to Lift Sanctions Act, 12 members of the parliament, mainly from the National Security and Energy Commissions, visited four nuclear sites in Isfahan, Natanz, Khandab, and Fordow, the spokesman for the parliament's National Security and Foreign Relation's Commission said.

Explaining the Iranian MPs' visit to four nuclear sites, the spokesman for the parliament's National Security and Foreign Relation's Commission, Abolfazl Amouie said that production of 20 percent enriched uranium is being carried out carefully in six chains of the first generation of IR1 centrifuges.

"The metal uranium factory completion process was observed by MPs," he said. Article 4 of the Law on Strategic Plan provides 5 months to complete this factory.

"One thousand IR2m centrifuges have recently been installed on Ahmadi Roshan (Natanz) nuclear site," he said. Also, a chain of 164 centrifuges of the 6th generation has been installed on the Natanz site within a legal period of 3 months.

He pointed out that in order to increase the enriched uranium reserves required by the country, 2 chains of IR4 centrifuges have been used at the Natanz site to produce enriched uranium.

Amouiee noted that the process of producing 20 percent enriched uranium, is carefully flowing in 6 chains of the first generation of IR1 centrifuges in Fordow.

Providing National Fuel Basket Amid Coronavirus Pandemic IRAN NEWS ECONOMIC DESK

TEHRAN - The CEO of Persian Gulf Star Oil Company (PGSOC) emphasized safeguarding the policy of providing the national fuel basket with observing all sanitary protocols amid the outbreak of the coronavirus, and said due to the start of the fourth surge of COVID-19 in Hormuzgan Province, the company has intensified sanitary protocols.

Mohammad Ali Dadvar said that due to the fourth surge of the COVID-19 in the province, the company has intensified its sanitary protocols and it has imposed a lockdown for its staff and accordingly those personnel who had left the province are not allowed to enter the refinery. He added that all of his colleagues and their families

He also said that personnel of the refinery are defenders of the security of national fuel basket and in the current condition, safeguarding the production process of strategic products are highly important, expressing hope that in the current era, the refinery would do its job successfully as the soldiers of the country in the economic front.



Meshkinfam noted that almost 70 percent of the consuming gas in the country is supplied by the South Pars gas field, adding that problems like the outbreak of coronavirus, changes in the management and financial shortages should not hinder achieving production and supplying 70 percent of the national consuming gas.

He added that currently 8 gas production units are under the control of the contractors of the developmental projects of South Pars and all plans should be in a way that those platforms are handed over to the operation and support department of the company by the end of June.

Former Portuguese PM to Stand Trial

LISBON (Dispatches) - A Lisbon judge ruled Friday to put former Portuguese Prime Minister José Sócrates on trial for alleged money-laundering and forgery but said the statute of limitations had expired on more than a dozen corruption allegations.

Judge Ivo Rosa said that 1.7 million euros (\$2 million), much of it in cash, given to Sócrates by a childhood friend who was working for a Portuguese construction company amounted to an attempt to gain influence over the prime minister and win contracts. Sócrates argued that the money and other assets, such as works of art and the use of an upscale Paris apartment, were loans from his longtime friend.

Myanmar UN Envoy Urges No-Fly Zone as Many Protesters Killed



YANGON (Dispatches) - Myanmar's own ambassador to the United Nations has called for a no-fly zone and sanctions, as the international community puts more pressure on the military government to end a deadly crackdown and restore democracy, and as the death toll continues to rise with dozens more reported killed early on Saturday

The United States and European nations pleaded for action at a meeting on Friday of the UN Security Council where a Southeast Asian summit on the crisis was taking shape, but the military leadership remained defiant and refused entry to a UN special envoy.

Ambassador Kyaw Moe Tun, who has passionately rejected the February 1 coup and brushed aside the military's claims that he no longer represents Myanmar, told the Security Council that there has been a "lack of adequate and strong action" despite hundreds of deaths, including children.

"Your collective, strong action is needed immediately," said Kyaw Moe Tun, in virtual remarks as he sat before the Myanmar and UN flags.

"I strongly believe that the international community, in particular the UN Security Council, will not let these atrocities keep going on in Myanmar."

The ambassador called for a no-fly zone to "avoid further bloodshed caused by the military air strikes on civilian areas".

He also asked for an international arms embargo and the freezing of bank accounts associated with members of the military and their families.

All foreign direct investment should also be suspended until the restoration of the democratically elected government, the ambassador said.

The diplomat's call came as reports emerged of more deadly crackdowns in the country, with at least 60 civilians killed on Friday night and into Saturday morning during protests in the Bago division outside of the largest city of Yangon. According to Radio Free Asia, civilians were reportedly shot at using live ammunition as security forces started dismantling a barricade set up by the protesters. Several people were also reportedly taken by police without arrest warrants. More than 60 people were killed in Myanmar's Bago division Friday after security forces removed barricades set up by pro-democracy demonstrators at around 3:00 a.m. and began firing live ammunition and grenades at the crowd. China and Russia wield veto power at the Security Council and generally oppose international sanctions, although Beijing – the top ally of Myanmar's military - has voiced growing concern about instability in its neighbour. Linda Thomas-Greenfield, the US ambassador to the United Nations, said the military "needs to feel the cost associated with its horrific actions" after ignoring previous condemnation.



Volcano on **Caribbean's St Vincent Erupts**

ST VINCENT (Dispatches) - An explosive eruption rocked La Soufriere volcano on the eastern Caribbean island of St Vincent on Friday following mandatory evacuation orders from the local government.



Emergency management officials said the ash column rose about six kilometres (3.7 miles) high and that the ash was headed east into the Atlantic Ocean.

Dormant since 1979, the volcano started showing signs of activity in December, spewing steam and smoke and rumbling away. That picked up this week, prompting Prime Minister of St Vincent and the Grenadines Ralph Gonsalves to order an evacuation of the surrounding area late on Thursday.

Northern Irish Loyalists **Demand Brexit Changes**

LONDON (Dispatches) - Pro-British loyalist militants in Northern Ireland said on Friday there had been a "spectacular collective failure" to understand their anger over Brexit and other issues as there was some respite in street clashes following a week of riots.

Despite appeals for calm from London, Dublin and Washington, the nightly unrest in pro-British areas spread further into Irish

nationalist parts of Belfast on Thursday, where police responded to petrol bomb and stone attacks with water cannon. A number of loyalist protests planned for Friday night were postponed in what posters put up in pro-British areas said was a mark of respect for Queen Elizabeth and the Royal Family following the death of her husband, Prince Philip. However some masked individuals threw bricks and missiles at police in a loyalist area of Belfast where

television footage showed a British Union Jack flying on a flagpole nearby. The clashes have been some of the worst violence in Northern Ireland in years and have raised concern about the 1998 peace accord that largely ended three decades of sectarian and political bloodshed during which 3,600 people

were killed.

Harry, Meghan Honor Prince Philip

LONDON (Dispatches) - Prince Harry and wife Meghan Markle's foundation Archewell paid tribute to Britain's Prince Philip following his death Friday as speculation builds about their plans to attend the funeral.

The foundation updated the archewell.com website so that it just displayed a single message without any drop-down menus or links to other pages.

"In Loving Memory of His Royal Highness, The Duke of Edinburgh, 1921-2021," read the message in white on a dark background.

"Thank you for your service... You will be greatly missed," it added.

Philip, the longest serving royal consort in British history, died peacefully in the morning at Windsor Castle, west of London, Buckingham Palace said in a statement. His death immediately fueled speculation about when Harry might return to Britain for his grandfather's funeral and whether Meghan, pregnant with their second child, would join him.

The couple, also known as the Duke and Duchess of Sussex, live in Los Angeles following their decision to quit frontline royal duties early last year.

They have yet to publicly say whether they will attend the funeral. If they do, t would mark their first return to Britain since their explosive interview with U.S. talk show superstar Oprah Winfrey last month.

During the two-hour sit-down, viewed by more than 17 million people in the JS and over 11 million in Britain, Harry and Meghan said racism had played part in them quitting the UK for North America.

The couple said a senior royal had speculated how dark their child's skin vould be before he was born. Meghan's mother is black and her father is white. The sensational claim set off a whirl of speculation about who might have said it. Neither the queen, now 94, nor Philip, made the racist comment,

Winfrey later told CBS. Harry, 36, and Meghan 39, accused newspapers of racial stereotyping, particularly set against coverage of Harry's sister-in-law, Kate, who is white.

The Loyalist Communities Council (LCC), which says it speaks for the Ulster Volunteer Force, Red Hand Commando and Ulster Defence Association militant groups, said it was not involved in the riots and it called for calm.

However it warned in a statement that border arrangements with EU-member Ireland must be negotiated.

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - The State Department has announced that it will make it easier for U.S. officials to meet Taiwanese representatives, defying pressure from China at a time of high tensions, and as the U.S. Congress considers sweeping legislation to counter Beijing's influence.

Airbus Deliveries Surge in March, Sending Shares Higher

PARIS (Reuters) - A rebound in air travel in China and the United States helped to drive a surge in March deliveries for Airbus, sending the planemaker's shares higher. Airbus reported slightly higher deliveries for the first quarter and posted 39 gross orders, including a new deal for 20 A220s to an unidentified buyer.

But the company's net orders - which are adjusted for cancellations - remained in negative territory for the first quarter, with a total of minus 61 net orders dominated by a Norwegian cancellation unveiled in the previous month.

IMF Warns More Funding Needed To Safeguard Global Economy

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - Warning that the recovery from the pandemic crisis is not yet over, the IMF on Thursday called on policymakers to continue to spend money to shore up the global economy and ensure no one is left behind.

Without that aid, and additional financing from both the fund and the World Bank, developing nations and the poor in many countries could struggle to rebound from the downturn caused by Covid-19, the International Monetary Fund said at the conclusion of its spring meeting.

Continued support is needed to "mitigate and heal economic scars," IMF managing director Kristalina Georgieva told reporters. "We want to make sure everybody has a fair shot to a better life." That means accelerating access to vaccines and taking advantage of the opportunity presented by the crisis to invest in green technology, which can create good paying jobs and address climate change.

U.S. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen joined the call, urging "significant" new spending to ensure a solid rebound from the damage inflicted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

While the economic outlook has "improved significantly," especially due to substantial government support, "the job is not yet done, given high uncertainty and the risk of permanent scarring," Yellen said.

"I urge major economies to not just avoid removing support too early, but to strive to provide significant amounts of new fiscal support

to secure a robust recovery," she said.

The IMF now projects global growth of six percent this year after the 3.3 percent contraction last year, and credited the \$16 trillion in global public spending during the pandemic with keeping the worst peacetime recession in a century from being three times as severe.

Yellen highlighted the \$1.9 trillion US aid package President Joe Biden signed last month, as well as his proposal announced last week to spend \$2 trillion on infrastructure and jobs.

She said that with stimulus already boosting the recovery from the pandemic shutdowns, the US economy "could reach full employment as soon as next year," but many developing countries do not have similar resources to support their economies.

Georgieva warned about a "dangerous divergence" in lowincome countries' prospects compared to rich nations, which could worsen if advanced economies like the United States raise interest rates sooner than expected.

She also praised the IMF members who agreed to allow the fund to issue \$650 billion in new Special Drawing Rights, an additional pool of IMF currency that will add to nations' reserves and boost their ability to access financing.

The IMF is expected to present a proposal to its board in June, and Georgieva said the fund is working with rich nations to shift some of their share of those reserves to help aid developing nations, which "face a crucial policy transition from crisis to recovery."

The officials again stressed that ending the health crisis remains central to the economic recovery, and the closing statement from the IMFC, the fund's steering committee, lamented the "uneven access to vaccines." The committee emphasized "the need for strong international cooperation to accelerate vaccine production and support affordable and equitable distribution to all."

Yellen pledged U.S. support for vaccine rollouts, including efforts to "make sure financing does not become an obstacle for global vaccination... and to work toward ensuring robust, equitable, and transparent vaccination deployment."

The crisis offers policymakers a vehicle to capitalize on the need for investments to accelerate green projects that can provide good-paying jobs.

U.S. Adds Chinese Supercomputing Entities to Economic Blacklist

WASHINGTON (Reuters) -The U.S. Commerce Department said it was adding seven Chinese supercomputing entities to a U.S. economic blacklist for assisting Chinese military efforts.

The Commerce Department said the seven were "involved with building supercomputers used by China's military actors, its destabilizing military modernization efforts, and/or weapons of mass destruction programs." The department is adding Tianjin Phytium Information Technology, Shanghai High-Performance Integrated Circuit Design Center, Sunway Microelectronics, the National Supercomputing Center Jinan, the National Supercomputing Center Shenzhen, the National Supercomputing Center Wuxi, and the National Supercomputing Center Zhengzhou to its blacklist. China's foreign ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian said Beijing will take "necessary measures" to protect its companies' rights and interests.

"U.S. containment and suppression cannot hold back the march of China's scientific and technological levelopment," he said at a daily news conference in Beijing on Friday.

Companies or others listed on the U.S. Entity List are required to apply for licenses from the Commerce Department that face tough scrutiny when they seek permission to receive items from U.S. suppliers.

"Supercomputing capabilities are vital for the development of many – perhaps almost all – modern weapons and national security systems, such as nuclear weapons and hypersonic weapons, Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo said in a statement.

The new rules take effect immediately but do not apply to goods from U.S. suppliers already en route.

Russian Central Bank Considers Digital Rouble in 2023

MOSCOW (Reuters) - The Russian central bank is considering limiting future transactions with a digital rouble to smooth the impact of its implementation, planned for 2023, Deputy Governor Alexei Zabotkin said on Thursday. Russia is working on introducing the digital rouble on top of existing cash and non-cash roubles, to facilitate payments for individuals and businesses and make the use of its currency

more global in the face of Western sanctions.

"The emission of the cryptorouble will be akin to cash emission," Zabotkin said.

"It will be feasible to introduce limits on the transactions from non-cash form into the digital rouble," Zabotkin said, adding that the central bank will stand ready to compensate for possible liquidity shortages when introducing the digital rouble.

Russia is joining other central banks across the world that are stepping up efforts to develop digital currencies to modernise financial systems, speed up payments and counter a potential threat from other cryptocurrencies.

World Food Prices Continue to Soar, Hitting Nearly 7-Year High

ROME (Dispatches) - World food prices rose for a 10th consecutive month in March, hitting their highest level since June 2014, led by jumps in vegetable oils, meat and dairy indices, the United Nations food agency said on Thursday.



The Food and Agriculture Organization's food price index, which measures monthly changes for a basket of cereals, oilseeds, dairy products, meat and sugar, averaged 118.5 points last month versus a slightly revised 116.1 in February.

The February figure was previously given as 116.0.

The Rome-based FAO also said in a statement that worldwide cereal harvests remained on course to hit an annual record in 2020, adding that early indications pointed to a further increase in production this year.

FAO's cereal price index fell 1.7 percent month on month in March, ending eight months of consecutive gains, but still 26.5 percent higher than the same period last month.

Among major cereals, wheat export prices dropped the most, declining 2.4 percent on the month, reflecting good supplies and encouraging production prospects for the 2021 crops, FAO said.

FAO's vegetable oil price index surged 8 percent on the month to reach its highest level since June 2011, lifted by higher prices for palm, soy, rape and sunflower oils.

Dairy prices rose for a 10th month running, registering a 3.9 percent increase. FAO said one of the drivers in the sector was milk powder, which was boosted by a surge in imports in Asia, especially China, due to concerns about short-term supplies.

The meat index climbed 2.3 percent, but unlike all the other indices, it was still slightly down on a year-on-year basis. FAO said poultry and pig meat quotations increased, underpinned by a fast pace of imports by Asian countries, mainly China.

Sugar prices dropped 4 percent month on month, but was still up 30 percent on the year. March's decline was fuelled by prospects of large exports from India, FAO said.

FAO raised its forecast for the 2020 cereal season to 2.765 billion tons from a previous estimate of 2.761 billion, pointing to a 2 percent increase year on year.

Looking ahead, FAO said it expected global cereal production to increase for a third consecutive year in 2021. Global wheat production was seen hitting a new high

of 785 million tonnes this year, up 1.4 percent from 2020 levels, driven by an anticipated sharp rebound across most of Europe and expectations of a record harvest in India, FAO said.

Above-average outputs were also expected for maize, with a record harvest forecast for Brazil and a multiyear high predicted for South Africa.

Economic Activity Rebounds Globally Even as Covid-19 Cases Rise



LONDON (Dispatches) - Moody's Investors Service has said that high-frequency alternative data indicates a strong rebound in economic activity even as infection rates rise and restrictive measures remain in place across many countries.

New infections are spiking again across 13 of the G-20 countries. Nevertheless, the number of fatalities has decreased in recent weeks as vaccinations gather pace.

Non-OPEC supply to Grow by 1mb/d in 2021

LONDON (Dispatches) – The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, OPEC, has predicted that the Non-OPEC oil supply will grow by one million barrels per day, mb/d in 2021.

Speaking at the International Monetary and Financial Committee Meeting, via videoconference, monitored by Vanguard, HE Mohammad Sanusi Barkindo, OPEC Secretary General, said the global economy and, consequently, the global oil market have started to emerge from the severe crisis, caused by the Coronavirus pandemic. Specifically, he said: "In 2020, countries around the world virtually shut down, imposed travel restrictions and mandated social-distancing measures. These measures are still necessary for some regions to combat new waves of infections and virus mutations, with a recovery to pre-pandemic levels not yet projected for 2021. Following an estimated decline of 3.5% in 2020, the OPEC Secretariat forecasts global economic growth of 5.4% in 2021.

"The measures to stem the spread of COVID-19 not only severely affected global economic growth, but they also caused a historic demand shock in the oil market, which led to extreme volatility in oil prices." He said: "The impact of the lockdown measures has disproportionally affected mobility and thereby fuel demand. World oil demand is therefore estimated by the Secretariat to have contracted by a very significant 9.5 mb/d in 2020 and is forecast to grow by around 6 mb/d in 2021. Similarly, non-OPEC supply suffered from unprecedented events and is estimated to have declined by around 2.5 mb/d in 2020, while it is forecast to grow by around 1 mb/d in 2021. "In response to the global crisis and the massive oil demand contraction, OPEC and 10 non-OPEC participating countries under the 'Declaration of Cooperation (DoC) acted swiftly and decisively to contribute to more stability in the oil market, by voluntarily adjusting production. "These are the largest and longest in duration in the history of the oil industry, lasting until well into 2022.



A series of technical and ministerial Meetings of both the OPEC Conference and the countries participating in the DoC throughout 2020 and 2021 have successfully responded to market challenges and confirmed the commitment to sustainable oil market stability. These joint efforts succeeded in driving down the unprecedentedly high commercial oil inventories."

He added: "In closing, OPEC would like to take this opportunity to reaffirm its longstanding commitment to supporting oil market stability for the mutual benefit of consuming and producing nations, contributing significantly to addressing the common challenges to the global economy." Meanwhile, oil prices continue to drop in the international market, mainly due to prolonged pandemic, which has slowed down economic and other activities globally. about Russia's digital rouble project:

* Russia is leaning towards a two-tier system for its digital rouble, with banks opening digital wallets with the central bank and serving as intermediaries for customers and companies;

* Russian banks expressed concern about the digital rouble, pointing at cyber risks, possible liquidity shortages and damage to their profits;

* Russia gave cryptocurrencies, such as bitcoin, legal status in 2020. But it banned them from being used as a means of payment, stressing that only currencies issued by central banks can be used for that;

* Russia eyes the digital rouble introduction at times when major central banks including the U.S. Federal Reserve have teamed up with the Bank for International Settlements (BIS) to explore central bank digital currencies. The United Kingdom and the United States lead in vaccinations among the G-20 countries, said Moody's in a sector in-depth report released on Thursday (local time).

Pent-up demand is driving a rebound in economic activity even as restrictive measures remain in place across many countries.

U.S. household spending has risen above pre-Covid levels across all income groups, driven by retail, apparel and general merchandise spending.

The latest high-frequency data suggests a strong rebound in trade activity across G-20 countries. Industrial production and manufacturing data support a continued, although uneven supply-side recovery.

Financial conditions remain supportive in the U.S. and Euro area, and they continue to improve in the UK. In contrast, the financial conditions recovery in emerging markets has stalled with conditions tightening in China, Brazil, Turkey and Argentina.

The latest retail sales data suggests a slower pace of contraction in Germany and the UK, and strong growth in the U.S., Australia and South Korea. Retail sales increased in Japan, reversing a contraction in January.

Moody's said mobility data indicates that while workplace visits have slowed, consumer retail, recreation and park visits have increased across most countries. Time spent at home has decreased. Use of public transport remains below January 2020 levels, except in Japan and France.

President Blames British COVID-19 Variant as Main Reason Behind 4th Wave

TEHRAN (IP) – President Hassan Rouhani called the British COVID-19 variant entered from Iraq as the most important reason behind the 4th wave of the spread of COVID-19 in Iran.

Speaking at the meeting of Iran's National Task Force for Combating Coronavirus on Saturday, Hassan

Rouhani said that Iran was on the eve of the Holy month of Ramadhan and he expressed hope that every individual could make the best of this blessed month. Rouhani added that unfortunately Iran has passed through 3 peaks of the COVID-19 outbreak and the country had entered the fourth one which had many reasons behind it.



Industry Suffers in Germany and France as Virus Forces Lockdowns

BERLIN (Bloomberg) - Germany and France, the euro area's two largest economies, both saw unexpected declines in industrial production in February, suggesting that coronavirus restrictions are increasingly harming parts of the economy that have proved resilient so far.

German output dropped 1.6% from the previous month, surprising all but three economists in a Bloomberg survey. Production in France slumped 4.7% and stagnated in Spain. Industrial output falls in Germany and France as economies struggle through lockdown

Euro-area manufacturing has held up relatively well in recent months as it benefits from economic recoveries in China and elsewhere. A separate release showed German exports rose 0.9% in February.

At home, persistently high coronavirus infections have kept large parts of the service sector shut, probably resulting in contractions in output in the first quarter. France's drop in industrial production -- the steepest in ten months -- was driven by a 11.4% decline in the automotive sector. In Germany, investment goods took

a particular hit. Still, the German economy ministry expressed some optimism that growth momentum will pick up in the months ahead.

"The improvement in business confidence and positive trend in orders signal a positive outlook in industry," it said. "Nevertheless, the future course of the pandemic poses uncertainties.

"The surprise drop in German production casts doubt on the narrative that booming global manufacturing is a big source of support for activity. Order books continue to fill



up and survey data show businesses are as optimistic as they have ever been about the outlook. Friday's data suggest that's not translating into higher output -- yet."

Chancellor Angela Merkel has signaled she'd be in favor of another short, sharp shutdown lasting two to three weeks to contain the pandemic. With some regional leaders reluctant to even fully implement the current measures, she has threatened to transfer powers to the federal level to impose additional curbs.

Earlier this week, France cut its economic growth forecast for this year to 5% from 6% as a stricter one-month lockdown hurts activity. The government is banking on a strong rebound from the summer to make up for a weak start to the year.

"I'm convinced that as soon as the health crisis is behind us, hopefully this summer, the French economy will recover quickly and strongly," Finance Minister Bruno Le Maire said on Sud Radio Friday.

Erdogan Promotes Islamic Megabank Idea Within D-8 Bloc

ANKARA (Dispatches) -President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan on Thursday pushed for a "megabank" idea that he said could meet the liquidity requirements of Islamic financial



institutions as well as financing for infrastructure projects. "We believe that the idea of an Islamic megabank based on an online platform can be turned into reality to meet the liquidity needs of Islamic financial institutions and the growing infrastructure financing needs of the Muslim geography at the same time," Erdoğan told a virtual summit of the D-8 group of developing nations.

The president did not provide further details but said the D-8 Organization for Economic Cooperation should be updated to better fit current needs and be transformed into a project-and-result-oriented structure, in addition to taking steps to speed up decision-making processes.

The D-8 group is also about to start a project that includes the Islamic Development Bank to revitalize regional cooperation and trade within member states, its secretary-general Dato Ku Jaafar Ku Shaari said last month. Erdoğan Thursday reiterated his call for greater use of local currencies in trade among the D-8 member nations.

The president has in recent years voiced support for and held negotiations with Turkey's top partners to increase local currency use in commercial transactions, particularly bilateral trade.

The president suggests this would minimize forex pressure inherent in U.S. dollar-based trade.

"In order to protect our countries from currency risks, it is essential that we focus on trade with local money," Erdoğan noted.

The president suggested that switching to national currencies would revolutionize trade relations when he made his first call during the summit in Istanbul in 2017.

"The developments over the last four years have proven this call's reliability," Erdoğan said Thursday. He earlier said the dollar's reign on global trade should come to an end, stressing that dependence on the greenback was becoming more of a burden instead

Kim Compares North Korea's Economic Woes to 1990s Famine

SEOUL (AP) - North Korean leader Kim Jong Un has called for waging another "arduous march" to fight severe economic difficulties, for the first time comparing them to a 1990s famine that killed hundreds of thousands.

Kim had previously said his country faces the "worst-ever" situation due to several factors, including the coronavirus pandemic, U.S.-led sanctions and heavy flooding last summer. But it's the first time he publicly drew parallel with the deadly famine.

North Korea monitoring groups haven't detected any signs of mass starvation or a humanitarian disaster. But Kim's comments still suggest how seriously he views the current difficulties — which foreign observers say are the biggest test of his nine-year rule.

"There are many obstacles and difficulties ahead of us, and so our struggle for carrying out the decisions of the Eighth Party Congress would not be all plain sailing," Kim told lower-level ruling party members on Thursday, according to the Korean Central News Agency.

"I made up my mind to ask the WPK (Workers' Party of Korea) organizations at all levels, including its Central Committee and the cell secretaries of the entire party, to wage another more difficult 'arduous march' in order to relieve our people of the difficulty, even a little," Kim said.

The term "arduous march" is a euphemism that North Koreans use to describe the struggles during the 1990s famine, which was precipitated by the loss of Soviet assistance, decades of mismanagement and natural disasters. The exact death toll isn't clear, varying from hundreds of thousands to 2 million to 3 million, and North Korea depended on international aid for years to feed its people.

Kim's speech came at the closing ceremony of a party meeting with thousands of grassroots members, called cell secretaries. During his opening day speech Tuesday, Kim said improving public livelihoods in the face of the "worst-ever situation" would depend on the party cells.

During the party congress in January, Kim ordered officials to build stronger self-supporting economy, reduce reliance on imports and make more consumer goods. But analysts are skeptical about Kim's push, saying the North's problems are the result of poor management, self-imposed isolation and sanctions over his nuclear program. Chinese data show North Korea's trade with China, its biggest trading partner and aid benefactor, shrank by about

80% last year following North Korea's border closure as part of stringent pandemic measures.

Over 15.5m Cellphones Imported in a Year

TEHRAN (MNA) - Iranian mobile phone traders imported 15.8 million smartphones over the previous Iranian calendar year (ended on March 20), according to the Iranian Association of Cellphones, Tablet, and Accessories Importers.

Based on the data released by the mentioned association, 15 million

being used by consumers, IRNA reported. As reported, some 2.5 million regular mobile phones were also imported into the country over the last year. Back in January, the spokesman of the Iranian Association of Cellphone, Tablet, and Accessories Importers had announced that the price of cellphones had dropped 12-20 percent in domestic markets.

Callamard serves as the secretary-general of the London-based human rights group. Before her new post, she served as the Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary, or arbitrary executions appointed by the United Nations Human Rights Council.

"During the past year Iranian people have been grappling with a fast-spreading virus while due to illegal U.S. sanctions their assets have been frozen in foreign banks, effectively cutting them off from global banking channels to pay for the necessary medical supplies," the mission added.

The U.S., it added, even blocked the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to grant Iran a load that it needed to "strengthen its economy to better provide for the people and tend to their health and medical needs."

"The report rightly describes health workers as the heroes of 2020. Iranian health workers endured the excruciating pressure of U.S. illegal sanctions while shouldering the burden of fighting the pandemic. Casualties among Iran's health workers is among the highest in the world," the Embassy added. "Amnesty International is hereby called upon to write a report on the ruinous impact of US illegal sanction on the lives of more than 80 million Iranians who have to win their bread under the pressure of unilateral sanctions and the threat of a virus," the mission said.

Since May 2018, when Washington left a multilateral nuclear deal with Tehran, the Iranian nation has been the target of an American "maximum pressure" campaign, which is primarily devised to cripple Iran's energy sector and its transactions with international banks.

The D-8 was launched in June 1997 after then-Turkish Prime Minister Necmettin Erbakan proposed the creation of an economic group consisting of eight emerging economies from the Islamic world.

Alongside Turkey, the group includes Indonesia, Bangladesh, Egypt, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria and Pakistan. A statement following the summit said the bloc adopted a road map, namely the D-8 Decennial Road Map for 2020-2030, and the Dhaka Declaration 2021. The nations agreed to enhance trade cooperation and bring their domestic trade volumes to at least 10% of the organization's total trade in the next 10 years.

The group has an annual trade volume of around \$1.6 trillion, of which 6.5% stems from intra-D-8 trade. It represents 4.5% of global trade and 5% of the global gross domestic product (GDP).

Yet, Erdoğan said even though the intra-D-8 trade increased sevenfold to date, it was not enough, calling on all the member nations to act to put into action the preferential trade agreement.

"It is of great importance that the D-8 Preferential Trade Agreement is put into effect by all member states at the earliest possible time," the president noted. "As Turkey, we have prepared a strategy document to facilitate trade between the D-8 countries and conveyed it to you."

The bloc has a target of achieving a trade volume of \$500 billion by 2023.

"We have made it clear that all sanctions that have been illegally imposed on Iran, re-imposed and re-labeled must be lifted at once, and Iran must approve the lifting of sanctions," he highlighted. "This is a very clear position of Iran, and not only is it logical, but it is a workable path for the full return of the United States to its commitments.'

"The United States has broken the deal and it has to fix it. They know what to do to repair this agreement. After four years of relentless economic war by the United States against the Iranian people, it is impossible for Iran to trust the United States," the spokesman said.

Khatibzadeh then stressed that it is Biden's administration that must change Trump's wrong path toward Iran. "It's logically up to the Biden administration to show everyone that it intends to reverse the course that Trump has taken [against Iran]. Remember that after the signing of the JCPOA in 2015, Iran was the first party to implement the deal and the agency confirmed after several fact-finding missions in 2016 that the United States had lifted sanctions against Iran, which did not happen even under Obama. But this time, the United States has to show to everyone, not just on paper, that it intends to reverse Trump's course and that it intends to implement the JCPOA fully and faithfully."

"Iran has paved the way for maintaining the JCPOA, and the United States knows exactly what steps Iran has taken to preserve the deal. The United States has to first lift all sanctions [against Iran] verifiably, and Iran is ready, based on its own trials, to not only halt its remedial measures taken in response to US sanctions but to reverse them. All the measures taken by Iran is actually reversible," he stressed.

"There were no direct or indirect talks in Vienna or anywhere else between Iran and the United States because there is no need for new talks as we negotiated in full detail about the JCPOA," Khatibzadeh said regarding some speculations about the possibility of direct talks between Iran and the United States," Khatibzadeh noted.

"What the P4 + 1 and Iran are currently doing in the framework of the JCPOA Joint Commission is to set out a complete list of sanctions that the United States should lift. The P4 + 1 has channels to talk to the United States to see what they are actually thinking. The United States should get that we can verify the fulfilment of its obligations. If the United States get back to the deal and on the JCPOA table, then the talks will continue. But until then, there would be no direct or indirect talks between the United States and Iran," he stressed.

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - Donovan Mitchell scored 37 points and Rudy Gobert contributed 18 points and 20 rebounds to lift the Utah Jazz to a big 122-103 win over the Portland Trail Blazers on Thursday night in Salt Lake City.

Utah snapped a two-game losing streak -- the NBA-leading Jazz had stumbled on the road at Dallas and Phoenix -- and secured its 23rd consecutive home victory.

Four other Jazz players scored in double figures -- Joe Ingles (13), Mike Conley and Bojan Bogdanovic (11), and Georges Niang (10) -- as Utah bounced back 24 hours after a tough overtime loss to the Suns.

Damian Lillard topped Portland with 23 points and CJ McCollum scored 19, but the Blazers fell for the third time in four games.

Mavericks 116, Bucks 101

Luka Doncic recorded 27 points, nine rebounds and nine assists to help host Dallas defeat Milwaukee for its sixth win in the past seven games.

Kristaps Porzingis added 26 points and 17 rebounds, and Josh Richardson scored 14 points for the Mavericks. The Bucks played without two-time reigning MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo (knee) for the third straight game and the fifth time in the past 10 contests. Donte DiVincenzo made a career best six 3-pointers and scored 22 points to lead the Bucks,

who have lost two straight games and five of their past eight. Bobby Portis recorded 20 points and a season-high 14 rebounds, and Brook Lopez added 16 points.

Pistons 113, Kings 101

Corv Joseph scored 24 points and dished seven assists as visiting Detroit held off a late Sacramento push.

Isaiah Stewart recorded 16 points and a game-high 13 rebounds for Detroit, which has alternated losses and wins over the past eight games. Sacramento took its fifth straight loss despite getting 23 points, nine rebounds and seven assists from De'Aaron Fox.

Detroit capitalized on a poor shooting night from the Kings, who finished 7 of 30 (23.3 percent) from beyond the 3-point arc. The Pistons built a big first-half lead that gave them a cushion down the stretch.

Heat 110, Lakers 104

Jimmy Butler scored a game-high-tying 28 points to lead host Miami past Los Angeles.



Miami also got 18 points from Victor Oladipo, who grabbed his right knee after a dunk with 5:35 left in the game. He immediately went to the locker room and did not return.

Kentavious Caldwell-Pope led the Lakers with a season-high 28 points. Andre Drummond returned for the Lakers and notched 15 points and 12 rebounds after missing the past three games with a toe injury.

Clippers 113, Suns 103

Los Angeles ran its home record to 20-8 this season, pushing past Phoenix in a battle of the second- and third-place teams in the Western Conference standings.

Paul George led the Clippers with 33 points on 12-of-19 shooting, including 7-of-9 success from 3-point range. Kawhi Leonard scored 14 of his 27 points in the third quarter for the Clippers, who saw Patrick Beverley and Marcus Morris Sr. get ejected in the fourth quarter. Devin Booker finished with 24 points to lead the Suns. Mikal Bridges added 20 points, and Deandre Ayton chipped in 18 points and 10 rebounds.

Bulls 122, Raptors 113

Lauri Markkanen, Coby White and Daniel Theis came off the bench to provide double-figure scoring performances as Chicago used superior depth to thrash short-handed Toronto in Tampa.

Starters Zach LaVine and Nikola Vucevic led seven Bulls in double figures with 22 points apiece as Chicago won its third straight game.

The Bulls clinched the three-game season series despite a huge game from the Raptors' Chris Boucher, who set career highs with 38 points and 19 rebounds. Pascal Siakam had 27 points for Toronto, which played without injured starters Kyle Lowry

ONDON (Reuters) - He has Lalready sampled the life of a singer at Italy's Sanremo music festival, and AC Milan striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic will now turn his hand to acting after being cast in a new Asterix and Obelix film.

Reports that the Swede would take a role in 'Asterix and Obelix: The Silk Road' appeared to be confirmed when Ibrahimovic posted a picture saying 'Antivirus' on his Instagram page, the name of the character he will play.

The 39-year-old appeared at Italy's Sanremo festival in March, where he sang a duet with Bologna coach Sinisa Mihajlovic and said he would like to try acting.

But the news that he would be cast in the Asterix film, directed by Guillaume Canet and scheduled for release in 2022, came as a surprise.

The striker is Milan's top scorer with 17 goals in all competitions this season and he is yet to agree a new contract, with his current deal set to expire at the end of the campaign.



ONDON (Dispatches) - Jannik Sinner's Lrun to the Miami Masters final has fuelled hopes of a new era for Italian men's tennis with, for the first time this week, 10 players ranked in the ATP Top 100. No Italian had reached the final in the ATP

Masters 1000 tournament in North America before Sinner, with their previous best Fabio Fognini's semi-final appearance in Miami back in 2017

The 19-year-old Sinner became the second-youngest Miami finalist after Rafael Nadal in 2005, rising this week to 23rd in the world rankings, just the sixth teen since 2010 to break into the Top 30.

Sinner is the third highest ranked Italian after world number 10 Matteo Berrettini and 18th-ranked Fognini.

They are followed by Lorenzo Sonego (34), Stefano Travaglia (69), Salvatore Caruso (87), Lorenzo Musetti (90), Gianluca Mager (91), Marco Cecchinato (93) and Andreas Seppi (96).

After his break-through in 2019, winning the ATP Challenger title in Bergamo and the NextGen ATP finals in Milan, Sinner has claimed two titles and reached the Roland Garros quarter-final on his debut in 2020.

The highest an Italian man has ever been ranked was their only Grand Slam winner Adriano Panatta, who reached a career-high world number four in August 1976 after his French Open triumph.

Only France and Spain have more players in the top 100 with 11 each, but they have much older average age whereas five of the 'Azzurri' are under 26 years, and two are teenagers.

Eight of France's players are over 30 and six of Spain's compared to two of Italy's Fognini, 33, and Seppi, 37.

Ex-NFL Player Fatally Shot South Carolina **Doctor, Four Others**

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - A former professional football player shot and killed a prominent South Carolina doctor, his wife, two grandchildren and another man before taking his own life at his home a short distance away, authorities said.

Phillip Adams, 32, who left the National Football League more than five years ago, was found dead hours after the killings of five people on Wednesday at the home of Dr. Robert Lesslie in suburban Rock Hill, South Carolina, York County Sheriff Kevin Tolson said. Investigators were at a loss to offer a motive for the shooting spree that broke out in the quiet community about 30 miles (48 km) south of Charlotte, North Carolina.

"We have probably more questions than you do right now," Tolson told reporters at a briefing. There was no indication that Adams had any relationship with Lesslie or his family, Tolson said.

The sheriff said two weapons were used in the violence, a .45-caliber and a 9mm.

Adams died from a single gunshot to the head at his home a short distance from the murder scene, where he lived with his father, as police closed in hours after the shootings, officials said.

As a player, Adams had a six-year NFL career as a defensive back with five teams, finishing with the Atlanta Falcons in 2015. He attended South Carolina State University and was selected in the seventh round of the 2010 draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Adams' father, Alonzo Adams, blamed the shooting outburst on football.

Toni Nadal Returns To Tour to Work With Auger-Aliassime

MADRID (Dispatches) - Toni Nadal, the man who masterminded nephew Rafa's incredible career, is returning to the Tour as part of the coaching team of Canadian youngster Felix Auger-Aliassime.

Nadal, 60, decided to step down as Rafa's coach in 2017 and concentrate on running the Rafa Nadal Academy in Mallorca.

Barty Advances To Quarter-finals In Charleston

World number one Ashleigh Barty defeated hometown favourite Shelby Rogers 7-6 (7/3), 4-6, 6-4 in the third round of the WTA clay court tournament in Charleston, South Carolina. Barty moves on to the quarter-finals where she will face Spain's Paula Badosa, a 6-3, 6-3 winner over Caty McNally of the US. "Shelby's an exceptional ball-striker, she always makes you work very hard for every single point, every single match, and tonight was no different," said Barty. The Australian from Ipswich arrived in Charleston fresh off a victory in the prestigious Miami Open, where she successfully defended a WTA title for the first time.

After a first-round bye she made a quick adjustment to the green clay of Charleston, needing just 61 minutes to dispatch Japan's 77th-ranked Misaki Doi, 6-2, 6-1.

Unseeded Danka Kovinic of Montenegro, ranked 91st in the world, toppled two-time Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova, the third seed, 6-4, 6-1 to reach the quarters.

"We both have pretty big serves and she's very good hitting from the baseline," Kovinic said. "Today it was the key that I tried, and did it really well, to take her pace of the ball and use her energy. As you can see, her returns on my second serve were sometimes incredible -- I didn't even move and the ball passed by me, but somehow I managed." Kovinic broke twice for a 5-1 lead in the second set, then served out the victory with four straight service winners.

Boateng's Confirmed Exit Sparks Tension At Bayern Munich

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Bayern Munich have confirmed 32-year-old centre-back Jerome Boateng will leave when his contract expires at the end of the season, but the decision has sparked obvious tensions behind the scenes.



Bayern have already signed France centre-back Dayot Upamecano, 22, from Bundesliga rivals RB Leipzig for the 2021/22 season, effectively hastening Boateng's departure.

"That was a joint decision of the club management and the coach was also involved," sports director Hasan Salihamidzic told Sky.

"I explained that to Jerome, he understood."

Boateng was at fault for Paris Saint-Germain's winning goal as Bayern's 19-match unbeaten run in the Champions League ended as they lost 3-2 in Wednesday's quarter-final, first leg. He struggled to mark Kylian Mbappe when the fleet-footed 22-year-old scored the visitors' crucial third goal at the Allianz Arena with the return to come in Paris on Tuesday. Behind the scenes, confirmation of Boateng's exit is causing tension.

On Tuesday, head coach Hansi Flick spoke out in favour of keeping the 2014 World Cup winner, saying "everyone knows how I feel about Jerome and what quality he has".

Although Salihamidzic later said Flick agreed with the decision, Bayern's head coach suggested otherwise in the press conference after Wednesday's defeat. Flick refused to answer when asked if it was the right decision to let Boateng leave, saying: "I have to answer the questions here professionally, but I don't have to answer everything because I don't want to."
