GC Warns Presidential Hopefuls On Early Campaigning

TEHRA – The Guardian Council spokesman said that would-be candidates in the June 18 presidential poll should not be campaigning before the election officially begins when the council announces those approved to run.

Abbasali Kadkhodaei said that infringements could affect the council's considerations of who would be deemed eligible. Speaking to IRIB radio, Kadkhodaei said the council had extended by five days its timetable for vetting hopefuls who had registered and would announce its decision on May 26. This will leave approved candidates less than three weeks before campaigns close on June 16.

Kadkhodaei criticized those who, after registering, were already active presenting their credentials in speeches and on social media. "This, we believe, is against the law," he said.

Among presidential hopefuls recently seeking limelight have been former president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, who has been rallying supporters around the country, and former parliament speaker Ali Larijani who Thursday answered questions from activists and journalists, both from inside Iran and abroad, in a three-hour-long session audio-chat on the Clubhouse application. Approved candidates, usually between four to six, are given airtime on state-owned networks to campaign, including in a series of televised debates. Larijani's interest in the Clubhouse session, where access requires an Iphone, might demonstrate a desire to appeal to intellectuals and perhaps concern over the impartiality of the state-owned broadcaster (IRIB). Larijani himself IRIB from 1994 to 2004.

IAEA No Longer to Access Images of Iran Nuclear Sites

TEHRAN – Majlis Speaker Mohammad Baqer Qalibaf says the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) will no longer access images of the Iranian nuclear sites because a monitoring deal with the UN nuclear body has expired.

"From May 22 and with the end of the three-month agreement, the agency will have no access to data collected by cameras inside the nuclear facilities agreed under the agreement, and cannot transfer them," Qalibaf told the parliament Sunday.

He said the Majlis is determined to implement its Strategic Action Plan to Counter Sanctions, which has tasked the administration with suspending extra commitments under the 2015 nuclear deal.

The decision, Qalibaf said, is backed by Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei. "Yesterday it was discussed and the decision was made. The law passed by the Parliament will be implemented.

The Leader has underlined the importance of this issue as well," Qalibaf said. Last December, Iranian lawmakers overwhelmingly voted in favor of the Strategic Action Plan to Counter Sanctions.

The law tasked the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) with producing and storing at least 120 kilograms of enriched uranium with a 20-percent purity level every year and raising enrichment beyond 20 percent according to the country's needs.

In February, Iran and the IAEA reached a technical understanding under which Iran agreed to keep the camera footage of its nuclear sites for three months in a goodwill gesture, waiting to see if the other parties to the nuclear deal can bring the US back into full compliance with the accord.

That deadline expired on Saturday, with the prospects of bringing Washington back to compliance with the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), as the nuclear deal is officially known, looking uncertain.

Deputy Foreign Minister Abbas Araqchi, who is the head of the Iranian delegation to the Vienna talks, told Japan's NHK channel on Friday that the Islamic Republic may consider extending the deal with the IAEA on inspection of its nuclear sites.

Iran's chief negotiator says Tehran's resumption of the voluntary implementation of the Additional Protocol is "predicated" on the lifting of sanctions.

IAEA Director General Rafael Grossi was going to hold a news conference later on Sunday.

Macro Drivers Signal Higher Oil Prices in 2022

DUBAI (Dispatches) - While big macro drivers-including a weaker USD, inflation and monetary easing all point to higher oil prices in 2022, micro headwinds (Iran, India's 2nd wave) may fade in the second half 2021, according to a new a BofA Global Research report.

A post-Covid scenario marked by a permanent reduction in mass transit use could quickly translate into a major world-wide oil demand rationing exercise. Even if electric vehicle (EV) sales reach 34% by 2030, an acceleration in miles driven of 20% could push peak oil demand levels to 109 million barrels per day (b/d) by 2027.

On the supply side, oil field decline rates have accelerated sharply in 2020 and in early 2021. Plus energy capex has come down sharply in the past year and now the IEA is calling for further investment reductions to meet climate goals. Reflecting a tighter market ahead, Brent in 2026 recently traded above \$59 per barrel (/bbl) last week, up from a 2020 low of \$47/bbl.

"With spec oil positions relatively low and CO2 prices rising too, we see room for long-dated oil prices to move structurally higher by \$5 to \$10/bbl," the BofA Global Research report said.

While a Covid-19 surge in India has depressed mobility, the link between Covid-19 cases and fuel consumption is starting to break down around the world. In part, workplace mobility is picking up thanks to the global vaccination campaign. For instance, despite a resurgence in Covid-19 cases in countries like Chile, the UAE, or Bahrain (nations with some of the highest vaccination levels in the world), hospitalization and death rates have stayed low. So mobility has kept improving there.

With global transportation demand set to recover sequentially, the upcoming new Iran nuclear deal could be the next bump in the recovery path for oil prices.

"Even then, we see three mitigating factors: (1) a return of Iran is already embedded into our global oil balances, (2) Opec+ will likely act to accommodate the comeback one of its largest members, and (3) Iranian output is already nearing 2.4 million b/d anyway, up 0.36 million b/d YoY," the BofA Global Research report said.

Iran to Continue Vienna Talks Till Clinching Agreement

TEHRAN (MNA) – President Hassan Rouhani said on Sunday that the Islamic Republic will continue JCPOA talks in Vienna until reaching a multilateral agreement. Referring to the recent talks in Vienna, Rouhani said that the other sides have explicitly stated their readiness to lift anti-Iranian sanctions in accordance with the JCPOA.

Emphasizing the victory of the Iranian nation in the economic war, he noted that: "Production growth figures in various industrial sectors of the country are the best evidence of the fruitlessness of the US policy of maximum pressure." The talks in Vienna on restoring Iran's nuclear deal (JCPOA) are reportedly expected to be completed in the first days of June.

Iran is engaged in talks with the remaining parties to the nuclear deal (JCPOA) known as the P4+1 to salvage the deal in the Austrian capital of Vienna. At the end of the fourth round of Vienna talks a few days ago, the head of the Iranian delegation at the talks Abbass Araghchi said that "Very good progress was made," though, he added there are still issues remaining to be agreed upon.

Iran has vowed already that it will leave the Vienna talks if it feels they are taking time and the other parties are not serious and are just killing the time.

Iran Hosting Afghan Refugees Over Four Decades

TEHRAN - United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees says Iran has focused on supporting Afghan refugees for more than 40 years.

Attending a press conference during his visit to Iran on Sunday morning, UNHCR deputy director Indrika Ratwatee has added that many refugees have returned to their homelands through Iran's efforts.

Iran has faced many challenges in hosting Afghan refugees since it has been a transit route for Afghans due to Iran's geographical condition.

"Iran has vaccinated above 70-year-old Afghan refugees like all other Iranians, although they have difficulties in the last 15 months challenging with the COVID-19 pandemic," UNHCR deputy director said.

Another speaker of the session, Director General of Bureau for Aliens and Foreign Immigrants Affairs of the Interior Ministry Mahdi Mahmoudi, said that Iran did its best so that Afghan refugees would return to their homes respectfully.

He went on to say that over two million legal Afghan refugees had been registered, though illegal ones are reported to the police.

"In 20 immigrant cities, Iran has provided all necessary equipment for Afghan refugees, including healthcare and education, and more than 523,000 Afghans are

He also said that amid the spread of coronavirus, Afghan refugees have quarantined in their immigrant cities and have been trained to observe health protocols.

Mahmoudi highlighted that all of the Afghan schools have been closed and virtual training began for them like other Iranian students.

"Iran has received some aid from international unions and has distributed them among Afghan refugees," he noted.

"Those refugees who have lost their jobs due to the coronavirus pandemic have received financial aid from Iran," Mahmoudi added.

Referring to refugees' return to their homeland, Mahmoudi said that Afghan refugees will be supported by Iran's government and United Nations so that they can learn a profession and create job opportunities in their country after returning.

"Also, through agreements with the Ministry of Science, Afghan students can continue their education in Afghanistan," he concluded.

Official Warns of Possible 5th Wave of Coronavirus in Iran

TEHRAN (IFP) - The Iranian Coronavirus Headquarters has sounded the alarm over a possible fifth surge in the disease. The warning comes despite a relative drop in the number of infections and deaths.

"All provinces across the country, especially 28 ones, are seeing a downward trend in terms of the spread of the coronavirus," said Alireza Raisi, the spokesman for the headquarters. "We have passed the fourth peak of the coronavirus outbreak," he added. "In two weeks' time, the number of [daily] deaths [from coronavirus] will drop below 200 people, but there

is a possibility of a fifth surge in the disease," he said. The spokesman underlined that a travel ban may be imposed for the holiday period in early June in order to create a safer atmosphere for the upcoming presidential election in terms of coronavirus infection. "If there are Covid patients among voters, mobile ballots boxes should be used for them, so that they

will not be deprived of the right to vote," he noted. He said voting should take place in open spaces as much as possible to contain a possible rise in the

disease as a result of being in closed spaces. "There is no need for using stamps and fingerprinting on the election day," he said.

Resistance Victory Big Lessen for Israeli Regime

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Minister of Defense and Armed Forces Logistics Brigadier General Amir Hatami said on Sunday that the recent victory of the Resistance gave a big lessen to the Israeli regime and taught them to take care of themselves instead of carrying out terror operations in Iran.

Speaking on the sidelines of Parliament Speaker's visit from defense industry exhibition, Brigadier General Hatami said that the Islamic Republic of Iran is in an unprecedented position today partly due to its defense industry.

Resistance Turned the Tables On Israeli Enemy in 12 Days

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Religious teachers at the northcentral Iranian city of Qom's internationally-renowned Seminary hail how the Gaza Strip's resistance movements turned the fortunes of war against the Israeli regime during Tel Aviv's recent escalation against the coastal territory.

Society of Seminary Teachers of Qom that represents the educators made the remarks in a Saturday statement, saying the movements managed to "turn the tables on the Zionist regime [of Israel]" during the warfare.

killing an injuring Afghan student, saying security cooperation between the regional




countries, especially Iran and Uzbekistan, can help resolve tensions in the region, establish stability and security in Afghanistan, and fight extremist groups.

NIDC Digs 17 Oil, Gas Wells in 2 Months

TEHRAN (MNA) - National Iranian Drilling Company (NIDC) dug and completed digging operation of 17 oil and gas wells during the first two months of the current Iranian calendar year (March 21- May 21), an official with the company said

According to Babak Zanganeh, director of consolidated planning at NIDC, the drilled wells consisted of four development and appraisal wells, and 13 workover ones.

The official stated that 15 of the mentioned wells, including four development and 11 workover wells were drilled in the operational zone of the National Iranian South Oil Company (NISOC) while two wells were drilled in the fields under the supervision of the Iranian Offshore Oil Company (IOOC).

NIDC owns 70 light, heavy and super-heavy drilling rigs, including 67 onshore drilling rigs and three offshore rigs, Zanganeh said. "Currently, 25 drilling rigs of the company are being relocated in the onshore operational areas of the country", he added.

NIDC managed to carry out 10,182 meters of horizontal and directional drilling in 43 oil and gas wells across the country during the previous Iranian calendar year (ended on March 20), according to the Head of NIDC's Special Operations Department Ali Daqayeqi.

Some 654 meters of core extraction drilling was also conducted in the mentioned period which was a huge achievement for assessing the condition of the country's oil and gas reserves.

Bolsonaro Fined for Breaking Covid-19 Restrictions

RIO DE JANEIRO (AFP) - President Jair Bolsonaro must pay a fine for failing to adhere to state health safety regulations at a public event, the governor of Maranhao state said, as Brazil struggles to contain the Covid-19 pandemic.

Health authorities filed the case against Bolsonaro "for the promotion in Maranhao of gatherings with no sanitary safeguards. The law applies to everyone," the governor of the northeastern state, leftist Flavio Dino, tweeted late Friday. Dino reminded the public that gatherings of more than 100 people are banned in his state, and the use of face masks is mandatory.

Palestinian Solidarity Protests Held Around the World



LONDON (Dispatches) - Pro-Palestine solidarity marches are being held around the world in a continuation of weeklong demonstrations, with protesters demanding their respective governments impose sanctions and a military embargo to cut the supply of weapons to Israel.

Israel's 11-day bombardment of Gaza killed nearly 250 Palestinians, including at least 65 children, leaving behind many buildings, homes and infrastructure destroyed in the besieged enclave.

The fighting came to an end after the Israeli government and Palestinian fighter groups agreed on a ceasefire that started on Friday.

The Sheikh Jarrah protests against forced expulsion of Palestinians by Israeli settlers in East Jerusalem, and the Israeli attack on Muslim worshippers in the Al-Aqsa Mosque, the third holiest site in Islam, during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, served as a catalyst for Israel's attacks in Gaza. Protests were held in London, Melbourne and Paris on Saturday, while more of them were scheduled for the weekend in other big cities, including New York.

"There is a sentiment that the conflict should not be forgotten," he said.



COVID-19 Deaths in Latin America Surpass 1m as Outbreak Worsen 🛐

LONDON (Reuters) - The death toll from COVID-19 in Latin America and the Caribbean passed 1 million people on Friday, according to a Reuters tally, with the pandemic worsening in the part of the world with the highest per capita death rate.

From the dusty highlands of Bolivia to the Brazilian metropolis of São Paulo, the pandemic has swamped underfunded healthcare systems after spreading fast across nations where many people survive hand-to-mouth and have been unable to enter lockdown.

In Peru, among the hardest hit nations in the region, COVID-19 patients have died in crowded hospital corridors of the capital Lima. Deep in the Amazon jungles of Brazil, many residents of the city of Manaus have died at home with no oxygen to fill damaged lungs, after supplies ran out there this year.


With cases falling in Europe, Asia and North America, and flat in Africa, South America is the only region where new infections are rising rapidly on a per capita basis, according to Our World in Data. Although India is currently struggling through one of the world's worst outbreaks of the pandemic.

On average in May, 31% of the COVID-19 deaths in the world have been in Latin America and the Caribbean home to just 8.4% of the global population. Doctors and epidemiologists say the coronavirus pandemic took unprepared governments by surprise last year and its impact has been worsened by leaders who downplayed its gravity and failed to secure timely vaccine supplies.

The top eight countries registering the most COVID-19 deaths per capita over the past week were all in Latin America.

Suu Kyi Will Soon Appear in Court

YANGON (Dispatches) Myanmar's junta leader Min Aung Hlaing said deposed leader Aung San Suu Kyi was healthy at home and would appear in court in a few days, in his first nterview since overthrowing her in a Feb. 1 coup.



Suu Kyi, a Nobel Peace Prize laureate for her long struggle against previous military rulers, is among more than 4,000 people detained since the coup. She faces charges that range from illegally possessing walkie-talkie radios to violating a state secrets law.

"Daw Aung San Suu Kyi is in good health. She is at her home and healthy. She is going to face trial at the court in a few days," Min Aung Hlaing said by video link with the Hong Kong-based Chinese language broadcaster Phoenix Television on May 20, in excerpts released on Saturday.

> The interviewer asked him what he thought of the performance of Suu Kyi, 75, who is widely admired in the country of 53 million for her campaign that had brought tentative democratic reforms which were cut short by the coup.

"She tried all she could," Min Aung Hlaing responded.

He reiterated that the army had seized power because it had identified fraud in an election won by Suu Kyi's party in November - although its accusations were rejected by the then election commission.



"Instead of preparing for the pandemic, we minimized the disease, saying the tropical heat would deactivate the virus," said Dr. Francisco Moreno Sanchez. head of the COVID-19 program at one of Mexico's main hospitals and a critic of the government's vaccination plan.

"Unfortunately, we are among the most-affected regions, where the handling of the pandemic has been the most mistaken, and now we are suffering the consequences," the epidemiologist told Reuters.

With the death toll steadily mounting, grave diggers in several countries have been forced to expand cemeteries with row after row of new tombs. In a break with the region's predominantly Catholic traditional culture, dead are often buried with few or no relatives there to say goodbye.

Most of the deaths - more than 446,000 - have occurred in Brazil, which became a coronavirus epicenter this year with the second-deadliest outbreak outside the United States, though it appears likely to be surpassed soon by India. Brazil recorded 2.215 new deaths from COVID-19 in 24 hours, the Health Ministry said on Friday, pushing Latin America's total to over 1 million COVID-19 fatalities.

Nepal President Dissolves Parlia<mark>ment</mark>

KATHEMANDU (Dispatches) - Nepal has plunged into fresh political turmoil as President Bidya Devi Bhandari dissolved parliament and fixed general elections in November amid a worsening COVID-19 outbreak.



Saturday's surprise announcement comes after a presidential statement said neither the caretaker Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli, nor opposition leader Sher Bahadur Deuba were able to demonstrate a majority to form a new government by the Friday deadline set by Bhandari.

"The president has dissolved the House of Representatives and ordered the first phase of general elections on November 12 and the second phase on November 19," a presidential statement issued after midnight said.

It said the decision was made on the recommendation of the cabinet headed by caretaker Prime Minister Oli, whose December 2020 dissolution of parliament sparked weeks of protests and was reversed by the Supreme Court as unconstitutional in February.

There was no immediate comment from political parties about the latest move.

Nepal is battling a deadly second wave of the pandemic and is reporting 8,207 new infections on average each day.

World Bank Official Welcomes Uzbekistan's **Commitment to Continue Market Reforms**

TASHKENT (Dispatches) - Anna Bjerde, World Bank Vice President for Europe and Central Asia, paid her first official visit to Uzbekistan on May 14-18. Ms. Bjerde met with the President of Uzbekistan, Shavkat Mirziyoyev, senior government and parliamentary officials, representatives of civil society and the private sector, and international development partners.

"The World Bank welcomes the Government's plans to continue a transparent and inclusive market transition and implement difficult but much-needed market reforms, despite the COVID-19 crisis. We will further support the reform agenda through our new Country Partnership Framework. It will define priority areas for the Bank's financing and advisory services from 2022 to 2026 and will be aligned with Uzbekistan's next development strategy," said Ms. Bjerde. The World Bank Vice President had productive talks with

President Shavkat Mirziyoyev, Chairperson of the Senate of Oliy Majlis (Parliament) Tanzila Narbaeva, First Deputy Chairperson of the Senate of Oliy Majlis Sodiq Safoyev, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Economic Development and Poverty Reduction Jamshid Kuchkarov, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Investments and Foreign Trade Sardor Umurzakov, and Minister of Finance Timur Ishmetov.

The discussions focused on the Government's efforts to enact market reforms, reduce poverty and unemployment, raise the living standards of the population in rural areas, improve access to health, education, social protection, and water supply services, create conditions conducive for private sector-led growth, and improve the business and investment climate.

The parties also considered the progress Uzbekistan has achieved in the areas of reforming public institutions, state-owned enterprises, financial, energy, transport, and other economic sectors, eliminating forced labor and reducing gender inequality, introducing a green growth model, and expanding trade and transport connectivity across Central Asia.

Ms. Bjerde participated in a signing ceremony for World Bank loans totaling \$289 million and a Swiss State Secretariat for Economic Affairs grant of \$7.8 million. The financing will allow the Government to implement projects on improving access to water supply and sanitation services for 500,000 people in three regions of Uzbekistan, and developing a market-oriented National Innovation System.

During her visit to Tashkent, the World Bank Vice President also met with representatives of civil society, the private sector, and international development partners to discuss how the Bank can work more effectively with these stakeholders to help the Government continue important reforms.

Uzbekistan was one of four countries in Ms. Bjerde's first official visit to Central Asia. She also visited the Kyrgyz Republic, Kazakhstan and Tajikistan. Ms. Bjerde, a Swedish national, became the World Bank Vice President for Europe and Central Asia on May 1, 2020. In this position, she leads the Bank's strategic, analytical, operational, and knowledge work in the region.

The World Bank supports Uzbekistan through technical assistance and the financing of 24 projects totaling around \$4.3 billion. These projects provide support in critical areas such as macroeconomic reforms, agriculture, health, education, water supply and sanitation,

U.S. Manufacturing Accelerates

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - U.S. factory activity gathered speed in early May amid strong domestic demand, but backlogs of uncompleted work are piling up as manufacturers struggle to find raw materials and labor, boosting costs for both businesses and consumers.

Though other data on Friday showed sales of previously owned homes dropping to a 10-month low in April



as an acute shortage of houses drove prices to a record high, they remained well above their pre-pandemic level. The housing market and manufacturing have led the economy's recovery from the COVID-19 recession, which started in February 2020.

"The economic recovery continues," said Daniel Silver, an economist at JPMorgan in New York. Data firm IHS Markit said its flash U.S. manufacturing PMI increased to 61.5 in the first half of this month. That was the highest reading since October 2009, and followed a final reading of 60.5 in April. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast the index dipping to 60.2 in early May.

A reading above 50 indicates growth in manufacturing, which accounts for 11.9% of the U.S. economy. Demand shifted to goods from services as the pandemic kept Americans at home, causing supply constraints. The virus also disrupted labor at manufacturers and their suppliers, leading to raw material shortages across industries.

More than a third of the population has been vaccinated, allowing the broader economy to reopen. While that, together with nearly \$6 trillion in pandemic relief provided by the government over the past year, is unleashing pent-up demand for services, appetite for goods remains healthy.

According to IHS Markit "manufacturers highlighted that strain on capacity and raw material shortages are expected to last through 2021." It noted that the supply crunch was

Bangladesh Outpaces India on Per Capita Income

DHAKA (Dispatches) - One of the most densely populated countries in the world, Bangladesh has been pattling poverty and under-development for almost five decades

When Bangladesh emerged as an independent country in 1971, it was arguably the poorest country in the vorld or close to it.

Today, the country is growing rapidly and ranks ahead of its big neighbour India.

Planning Minister of Bangladesh MA Mannan informed the country's cabinet that the per capita income f Bangladesh has now increased from \$2,064 to \$2,227.

Bangladesh's per capita income is now \$280 higher than India's per capita income which is \$1,947. "Our per capita income stands at \$2,227 in the fiscal year 2020-21, but the previous fiscal year's per capita ncome was \$2,064. So, the growth rate is 9%," said Bangladesh's Cabinet Secretary Khandker Anwarul slam while briefing reporters.

In 2007, the per capita income of Bangladesh was half of that of India.

Japan's Consumer Prices in April Down for 9th Straight Month

TOKYO (Dispatches) - Japan's core consumer prices fell for the ninth straight month in April as a record slump in cellphone fees offset rising energy prices, suggesting that weak demand and higher costs will weigh on a fragile economic recovery. Separate data showed firms facing rising input costs and a slower expansion in factory activity

in May, highlighting risks to an economy heavily reliant on the manufacturing sector.

The data underscores the challenge policymakers face in combating a resurgence in Covid-19 infections without hobbling an economy already lagging other major trading partners emerging from the pandemic-induced slump.

"Inflation fell in April but that was almost entirely due to a plunge in mobile phone tariffs," said Tom Learmouth, Japan economist at Capital Economics. "Looking past temporary government data showed on Friday and in line with March's decline.

charges knocked 0.5 per cent off core CPI, the data showed, as carriers heeded Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga's calls to ease the burden on households.

The au Jibun Bank Flash Japan Manufacturing Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) weakened to a seasonally adjusted 52.5 in May from a final 53.6 in April. The PMI survey showed overall output posted the weakest monthly expansion since February, in a sign the state of emergency curbs in Tokyo and other major areas were taking a toll on manufacturers.

This growth in a period in which Covid placed a huge challenge to the economy is extremely gratifying," minister for planning Asad Umar tweeted. Yesterday, the ministry also revised down GDP growth for the financial year that ended on June 30, 2020, to -0.47 per cent, from -0.38 per cent.

The IMF has estimated GDP for 2020/21 growing 1.5 per cent and the World Bank estimates growth of 1.3 per cent. Prime Minister Imran Khan's government is weeks away from presenting its annual budget which faces tough challenges on the fiscal deficit and an ambitious revenue collection target.

Due to a combination of GDP growth and strengthening of the Pakistani rupee against the dollar, Pakistan's per capita income jumped by 13.4 per cent this year from US\$1,361 to US\$1,543, Umar said.

Total GDP increased from US\$263 billion to US\$296 billion, the highest increase recorded in any year, he said. The South Asian nation of 220 million people got into a US\$6 billion IMF stabilisation programme in 2019 months after Khan's government delayed it.

Pakistan's Finance Minister Shaukat Tarin has said the country is in talks with the IMF to seek easing of "tough conditions" on the loan.

GDP growth was 5.8 per cent before Khan took power in 2018 with inflation below 4 per cent, which was recorded in double digit last month. Some US\$2.5 billion of borrowing in international bond markets and historically high remittances have recently given some breathing space.

Turkish Consumers' Confidence in Economy Down in May

ANKARA (Dispatches) - The consumer confidence index in Turkey slipped on a monthly basis to 77.3 in May for the second month in a row, the country's statistical institute said.

May's confidence index, jointly calculated by TurkStat and the Central Bank of the Republic of Turkey (CBRT) through the measurement of consumer tendencies, decreased 3.6% from April.

The consumer confidence index, calculated from survey results, is evaluated within the range of 0-200, indicating optimism when the index is above 100 and pessimism when below.

All sub-indices deteriorated this month, with the financial situation expectation of households index struggling the most.



The sub-index fell 5.5%, suggesting that fewer people were expecting a better financial situation in the next 12 months.

The general economic situation expectation over the coming 12 months decreased 4.9% month-on-month in May. The financial situation of the household index at present compared to the past 12 month period slipped 3.8% during the same period.

The index for assessment on spending money on durable goods over the next 12 months posted a slight decrease of 0.7% from last month.

The monthly survey measures consumers' assessments and expectations on financial standing and the general economic situation, as well as their expenditure and saving tendencies.

India Remains Greatest Rising Power Despite Covid-19 Tragedy

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - India remains the "greatest rising power" on the planet and has a number of fundamental strengths that will make it one of the "most powerful" countries in the world, according to report

Despite the damage caused by the record rise in COVID-19 cases, India remains the "greatest rising power" on the planet and has a number of fundamental strengths that will make it one of the "most powerful" countries in the world, according to report published in a Saudi daily. Rebuffing critics of India's handling of the pandemic, American foreign policy expert Dr John C Hulsman in an op-ed for Arab News has said that India's political power structure is stable and both Modi and the BJP are politically secure in a way that other "developing countries can only envy."

Due to a substantial rise in virus cases, India has witnessed a strain on its health infrastructure and subsequent rebuke from some sections of the western media.

Hulsman has argued that the analytical danger is to look at India's tragic problems of today, but not at the enduring changes lying beneath the surface that will continue to make it the "greatest rising power" in the world.

"First, India's political power structure is remarkably stable. Surprising most of the foreign policy commentariat (but in line with my firm's political risk predictions), the BJP actually gained seats during the May 2019 national parliamentary elections," the American expert said.

"Coupled with these political advantages, India's demography affords it a mighty relative advantage. It is projected to surpass China as the world's most populous nation by 2024. Crucially, more than 50 percent of India's population is below the age of 25 and 65 percent is under the age of 35," he added.

Pointing to India's sturdy figures, the foreign policy expert said that economic numbers "simply do not lie." "By 2050, it is estimated that India will account for a startling 15 percent of global gross domestic product (GDP). Coming out of the COVID-19 economic abyss, the subcontinent is set for a golden era of renewed growth," Dr Hulsman said.



He also reminded how the International Monetary Fund estimates India's economy is on course to grow by an impressive 11.5 percent this year, which is the only major global economy predicted to experience double-digit growth.

"Long-term political stability and an economic and demographic lift off already in progress make the essentials of India strikingly clear. This is the rising power in today's world -- one that will only grow in importance as the years progress."

There will often be chaos on the surface but India's enduring and essential political risk trajectory is decisively favorable, the expert concluded.

Eurozone Economy Booms as Virus Restrictions Recede



LONDON (Dispatches) - Eurozone business activity is growing at its fastest rate in three years as Europe's economy steadily reopens after months of Covid-19 restrictions.

According to a survey published on Friday, business activity in the eurozone is growing at its fastest rate in three years, as Europe's economy steadily reopens after months of Covid-19 restrictions.

The closely-watched study compiled by economic data group IHS Markit indicated that the jump in demand was even overwhelming the economy, with factories and businesses unable to keep up with record demands.

According to the data, "order inflows surged to an extent not seen for almost 15 years", the report said.

The firm's PMI index, one of the earliest indicators for where the economy is heading, said activity rose from 53.8 in April to a strong 56.9 in May, above the 50-point level that indicates growth.

Growth would have been "even stronger" had it not been for supply chain delays and difficulties restarting businesses quickly enough to meet demand. Among the countries, IHS Markit said France, where the pandemic downturn was deep, grew "especially sharply". Germany also saw strong output, although "the manufacturing sector saw growth slow from the recent record pace of expansion thanks to supply chain bottlenecks," it said.

Hungary to Lead EU's Post-Covid Economic Rebound

BUDAPEST (Dispatches) - Hungary is poised to lead the European Union's post-pandemic economic rebound, Finance Minister Mihály Varga said after meeting his EU counterparts in Lisbon.

Hungary's vaccination drive and the government's economic response measures to the pandemic have given the country an advantage over its EU peers, the minister told MTI by phone.

Varga said he briefed his colleagues on the Hungarian government's economic protection measures aimed at fending off the effects of the pandemic, noting tax cuts, grants aimed at boosting investments, an extension of a moratorium on debt service payments and the job protection scheme.

The 2022 budget is devoted to relaunching Hungary's economy, Mihály Varga, the finance minister, said during a presentation of the draft budget to lawmakers on Wednesday. The opposition, on the other hand, criticized the plan "As a result of these measures, Hungary's unemployment rate has remained around 4 percent, compared with the EU average of 7.5 percent," he said.

Varga said Friday's meeting had vindicated the government's economic policy. The meeting's participants were in agreement that an expansionary fiscal policy similar to the one pursued by Hungary was needed to promote growth. "Tax cuts and reducing the budget deficit should come next," he said, adding, however, that there was a debate among European decision-makers as to when it was best to return to tighter policies.

Bank of Spain Hints at Faster Economic Growth in 2022

MADRID (Reuters) - Spain's economy is expected to bounce back in the second half after a slow start to 2021 and could grow more than expected next year driven by a delayed boost from EU recovery funds, Bank of Spain Chief Economist Oscar Arce told reporters.

In its latest economic outlook from March, the central bank expected gross domestic product, which last year slumped by a record 10.8% due to the COVID-19 pandemic, to expand by 6% in its central scenario this year and by 5.3% in 2022.

On Thursday, it said in an annual report that Spain's economic recovery also hinged on the progress of the COVID-19 vaccination campaign, the implementation of reforms in the labour market and pension system, as well as private consumption.

It also warned that the pace of recovery in international tourism, which in 2019 accounted for more than 12% of Spain's GDP and now represents just around 4%-5%, was still uncertain, clouding the prospects of an economic rebound.

Spain to 5.9% in 2021 and 6.8% in 2022, citing the projected impact of EU recovery funds, especially next year. Arce said the central bank's updated macroeconomic forecast in June would be more comparable to the Commission's view, but would not elaborate further.

"It is possible that, as this delay (in EU aid) occurs to some extent, we will implement less European funds in 2021, and possibly more in 2022, and this may be reflected in slightly less momentum this year and more in 2022," he said.

Such a delay may not necessarily be a bad thing if the funds were accompanied by a more thorough selection process of investment projects, Arce added.

Bank of Spain Governor Pablo Hernandez de Cos said that, while the Spanish economy would get a boost from EU funds, the consequences of the pandemic on the labour market and fiscal accounts would be felt for years.

UAE Creates 248,000 Jobs in Pandemic Year

DUBAI (Dispatches) - The UAE has once again proven its economic resilience by creating hundreds of thousands of jobs last year when the global economy was shrinking and international trade was on the decline.

Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice-President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, on Saturday disclosed that the emirate created nearly 248,000 jobs last year when millions of people were rendered jobless or unemployed due to the global economic slowdown because of the coronavirus pandemic.

GENEVA (Dispatches) - Norwegian young gun Casper Ruud has clinched his second ATP Tour title by winning the Gonet Geneva Open held at the Tennis Club de Genève. The 21-year-old, No. 3 seed of the ATP 250 clay-court tournament, defeated second favourite Denis Shapovalov 7-6(4), 6-4 in Saturday's singles final.

After a first-round bye, Ruud beat US-American Tennys Sandgren, Dominik Koepfer of Germany and Spaniard Pablo Andujar and dropped only one set en-route to the championship match. The World No. 21 withstood eight aces from Shapovalov and won 54 per cent of the total points played to seal victory in one hour and 41 minutes.

"It was a tough first set, it was very close," Ruud said. "We were both serving great so there weren't that many rallies after the serve on both sides because of the high level. But in the tie-break there were some rallies here and there... Happily for me I won the first set, and I think that gave me a little bit of confidence to calm down a little bit – not to relax, but to play more freely."

Following his maiden triumph in Buenos Aires, Argentina in February last year, Ruud pocketed €41,145 as well as 250 ATP Ranking points in western Switzerland.

Earlier in the day, John Peers from Australia and Michael Venus of New Zealand took the doubles title. The No. 2 seeds defeated Italian Simone Bolelli and Maximo Gonzalez from Argentina 6-2, 7-5. The encounter lasted one hour and 16 minutes. Meanwhile in Lyon, world number five Stefanos Tsitsipas came from a set down to

James Escapes Sanction Over Covid-19 Rule Breach

LOS ANGELES (Dispatches) - Los Angeles Lakers star LeBron James broke NBA rules regarding Covid-19 but will not face sanction over the protocol breach, US media reported Saturday.

Ranieri to End Managerial Soap Opera at Sampdoria

RomE (Dispatches) - Claudio Ranieri announced on Friday he will not coach Serie A club Sampdoria next season. Ranieri, who memorably guided outsiders Leicester City to the 2016 English Premier League title, took over the Genoa side in October 2019. "I would like to close the soap opera of my contract," Ranieri said on the club's website. "Today, I told the team that I will not stay another year, the conditions aren't right to stay." Madrid to the La Liga title on Saturday after Luis Suarez fired them to a 2-1 comeback win at Real Valladolid, which secured them the Spanish championship for the first time in seven years.

Valladolid took a shock lead in the 18th minute when Oscar Plano slotted past Jan Oblak to complete a sweeping counterattack after Yannick Carrasco had lost control of the ball following an Atletico corner.

Just as they had done in last week's comeback win over Osasuna, Atletico missed a series of clear opportunities but they drew level after a moment of magic from Angel Correa, who danced his way through the defence before arrowing into the bottom corner in the 57th minute.

Suarez then pounced on a giveaway by the Valladolid defence to score in the 67th and put Atletico on their way to a victory that would secure the title no matter what happened in Real Madrid's game at home to Villarreal.

Valladolid missed a couple of glaring opportunities down the other end while Geoffrey Kondogbia wasted a chance that would have given Atletico a more relaxing finish when he blasted into the side-netting.

Real Madrid ended up fighting their way back from a goal down to beat Villarreal 2-1 which meant they would have swiped the title from Atletico's hands if Valladolid had equalized thanks to a better head-to-head record.

However, Diego Simeone's side saw out the victory and wildly celebrated on the pitch.

"Atletico have had an incredible season despite all the difficulties we've had. We've been the most consistent team and we are champions," said Suarez.

The game was played behind closed doors like all of Atletico's matches this season although several hundred supporters cheered them on from outside the stadium.

Atletico finished top of the standings on 86 points while Real came second on 84. Valladolid finished 19th and were relegated to Spain's second division.

called for an overhaul of the international football calendar beyond 2024, insisting on a requirement to start with a "blank sheet of paper".

"Let me be very clear: the starting point is not 'the calendar is full and so nothing changes'," he told the 71st FIFA Congress.

"The starting point is the exact opposite of that. We have a blank sheet, we are open to take on board all views and opinions about how we can make the international calendar better." Infantino reiterated his intention to "find a date" for a Club World Cup which he wants to see extended to 24 teams, despite widespread opposition to the plan.

However, he argued at length Friday for FIFA to play a key role in rewriting the calendar. He said the organisation is the "only body" that "generates" and "redistributes" its revenues "around the world" unlike continental confederations and leagues.

"Let me explain," he added Friday.

"Today, big leagues generate billions in revenues from all over the world - and these revenues are distributed where? To the 18-20 clubs in their leagues, with a small percentage going in solidarity." He added: "The only body which is generating revenues from all over the world and redistributing and investing all over the world in solidarity is FIFA."

Meanwhile, there have been moves to push for a biennial World Cup, which is tempting for broadcasters but has angered national leagues and clubs who are seeing player burnout in an already packed calendar.

FIFA's football development chief Arsene Wenger suggested in March that the World Cup, the European Championship and other international tournaments be held every two years. It was an idea dubbed "unrealistic" by European Leagues, a body which groups 37 leagues and club associations in Europe, but still featured in a report carried out by Wenger and released last week.

Infantino has stayed vague on the concept, saying at the end of March that he was open to any ideas for the post-2024 football calendar and earlier this month promising "interesting discussions" on Wenger's proposals.
