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Vienna Talks to Be **Continued** as Long as Necessary

VIENNA - The head of the Iranian negotiating team in Vienna said that they need a lot of political, technical, and legal discussions and consultations, and they would continue these talks as long as necessary.

Seved Abbas Aragchi said that the other parties to the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) must assure the Islamic Republic of Iran what happened in the past (U.S. withdrawal from the agreement) will not be repeated in the future."

The head of the Iranian negotiating team in Vienna noted: "To achieve this, we need a lot of political, technical, and legal discussions and consultations, and we will continue these talks as long as necessary.'

"There are still many technical issues to reach a final agreement that need to be resolved," Araqchi said. He also predicted that talks in Vienna between

Tehran and other signatories to the 2015 nuclear deal on a potential revival of the accord are unlikely to conclude this week.

Araqchi said that the negotiations are not tied to the June 18 presidential election in Iran. See Page 7

TEHRAN - The value of Iran's non-oil exports stood at \$3.352 billion in the second month of the current Iranian calendar year (April 21-May 21) to register a 27.5-percent rise compared to the same month in the previous year, the spokesman of the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs Administration (IRICA) announced.

According to Ruhollah Latifi, Iran exported 8.579 million tons of non-oil commodities to foreign destinations in the mentioned month, IRNA reported.

The country's non-oil exports in the said month also increased by 3.3 percent and 13 percent in terms of weight and value, respectively, compared to the previous month, the official stated. See Page 7

"To Progress" Or "Not to Progress" This the Question

For weeks the talks on Iran's nuclear deal, the JCPOA, have resume in Vienna and the signatories of the deal are discussing the return of the U.S. to the JCPOA and everyday one party says something differently on the outcome of the talks.

Iran has determined its conditions for the return of the U.S. to the JCPOA and as the Supreme Leader of the Islamic Revolution has emphasized, the U.S. should remove all imposed sanctions against Iran in order that Iran could return to its JCPOA obligations. Despite Iran's crystal clear stand on this issue, the U.S. seems to play with words and sanctions and it is not ready to remove sanctions and it just thinks of partial removal of the sanctions. The most interesting thing is that every party in the deal claims of progress in the talks but nobody points to its details. Even Iranian negotiating team is talking about the progress, As the new round of the talks began on Saturday, the European Union, which coordinated the talks leading to conclusion of the 2015 nuclear agreement between Iran and world countries, claimed it is hopeful about underway talks that seek to remedy the U.S.'s sabotage against the deal. "We are making progress," EU representative Alain

Matton told reporters in Vienna. The talks started in the Austrian capital in April to potentially revive the accord that is officially known as

the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA). The U.S. left the deal illegally and unilaterally in 2018, returning the sanctions that the agreement had lifted. "But the negotiations are intense and a number of


issues [remain], including on how steps are to be implemented," Matton acknowledged.

His remarks were echoed by China's envoy to the United Nations in Vienna, Wang Qun, who said, "To a great extent, the major issues have been worked out as a matter of principle, though I think there are some fixes [left]."

Iran has roundly rejected the notion of any phasedout removal of the sanctions on the part of the U.S., saying Washington has to eliminate all of the measures in one go in a way that can be verifiable by Tehran.

It is only then, the Islamic Republic insists, that the country would reverse a set of remedial nuclear measures that it has been implementing since 2019 in return for the U.S. and others' non-commitment to the deal.

"The EU will continue with the talks with all the participants...and separately with the United States to find ways to get very close to a final agreement in the coming days," the European official said. See Page 7

China Says Small Groups Can't Rule World

BEIJING (Dispatches) - The Group of Seven's adoption of a controversial agenda against China has escalated tensions, drawing a stern rebuke from Beijing about outdated assumptions that small groups of countries could still rule and make decisions for the rest of the world.

Leaders of the so-called Group of Seven (G7) largest economies have adopted an openly hostile anti-China stance, including a US-proposed rival plan to counter China's multi-trillion-dollar Belt and Road initiative (BRI) by investing in infrastructure in developing countries.

The adoption of the Build Back Better World (B3W) project came after US President Joe Biden and other G7 leaders held their meeting in southwestern England on Saturday as part of attempts to confront China's surging economic and military rise over the past four decades.

"This is not just about confronting or taking on China," a senior official in the Biden administration said. "But until now we haven't offered a positive alternative that reflects our values, our standards and our way of doing business." See Page 7

President Rouhani in the meeting of the Economic Coordination Headquarters of the administration on Sunday, referring to unrealistic and false issues raised in the election debates, added: "Denying the obvious achievements of the administration in the fight against economic sanctions and the coronavirus is the strategy of the Iranian opposition, and this is not only undermining the system and the country as a whole but also undermining the people and the decisive vote of the majority of society."

The President added: "When we invite everyone to participate in the election, we should not insult the people's vote and achievement. It is the national duty of all officials to defend their glorious record of resistance by stating great achievements during the maximum pressure of the enemies and the imposition of economic war. Rouhani has emphasized that his administration does not stutter both in expressing



honors and achievements and results of activities and accountability and in apologizing for its shortcomings and will be accountable for its actions with courage. He said that all government officials at various levels are obliged to answer for the ambiguities and accusations that have been made against the administration's performance, adding that the government, relying on enlightenment and transparency as an accepted principle in successful governance, is open and has spoken and will speak openly, transparently and honestly to the people, and we must not allow false accusations to go unanswered.

Iran Prepares 24 Polling Stations in U.S. for **Presidential Election**

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - The Interests Section of Iran in Washington, D.C., has made arrangements for the Iranian expatriates to take part in the upcoming presidential election of Iran in 24 polling places across the United States.

Director of Iran's Interests Section in the U.S., Mahdi Atefat, told IRNA that the Iranian expats residing in the United States can cast their ballots in the June 18 presidential election in a total of 24 polling stations in various states.

The number of polling stations has been increased from two regions in Washington, D.C. and New York to 24 areas in Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, Virginia, Missouri, North Carolina, Ohio, Wisconsin, and Oklahoma, he noted, adding that one or two polling places will be open in each of those states on Friday.

Atefat also said two polling stations will be available in Oregon and in Buffalo, New York State, to allow the Iranians in Canada to travel to those border cities.

However, he added, the Iranian expats in Canada may have difficulty in crossing the border because of the coronavirus restrictions. The official noted that the polling stations for the Iranian presidential election will be open on Friday from 8 am to 5 pm local time in each state.

Six Iranian executive personnel will be stationed at every polling place, including one observer representing the Constitutional Council of Iran, he noted.

Arrangements have been made to ensure the security of the polling stations with the assistance of Diplomatic Security Service and the local police, Atefat added.

Raisi to Abide by JCPOA If Nation's Interests Secured

TEHRAN (MNA) - The main Principlist candidate said in the final presidential debate Sat. that he will continue the JCPOA if it secures the nation's interests, accusing Rouhani's administration of not being able to implement the deal. The seven hopefuls started

their final showdown at 17:00 Tehran local time (1230 GMT) which is under at the headquarters of the Islamic

Republic of Iran (IRIB) located in the north of the Iranian capital of Tehran.

Ebrahim Raeisi, Mohsen Rezaei, Mohsen Mehr-Alizadeh, Saeed Jalili, Alireza Zakani, Abdol-Nasser Hemmati, and Amirhossein Ghazizadeh Hashemi are the seven candidates are running in this round of presidential elections in Iran. The seven contenders discussed "economy" and "politics, culture and society," as the main themes of the previous two debates.

According to the figures released by election officials, over 59 million Iranians are eligible to vote at 72, 000 polling stations across the country on June 18.

Most of the debate today focused on the people's livelihood and the solutions to solve the economic problems such as the high inflation rate and foreign economic pressures. The candidates blamed their rival political camp for being unable to solve the country's problems.

The Reformist candidate Hemmati blamed the economic sanctions on the country for the economic problems while the Principlist contenders said that mismanagement was to blame. With regard to the future of the JCPOA, the main

candidate in the Principlaist camp Ebrahim Raeisi said that "If the nation's interests are secured in an agreement, we will support it." Raeisi added his future

Ghazizadeh Hashemi, for his part, said that he would support rebuilding the country's educational system based on new methods. The Principlist candidate said that he would appoint a foreign minister with a background in international trade.

He also promised to work hard to create jobs for the young generation.

Azar Mansouri said in a tweet that "the Reformists are denied the right to actively participate in the elections."

Rahmani Fazli predicted a high turnout of voters in the elections on June 18. Iran will not face any security issues at the time of elections, the minister said. He yet noted, "We are ready for prevention in possible cases."

Referring to the risk of the spread of COVID-19, Rahmani Fazli said that both the polling stations and the voting hours have been increased in comparison to the previous elections to prevent the spread of the disease.



Vaccines to Start Next Week

TEHRAN (IP)- Iran's deputy health minister said that if the necessary permits are approved and provided, vaccination of people against the coronavirus will begin next week with domestic vaccines

Alireza Raisi, in an interview, emphasized that nationwide vaccination will be done by domestically produced vaccines.

"Fortunately, Iranian scientists have perfectly produced COVID vaccines and are conducting clinical trials in various phases," said the official.

Raisi said that in order to vaccinate more than 70% of Iran's population, about 120 million doses of vaccine are needed, of which, in the most optimistic case, 60% would be provided from domestic vaccines and 40% from foreign vaccines.

He also noted that the Iranian Ministry of Health and Medical Education has purchased 16 million and 800 thousand doses of vaccine from the COVAX, but a small amount of it has arrived in Iran so far.

Raisi said that the Iranian Ministry of Health and Medical Education has signed other contracts with different countries to purchase the COVID vaccine, adding that about 5 million and 500 thousand doses of COVID vaccine have been imported.

Iran Seeks More **Share of Qatar's Market**

TEHRAN - Deputy for International Affairs at Tehran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (TCCIMA) Mr. Hessameddin Hallaj says unfortunately Iran is not among the top trade partners of Qatar and Qatar's trade partners are mostly European, China and Turkey.

On Sunday, Iran-Qatar Joint Chamber of Commerce and TCCIMA signed a MoU on expanding economic and trade exchanges between Iran and Qatar.

In the meeting, Hallaj talked about the current trend of trade between Iran and Qatar and said Iran's political relation with Qatar is very good and there are several countries that Iran has good relations with them but unfortunately the country has not taken advantage of this good relation to boost its trade.

He said the reason behind this failure is that the country's political negotiators are not fully aware of economic issues and the views of the private sector are not taken into consideration. He added so we reach a point that we have been unable to restore good economic relation with a country like Qatar which has had good relations with us as this Arab country has been a mediator country in the region.

Pointing to Iran's share of Qatar's market, Hallaj said that unfortunately Iran's share of Qatar's annual \$26.7b imports is only around \$360m, adding that unfortunately Iran is not among Qatar's top 20 trade partners and mainly European states and Turkey are Qatar's major trade partners.

He went on to say that the chamber is working on a 10-year outlook for trade with Qatar in order to plan short-term projects in different fields like the food industries,



oil products and the commodities which are the priorities of Qatar's market. Hallaj noted that Iran's imports from Qatar are not significant and the total volume of Iran's imports from Qatar is around \$30m that they are mostly electric, electronic, audio and visual devices and tires.

He went on to say that the country should use Qatar as a country for skirting sanctions and to boost the trade with this Arab state in order to encourage them for expansion of ties.

He referred to Turkey's good performance in Qatar's market and said the Turks work very well in Qatar as they usually set long-term goal for cooperation in their target countries. He added that Turkey beside China and European states are Qatar's major trade partners, admitting that Turkey has strengthened its foothold in Qatar's market.

Hallaj went on to say that some major events are to happen in Qatar that Iran can take advantage of it like the Soccer World Cup and the Asian Games. He said the chamber has some long-term plans which are not limited to these two major sport events and urged economic activists to help the chamber for boosting economic activities in Qatar for cementing Iran's foot hold in this friendly Arab country. He also noted that the chamber is to boost its cooperation with Persian Gulf states through signing the MoUs.

Then Chairman of Iran-Qatar Joint Chamber of Commerce Adnan Mousapoor, for his part, pointed to the significance of developing trade ties between Iran and Qatar especially in boosting its handicraft exports on the eve of the Soccer World Cup in Qatar, adding that the event is the best opportunity for Iran to pick up its handicraft exports to Qatar.

The Secretary General of TCCIMA Mr. Bahman Eshqi, for his part, in the meeting said that TCCIMA expects the government and the decision-making bodies to help the chamber for boosting trade with Qatar.

98% of Iranian Cities **Enjoy Natural Gas**

TEHRAN (IRNA) - The head of National Iranian Gas Company for gas distribution affairs said 98% of Iranian cities enjoy natural gas.

Despite problems caused by coronavirus, National Iranian Gas Company could set a new record with regard to gas distribution in urban, rural, and industrial areas during the last Iranian calendar year (ending on 20 March 2021), Gholam Reza Mashayekhi said.

Accordingly, 98% of urban areas and 85% of rural population enjoy natural gas, he added.

Some 2,918 villages, 23 cities and 6,500 production and industrial units joined gas distribution network last year, he noted.

At the end of the third and last televised debate of the presidential election, Mohsen Rezaei, in response to Iran Press on how he would implement major economic surgery in the country, said that the country's economic problems could not be solved without major economic surgery.

Tehran, Moscow Join **Forces in Building Power Plants**



TEHRAN (IRNA) - Iran's Thermal Power Plants Holding Company CEO said on Sunday that construction of the 1400-megawatt power plant in Hormozgan Province, southern Iran, with Russiaprovided loan would serve as bridge for expanding bilateral cooperation in this filed.

The implementation of Sirik thermal power plant in Hormozgan Province with the capacity of 1400 megawatts began on June 10 and would be completed in 55 months by Iranian and Russian contractors with the loan provided by Russia, Mohsen Tarztalab said.

He added the Iran and Russia, as neighboring countries, are trying to remove hurdles against upgrading level of economic and trading opperation, one of its cases being joint construction of power plants. In a condition that Iran's electricity industry faces a shortage in financial resources due to sanctions, the CEO said, leveraging different methods of funding is of significant importance. Tarztalab underlined that using foreign investment is one of the ways foreseen in Iran's sixth development program for funding power supply projects, including the 25,000 megawatts of electricity provisioned in the program to be added to the country's power capacity. Russia has handed Iran 1.2 billion euros in loan, i.e. 85 percent of the fund, for construction of the plants, according to the CEO. The plant is also expected to provide 30 villages of Sirik Country with fresh water as well as job opportunities for the local people.

GTPP of West Islamabad Operational by 2024

TEHRAN (Shana) -- The CEO of the National Petrochemical Company (NPC) said the GTPP unit of West Islamabad project would come online by 2024 as the first development project of the National Petrochemical Company after privatization.

Petrochemical Company, Behzad Mohammadi said: "This project is the first national project in the



As reported, following the increase in the electricity consumption by the agricultural sector in the current years due to the water shortage and drought, Tavanir and IFCC have signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to collaborate for installing PV stations for the agricultural wells.

Based on the mentioned MOU, which was signed by Tavanir Head Mohammad-Hassan Motevalizadeh and head of IFCC Ali Mobini Dehkordi, farmers are not going to pay any price for the mentioned stations and all the costs are covered by the mentioned entities.

Speaking at the signing ceremony of the MOU, Dehkordi noted that under the framework of this memorandum, PV stations will be installed for 60,000 agricultural wells over a three-year period.

"In the first phase of this program, 11,000 wells are scheduled to be provided with renewable energy sources," the officials said.

"In winter, when agricultural wells are not in use, solar electricity is injected into the national grid and will be supplied to other consumers,' the official stated.

Four Afghans Get 10-Year Jail Terms For Greek Migrant Camp Fire

ATHENS (Dispatches) - A Greek court on Saturday sentenced four Afghan asylum seekers convicted of starting fires that burnt down Europe's largest migrant camp last year to 10 years in prison each.

The court in Chios found the defendants guilty of arson while their lawyers denounced a "lack of sense of fairness". No one died in the fires.

The lawyers told AFP they had immediately filed for an appeal after the sentence was handed down.

The young Afghans were taken to the court handcuffed and were expected to return to the Avlona jail outside Athens, were they were held before the trial.

Johnson Warns EU Over **Post-Brexit Trade**



LONDON (Dispatches) - Britain will do "whatever it takes" to protect its territorial integrity in a trade dispute with the European Union, Prime Minister Boris Johnson said on Saturday, threatening emergency measures if no solution was found.

The threat by Johnson seemed to break a temporary truce in a war of words over part of the Brexit deal that covers border issues with Northern Ireland, the focus for tensions since Britain completed its exit from the EU late last year. Despite U.S. President Joe Biden encouraging them to find a compromise, Johnson used a G7 summit to indicate no softening in his position on what is called the Northern Ireland protocol that covers border issues

with the British province. "I think we can sort it out but ... it is up to our EU friends and partners to understand that we will do whatever it takes," Johnson told Sky News.

"I think if the protocol continues to be applied in this way, then we will obviously not hesitate to invoke Article

16," he added, referring to a safeguard clause that allows either side to take measures if they believe the agreement is leading to economic, societal or environment difficulties.

"I've talked to some of our friends here today, who do seem to misunderstand that the UK is a single country, a single territory. I just need to get that into their heads

His comments came after he met French President Emmanuel Macron, German Chancellor Angela Merkel and top EU officials Ursula von der Leven and Charles Michel at a Group of Seven summit in southwestern England.

The EU told the British government once again that it must implement the Brexit deal in full and introduce checks on certain goods moving from Britain to Northern Ireland. Britain repeated its call for urgent and innovative solutions to ease the friction. The province has an open border with EU member Ireland so the Northern Ireland protocol was agreed as a way to preserve the bloc's single market after Britain left. The protocol essentially kept the province in the EU's customs union and adhering to many of the single market rules, creating a regulatory border in the Irish Sea between the British province and the rest of the United Kingdom. Since Britain exited the bloc's orbit, Johnson has unilaterally delayed the implementation of some provisions of the protocol, including checks on chilled meats such as sausages moving from the mainland to Northern Ireland, saving it was causing disruption to some supplies to the province. "Both sides must implement what we agreed on," von der Leyen, European Commission president, said after meeting Johnson alongside Michel, the European Council president.



Azerbaijan Swaps 15 **Armenian Prisoners**

BAKU (Dispatches) - Azerbaijan said on Saturday it had handed over 15 Armenian prisoners in exchange for a map detailing the location of landmines in Agdam, a region relinquished by ethnic Armenian forces as a part of a deal to end a six-week war last year.

7 Killed in Blasts in Kabu

KABUL (Dispatches) - At least seven people have been killed and six wounded as separate bombs hit two commuter minivans in Afghanistan's capital, Kabul, according to officials.

The explosions on Saturday hit vehicles on the same road about 2 kilometres (1.25 miles) apart in a western Kabul neighbourhood largely populated by members of the ethnic Hazara minority.

One of the blasts killed six people and wounded two, the interior ministry said. The other, which took place in front of Muhammad Ali Jinnah hospital, killed one and wounded four. Hazaras, who are mostly Shia Muslims, have long suffered oppression and persecution in mostly Sunni Afghanistan - and were more recently targeted by ISIL-linked fighters.

An attack on a Kabul school on May 8 killed nearly 100 people, all of them Hazara and most of them young girls just leaving class. It was not immediately clear what type of explosives were used and no one immediately claimed

Algerians Vote in Parliamentary Elections Amid Boycott Calls

ALGIERS (Dispatches) - Algerians voted in the first parliamentary elections since longtime leader Abdelaziz Bouteflika was forced to resign two years ago, but the opposition Hirak movement has called for a boycott after seven of its leaders were arrested on Thursday.

About 24 million Algerians are eligible to vote to elect 407 members of the People's National Assembly for a five-year term.

The Hirak movement has been spearheading the anti-government protests calling for fundamental changes to the political system in the country, which was ruled by Bouteflika for 20 years.

Pro-government parties have urged Algerians to take an active part in what they call a "crucial vote for the country's stability", while opponents are denouncing a "sham" election.

Seven leading protest movement figures, including leading opposition figure Karim Tabbou, were arrested on Thursday while on Friday police deployed heavily in the capital, Algiers, blocking any bid by the Hirak movement to hold anti-government protests.

The early election is supposed to exemplify President Abdelmadjid Tebboune's "new Algeria", with an emphasis on young candidates and those outside the political elite.

Those who vote in Africa's biggest nation must choose from more than 13,000 candidates, more than half of whom are listed as "independent".

The head of the Algerian League for the Defense of Human Rights, Said Salhi, has denounced the crackdown that preceded the vote.

The "repressive atmosphere and the restrictions placed on human rights and reedoms mean these elections have no democratic value", Salhi said.

Farida Hamidi, a Hirak activist in Paris, said the election meant little to young Algerians dreaming of change.

"We reject it all: the president, the parliament, the constitution, everything done by this military junta which has been ruling Algeria since 1962 we want something else," she said.

Break Up Protests Over Rising Insecurity

LAGOS (Dispatches) - Police fired teargas and detained several demonstrators in the Nigerian cities of Lagos and Abuja on Saturday during protests over the country's worsening security situation.

Anger over mass kidnappings-for-ransom, a decadelong Islamist insurgency and a crackdown on protesters in Lagos last October has fuelled demands for the government of President Muhammadu Buhari to do more to tackle violence and insecurity.

There was a heavy police presence in the country's two major cities as several hundred people gathered to protest on Democracy Day, which marks Nigeria's move to civilian rule more than 20 years ago. Reuters witnesses in Lagos and the capital Abuia saw police shooting their guns into the air and firing teargas into the crowds to disperse the demonstrators,

shouted at demonstrators to leave the scene.

Officers were also seen smashing mobile phones confiscated from protesters, some of whom criticised the government's decision to suspend access to Twitter after the social media platform removed a recent post by Buhari.

Abuja police spokesman Yusuf Mariam said officers in the capital made no arrests but had "restored calm" after people gathered who were "inciting public disturbance and breaching public peace."

The tense vote count is the culmination of a bitterly divisive election in Peru, where low-income citizens supported Castillo while wealthier ones voted for Fujimori.

On Saturday, Peru's electoral jury tried to push back a deadline to allow Fujimori to submit requests to disqualify up to 200,000 votes cast in Peru's poorest regions, but said in the afternoon that it had backtracked that plan, paving the way for a Castillo victory. In the end, Fujimori has only been able to challenge some 38,000 votes.

"We call for the (electoral jury) to guarantee and support a clean and just electoral process," Castillo tweeted on Friday night. "The Peruvian people deserve it." Fujimori, meanwhile, responded on Twitter that "the field was not level." She has so far declined to concede.

Fujimori first brought up allegations of fraud on Monday, and doubled down on Wednesday when she signaled she intended to seek the annulment of some 200,000 votes in rural areas of the country that support Castillo. One of the her main arguments is that she had won no votes among voter

groups in those regions that pool up to 300 people, which she said was a sign of fraudulent action.

Left-wing Castillo has spooked markets, largely because his party, Free Peru, is self-described as Marxist-Leninist.

Abu Dhabi to Invest Nearly \$100m in Turkmenistan

DUBAI (Dispatches) - The Abu Dhabi Fund for Development (ADFD) has signed deals worth \$99.91 million to build an airport and a power plant in Turkmenistan.

The deal allocates 275 million dirhams (\$74.9 million) for the construction of an airport in Jebel in the Balkan region of the country. It aims to improve airport infrastructure in the area and enhance air connectivity in central Asia. The project includes building Jebel airport terminal with a capacity of 100 passengers per hour. About 92 million dirhams will be used to build a 10-megawatts hybrid power plant that will provide clean energy for the people in Altyn Asyr.





G7 Rivals China With Grand Infrastructure Plan

LONDON (Dispatches) - The Group of Seven richest democracies on Saturday sought to counter China's growing influence by offering developing nations an infrastructure plan that would rival President Xi Jinping's multi-trillion-dollar Belt and Road initiative. The G7, whose leaders are meeting in southwestern England, has been searching for a coherent response to the growing assertiveness

of Xi after China's surging economic and military rise over the past 40 years. U.S. President Joe Biden and other G7 leaders hope their plan, known as the Build Back Better World (B3W) initiative, will provide

a transparent infrastructure partnership to help narrow the \$40 trillion needed by developing nations by 2035, the White House said. "This is not just about confronting or taking on China," a senior official in Biden's administration said. "But until now we haven't offered a positive alternative that reflects our values, our standards and our way of doing business."

The G7 and its allies will use the initiative to mobilise private-sector capital in areas such as climate, health and health security, digital technology, and gender equity and equality, the White House added.

It was not immediately clear how exactly the plan would work or how much capital it would ultimately allocate.

China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) scheme, which Xi launched in 2013, involves development and investment initiatives that would stretch from Asia to Europe and beyond.

More than 100 countries have signed agreements with China to cooperate in BRI projects like railways, ports, highways and other infrastructure.

Critics say Xi's plan to create a modern version of the ancient Silk Road trade route to link China with Asia, Europe and beyond is a vehicle for the expansion of Communist China. Beijing says such doubts betray the "imperial hangover" of many Western powers that humiliated China for centuries.

Leaders of the G7 - the United States, Canada, Britain, Germany, Italy, France and Japan - want to use their gathering in the seaside resort of Carbis Bay to show the world that the richest democracies can offer an alternative to China's growing clout.

The re-emergence of China as a leading global power is considered to be one of the most significant geopolitical events of recent times, alongside the 1991 fall of the Soviet Union that ended the Cold War.

China in 1979 had an economy that was smaller than Italy's, but after opening to foreign investment and introducing market reforms, it has become the world's second-largest economy and is a global leader in a range of new technologies.

The U.S. official said until now, the West had failed to offer a positive alternative to the "lack of transparency, poor environmental and labour standards, and coercive approach" of the Chinese government that had left many countries worse off.

According to a Refinitiv database, as of mid-last year, more than 2,600 projects at a cost of \$3.7 trillion were linked to the BRI, although the Chinese foreign ministry said last June that about 20% of projects had been seriously affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

As part of the G7 plan, the United States will work with the U.S. Congress to supplement existing development financing and to "collectively catalyze hundreds of billions of dollars of infrastructure investment", the White House said.

Biden made "forceful comments" to G7 leaders about the need to make a strong statement on Washington and rights group say is the use of forced labour in China, but there was a "spectrum of how far different countries are willing to go" in their criticism in a final communique from the three-day summit, another U.S. official said.

The United States has pushed for specific language in the communique about alleged forced labour in the China's Xinjiang region, officials said.

U.N. experts and rights groups estimate over a million people, mainly Uyghurs and other Muslim minorities, have been detained in recent years in a vast system of camps in Xinjiang. China denies all accusations of forced labour or abuse. It initially denied the camps existed, but has since said they are vocational centres and are designed to combat extremism. In late 2019, China said all people in the camps had "graduated". The Chinese foreign ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

- Turkey's Economy to Grow 5.8% in 2021

ANKARA (Dispatches) - The Turkish economy will grow 5.8% this year and return to a lower trend from 2022 onwards, the International Monetary Fund said on Friday, calling for steps to address high inflation and low reserves.

"Mainly reflecting a large positive carryover from the sharp activity rebound in the second half of 2020, growth should reach about 5.75% this year," the Fund said in a statement concluding its 2021 Article IV consultation.

"With high external financing needs, sizeable domestic foreign exchange deposits, and low reserve buffers, the economy remains vulnerable to shocks and to changes in sentiment at home and abroad."

The rapid economic recovery after the coronavirus outbreak with state bank-led credit growth and liquidity support was exceptional, the Fund said, adding that, however, policies fuelled inflation, dollarisation and external imbalances.

The Fund also underscored the importance of adopting policies to reduce vulnerabilities and committing to a firm monetary policy stance to fight inflation.

"Directors also emphasized the importance of strengthening central bank independence, rebuilding high-quality reserves, further simplifying the operational framework, and improving policy communication," it said.

The lira has fallen some 11% so far this year, on top of double-digit falls in the past three years, while inflation is hovering around 17%.

Swiss Economic Growth Forecast Revised Upward

Norway Isn't Giving Up On New Oil Development

OSLO (Dispatches) - Norway is betting on offshore wind, hydrogen, and electrification to meet its commitment under the Paris Agreement, but its oil and gas sector will continue to play a major role in long-term job creation, economic growth prospects, and value for the country, the government said.

Norway, Western Europe's largest oil producer, is preparing to face the energy transition, yet it believes that it can develop its petroleum resources to deliver low-emission production within its climate policy, the government's White Paper 'Putting Energy to Work' showed.

"Retaining expertise and technologies in the oil and gas sector is also vital for the development of new industries and technologies such as carbon capture and storage, offshore wind and hydrogen," Minister of Petroleum and Energy, Tina Bru, said in a statement.

"The main goal of the government's petroleum policy - to facilitate profitable production in the oil and gas industry in a long term perspective - is firmly in place," she added.

According to the Norwegian government, the domestic oil and gas industry currently faces two major challenges—maturing oilfields and increasing demands for lower emissions.

"The petroleum sector will remain a significant factor in the Norwegian economy in the years to come, although not on the same scale as today. The government will facilitate long-term economic growth in the petroleum industry within the framework of our climate policy and our commitments under the Paris Agreement," the government said.

Norway has become yet another oil-producing country that has said it would not stop investing in oil and gas since the International Energy Agency suggested in a report last month that the world wouldn't need new investment in fossil fuels ever if it wants to achieve net-zero in 2050.

The Norwegian Oil and Gas Association has also commented on the IEA report, saying that it "does not share the assumption that OPEC members alone should account

for more than half of oil and gas production for the world market in a 2050 perspective. If demand does not decline as rapidly as the IEA assumes in its scenario, and the supply side is simultaneously choked off, global energy provision could be threatened and lead to very high energy prices."

Italy Central Bank Sharply Raises 2021 Growth Forecast



ROME (Dispatches) - Italy's economy will grow more than previously expected this year, buoyed by EU-supported investment, the central bank said.

The Bank of Italy said it expected gross domestic product (GDP) to rise by 4.4 percent, but warned its forecast did not take into account favorable economic data from last week.

Factoring in projections released by national statistics agency Istat on June 4, the estimate should be revised upwards by "more than half a percentage point", a statement said.

For 2022 and 2023, the bank predicted growth of 4.5 percent and 2.3 percent, respectively.

Friday's data was markedly more optimistic compared to January, when GDP was expected to expand by 3.5 percent in 2021, 3.8 percent in 2022 and 2.3 percent in 2023. The recovery "is driven above all by investment" helped by growing confidence in the economy, low-interest rates, and the expected windfall of billions of euros from the European Union, the central bank said. Italy was the first European nation to be hit by the Covid-19 pandemic and its economy contracted by a staggering 8.9 percent last year. However, the economic outlook has recently turned sunnier, and the country is set to receive nearly 200 billion euros (\$242 billion) from the EU's massive post-pandemic recovery fund. The money, covering the 2021-2026 period, is expected to be disbursed in instalments starting in the second half of the year. The Bank of Italy said its forecast depended on continued progress with vaccinations, allowing the lifting of "most" coronavirus restrictions by the end of the year. It also said its calculations banked on continued fiscal and monetary stimulus for the economy, and on "no significant delays" in recovery projects backed by national and EU funds. Last week, Prime Minister Mario Draghi said Italy was "yearning to restart" and "facing a new phase" after "very tough" pandemic months. In one of several signs of growing optimism for the eurozone's third-largest economy, industrial production returned to pre-Covid levels in April, Istat data showed Thursday.

ZURICH (Dispatches) - Independent research group BAK Economics has revised its growth forecast for the Swiss economy upwards, as coronavirus restrictions are eased.

S. Korea's National Debt Grows at a Rate of 3m Won Per Second

SEJONG (Yonhap) -- South Korea's national debt is growing at a rate of 3 million won (US\$2,730) per second and stands at 17.6 million won per person, a parliamentary office said Saturday.

The total debt by the central and provincial governments in Asia's fourth-largest economy reached 912.5 trillion won as of 3:30 p.m. Saturday, according to the National Assembly Budget Office's real time national debt clock. The national debt has steadily increased, rising from 24.5 trillion won in 1990 and 111.2 trillion won in 2000 to 392.2 trillion won in 2010, the clock showed.



It ballooned to a record high of 846.9 trillion won last year as the government sharply expanded spending to mitigate the fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic and prop up the local economy.

The national debt is expected to reach 965.9 trillion won this year as the government created an extra budget to provide relief aid for small merchants and vulnerable people hit hard by the pandemic.

Since last year, the country has drawn up five rounds of extra budgets totaling 82 trillion won to tackle the economic impact of the coronavirus.

South Korea may face further debt burdens as some lawmakers are reviewing a bill designed to provide state compensation to smaller merchants and the self-employed who have suffered losses incurred by the pandemic. The Basel-based group now expects GDP to rise by 3.9% this year, compared with a previous forecast of 3.4%. On the other hand, it has revised its forecast for next year's growth down to 3.2% (from 3.9%), it said.

With the Covid-19 situation easing, the research institutes predicts a sustained recovery for the second and third quarters of this year. "With a gradual opening up, it will be the service sectors driving economic growth," it said. "At the same time, the industrial sector continues to show dynamic development."

The upwards trend is following other predictions. Government experts also forecast in March a weak start to the year but said the economic situation should pick up quickly if the pandemic situation evolves positively.

Switzerland's economy shrank 2.9% last year as a result of Covid-19, the worst annual contraction since the aftermath of the oil crisis in 1975. But official figures showed that the second wave in the autumn had a less harmful effect, with the economy growing 7.6% in the third quarter before slowing to +0.3% in the last three months of the year. Switzerland is an attractive place to work but it is increasingly being challenged as a business location because of immigration restrictions.

Japan Confers Imperial Badge Upon Former Iranian Ambassador

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Japan conferred Order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver Start on former Iranian Ambassador to Tokyo Mohsen Talaei.

Talaei served as the Ambassador of the Islamic Republic of Iran to Tokyo from 2004 to 2008. He received the second class of the Order of the Rising Sun decoration from the Japanese government. Dr. Abdorrahim Govahi, Dr. Mohammad Hossein Adeli, and Dr. Manouchehr Mottaki are among other Iranians who have received the badge from Japan.



Iraq Oil Minister Says Gas Sector a Priority

BAGHDAD (Dispatches) - Iraq's oil sector is rebounding after a catastrophic year triggered by the coronavirus pandemic, with key investment projects on the horizon, Iraq's oil minister said Friday. But he also warned that an enduring bureaucratic culture of fear threatens to stand in the way.

Iraq is currently trading oil at \$68 per barrel, close to the approximately \$76 needed for the state to operate without reliance on the central bank to meet government expenditures. Oil Minister Ihsan Abdul-Jabbar Ismail took over the unenviable job of supervising

Iraq's most vital industry at the height of an oil price crash that slashed oil revenues by more than half last year. Since then, he has had to balance domestic demands for more revenue to fund state coffers and pressure from OPEC to keep exports low to stabilize the global oil market.

With the sector rebounding, Ismail told The Associated Press, he can now focus on other priorities. In the interview, he offered a rare glimpse into the inner-workings of the country's most significant ministry — Iraq's oil industry is responsible for 90 percent of state revenues.

He said cutthroat Iraqi politics and corruption fears often derailed critical investment projects during his tenure and those of his predecessors — a source of long-term frustration for international companies working in Iraq.

"In the Ministry of Oil, the big mistake, the big challenge are the delays in decision-making or no decision-making at all," he said, attributing indecisiveness to fears of political reprisal from groups or powerful lawmakers whose interests are not served.

He described what he said was a warped work culture where allegations of corruption are used as tools by political players to get their way. He alleged that the mere possibility is often enough to keep high-ranking officials in ministry from signing off on important projects.

"This is the culture: To stay away from any case, to stay away from inspectors, to say 'let us not do it,'" he added. "I think this is the corruption that slows the economy."

He said that during his time as minister he has sought to fast-track projects, he said. Top on his list is developing the country's gas sector, a central condition for Iraq to be eligible for US sanction waivers enabling energy imports from neighboring Iran. To that end, Iraq is looking to develop long-neglected gas fields and capture gas flared from oil sites.

Ismail said he is hopeful contracts will be signed within the coming months to develop key projects that could boost Iraq's gas capacity by 3 billion cubic standard feet by 2025. But that all depends on closing the deal with oil companies; lucrative contract negotiations in Iraq have a history of stalling once commercial terms are laid out.

Iraq currently imports 2 billion standard cubic feet to meet domestic needs.

The ministry is close to signing with China's Sinopec to develop Mansuriya gas field in Diyala province, said Ismail. The field could add 300 million standard cubic feet of gas to domestic production. He hopes to finalize the deal by mid-July.

The ministry is also in talks with France's Total to develop an ambitious multi-billion dollar mega investment project in southern Iraq, including the Ratawi gas hub, development of Ratawi oil field and a scheme to provide water to oil fields required to boost production.



Early talks are also ongoing to develop Akkas gas field in Anbar province, with the American Schlumberger and Saudi Arabia's oil giant Aramco, he said, expressing hopes for an agreement there too.

Though negotiations with international companies have picked up speed, Ismail said entrenched indecision within his ministry persists. Investors have blamed glacial bureaucracy and indecision within ministry ranks for thwarting projects. Among his deepest regrets is the collapse in talks — after five years of negotiations

— between the ministry and Exxon-Mobil over a multi-billion dollar investment project that would have been key to increasing Iraq's production and exports.

"For me it was a big mistake from our side," said Ismail, who was the former director-general of the state-owned Basra Oil Company.

Ismail himself came under scrutiny when lawmakers accused him of corruption. The Cabinet dismissed him as head of the Basra company in October 2019 during a purge against alleged corruption. He was reinstated a few months later.

Iraqi media are often used as a pressure tool, Ismail said

"Someone sends me a contract, and it would be illegal to say yes, so I say no, and he starts to say bad things in the media," Ismail said.

Also, he said 80 percent of his time is spent fielding requests from political parties and individuals asking for employment, contracts or job transfers — requests he says he routinely rejects.

"They say: 'Move this person from this position to this, we need this position, we need this department, we need this company'," he said.

Latifi put the value of the country's total non-oil trade in the mentioned month at \$7.83 billion.

Some 11.9 million tons of such goods were traded in the period under review, of which 3.321 million tons were imports, according to the official. The value of the imported goods stood at \$3.731 billion, he stated.

Among the country's non-oil export destinations, China was the first, importing \$1.089 billion worth of products from Iran, Iraq was the second importing \$525 million, the United Arab Emirates the third importing \$432 million, Turkey the fourth importing \$211 million, and Afghanistan the fifth importing \$190 million, Latifi announced.

He further named Iran's top sources of non-oil imports in the said time, as the UAE with \$1.055 billion worth of exports to Iran, China with \$832 million, Turkey with \$395 million, Switzerland with \$227 million, and Germany with \$171 million, respectively.

The value of Iran's non-oil exports reached \$6.3 billion in the first two months of the current Iranian calendar year (March 21-May 21), up 48 percent compared to the last year's same period.

Iran exported 16.9 million tons of non-oil commodities including gasoline, polyethylene, methanol, iron, and steel ingots and steel products to foreign destinations in the mentioned two months, according to IRICA Head Mehdi Mir-Ashrafi. Meanwhile, some 5.3 million tons of goods valued at \$6.5 billion were also imported into the country in the said period to register a 26.5-percent rise compared to the last year's same two months.

Pakistan Gov't Unveils FY Budget



ISLAMABAD (Dispatches) - Pakistan government on Friday proposed Pakistani rupees 8,487 billion budget for the next financial year with a fiscal deficit target at 6.3 per cent of gross domestic product (GDP).

Pakistani rupees 1,370 billion have been allocated to defence services, up 6.2 per cent from last year. Expenditure on Defence Services makes up around 16 per cent of total expenditure budgeted for FY22, down from 18 per cent last year, Dawn reported. The budget was presented by Pakistan Finance Minister Shaukat Tarin at a time Pakistani debt-ridden

Sri Lanka Seeks \$40m in Damages Over Ship Fire

COLOMBO (Dispatches) - Sri Lanka is seeking \$40 million in damages from the operator of a ship that left massive pollution when it caught fire off the country's west coast, officials said Saturday.

Ports and shipping minister Rohitha Abeygunawardena said an interim claim had been lodged with X-Press Feeders, which controls the Singapore-registered MV X-Press Pearl.

The vessel has been submerged in seas off Colombo since June 2 after burning for almost two weeks and releasing tons of plastic raw materials that swamped local beaches.

Sri Lankan environmentalists have called it the "worst marine disaster" in the country's history.

"In addition to this (claim), we will also seek reimbursement of the cost of putting out the fire," Abeygunawardena said, adding that the full damage to the environment was still being assessed.

Sri Lanka has sought help from Australia in studying the impact on the local marine economy, which has

been hit by a fishing ban imposed since the disaster. Fisheries minister Kanchana Wijesekera said the ban along an 80-kilometre (50 miles) stretch of coastline was lifted on Saturday except for in the immediate

vicinity of the wreckage. "About 20,000 families of fishermen were affected by the ban," Wijesekera said. "Many of the beaches have been cleared of plastic waste from the ship."

Officials said about 1,200 tons of plastic pellets and other debris scooped from the beaches were being stored in 45 shipping containers.

On May 20 the X-Press Pearl reported an onboard acid leak and caught fire just as it was due to enter the Colombo harbour.

The fire was put out after 13 days, but the vessel's stern hit the bottom of the shallow sea when a tug attempted to move it to deeper waters.

Two onboard explosions saw several cargo containers fall into the Indian Ocean and plastic raw material later smothered the western seaboard of the island. IRAN NEWS

The total expenditure budgeted for next year stood at Pakistani Rs 8,487 billion which is almost 19 per cent higher than the last year's budget size of Rs 7,136 billion. Total allocations for the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) have been budgeted at Rs 2,135 billion for FY22, up 37 per cent from R1,324 billion last year. For the upcoming fiscal year, the government targets to keep inflation at 8.2per cent, which is significantly higher than the 6.5per cent targeted for FY21.

The White House said the B3W was meant to address "strategic competition with China and commit to concrete actions to help meet the tremendous infrastructure need in low- and middle-income countries."

The White House added that the G7 initiative would be similarly global in scope, estimating that more than \$40 trillion was needed for building infrastructure in developing nations in a "values-driven, high-standard and transparent" partnership. "B3W will collectively catalyze hundreds of billions of dollars of infrastructure investment for low- and middle-income countries in the coming years," it said.

Chinese President Xi Jinping launched the BRI scheme in 2013, which involves development and investment initiatives that would stretch from Asia to Europe and beyond. More than 100 countries have signed agreements with China to cooperate in BRI projects like railways, ports, highways and other infrastructure.

Xi's critics and opponents of the BRI claim that creating a modern version of the ancient Silk Road trade route to link China with the rest of Asia, Europe and beyond is a vehicle for the "expansion of Communist China."

Beijing has responded by saying such doubts betray the "imperial hangover" of many Western powers that humiliated China for centuries.

U.S. officials said on Saturday that the G7 leaders had reached a consensus on the need for a shared approach to China's alleged human rights abuses in the Xinjiang region and Beijing's exports at unfairly low prices.

"I would say there was unanimity in terms of a willingness to call out human rights abuses and violations of fundamental freedoms that invoke our shared values," said an official who requested anonymity. "There was commitment to take action in response to what we're seeing."

The official added that under the legal structure of the World Trade Organization, the designation of China as a "nonmarket economy" allows its trading partners to use a special framework to determine whether China's exports are being sold at unfairly low prices and, if that is found to be the case, to apply additional anti-dumping duties.

China hit back on Sunday at G7 leaders for their anti-Beijing positions, saying the days when "small" groups of countries decided the fate of the world was long gone. "The days when global decisions were dictated by a small group of countries are long gone," a spokesman for the Chinese embassy in London said.

"We always believe that countries, big or small, strong or weak, poor or rich, are equals, and that world affairs should be handled through consultation by all countries."

strong -- I love you" into a pitchside camera during the celebration for his opening goal. Eriksen is recovering in hospital in Copenhagen after collapsing on the pitch during extraordinary scenes which overshadowed Denmark's 1-0 home defeat by Finland in Saturday's earlier Group B game.

"I am really happy with the win, but it was hard for me to play because my thoughts were with Christian Erkisen," said Lukaku, who revealed he cried tears of concern before kick-off for his Inter team-mate.

Belgium coach Roberto Martinez admitted other members of his squad were also affected after seeing Eriksen suddenly slump to the turf during the Denmark-Finland game.

"We were watching the game live and five minutes after Christian collapsed, we went into a team meeting. As you can imagine, the last thing we wanted to do was talk about football," said Martinez.

"There were a lot of tears from players who have shared dressing rooms and big moments with Christian.

"All our thoughts go to him and his family, but also to the Danish team, as that was a really tough moment."

Substitute Thomas Meunier doubled Belgium's lead on 34 minutes before Lukaku put the result beyond doubt with a late second goal.

Krejcikova Wins French Oper

PARIS (Dispatches) - Barbora Krejcikova won her maiden Grand Slam singles title at the French Open on Saturday, beating Russia's Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova to become the first Czech woman in 40 years to conquer Roland Garros.

Krejcikova, ranked 33 in the world and playing just her fifth main draw in a Slams singles event, triumphed 6-1, 2-6, 6-4 for a second career title.

The 25-year-old emulates compatriot Hana Mandlikova who claimed the trophy in Paris in 1981.

The 25-year-old Krejcikova dedicated her victory to her mentor, the former Wimbledon champion Jana Novotna who died of cancer at the age of 49 in 2017.

"It's hard to put into words. I cannot believe I have just won a Grand Slam," said Krejcikova who was still outside the top 100 when the 2020 French Open took place last October.

"I spent a lot of time with Jana before she died. Her last words to me were 'enjoy tennis and try and win a Grand Slam'.

"I know she's looking after me. All this is pretty much because she is looking after me.

"It was amazing that I got the chance to meet her. She was such an inspiration. I miss her and I hope she's really happy.' In a nervy start to the final, Krejcikova

was broken in the first game, serving up two double faults.

Sterling Honored by Queen for Racial Equality Fight

ONDON (Dispatches) - Manchester City and England forward Raheem Sterling was on Friday named in Queen Elizabeth II's Birthday Honours list in recognition of his work to promote racial equality in sport.

The 26-year-old, who has been heavily involved in anti-racism and antidiscrimination campaigns, has been made an MBE (Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire).

Sterling, a Premier League and League Cup winner with City this season, has been subjected to racial slurs in stadiums and online during his career.

In 2019, he took part in an anti-racism campaign, "No Room For Racism" and spoke out last year as the Black Lives Matter movement gained traction following the murder of George Floyd in the United States.

The award comes just days after England players were booed by fans for taking the knee to protest against racial injustice before friendly matches ahead of Euro 2020.

Almost a quarter, or 262 people, on the main honors list, which rewards individuals' bravery, service or achievement in their fields, have been recommended for coronavirusrelated activities.

Liverpool and England midfielder Jordan Henderson received an MBE for services to football and charity, particularly during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Former Liverpool and England manager Roy Hodgson received a CBE in recognition of his long and distinguished career in football.

LONDON (Dispatches) - David Moyes has been rewarded for guiding West Ham to sixth place in the Premier League with a new three year contract and says he is "really excited by the ambition" at the club. The 58-year-old Scot surpassed expectations in his second spell at the Hammers securing them a place in next season's Europa League with 65 points, their highest Premier League tally.

The previous season after replacing the sacked Manuel Pellegrini in December 2019 he had saved them from relegation.

"We have made tremendous progress in the past 15 months and that has been a collective effort from everyone at the club," said Moyes in a statement on the club website.

"We must keep pushing boundaries for consistent improvement as we all aim to continue the growing of the club. ONDON (AFP) - Former world unumber one Andy Murray has been given a tough draw as he bids to get match-fit for Wimbledon with a first round clash against France's enfant terrible Benoit Paire at key warm-up tournament Queen's.

Murray has won Queen's a record five times and the 34-year-old Scot will be playing his first singles tournament since March.

It gets underway on Monday.

The two-time Wimbledon champion suffered a groin injury ahead of the Miami Open in March and pulled out of the French Open after experiencing further discomfort.

Paire will be a tough first round opponent for Murray, who was given a wild card entry, though how much of a challenge may depend on what mood the Frenchman is in.

Paire has upset the authorities to such an extent with his outspoken behaviour that in April the French Tennis Federation took the extraordinary step of barring him from the Tokyo Olympics.

Should Murray beat him he is likely to play top seed Italy's Matteo Berrettini in the second round.

Murray enjoyed a rousing return to Queen's two years ago after hip surgery winning the doubles with Spanish veteran Feliciano Lopez.

However, injuries have dogged him since then.

He has only played three tour-level singles matches since October.



B RASILIA (Dispatches) - Nearly two thirds of Brazilians oppose the country hosting the upcoming Copa America soccer tournament, a poll showed on Friday, amid concerns over the country's dire COVID-19 outbreak.



The South American Football Confederation last week unexpectedly relocated the tournament, which kicks off on Sunday, with Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro's backing. Brazil stepped up after co-hosts Colombia were dropped because of civil unrest and Argentina withdrew after a surge in coronavirus infections.

Bolsonaro has played down the severity of the pandemic and fought against lockdowns to control an outbreak that has killed more than 480,000 Brazilians. Public health experts, Supreme Court justices and footballers questioned the wisdom of hosting the tournament with a pandemic raging, while high-profile sponsors have pulled out. According to an XP/Ipespe poll, 64% of respondents were against hosting the cup, while 29% were in favor. Among Bolsonaro's critics, 83% were against the tournament in Brazil, while 35% of his supporters also did not support the competition. Ahead of next year's elections, former leftist President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva appears to be strengthening his lead over Bolsonaro, the poll showed. Although neither men have announced their candidacy, the 2022 election is widely expected to be a run-off between the two polarizing figures. In the first round vote, Lula saw his share rise to 32%, up three percentage points from a May poll. Bolsonaro's first-round support slipped one percentage point to 28%. In a simulated second-round matchup, Lula's support rose to 45% from 42% in the previous survey, while Bolsonaro's fell to 36% from 40%.
