Iran to Eliminate Foes Before Approaching Its Territory

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Commander of Iran's IRGC Navy said on Tuesday that the Iranian defense forces would obliterate the foes before they even approach the southern Iranian islands.

Speaking on the sidelines of the IRGC's maritime drills, Brigadier-General Alireza Tangsiri said that IRGC forces showed in this military exercise that they would obliterate the foe before they could approach Iranian islands in the Persian Gulf.

He praised the accuracy of the forces in using specialized weapons and said that these high-accuracy weapons were a source of pride for Iran's armed forces.

The IRGC launched a large-scale military exercise in an area stretching along the southern shores of the country on the Persian Gulf and the strategic Strait of Hormuz, with the participation of airborne units, ground, and naval forces.

"In the Great Prophet 17 joint drills, we defended the islands firmly and showed that we will destroy enemies before they come near, and if some of the foes trespass, we will target them with deterrent weapons," the IRGC navy commander said on the sidelines of the military drills on Tuesday. Iran Will Be Soon Linked To Mediterranean Sea IRAN NEWS ECONOMIC DESK

TEHRAN - Minister of Roads and Urban Development

Rostam Ghasemi says with some contracts are underway to be signed in the field of transportation for completing its infrastructures and soon the contract for the Shalamcheh-Basra Railway network will be signed with Iraq and it will link Iran to the Mediterranean Sea. Speaking in a ceremony for operation of railway devices, Ghasemi announced the news and said with signing the contract with Iraqis Iran will be linked to the Mediterranean Sea, adding that the country needs to boost its infrastructures in the field of transportation especially for the transit sector and above all rail transit, and to this end, talks are underway for signing some contracts.

He went on to sway that some time ago Iran tentatively shipped a consignment from the route of India to Finland for testing the new corridor of Iran-Finland and it took only 21 days while if this cargo was to be shipped by sea, it would have taken at least 3 months. Ghasemi added that recently some Pakistani trucks tentatively passed from Iran to reach Europe, adding that he believes these transit routes can be a source of income for the country.

ITI Rail Link Opens in Blow To U.S. Bid to Sideline Iran

TEHRAN - The first freight train to run from Pakistan to Turkey through Iran has departed after a 10-year hiatus in a major boost to the trading credentials of the three founders of the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO). The 6,540 km journey from Islamabad to Europe's largest city will take 10 days, less than half the time needed

for the equivalent voyage of 21 days by sea. The train left a depot at Margala station in the Pakistan capital to the Turkish city on the Bosphorus Strait on

Tuesday, hauling dozens of containers.

It will cover 1,990 km inside Pakistan, passing through Quetta into Taftan at the Iranian border and on to Tehran and Tabriz over a 2,603 km stretch before ending up in Istanbul through Ankara.

The three countries launched the Islamabad-Tehran-Istanbul (ITI) container train service in 2009, but it only got as far as test runs and was never fully operational.

Even so, they always planned to follow up the initial freight trains with passenger services and operationalize the ITI transnational line with the aim of enhancing connectivity with China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI). "The start of the container train from Pakistan to Iran and Turkey was a long-standing dream of the countries of the

region, which came true again," Pakistan's Railways Minister Azam Khan Swati told the opening of the project. He said strengthening and expanding ECO rail cooperation can contribute to regional stability and peace.

"Regional business cohesion is in dire need of important projects such as the Islamabad-Tehran-Istanbul railway," Pakistan's Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi said.

"As one of the most effective vehicles, the ECO train can virtually help expand exports, imports and trade among the member countries," Adviser to Prime Minister of Pakistan for Commerce and Investment Abdul Razak Dawood told the ceremony.

The ITI, by extension, will connect to China's Xinjiang autonomous region which is populated by ethnically Turkic Uighur Muslims and further boost BRI, a trillion-dollar plan to connect the infrastructure and economies of countries across Asia, Africa and Europe.

China regards Iranian transport in particular as part of BRI and has sought close involvement in the build-out of the West Asian nation's infrastructure. The ITI railroad, on the other hand, will help Iran move around U.S. sanctions.

For Tehran, this is an attractive alternative trade route because the ECO countries trade in local currencies.

Yew! Martyr Soleimani **Hero of Hearts**

On January 3, Iranians along with the world peace-loving people will commemorate the martyrdom anniversary of the hero of hearts and brave fighter of all times Martyr Brigadier General Qasem Soleimani.

Martyr Soleimani and his comrades were assassinated in a drone attack ordered by former U.S. President Donald Trump outside Baghdad International Airport in January 2020.

On Monday, President Ebrahim Raisi said the former commander of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC)'s Quds Force created a huge capacity in the Muslim world by training Iraqi and Syrian forces.

Raeisi made the remarks in a meeting with members of a special headquarters set up to mark the martyrdom anniversary of Soleimani.

"Haj Qassem managed to train very good forces out of Iraqis and Syrians to defend those countries and fight oppression, and in doing so, he created a huge capacity in the Islamic world," Iran's president said.

The president pointed to remarks by Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyed Ali Khamenei who noted that General Soleimani should be viewed as a school of thought, saying, "The fact is that Haj Qassem was not a single person but a school of thought, who sent a message to all societies."

Raisi stated that General Soleimani first developed his own personality and then tried to help others improve theirs. General Soleimani and deputy commander of Iraq's Hashd al-Shaabi Mahdi al-Muhandis, the two iconic figures in the fight against the Daesh terrorist group, were assassinated in a U.S. airstrike outside the Baghdad International Airport on January 3, 2020.

Iranian officials have on several occasions vowed to avenge the death of the two top commanders.

Tehran has denounced the assassinations as "state terrorism" and vowed to end the American presence in the region as the ultimate act of revenge, while urging neighboring Iraq to expel the U.S. forces from the country. A research revealed in October that a secretive UK intelligence base was likely involved in the U.S. military's drone strike that assassinated the top Iranian anti-terror commander, among its other controversial targeted killings. The UK Royal Air Force intelligence base in Yorkshire, Menwith Hill, was likely involved in the U.S. assassination of top Iranian counter-terrorism commander Soleimani, a new report reveals. ECO stands for the Economic Cooperation Organization, a 10-member political and economic intergovernmental organization founded in 1985 by Iran, Pakistan and Turkey.

The United States has been following a policy of "maximum pressure" against Iran in order to isolate the country through severing all modes of international trade with the Islamic Republic. However, it is practically impossible to isolate and stop Iran from trading with its neighbors.

Earlier this month, an official with Iran's Road Maintenance and Transportation Organization said the Islamic Republic, Azerbaijan and Georgia have reached an agreement on establishing a transit route connecting the Persian Gulf to the Black Sea.

"Georgia and Iran are the two main parties to the agreement, as Iran is connected to the free waters through the Persian Gulf, and Georgia has two important trading ports east of the Black Sea," Javad Hedayati said.

"On the other hand, Georgia and Azerbaijan have made great efforts to improve and develop their transportation infrastructure, so we have tried to increase cooperation with both these countries," he added.

This transit route can potentially link with the ITI and further boost connectivity in the region, given that Pakistan and Turkey are both close allies of Azerbaijan in addition to having strong trade relations with Iran.

UNSC Urged to Compel Israel to Stop Aggression Against Syria

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran's Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN Zahra Ershadi says the United Nations Security Council must act to force Israel to end the occupation of Syria's Golan Heights and aggression against the country.

Ershadi made the remarks in an address to a UN Security Council session on the situation in Syria on Monday during which she strongly condemned "all aggressions of the Israeli regime against Syria."

Reaffirming Syria's inherent right to self-defense and to respond to Israel's acts of aggression at a time and place of its choosing, Iran's deputy ambassador to the UN said, "The Security Council must compel the Israeli regime to end the occupation of the Syrian Golan and also stop immediately its aggressions against Syria." The senior diplomat added that "the continued occupation of parts of Syrian territory by foreign forces, which constitutes flagrant violation of international law and the UN Charter, must come to an end." Europeans Criticized For Not Being Committed To JCPOA Obligations

TEHRAN (PressTV) - The Iranian vice president for legal affairs says while the United States was violating the 2015 nuclear deal with Iran, European signatories to the agreement just stood by and watched its violations.

Mohammad Dehqan made the remarks in a Monday meeting with German Ambassador to Tehran Hans-Udo Muzel, during which the two sides exchanged views on various issues, including the future outlook of negotiations in the Austrian capital on the restoration of the nuclear deal, officially known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), to its original state.

"The U.S. is to blame for the violation of the JCPOA and we expected Europe, especially Germany, to play an active role in this regard. The JCPOA was an international document, which had been upheld by the United Nations Security Council. Europe merely stood by and watched US violating the JCPOA. History will not judge Europeans' conduct kindly," Iran's vice president said.

"Iran has always welcomed negotiations and has never left the negotiating table. In the past, we tried to do away with international concerns by remaining compliant with the JCPOA unilaterally. Now, we still hope that we would clinch a balanced deal after the inauguration of the new German government and through more active participation of Europeans" in Vienna talks, Dehqan added.

The JCPOA was abandoned by former U.S. President Donald Trump in May 2018. Trump then targeted Iran's economy with what he called a "maximum pressure" campaign, which failed to compel Tehran to negotiate a "new deal."

Elsewhere in his remarks, Dehqan pointed to the 150-year track record of cordial relations between Iran and Germany as well as cultural commonalities between the two nations, saying that the Iranian administration's policy is to expand ties with



different countries. He also expressed hope that Iran's relations with Germany would be further strengthened.

"We want Germany, as a powerful European country, to maintain its independence, not be influenced by American unilateralism and appear as an effective player in the international arena," the senior Iranian official pointed out.

He rejected "baseless" claims that Iran has been seeking to develop weapons of mass destruction, saying, "During the [Iraqi] imposed war, Iran did not possess any weapons of mass destruction as it does not believe in such weapons.'

"This is a baseless accusation that Iran has sought to obtain nuclear weapons. We have never been, and are not after nuclear weapons," Iran's vice president said. He slammed European countries' double standards when it comes to atomic weapons and said, "Europe does not care about the Zionist regime's nuclear weapons, which endanger the security of the region."

The German ambassador, for his part, said the new government in Germany, as a non-nuclear country, will try to facilitate the conclusion of a comprehensive agreement between Iran and the P4+1 group of countries and promote stability in relations among states.

He added that the Vienna negotiators have returned to their capitals after reaching an agreement on how to continue the talks, expressing hope that the eighth round of the talks, which is expected to resume after New Year's holidays, would result in positive outcomes.

Japan Envoy **Hails Iranian** Poet Ferdowsi



MASHHAD (IRNA) - Japanese Ambassador to Iran Kazutoshi Aikawa has underlined that renowned Iranian poet Ferdowsi played key role in consolidating national identity in Iran.

According to Khorasan Razavi Cultural Heritage Organization, the ambassador made the remarks during a visit to a cultural and historical complex in Tous and mausoleum of Ferdowsi on Monday.

Pointing to cultural commonalities of two nations of Iran and Japan, he said that there are some epic literature in Japan, which helped consolidate national identity in the East Asian country, and that Ferdowsi's poems have played the same role in Iran. As to narration of Ferdowsi's Shahnameh performed in front of the ambassador, he noted that he became acquainted with epic lifestyle of the Iranian people. Kazutoshi Aikawa also expressed hope for expansion of bilateral ties between Iran and Japan. He further pointed to development of economic ties with Iran in particular with Khorasan Razavi province, noting that his embassy will make all-out efforts to remove obstacles in the way of trade cooperation between Japanese and Iranian companies.

Tehran Calls for Increased Int'l Aid for Afghanistan

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iranian foreign minister has called for a boost to international humanitarian efforts for Afghanistan, describing as massive the influx of Afghan refugees into neighboring countries compared to the very small volume of international aid for them.

In a meeting with UN High Commissioner for Refugees Filippo Grandi in Tehran, Hossein Amir-Abdollahian praised the agency's assistance but described it as "woefully insufficient" given the wave of displaced Afghans heading toward neighboring countries.

"The wave of Afghan refugees heading toward neighboring borders is increasingly high and the volume of international aid is very small," Amir-Abdollahian said.

He called on the UNHCR to play a more active role inside Afghanistan and help reduce the inflow of refugees through aid efforts.

The chief Iranian diplomat proposed that the UNHCR and the UN chief put on the agenda an international conference on fundraising for the Afghan people.

Iran cannot always be expected to help the Afghans and the European countries must do their part in this regard as the presence of thousands of refugees on their borders is turning into a crisis, he stated.

"Iran does not have the capacity to provide services more than the current level to new asylum seekers. and the international community must pay special attention to the living conditions of the Afghan people," Amir-Abdollahian added.

He also said that more than 520,000 foreign students are studying for free in Iran and that the vaccination drive in the country has included Afghan refugees like the Iranian citizens.

Grandi, for his part, praised Iran's extensive efforts to help new Afghan refugees.

He also hailed as a humanitarian and important measure the vaccination of a high percentage of Afghans in Iran and the resettlement of new refugees entering the Iranian border on a daily basis.

He further said the idea of holding an international summit to raise funds for the Afghan people was significant.

Tehran, Yerevan Review Ways To Widen Cooperation

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Chairman of Iran-Armenia parliamentary friendship group Mehdi Farshadan and President of National Assembly of Armenia Alen Simonyan have held talks on expansion of parliamentary relations between the two countries.

The talks were held in Armenia on Monday.

During the talks, Simonyan assured that the visit of the Iranian delegation to Yerevan and the continuation of parliamentary cooperation will help the expansion of Armenia-Iran relations in various fields.

For his part, Farshadan presented an invitation message from Iran's Majlis Speaker Mohammad Baqer Qalibaf to Simonyan to visit Iran.

Also, the two reviewed capacities of both parliaments for promotion of cultural, economic and political ties. During their stay in Armenia, members of the Iranian delegation will meet with the host country's officials and visit cultural centers in the country.

No Lawsuit Against Iran On Ukrainian Plane Crash

TEHRAN - The Judiciary Spokesman clarified the latest status of the plaintiffs on the Ukrainian plane crash. In his weekly press conference, Zabihullah Khodaeian stated on Tuesday that the case Ukrainian plane crash was

He contracted the coronavirus at the place of his mission, and passed away early on Tuesday "despite undergoing all stages of treatment to improve his condition". Khatibzadeh said.

TEHRAN - The head of Iran-Kuwait Joint Chamber of Commerce in Tehran says Kuwait has stopped issuing visas for Iranian businesspeople.

Hani Feysali made the remarks in an interview on Monday, clarifying that the Iranian traders who are still doing business with Kuwait are those who have already been residents there.

He added that trade ties between the two countries have dropped drastically, mentioning the covid-19 pandemic as one of the reasons behind the plunge.

Iran has been losing trade also as a result of U.S. sanctions, which impose banking restrictions on Tehran. According to official figures by the Iranian Customs Administration, exports to Kuwait in the first eight months of the Iranian calendar year (beginning March 21) were over \$90 million. The amount of Iran's annual exports was \$190 million two years ago before the coronavirus hit the world.

Feysali had earlier said that due to Iran's weak diplomacy, bilateral trade has been recording a downward trend in recent years as its total volume fell from \$400 million in 2020 to \$18 million last year.

Most trade between Iran and Kuwait is through Khorramshahr and Abadan ports. Foodstuff and construction products such as cement and plaster constitute most of Iran's exports.

Iran's development plans at South Pars 11 hit a snag in 2018 when French and Chinese contractors decided to abandon the project after the United States imposed sanctions on Tehran.

Iran then decided to award the \$5 billion project to Petropars despite objections raised by some experts who believed the local companies lacked the technology needed to develop the phase which is located in shallow water.

Iran has relied on domestic expertise and technology to develop all other 27 phases of South Pars, the world's largest gas field which is shared between Iran and Qatar

Transit Flights Capacity Over Iran Air Space Up

TEHRAN (IRNA) - The managing director of Iranian Airports and Aviation Navigation Company said here on Monday that the capacity of transit flights over Iran air space has increased to 1,800 flights per day in 132 air corridors. Siavosh Amir-Mokri who was speaking at a press conference on the sidelines of the 5th Iranian Transportation

Exhibition, said that "we now have the capacity for 1,800 transit flights per day in 132 air corridors over the Iranian air space and our country's air space is very favorable for the European flights heading for East Asia, on condition that the transit cost for passing through the Iranian air space will be economically justifiable for the foreign airways".

The managing director of Country's Airports and Aviation Navigation Company added that keeping in mind the formula inclusive of the plane weight, the length of path, and a fixed ratio of dollar, we have defined a transit cost, but both the lengths of the paths need to be decreased and we should consider discounts for foreign airlines so that passing through Iran's air space will be economically justifiable compared with those of the other countries.

We obtained the discount permit from the government last year, and we are currently shortening the air paths' lengths, while Iran has the most no flight zones compared with the other regional countries, for lessening them we need to reach agreements with the armed forces," he said.

TEHRAN (MNA) - The value of Iran's export to Iraq has risen 15 percent during the first eight months of the current Iranian calendar year (March 21-November 21), as compared to the same period of time in the past year, the secretary-general of Iran-Iraq Joint Chamber of Commerce announced.

Referring to the growth of oil revenues, Hamid Hosseini said: "The value of Iran's exports to Iraq in the first eight months of this year, increased by \$800 million to stand at \$6.1 billion, and this export trend has risen in the second half of the year.'

Meanwhile, the chairman of Iran-Iraq Joint Chamber of Commerce has said Iran is planning to boost its annual trade with neighboring Iraq to \$20 billion.

Yahya Al-e Eshagh made the remarks in a business forum between Iran and Iraq's Kirkuk province earlier this month, saying that Iranian and Iraqi governments are determined to develop regional cooperation in all areas.

"Despite all events that are happening in the region, the relationship between the two countries of Iran and Iraq are on the upward trajectory," the official said.

The current administration of Iran under President Raisi has shown great interest in broadening and enhancing trade and economic ties with neighboring states, he emphasized.

Elsewhere in his remarks, the chairman of the Iran-Iraq Joint Chamber of Commerce pointed to the country's planning for a \$20 billion trade with Iraq and put the current trade volume exchange between the two countries at about \$13-\$14 billion.

Iran and Iraq signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on economic cooperation back in January, at the end of the fourth meeting of the two countries' Joint Economic Committee.

TEHRAN (MNA) - According to Iran's agriculture ministry, Iran has exported \$533m worth of pistachio during the first seven months of the Iranian year of 1400. Darab Hasani, Director-General of Cold Weather and Dry Crops Department of the Ministry of Jihad-e-Agriculture or Iran or the agriculture ministry, in short, said Monday that pistachio is cultivated in over 500,000 hectares of lands in Iran and an average of 300,000 tons of the crops are produced annually in the country.

Hasani stated that exports of pistachio in Iran have witnessed an upward trend over the past 3 years, adding, in the year 1398 in the Iranian calendar (March 21, Oct. 22, 2019) 109,000 tons of pistachio valued at \$972 m were exported by Iran while the figures for the last year 1399 (March 21, Oct. 22, 2020) were 203,000 tons worth \$1.371b. He further said that during the first seven months of 1400 (March 21, Oct. 22, 2021), Iran exported 80,000 tons of pistachio worth \$533m.

Hasani stressed that the total production of pistachio in Iran in 1398 stood at 337,000 tons while that the volume of pistachio production in 1399 increased to 358,000 tons.

The official also said that the production of pistachio in Iran witnessed a downward trend this year, saying that Pistachio production is estimated to be standing at 281,000 tons, indicating a 21% decrease.

According to the statistics released by Food and Agriculture Organization (FOA), Iran is the top producer of pistachio in the world while it is the second exporter of the crop after the United States.

Volcanic Eruption Outside Reykjavik Officially Over

REYKJAVIK (Dispatches) - The eruption of an volcano in Iceland, which drew hundreds of thousands of tourists and was the longest in 50 years, has been declared officially over, the authorities said Monday.

"It's been three months since lava last came out, so this eruption is now considered over," Bryndis Yr Tisladottir, specialist in natural hazards at the Icelandic Meteorological Institute (IMO), told AFP.

But the agency, which monitors volcanic activity, nevertheless called on hikers to be cautious, and it will continue to monitor the area. The eruption of lava began on March 19 on the outskirts of Mount Fagradalsfjall, about 30 kilometres (20 miles) southwest of the capital Reykjavik.

Russia Presses for Urgent U.S. Response on Security Guarantees



MOSCOW (Dispatches) - Russia said it urgently needed a response from the United States on its sweeping security demands and again warned of a possible Russian military response unless it saw political action to assuage its concerns.

Moscow, which has unnerved the West with a troop buildup near Ukraine, last week unveiled a wish list of security proposals it wants to negotiate, including a promise NATO would give up any military activity in Eastern Europe and Ukraine.

Washington has said some of Russia's proposals are obviously unacceptable, but that the United States will respond some time this week with more concrete proposals on the format of any talks.

Konstantin Gavrilov, a Russian diplomat in Vienna, said that relations between Moscow and NATO had reached a "moment of truth".

"The conversation needs to be serious and everyone in NATO understands perfectly well despite their strength

and power that concrete political action needs to be taken, otherwise **One Killed in Sudan Protests** the alternative is a military-technical and military response from Russia," KHARTOUM (AFP) - A Sudanese protester was shot he was quoted as saying by RIA news agency.

The U.S. response is likely to shape Moscow's calculus over Ukraine. which has become the main flashpoint in East-West relations.

The United States and Ukraine say Russia may be preparing an invasion of its ex-Soviet neighbor. Russia denies that and says it is Ukraine's growing relationship with NATO that has caused the standoff to escalate. It has compared it to the 1962 Cuban missile crisis, when the world came to the brink of nuclear war. Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said that Moscow had so far received no response from the United States.

Demonstrators there had chanted slogans against military chief General Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, dead during a "savage" crackdown on mass pro-democracy rallies Sunday, medics said, and who led a coup on October 25. 125 others were injured according to the health ministry.

The generals had initially detained civilian leader Prime Minister Abdalla Hamdok for weeks under effective house arrest, but reinstated him on November 21 and promised elections for July 2023.

But the move alienated many of Hamdok's pro-democracy supporters, who dismissed it as providing a cloak of legitimacy for Burhan's coup.

The army on Monday insisted it backed "the democratic choice for the people" and supported "free and fair elections", a spokesman said in a statement. Security forces on Monday maintained a barricade

Tigray Rebels Announce Withdrawal From 2 Regions

ADDIS ABABA (Dispatches) - Rebellious Tigrayan forces fighting the central government are withdrawing from neighboring regions in northern Ethiopia, a spokesperson for the Tigrayan forces said on Monday, a step towards a possible ceasefire after 13 months of brutal war.

"We trust that our bold act of withdrawal will be a decisive opening for peace," wrote Debretsion Gebremichael, the head of the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF), the political party controlling most of the northern region of Tigray. His letter to the United Nations called for a no-fly zone for hostile aircraft over Tigray, imposing arms embargos on Ethiopia and its ally Eritrea, and a U.N. mechanism to verify that external armed forces had withdrawn from Tigray.



SAO PAULO (Dispatches) - Brazil's former President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, who is currently leading in the polls ahead of next year's election, said if reelected he would seek to build a broad range of alliances in a bid to unite a deeply polarized country.

In an interview, the 76-year-old former union leader promised to more fairly distribute wealth under a Workers Party government, and stressed the need to get rich Brazilians to pay more tax.

He also vowed to regain Brazil's international credibility, damaged by President Jair Bolsonaro. A South American trade deal with the European Union would be a priority, he said, as would strengthening ties with the United States and China. "I don't want to fight: I want to join forces so we can build," he said at the Workers Party offices in downtown Sao Paulo.

U.N. Chief Pushes for Beirut Port Blast Accountability

BEIRUT (Dispatches) - U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said Lebanon needed proper accountability for the August 2020 Beirut port explosion and that elections due to be held next year could usher in political stability in the troubled country.

His comments followed a meeting with Lebanese House Speaker Nabih Berri and a visit to the port, where he laid a wreath at a memorial for the more than 215 people killed when chemicals stored at the port for nearly seven years exploded.

"I know the will of the people to know the truth, the will of the people to have proper accountability," Guterres said on the second day of a visit aimed at callying international support for Lebanon.

The blast 16 months ago was a strong blow to a country already crushed by an economic meltdown described by the World Bank as one of the world's worst since 1850.

Many Lebanese are looking to elections scheduled for the spring of next year to challenge the political establishment they hold responsible for the crisis and the blast.

Guterres said he had received a "guarantee" from Lebanese leaders that the elections would be held and said they could create "new political stability for the future."

Guterres, who arrived on Sunday, has also called on Lebanon's politicians to work to address an economic crisis that has left four in five Lebanese poor. "Lebanese political leaders do not have the right to be divided and paralyzes the country," he said.

The Maduro and Guaido camps have each appointed a different board to the Central Bank of Venezuela (BCV) and the two have issued conflicting instructions concerning the gold reserves and a similar sum held by Deutsche Bank.

The court said a decision last year by the English Court of Appeal to overturn an earlier High Court ruling was "misplaced" as the British government's recognition of Guaido as Venezuela's interim president was "clear and unequivocal".

In a press release, the Supreme Court said on Monday that British courts were bound to accept that the British government does not recognize Maduro as Venezuela's president "for any purpose".

However, the court said it remained necessary to consider whether to recognise judgments by Venezuela's Supreme Court ruling that Guaido's transition statute was null and void, and it asked the Commercial Court to do so.

Maduro's BCV sued the Bank of England (BoE) in May 2020 to recover control of the gold, which it says it will sell to finance Venezuela's response to the coronavirus pandemic and bolster a health system gutted by years of economic crisis.

The BoE has refused to release the gold since the British government in early 2019 joined dozens of nations in backing Guaido on the basis that Maduro's election win the previous year had been rigged.

Venezuela's opposition has alleged that Maduro's cash-strapped administration wants to use the money to pay off his foreign allies, which his lawyers deny.

U.S. Motor Vehicle Travel Rises by 7.1% in October

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - U.S. motorists drove 7.1% more miles in October over 2020 levels as people return to offices and leisure trips, but the distance is off slightly from pre-pandemic levels.

The Federal Highway Administration said Monday motorists drove 277.5 billion miles in October, up 18.5 billion miles over the same month in 2020, but still down 5.6 billion miles over October 2019. For the first 10 months of 2021, road travel is up 11.2%, or 262.5 billion miles.





Erdogan Defends Rate Cuts

ISTANBUL (Dispatches) - Turkey's troubled lira nosedived Monday after President Recep Tayyip Erdogan cited Muslim teachings to justify not raising interest rates to stabilize the currency.

Erdogan has pushed the central bank to sharply lower borrowing costs despite the annual rate of inflation soaring to more than 20 percent. Economists believe the policy could see consumer price increases reach 30 percent or higher in the coming months. But Erdogan said in remarks aired by state television late Sunday that his Muslim faith prevented him from supporting rate hikes.

"They complain we keep decreasing the interest rate. Don't expect

anything else from me," he said in the televised comments. "As a Muslim, I will continue doing what our religion tells

us. This is the command.' Islamic teachings forbid Muslims from receiving or

charging interest on loaned or borrowed money.

Erdogan has previously cited his religion in explaining why he believes interest rates cause inflation instead of reining it in. High interest rates are a drag on activity and slow down economic growth.

But central banks raise their policy rates out of necessity when inflation gets out of hand.

The Turkish lira has now lost nearly half its value in the past three months alone.

It was trading down more six percent against the dollar on Monday afternoon.

A dollar could buy 7.4 liras on January 1. It was worth 17.5 liras on Monday.

"You cannot run a modern economy integrated into the global economy on this basis," economist Timothy Ash of BlueBay Asset Management said in a note to clients.

"Even Saudi Arabia really does not attempt full shariah compliant macro(economic) management."

Turkey's nominally independent central bank -- stacked in the past year with Erdogan's allies and supporters -- has used four successive rate cuts to lower its policy rate to 14 percent from 19 percent.

Diplomats think the powerful but increasingly unpopular Turkish leader believes that economic growth at all costs will help him extend his rule into a third decade in an election due by mid-2023.

Erdogan last month launched a self-declared "economic war of independence" aimed at breaking Turkey's dependence on foreign

investment and the fluctuating cost of imports such as oil and natural gas. But the policy is meeting increasing resistance from powerful business leaders who had largely rallied around Erdogan during his 19-year rule.

The TUSIAD big business lobby of major exporters issued an unusually firm rebuke of the president over the weekend.

"The policy choices implemented here are not only creating new economic problems for businesses, but for all of our citizens," the big business lobby said.

"It is urgent that we assess the damage that has been done to the economy, and quickly return to the implementation of established economic principles, within the framework of a free market economy.' Erdogan attacked TUSIAD directly in his televised comments. "I am calling you out," he said. "You have only one job: to ensure investment, production, employment and growth.'

China Cuts



China's central bank cut a benchmark interest rate on Monday for the first

time in nearly two years in a bid to kickstart growth in the world's number two economy as it creaks under the impact of a real estate crisis and coronavirus flare-ups.

The People's Bank of China said in a statement that it had lowered the loan prime rate (LPR) to 3.8 per cent from 3.85 per cent in November.

The move marks the first reduction of the rate — which guides how much interest commercial banks charge to corporate borrowers — since April 2020.

It also follows the bank's decision earlier this month to lower the amount of cash that lenders must hold in reserve, which it said would release 1.2 trillion yuan (RM794.5 billion) into the economy.

"Today's cut will immediately feed through to outstanding floating rate business loans and should also lead to cheaper loans for new fixed rate borrowers," said Mark Williams, chief Asia economist at Capital Economics.

"We expect a cut to the five-year LPR before long which will make mortgages slightly cheaper and help official efforts support housing demand," he added.

The reduction comes despite concerns about inflation, with factory gate prices rising at levels last seen in the mid-1990s.

China was the only major economy to expand in 2020 despite the pandemic, but growth

has slowed this year owing to headwinds from a festering debt crisis in its property sector and localised Covid outbreaks.

The real estate industry — a major growth driver remains a cause for concern, with several large companies including Evergrande defaulting on bond repayments in recent weeks.

Virus outbreaks in the nation's eastern and southern industrial hubs have also caused some districts to shut down and forced hundreds of thousands of people into quarantine and other restrictions.

UK Supply Crunch Worsens With Stocks at Record Low



LONDON (Dispatches) - British manufacturers' inventory position deteriorated in December, which means the nation's supply issues could well continue into the New Year.

The CBI Industrial Trends Survey of 258 manufacturing firms revealed stock adequacy of finished goods worsened to a new record-low position for the second month in a row (-24% in December, from -16% in November).

Respondents also said they expect price pressures to remain acute in the next three months.

Japan Enacts Record Extra Budget TOKYO (Dispatches) - Japan's parliament

enacted a record supplementary budget worth over \$300 billion on Monday as part of measures to bolster the world's third largest economy as the pandemic threat drags on.

The extra budget -- larger than the total annual GDP of countries such as Colombia, Vietnam and Finland -- will fund part of the massive virus stimulus package announced last month by new Prime Minister Fumio Kishida.

Upper House lawmakers approved the 35.98 trillion yen (\$317 billion) supplementary

budget for the current fiscal year, with the majority allocated for economic measures. They include cash handouts for children under 18, subsidies for small businesses, and pay rises for nurses and care-givers

Japan passed three extra budgets in fiscal 2020-21 as manufacturing slowed during the pandemic and restrictions hit nightlife and tourism, but this marks the first for 2021-22 and the biggest yet. Kishida became prime minister in October after his predecessor Yoshihide Suga stepped down partly over public discontent with his pandemic response.

After leading the ruling coalition to election victory, Kishida quickly announced a record 56 trillion yen n stimulus spending, roughly 10 percent of Japan's total GDP.

The country has recorded fewer than 18,400 Covid-19 deaths in its population of 126 million, despite voiding harsh lockdowns.

Emergency measures targeting evening entertainment and crowd sizes at events were in place in major ities and other parts of Japan for much of the year, but were lifted in October.

This month, the Bank of Japan's latest quarterly Tankan business survey showed major manufacturers remain cautious about the economy's trajectory, with business sentiment flat for the quarter.

SOCAR Targets Net Zero Emissions in Extraction From Own Sites

BAKU (Dispatches) - Azerbaijan's state energy firm SOCAR aims to achieve net zero carbon emissions in early 2022 in extracting oil and gas at its own sites, a company official told Reuters.

SOCAR produced 6.58 million tons of oil and 6.55 billion cubic meters (bcm) of gas at its own fields between January and October, or around a fifth of country's total oil and gas output.

It works with BP (BP.L) and a number of other Western companies at other fields.

To reduce emissions, SOCAR has been shutting down mature fields, improving infrastructure and equipment.

"Thanks to the work we have done, it's possible to capture 300,000-600,000 cubic meters of natural gas, which had been effectively flared before for 20 years," Guseinzade said.

She added that SOCAR is able to increase natural gas output by up to 2 bcm per year by using ecologically friendly know-how at Neft Daslari and Gunashli shallow water fields. SOCAR and BP have also pledged to develop green energy, jointly work in waste management and clean industry.

She said continued expectations for sharp price growth are a challenge for the sector, along with the spread of the Omicron variant dealing a blow to business confidence.

But she said "firms will welcome the government's decision to move from isolation to testing as a method of controlling the virus without unduly impacting their ability to operate."

OPEC+ Produces Below Target in November

LONDON (Dispatches) - OPEC+ compliance with oil production cuts rose to 117% in November from 116% a month earlier, two sources from the group told Reuters, indicating production levels remain well below agreed targets.

Compliance from the 10 OPEC countries participating in the production cuts reached 122%, with participating non-OPEC countries achieving 107%, data seen by Reuters showed.

The International Energy Agency (IEA) said in its December oil market report that OPEC+ missed its production targets by 650,000 barrels per day (bpd) last month, compared with 730,000 bpd in October.



The OPEC+ data shows West African producers Nigeria and Angola continued to struggle to pump at target with Angola's compliance hitting its highest this year at nearly 300%. Nigerian compliance fell by 10 percentage points month on month to 239%, as the country raised production slightly.

The two countries have failed to produce at targets in recent years due to underinvestment, persistent maintenance issues and an exodus of international energy companies. Production of Russian oil and gas condensate, the latter being excluded from the deal, has been broadly stable in December versus November.

Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak has said the country's oil production will reach pre-pandemic levels by May 2022.

Zanjan Non-Oil Exports Hit \$400m in 9 Months

TEHRAN (Dispatches) - The director-general of Zanjan Customs said that \$400 million worth of non-oil goods were exported from Zanjan province in the nine months of the current year (from March 21 to Dec. 21).

Speaking in a session on exports promotion of Zanjan province, Mir-Hashem Seyyed-Ahmadi described the exports level of products from

this province as 'satisfactory and good' and stated that 75 percent of provincial products has been exported to neighboring states.

Neighboring countries accounted for 75% share of total exports of Zanjan province in this period, he said, adding that lead and zinc are the top exported products of the province with 76% share of the total exports.



EU Approves New Covid Jab to Stem Omicron Onslaught

THE HAGUE (Dispatches) - The EU's drug regulator on Monday approved a fifth Covid jab as the U.S. warned of a bleak winter with the Omicron variant spurring new waves of infections globally.

Since it was first reported in South Africa in November, Omicron has been identified in dozens of countries, dashing hopes that the worst of the pandemic is over.

Despite indications it is not more severe than the Delta variant -- still the dominant strain -- Omicron has been shown in early data to have higher transmissibility and a worrying resistance to vaccines.

On Monday, the European Medicines Agency's human medicines committee approved Novavax, which uses a more conventional technology that the biotech firm hopes will reduce vaccine hesitancy.

"EMA has recommended granting a conditional marketing authorisation for Novavax's Covid-19 vaccine Nuvaxovid to prevent Covid-19 in people from 18 years of age," it said after an extraordinary meeting at its Amsterdam headquarters.

It is the fifth vaccine approved in the bloc after shots from Pfizer, Moderna, AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson, and the EU has already signed a deal to buy up to 200 million doses of the two-shot Novavax vaccine.

The firm says its vaccine showed 90.4 percent efficacy against Covid-19 in a North American trial.

Governments are scrambling to roll out booster shots to populations, with early data suggesting that a third dose offers increased protection against Omicron.

Moderna said Monday that a full dose of its vaccine given as a booster provides more antibody protection against the variant than currently authorized half-strength injections. CEO Stephane Bancel called the results "reassuring", adding that the company is continuing to develop an Omicron-specific jab.

As the pandemic gathers pace again, familiar restrictions are once again being rolled out as fears loom large. The World Economic Forum said it was postposing its annual summit of the world's rich and powerful in the Swiss ski resort of Davos scheduled for January 17-21 due to the new variant.

"Despite the meeting's stringent health protocols, the transmissibility of Omicron and its impact on travel and mobility have made deferral necessary," the WEF said Monday. And in the U.S., top pandemic adviser Anthony Fauci meanwhile warned of tough times ahead

with stretched hospitals and over-optimism about the apparent reduced severity of Omicron. "One thing that's very clear... is (Omicron's) extraordinary capability of spreading,"

Fauci told NBC News. "It is just ... raging through the world."

"Our hospitals, if things look like they're looking now in the next week or two, are going to be very stressed," particularly in areas of the country with low levels of vaccination, Fauci said.



While a little more than 70 percent of the US population has had at least one shot, another 50 million eligible people remain unprotected, Fauci said.

"With Omicron... it is going to be a tough few weeks to months as we get deeper into the winter," he added.

In Germany, which has tightened restrictions notably affecting the unvaccinated - who are barred from most public places -- needs fresh measures urgently, a government advisory group said.

"If the spread of the Omicron variant in Germany continues as it has done so far, a significant part of the population will fall sick and/or will go into quarantine simultaneously," a report by the 19-member panel said.

The report did not raise the specter of a new lockdown, but urged "strong reductions in contacts" within the populace in "the coming days"

The Netherlands has imposed a Christmas lockdown and EU chief Ursula von der Leyen has warned that the Omicron variant could be dominant in Europe by mid-January.

Israel's health ministry recommended banning nationals from travelling to the United States, and added several European countries to its Covid "red list"

One of the main problems in the fight against the pandemic is the yawning chasm in vaccinations between developed and poorer countries, notably in Africa, the world's poorest continent.

Biennial World Cup Would Raise Extras4 URICH (Dispatches) - International football leaders were told by FIFA on Monday

that a switch to a biennial World Cup would create an extra \$4.4 billion in revenues for the world body.

FIFA is holding a 'global summit' of leaders of national football federations to discuss their proposal to increase the frequency of the World Cup from every four years to every two.

The financial data forms part of an overall feasibility study which FIFA is presenting on Monday. No vote is planned from the event which forms part of FIFA's consultation process.

The upbeat reports are in marked contrast to analysis put forward by critics of the proposals.

There has been opposition from European clubs, the top leagues and European governing body UEFA whose president Aleksander Ceferin has threatened to boycott any additional tournament

Last month, a report commissioned by the World Leagues Forum said the FIFA proposal, allied with changes to the Club World Cup could cost the big domestic soccer leagues and UEFA around 8 billion euros (\$9 billion) per season in lost TV rights and match day and commercial agreements.

UEFA, on Friday, published a report they had commissioned from consultancy firm

Odermatt Dominates Giant Slalom

ALTA BADIA (Dispatches) -Switzerland's Marco Odermatt dominated Monday's World Cup giant slalom in Alta Badia to consolidate his lead in the overall standings as last season's crystal globe winner Alexis Pinturault dropped out of contention.

The French skier trailed in 18th and conceded he was out of the running - even though this was only the 12th of 36 events - and would take a time out to try and rediscover his lost form.

Odermatt is shaping up to be the likely recipient of the 2021/22 season's big crystal globe after notching up his fourth win of the campaign.

He capitalized on his first run lead to finish 1.01seconds clear of Italian Luca De Aliprandini.

For the home hope and third-placed German Alexander Schmid, this was a first-ever visit to the World Cup podium.

This latest success lifted Odermatt onto

FIFA officials told the delegates that \$3.5 billion of the extra revenue would go to a new 'Member Association Solidarity Fund' with each national federation allocated around \$16 million in a four year period, while extra funds would also be given to the FIFA Forward Program for development projects.

FIFA said that the funds would help reduce the gap in revenues between the developed and less developed football markets.

Any vote on the plans would likely involve all the 211 national associations.

Along with UEFA, South American confederation CONMEBOL has opposed the proposal. Earlier this month, Victor Montagliani, president of North and Central American and Caribbean confederation CONCACAF, told Reuters that a compromise solution could be for an additional tournament to be a revamped version of the old Confederations Cup rather than a full World Cup with a separate qualifying process.



ADRID (Dispatches) - Spanish Madrid (Dispatches) tennis star Rafael Nadal said Monday he had tested positive for Covid-19, which puts in doubt his participation in the Australian Open next month where was was expected to make his big comeback after months of injury.

The Spanish former world number one said he took the test when he returned to Spain from Abu Dhabi where he took part in an exhibition tournament last week, his first since August due to a foot injury.

Australia

ADELAIDE (Dispatches) - Australia ground down a battling England to win the second Test in Adelaide Monday and go 2-0 up in the Ashes series, leaving the visitors' dreams of winning back the hallowed urn in tatters.

England resumed day five of the pink ball Test in deep trouble at 82 for four chasing a massive 468 to win, needing a miracle to salvage a draw.

They gamely hung on into the final session, fighting a desperate rearguard action until ultimately crumbling to be all out for 192, crashing to a 275-run defeat.

Jhye Richardson was the pick of the attack with 5-42.

England slumped by nine wickets in the first Test at Brisbane and the loss this week means their hopes of winning back a trophy they last secured on Australian turf in 2010-11 are all but over. Joe Root's men will head to Melbourne for the Boxing Day Test starting Sunday knowing that the only instance of a team coming from 2-0 down to win the Ashes was Donald Bradman's Australia way back in 1936-37.

With Root, the world's number one Test batsmen, removed by Mitchell Starc in the final over on Sunday evening, England's hopes appeared to rest with allrounder Ben Stokes.

The 30-year-old has so often rescued his team, with memories of his match-winning exploits against Australia at Headingley in 2019 to keep that series alive still fresh.

But trying to nurse England's batting through 90 overs against Australia's relentless bowling was too big a task, even for him.

He put his head down and lasted 77 balls for 12 runs before Nathan Lyon struck. The umpire initially gave the lbw shout not out, but Australia reviewed and it was shown to be plumb in front.

Rules Out **Signing Haaland**

Hainer told broadcaster Sport1 that FC Bayern will not sign Haaland "because we have Robert Lewandowski".

The Poland striker, 34 next August, has a Bayern contract until 2023 and Hainer has "told him often enough" that club officials hold him in "high esteem".

Haaland, 21, is under contract at Dortmund until 2024, but could leave in 2022 when a release clause in his contract, reportedly for around €80 million (RM379.4 million), becomes active.

The Norwegian has scored 76 goals in 75 Dortmund games since January 2020 and is regarded as one of the hottest properties in European football.

Mino Raiola, Haaland's agent, recently said there is a "great chance that Erling will leave" at the end of the season, naming Bayern, Real Madrid, Barcelona and Manchester City as possible destinations.

But Hainer has made it clear Bayern are extremely happy with Lewandowski, who joined on a free transfer from Dortmund in 2014.

Lewandowski is the Bundesliga's top scorer this season with 19 goals and has netted 324 times in 354 Bayern appearances.

He scored in Friday's 4-0 thrashing of Wolfsburg to set a new record of 43 Bundesliga goals in a calendar year.
