Tehran Expects Its Non-Oil Exports to Reach \$45b by Yearend

TEHRAN - Deputy Industry, Mine and Trade Minister and Head of Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO) Alireza Peyman-Pak says the value of the country's non-oil exports is expected to reach \$45 billion in the current Iranian calendar year (ends on March 20), IRIB reported.

Speaking in a press conference on Sunday, Peyman-Pak pointed to the realization of the Industry, Mining, and Trade Ministry's goal for increasing the country's non-oil exports by \$5 billion in the second half of the current Iranian calendar year (September 23, 2021-March 20, 2022) and noted that the mentioned target has been realized sooner than scheduled.

According to the official, Industry Ministry has targeted yet another \$5 billion increase for the country's non-oil exports in the next Iranian calendar year.

"We plan to increase the total value of non-oil exports to \$50 billion [in the next year], however, this amount is also not proportional with the country's export capacities and we will continue to work to increase the figure," he said. See Page 7

Leader Says Jihad **Means Striving to Target Enemy**

TEHRAN - Supreme Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyed Ali Khamenei has outlined various aspects of the struggle against the enemies of Islam enshrined in the principle of jihad.

"Jihad means striving to target the enemy, and the field of jihad must be correctly identified at all times," he told a group of eulogists on the birth anniversary of Hazrat Fatima Zahra (SA), the beloved daughter of Prophet Muhammad (Peace upon Him), in Tehran Sunday.

Ayatollah Khamenei touched on various fields of jihad in different periods such as military jihad, scientific jihad and jihad of social service.

"For instance, social service to the people in a situation where the enemy is trying to put them against the Islamic system by creating economic pressure is valuable jihad.'

The Leader touched on the vast campaign of the enemies to upend the thoughts of the Iranian people and destroy their faith and beliefs through the mass media and using thousands of art and media experts and huge financial and security support, against which "the most important area of jihad is the field of explanation and enlightenment".

"In the face of this evil move, hay'ats must ask themselves where they stand on the front of truth and falsehood, and the confrontation between the narrative of falsehood and truth, and how they expand the main ideals and foundations of the revolution," Ayatollah Khamenei said.

Hay'ats are religious foundations which hold mourning or eulogy ceremonies for Prophet Muhammad (Peace upon Him) and his infallible Household known as Ahl al-Bayt.

Ayatollah Khamenei described hay'ats as "the center of the great jihad of enlightenment", saying they should be a place for providing convincing and correct answers to the current questions of the society, especially the young generation.

The axis of the formation of hay'ats as a social unit has been the friendship of the Ahl al-Bayt and keeping alive the way and school of the Imams, which has been formed since the time of those nobles."

The Leader also touched on patterns inspired by the life and thoughts of Hazrat Fatima Zahra (SA) in the Iranian society, citing sincere services meted out to the needy and those hit by floods and other natural disasters as well as scientific services of Iran's nuclear experts assassinated in recent years as examples.

Ayatollah Khamenei also cited services provided to the public without pay during the COVID-19 pandemic as

and bloodshed and on Thursday this bloodsucking regime got license from the United Nations to continue its crimes.

On Thursday, the United Nation's General Assembly adopted, by consensus, a resolution that condemns denial and distortion of the Holocaust.

The resolution was approved in the presence of a group of people who survived the Nazi genocide that killed around six million Jews, some two-thirds of the Jewish population of Europe, during World War Two.

The vote comes on the same day, 80 years ago, during the Wansee Conference, when top Nazi officials discussed and coordinated the genocide of the Jewish people, establishing the system of Nazi death camps.

According to the resolution, this genocide "will forever be a warning to all people of the dangers of hatred, bigotry, racism and prejudice."

In the text, Member States express concern about "the growing prevalence of Holocaust denial or distortion through the use of information and communications technologies.'

It also urges all Member States to "reject without any reservation any denial or distortion of the Holocaust as a historical event, either in full or in part, or any activities to this end.'

This resolution is an official license for the Zionists to officially continue their crimes and mow nobody can dare even question this historic event.

When it comes to the religion or even weaker countries, the international bodies, above all, the Western countries claim they are defending the human rights issue and freedom of expression but when it comes to the Zionist regime's atrocities, they all forget that they should defend human rights and freedom of speech.

When Westerners and their media like the French weekly Charlie Hebdo with their cartoons attack the religious beliefs and sanctities, there is no UN resolution to condemn it and defend religious beliefs, and they jump to defend the issue of freedom of speech.

This double standard approach of the United Nations will turn it into a Divided Nations body and this body which is to bring unity and to work for all is gradually turning into a tool in hands of big powers, mainly the Westerners and their allies See Page 7

Seoul Uses Frozen Assets To Pay Iran's Dues to UN

TEHRAN (IFP) - The Iranian ambassador to the United Nations has confirmed that South Korea has used \$18million of Tehran's frozen assets to pay Iran's arrears to the UN.

Majid Takht Ravanchi said the payment would immediately restore the country's voting power at the world body.

He said Iran, as an active member of the UN, has always remained committed to paying its dues on time.

"But unfortunately, we faced problems with our payment for the second year in a row due to the United States' cruel and unilateral sanctions against Iran," he explained.

"The U.S. cruel sanctions have not only affected different domains such as the provision of medicines, humanitarian items, medical equipment, etc., but has also disrupted work at the UN," said the top diplomat. The payment was made Friday after Iran made an

Iran, Pakistan to Do Trade by Barter Soon

TEHRAN - Iran and Pakistan will resort to barter soon, said a member of Iran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (ICCIMA).

La'l Mohammad Baluchzehi added that a Pakistani delegation has been scheduled to visit Zahedan, the capital of Iran's southeastern province of Sistan and Baluchestan, and hold talks on barter system and free trade with the ICCIMA officials. The provincial official said Pakistan exports different products, including basic goods, clothes, bananas, and mangoes, to Iran while it imports various products from Iran such as petrochemical products, tiles, ceramics, apples, and dates.

According to Baluchzehi, the two sides have already negotiated on barter and the necessary arrangements have been made. He then pointed to the inauguration of Pakistan-Iran-Turkey train services which started its operation some 45 years ago from Pakistan to Iran and then towards Istanbul. He expressed hope this operation would continue constantly, adding that Pakistan is currently persistent.

He also reiterated that Iran has not faced any problem regarding its exports to Pakistan.

In November, Iran and Pakistan reached an agreement on barter trade aimed at expanding their transactions in the face of U.S. sanctions, Pakistani media reported.

The decision was announced by Pakistan's Commerce Secretary Sualeh Faruqi in a meeting of the Senate Standing Committee on Commerce, reported the Pakistan daily Dawn.

Given the lack of banking channels with Iran, some issues existed in trading with Tehran and the barter trade agreement is expected to resolve the problems, said the commerce secretary.

The two neighboring countries have earlier announced that a free trade agreement would be implemented within the coming months, as Tehran and Islamabad are seeking to increase their annual trade volume to \$5 billion by 2023.

Monthly Inflation Drops 1% to 42.2%

TEHRAN - The government has reported a further slight decline in the country's annual inflation rate in the calendar month to late January.

Figures by the Statistical Center of Iran (SCI) published on Saturday put the consumer price index at 42.4% for the calendar month to January 20, down 1% from the figure reported on December 21.

January CPI rose by 41.8% for households in urban regions and by 45.8% for families living in the countryside, showed the figures.

However, Iran's monthly CPI rose 0.7% against December to reach 2.4% in late January, said the statistics agency, adding that food, beverage and tobacco prices had increased 1.7% month-on-month while services and non-food prices had risen 2.7% against the previous month.

CPI calculated on a point-to-point scale, a measure used by the SCI for more than a decade, rose 0.7% to 35.9% in the month to January 20 against the similar period in 2020, said the statistics agency.

Majlis Speaker Approves Gov't Diplomacy

TEHRAN (IP) - Majlis Speaker says the government's realistic and multilateral approach to foreign policy has opened a new window to ensure national interests.

"Today, foreign relations are based on independence and national dignity, and pragmatic diplomacy is based on a realistic understanding of the multipolar systems that govern global relations," Parliament Speaker Mohammad Baqer Qalibaf noted.

He dded: "I hope that the correct approach of the 13th government in using the capacity of neighboring countries and Look to the East policy will lead to an improvement in the economic situation.'

President Says Iran Eyes Long-Term Strategic Ties With Turkey

TEHRAN (PressTV) - President Ebrahim Raisi says the Islamic Republic seeks to promote long-term and inclusive relations with Turkey and welcomes plans to boost bilateral strategic cooperation.

The Iranian president made the remarks in a phone call with his Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Saturday, saying the two countries have potential to expand cooperation in mutual and regional issues.

"Tehran supports the establishment of lasting peace and stability in the region," Raeisi added.

He emphasized that respect for the countries' national sovereignty and territorial integrity is the sole way to establish sustainable security and stability across the region. During a telephone conversation with his Turkish counterpart in December, President Raeisi had said the region does not need foreigners' meddling because its problems should be resolved through intraregional interaction.

"We insist that the region's problems should be resolved among the regional



countries themselves and through active participation of the countries [of the region]," the Iranian president had said.

Erdogan said Turkey regards Iran as a reliable supplier of its energy demands and seeks to increase cooperation with Tehran.

He added that Ankara has drawn up plans for strengthening economic cooperation with Tehran in various fields and voiced optimism that he will visit Iran soon.

Pointing to the Iranian president's recent meeting with his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin in Moscow, Erdogan expressed hope that the entire region would witness the useful outcomes of the trip.

The Turkish president also voiced his country's readiness to cooperate with Tehran on finding possible ways to increase regional security.

Raisi Calls Fatemeh Zahra (AS) as Savior **Of Contemporary Man**

TEHRAN (IP) - President Seyed Ebrahim Raisi said:"We should try to get to know the civilization-building culture called Fatemeh Zahra (AS) (Fatima the purest one) and a civilization called Fatimid civilization and the children of Fatemeh, peace be upon them, as the ones who can be called the savior of contemporary man."

Speaking to mark the occasion of Women's Day in Iran, Ibrahim Raisi said: "The character of Fatemeh, peace be upon her, is achievable, we have the sermon of Siddiqah Tahereh (Her nickname), we must understand and act accordingly.'

Iran Stands 11th in WIPO Rankings

TEHRAN (IFP) - Iran has stood 11th in the rankings of the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) in 2021. Amir Abbas Mohammadi Koushki, the head of the Iranian inventions team, said WIPO releases the indexes of intellectual property every year, adding the countries seek to gain higher positions by evaluating and upgrading their capabilities according to the indexes.

He said Iran ranked 21st in the world's invention registrations in 2021, 23rd in the trademark registrations, and 12th in the registration of industrial plans, including applications.

According to Mohammadi Koushki, China, the United States, and Japan are the top three countries in the WIPO standings, respectively.

China is also on top of the world rankings for the registration of trademarks, he continued and added the United States and Iran are in the second and third places, respectively. The European Union is in the fourth position, Koushki said. He explained that the great number of start-ups in China has helped the Asian country achieve the success. WIPO is the global forum for intellectual property (IP) services, policy, information and cooperation. It is a self-funding agency of the United Nations, with 193 member states Its mission is to lead the development of a balanced and effective international IP system that enables innovation and creativity for the benefit of all its members.

Gov't Cancels Divestment of Shares in Mega Petchem Firm PGPIC

TEHRAN (PressTV) - The Iranian government has cancelled plans for selling off its shares in the country's largest petrochemical company over lack of sufficient bids.

The Iranian Privatization Organization wrote in a letter to the country's stock exchange authority on Saturday announcing the cancellation of divestment plans for government shares in the Persian Gulf Petrochemical Industries Corporation (PGPIC).

The government had planned to sell its stakes in PGPIC, which amount to 18% of the total shares in the company, in three separate listings.

The Saturday letter by the privatization authority said that it had received a single bid for the largest block of share listing which amounted to over 40 billion shares or 15% of stakes in PGPIC. The listing was aimed at raising nearly 5,700 trillion rials (over \$2 billion) in new finances for the Iranian government as it tries to access

new funds to spend on key infrastructure projects in the country.

However, officials in the privatization authority indicated they were not happy with the price offered by the single bidder in the listing as they insisted they will do their best to maximize government revenues from major divestment schemes

Sources said that the government could introduce a new divestment plan for PGPIC shares if it reaches a decision on the issue within the next weeks.

The Iranian government has relied on selling off its stakes in large companies, banks and crude refineries in recent years to ease the financial pressure caused by the US sanctions on the country's crude exports revenues. Those divestments have also triggered a major boom in the Iranian stock market where indexes have risen to record highs in the past two years.

Iran Exports over \$3b Agricultural Products in Nine Months Iran, Russia Need Each Other in Face of Sanctions

 $TEHRAN\,(MNA)-Seyed\,Mahmoud-Reza\,Sajjadi,\,former\,Ambassador$ of Iran to Russia said Saturday that North-South Transnational Corridor and the oil and gas projects are two main priorities for Iran and Russia in new era after President Seved Ebrahim Raisi's visit.

Speaking to the local media, Sajjadi pointed to the recent President Raeisi's visit to Moscow and said that the implementation of the North-South Transnational Corridor is what the Russians see as a sign that shows how serious the Iranian government is in implementing bilateral projects.

"In my perspective, the most important issue is to pursue the implementation of the South-North and North-South corridor. This project has a very high economic value for us, and it has a security value for the Russians, and this project will link the interests of the two countries for years," the former Iranian diplomat said.

Sajjadi added that the implementation of the North-South Transnational Corridor helps the Russians in their struggle with the west, and also helps Iran in implementing the development project in Iran.

He also said that another priority is the oil and gas projects "because the United States and the West are making their utmost efforts to destroy Iran's oil and gas industry, so the use of Russian technical and engineering capabilities is essential for the development of oil and gas infrastructure industries and the development of exports [of Iran]." He added, "Needless to say that in the meantime in addition to these two priorities, other agreements reached during this trip must be seriously pursued and time lined."

TEHRAN (MNA) - An official in the Ministry of Agriculture said that 6,263,000 tons of agricultural products, valued at \$3.878 billion, were exported from the country in the first nine months of the current year (March 21-Dec. 22).

Mohammad Ghorbani, Deputy Ministry of Agricultural Jihad for Economic and Planning Affairs said on Sunday that \$3.878 billion worth of agricultural products were exported from the country in this period.

Referring to the import of agricultural products into the country, he stated that 6,893,000 tons of animal corn, 5,028,000 tons of wheat, 2,678,000 tons of barley and 1,823,000 tons of soybean were imported into the country in the same period.

He further noted that 443,000 tons of poultries, valued at \$406 million, 88,000 tons of fisheries, valued at \$159 million, \$1.409 billion worth of agricultural products and also \$1.707 billion worth of horticultural products were exported from the country in this period.

IME Posts Trade Of 7.2m Tons of Commodities Last Month



TEHRAN – Iran Mercantile Exchange (IME) witnessed trade of 7,297,000 tons of commodities with a total trading value of more than \$2b on its physical market during last month of Iranian calendar month. According to a report by the IME's International Affairs and PR, the exchange sold on both domestic and export pits of its oil and petrochemical trading floor more than 1,529,000 tons of commodities worth more than \$856m. On this floor the exchange traded 415,000 tons of vacuum bottom, 490,000 tons of bitumen, 306,534 tons of polymeric products, 171,000 tons of lube cut, 108,463 tons of chemicals, 26,285 tons of sulfur, 14,653 tons of oil, 450 tons of argon and 225 tons of insulation. Next was the metals and minerals trading floor with trades of 5,724,000 tons of commodities valued at more than \$1b. This should be left to the experts. Unfortunately, there is weakness in all three areas of industry, mining and trade in Fars province and many other provinces. In short, I consider weakness in management as daring and lack of effective communication with major stakeholders in the country. For example, in Isfahan and East Azarbaijan provinces, with the same conditions, domestic and foreign problems have far better real performance than the vast province of Fars.He stated: Fars province has rich resources of educated forces, special geopolitical position and the most powerful businessmen in the country. With the presence of craftsmen who have more than 70 years of experience in this province, it is not appropriate for it to suffer from today's conditions.

Mahathir Admitted To Hospital Again

KUALA LUMPUR (Dispatches) - Former Malaysian prime minister Mahathir Mohamad has been admitted to a specialist heart hospital for the third time in the space of a few weeks, a spokesperson said Saturday.

The 96-year-old is in the cardiac care unit of the National Heart Institute in Kuala Lumpur, a spokesperson who asked not to be named said, without giving further details.

Media descended on the hospital as news spread that Mahathir had been admitted again, about a fortnight after he had a procedure at the same facility.

U.S. Military Aid Arrives in Ukraine Amid Russia Border Tensions



WASHINGTON (dispatches) - The first shipment of the United States' \$200m security support package for Ukraine has arrived in Kyiv, the U.S. embassy said.

The delivery followed U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken's visit to Kyiv this week amid concerns from Ukraine and its Western allies over tens of thousands of Russian troops amassed at the border with Ukraine. Russia denies planning a new military offensive.

Washington had approved the \$200m package in December.

"The United States will continue providing such assistance to support Ukraine's armed forces in their ongoing effort to defend Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity against Russian aggression," the embassy said on Facebook on Saturday. Ukraine's defense minister thanked the U.S. for the aid.

Meanwhile. the Baltic nations of Estonia. Latvia and Lithuania will send U.S.-made anti-tank and anti-aircraft missiles to Ukraine in a move that Blinken said Washington was fully endorsing. "I expedited and authorized and we fully endorse transfers of defensive equipment NATO

Burkina Police Fire Tear Gas at Protesters

OUAGADOUGOU (Dispatches) - Security forces Burkina Faso's military, the first time French soldiers fired tear gas at protesters barricading the streets and throwing rocks in Burkina Faso's capital on Saturday, as anger grows at the government's inability to stop jihadist attacks spreading across the country.

Several hundred people marched through downtown Ouagadougou chanting for President Roch Marc Christian Kabore to resign.

"The jihadists are hitting (the country), people are dying, others are fleeing their homes. ... We want Roch and his government to resign because their handling of the country is not good. We will never support them," said protester Amidou Tiemtore.

Some people were also protesting in solidarity with

have been injured in the country since two were killed in 2019 during a hostage release operation, Pascal Ianni, spokesman for the chief of defense for the French armed forces, told The Associated Press.

France has some 5,000 troops in the region but until now has had minimal involvement in Burkina Faso compared with Niger or Mali.

This is the second government crackdown on protests since November and comes after the government shut down access to Facebook last week, citing security reasons, and after arresting 15 people for allegedly plotting a coup. As tensions mount, the government is struggling to

stem the jihadist violence. Last month the president fired his prime minister and replaced most of the cabinet.

Berlin Not to Supply Weapons to Kiev for Now

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Berlin is ruling out arms deliveries to Ukraine in the standoff with Russia for now, German Defence Minister Christine Lambrecht said in an interview published on Saturday, a few days after Britain started supplying Kyiv with anti-tank weapons.

A bipartisan group of U.S. senators also promised weapons to Ukraine, which could include missiles, small arms and boats, to help the country defend itself from a potential invasion amid a Russian military build-up on its borders.

German Chancellor Olaf Scholz, however, has stressed Berlin's policy of not supplying lethal weapons to conflict zones.

German Conservatives Elect Right-Winger Merz as New Party Leader

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Germany's center-right Christian Democrats (CDU) elected arch-conservative Friedrich Merz their party leader to follow the more centrist Armin

Laschet, who lost September's national election to Chancellor Olaf Scholz's Social Democrats.

Merz. who has promised a break with the CDU's centrist course pursued by Angela Merkel during her 16-year tenure as chancellor, got nearly 95% of the valid votes during a virtual party conference, party secretary general Paul Ziemiak said.

The official election followed an informal vote last month in which Merz beat party rivals Norbert Roettgen and Helge Braun, who had both positioned themselves as heirs of Merkel's more centrist line.

The 66-year-old succeeded on his third attempt to win the party's leadership. An emotional Merz accepted the

UN Urges Investigation Into Saudi-Led Coalition Air Raids

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - The UN chief has condemned air raids by the Saudi-led coalition on Saada city and called for an investigation into the attacks that killed more than 70 people in Yemen.

"The Secretary-General calls for prompt, effective and transparent investigations into these incidents to ensure accountability," Antonio Guterres' pokesman, Stephane Dujarric, said.

A detention centre holding migrants in Saada city was bombed on Friday. Basheer Omar, a Red Cross spokesperson in Yemen, said rescuers continued to search for survivors. He said more than 100 people had been killed and wounded, according to the Red Cross count.

Yemen's Houthi rebels and an aid group on Saturday claimed that the death oll had climbed to at least 82.

Al Jazeera, however, could not independently verify the casualty figures.

Doctors Without Borders (Medecins Sans Frontieres, or MSF) put the number of wounded alone at "about 200". Ahmed Mahat, MSF's head of mission in Yemen, said they had reports of "many bodies still at the scene of the air strike, many missing people".

Another Saudi air raid on Friday in the port city of Hodeidah - later confirmed by satellite photos analyzed by the AP news agency - hit a telecommunication centre that is key to Yemen's connection to the internet. Early on Saturday, the internet remained down. Yemen's Houthi Health Minister Taha al-Motawakel has appealed to the international community for medical aid. He accused the Saudi coalition of deliberately targeting civilians. "We consider this a war crime against humanity. The world should take responsibility at this critical moment in human history," he said.

The Houthi Al Masirah TV satellite news channel said the strike on the telecommunications building killed and wounded an unspecified number of people. It released chaotic footage of people digging through rubble for a body as aid workers assisted bloodied survivors.

Desperate for international recognition to unlock frozen assets, the Taliban have largely refrained from issuing national policies that provoke outrage abroad.

But provincial officials have issued guidelines and edicts based on local interpretations of Islamic law and Afghan custom that have curbed women's freedoms. Girls in most provinces have not been allowed to return to secondary school, public universities are shuttered, and women have been banned from most public sector jobs.

Women must also be accompanied on long journeys by a close male relative, while posters have gone up in Kabul ordering them to cover up -- illustrated by the all-covering burga.

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - The United States announced Friday that it was suspending 44 Chinese passenger flights from America to the Asian giant in response to restrictive moves by Beijing on U.S. carriers under its Covid-19 protocols.

China's aviation authority used the circuit breaker policy to cancel flights by American, Delta and United airlines when passengers who tested negative for Covid before takeoff later tested positive once arriving in China.





Chief Warns World Economy **Faces an Obstacle Course This Year**

LONDON (Dispatches) - The head of the IMF said that the global economy would have to navigate an "obstacle course" this year with the ongoing pandemic and geopolitical tensions deepening a global inflation problem.

Speaking at the virtual World Economic Forum held instead of the normal in-person gathering at Davos, Kristalina Georgieva warned that the outlook for the global economy this year would be far from smooth.

"[The year] 2022 is like navigating an obstacle course," the fund's managing director said. "We anticipate the [global] recovery to continue but it is losing some momentum and it is faced with the renewal of [Covid-19] infections...much more persistent than anticipated inflation and . . . record high debt levels.'

With an eye to the worsening tensions between Russia and Ukraine, Georgieva said that many of the causes of inflation were not simply explained by levels of spending and demand being too high compared with global supply capacity.

Commenting that inflation was not just a problem that central bankers could fix, the IMF head added that "the pressure on prices comes from food prices shooting up [caused] to a certain degree because of [the] climate ... and energy prices shooting up, and this is a very complicated story in which there is also an element of geopolitical tensions"

Georgieva said the US Federal Reserve was "acting responsibly" in its tightening of monetary policy, and was balancing the need to fight rising prices and protect the recovery at a time when "inflation in the US is turning into an economic and social concern".

However, higher US interest rates would hit some countries, especially those with high levels of dollar denominated debt, which "could throw cold water on what for some countries is already a weak recovery"

Georgieva urged them to act quickly. "If you have currency mismatches, now is the moment to address them," she said. Noting China's slowing economy, Georgieva said this was

a concern for the rest of the world in 2022 and that Beijing should think about both loosening policy to encourage growth and whether its zero-Covid policy was still optimal given the more contagious Omicron variant.

"What Omicron is teaching all of us is that it is a highly transmittable variant of Covid and may be much more difficult to contain without a dramatic impact on the economy and our view is that this has to be taken into account," she said.

"We will see how China integrates this message, both in terms of the policies they apply but also in terms of how they advance on the direction of what are the vaccines that are most effective and how that would be integrated [into] China's [policies to control infections]."

China's Economy **Poised to Grow** Around 5.5% BEIJING (Dispatches) - China will be

able to achieve economic growth of around 5.5% in 2022, an adviser to the government's cabinet said, making a rosier prediction than markets expect as recent data have pointed to slowing momentum.

The world's second-largest economy cooled over the course of last year and faces multiple headwinds as a property downturn hurts investment and China's efforts to contain local cases of the highly contagious Omicron variant of COVID-19 weigh on consumption.

That has prompted policymakers to roll out an array of support measures, including Friday's cut by the central bank in the rate on standing lending facility (SLF) loans by 10 basis points, a day after it cut benchmark lending rates.

Friday's comments by Zhu Guangyao, a former vice finance minister, are more optimistic than those from private economists.

A Reuters poll of analysts published on Jan. 13 forecast China's economy would grow 5.2% in 2022. The government will unveil a growth target for 2022 at the opening of the annual parliament meeting in early March.

"I'm confident that China's economic growth will be around 5.5% in 2022," Zhu told a media briefing, adding that the potential economic growth rate was estimated at 5-6%.

Li Yang, former vice president of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, a top government think tank, said China has policy space to support the economy.

China was restrained on monetary policy and fiscal policy in 2021, leaving some space for this year, Li said during the same event on Friday hosted by China's State Council Information Office.

World Bank Grants S. Africa \$750m Loan for COVID-19 Recovery

CAPE TOWN (Dispatches) - South Africa will receive a loan of \$750 million from the World Bank to protect the poor and support economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, the National Treasury said. The continent's second largest economy, South Africa has been hit hard by four waves of infection that tilled close to 94,000 people and infected 3.5 million in Africa's worst caseload.

Successive lockdowns meant to protect people have led to the closure of thousands of businesses, swelling an army of unemployed as South Africa's jobless rate hit records in 2021.

"The World Bank budget support is coming at a critical time for us," Dondo Mogajane, the directorgeneral of the National Treasury, said in a statement.

Funds from the development policy loan would help bridge a financing gap stemming from additional pending on the COVID-19 crisis, he added.

The World Bank in Jan. 12 warned that high debt levels, growing income inequality and coronavirus variants threatened the recovery in developing economies. The forecasts for 2021 and 2022 - the first by a major international institution – were 0.2 percentage points lower than in the bank's June Global Economic Prospects report, and could be knocked even lower if omicron variant persists.

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) is also expected to cut its growth forecasts in its update on Jan. 25. The bank's latest semiannual forecast cited a big rebound in economic activity in advanced and developing economies in 2021 after contractions in 2020 but warned that longer-lasting inflation, ongoing supply chain and labor force issues, and new coronavirus variants were likely to dampen growth worldwide.

Developing countries are facing severe long-term problems related to lower vaccination rates, global macro policies and the debt burden, according to the World Bank President David Malpass, who also cited troubling reversals in poverty, nutrition and health data and permanent impacts from school closures.

Exports Likely Buoyed S. Korea GDP Growth in Q4

BENGALURU (Dispatches) - South Korea's economy likely accelerated in the last quarter, buoyed by strong exports and investments, but an economic slowdown in China and surging COVID-19 cases pose a significant risk, a Reuters poll found.

Asia's fourth-largest economy is expected to have expanded a seasonally-adjusted 0.9% in the fourth quarter, according to the median forecast of 10 economists, up from a 0.3% rise in the preceding quarter.

However, the survey showed growth in annual terms likely slowed to a median 3.7%, based on a higher sample of 16 economists, from 4.0% in the third quarter, partly due to the above-trend expansion registered in the comparable period in 2020.

The data will be released on Jan. 25.

On Thursday, Premier Li Keqiang said China will take more "practical and concrete measures" to boost effective demand and stabilise market expectations, state media reported.

China's cabinet has pledged to speed the issuance of local government special bonds to boost investment, while the finance ministry has issued 1.46 trillion yuan (\$230.26 billion)in the 2022 advance quota for local special bonds.

Chinese policymakers, however, have ruled out "flood-like" stimulus for fear of reigniting debt and property risks.

China's economy expanded 8.1% in 2021, the fastest in a decade due partly to the low base from 2020 when COVID-19 jolted the economy, comfortably beating an official target of "above 6%'

Last year, Chinese policymakers focused on curbing property and debt risks, exacerbating the slowdown, but have eased back somewhat so as not to fuel job losses ahead of a key Communist Party Congress late this year. Zhu also said that expected interest rate hikes by the U.S. Federal Reserve could have a big market impact, Zhu said, and said that the United States should strengthen its policy coordination with emerging economies, including China.

Turkish January Consumer Confidence Rebounds From Dec. Low



TOKYO (Dispatches) - The world's No. 3 economy, Japan, saw its imports and exports hit record highs in December in terms of their value in yen as supply bottlenecks eased at the end of 2021 amid rising prices, government data showed.

However, a persistent semiconductor shortage remained a headache for Japanese firms such as automaker Toyota, which slashed its near-term output target this week, in addition to uncertainties around the omicron variant.

"There're considerable uncertainties" from omicron, Takeshi Minami, chief economist at Norinchukin Research Institute said, adding it could derail various aspects of Japan's economy from firms' overseas supply chains to domestic consumption. Exports in December rose 17.5% from a year earlier. Ministry of Finance data showed, outstripping a 16.0% gain expected by economists in a Reuters poll but below a 20.5% rise in November.

Yen-denominated exports and imports hit records of 7,881.4 billion yen (\$69 billion) and 8,463.8 billion yen, respectively, the biggest since comparable data became available in January 1979, largely as rising inflation affected both flows.

Steel exports rose 75.1% year-on-year by value, but the gain in export volume was 10.2%, suggesting soaring commodity prices pushed up values of made-in-Japan goods sold overseas. Exports to the United States rose 22.1%, with car shipments marking their first year-over-year rise in five months at 11.9% as Japan's factory output rebounded.

Shipments to China, Japan's biggest trade partner, grew 10.8% in December from a year earlier.



Imports by Japan surged 41.1% in December on higher raw material costs and a weak yen, versus expectations of a rise of 42.8% and growth of 43.8% in the previous month.

This led to a trade deficit of 582.4 billion yen (\$5.09 billion) in December, versus expectations of 784.1 billion yen.

For the full year 2021, Japan reported a trade deficit of 1,472.2 billion yen, the first in two years and following a 388.3 billion surplus in 2020, amid higher fuel import costs.

"The rise of import costs is common among advanced economies, but (Japan's) problem is weak pass-through of import costs to domestic prices." Norinchukin's Minami said.

"The recent combination of a weak yen and high fuel costs has brought considerable damage to Japan's economy."

"It is highly probable private consumption has weakened somewhat due to the re-spread of the COVID-19 in Korea, but solid exports and investments supported growth in Q4," said Chun Kyu-yeon, an economist at Hana Financial Investment in Seoul.

South Korea's recovery from a pandemic-induced economic slump has been largely driven by robust exports, which expanded at their fastest pace in 11 years in 2021. By destination, exports to China, the United States and the European Union rose 22.9%, 29.4% and 33.9%, respectively.

But an upsurge in COVID-19 cases, the waning effects of pandemic-related stimulus and an economic slowdown in China, the country's largest trade and investment partner. will weigh heavily on the economy this year and next.

"Exports have continued to be a pillar of strength, but are likely to provide a smaller boost to growth going forward. The ongoing slowdown in China poses another headwind,' wrote Krystal Tan, an economist at ANZ in Singapore.

A separate Reuters poll published a week ago showed growth averaging 3.9% in 2021. It was then expected to ease to 2.9% in 2022 and 2.5% in 2023.

ANKARA (Dispatches) - Turkish consumer confidence rebounded in January, official data showed, after hitting its lowest level on record in December after a slide in the value of the Turkish lira.

The consumer confidence index rose 6.2% to 73.2 points this month, according to the Turkish Statistical Institute (TurkStat) data, bouncing back after dropping 3.1% to 68.9 points in December.

Confidence declined in 2020 due to fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic before a rebound that began declining in October of last year.

The index is a vital gauge of the economy's overall performance, indicating people's sentiments on financial standing and the general economic situation, along with expenditure and saving tendencies.

A confidence level below 100 reflects a pessimistic outlook, while a reading above 100 indicates optimism. All sub-indices improved in the month with the financial situation expectation over the next 12 months increasing the most.

The financial situation of the household index at present surged 3.6% month-over-month in January to 56.1, the data showed.

The general economic situation expectation index in the next 12-month period increased 11.8% month-over-month to 74.5.

Assessment on spending money on durable goods index over the next year rose by 1.4% to 90.9 in the month, compared to 89.6 in December.

Azmoun Joins

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Bayer Leverkusen signed Iran forward Sardar Azmoun for next season on Saturday, announcing the transfer shortly after it scored five goals in a Bundesliga game.

The German football club announced that the 27-year-old Iran **Bayer 04 Leverkusen** extend his contract with Russian champion Zenit St. Petersburg. He

is getting a 5-year deal with the German club.

"Azmoun is one of the Russian league's top scorers for years. He was champion three times in a row there with Zenit, has regularly played Champions League and shown his international class at the highest level there," Leverkusen sporting director Simon Rolfes said. "He will bring more quality to our attack."



EU Nations Quarrel Over Whether Nuclear, Gas Are Green

AMIENS (Dispatches) - Hours before the window for lodging objections closes, EU environment and energy ministers meeting in France Friday differed sharply on a European Commission provision that would classify nuclear and natural gas energy as "sustainable". The controversy pits countries led by France -- where nuclear generates a world-leading

70 percent of electricity -- against Germany, Austria and others in the 27-nation bloc. Debate over the Commission's so-called "taxonomy" is not on the agenda of the informal, three-day talks in Amiens, but flared nonetheless.

In late December the European Commission unveiled a classification labelling investment in nuclear gas-based energy as sustainable, in order to favour sectors that reduce the greenhouse gas emissions driving global warming.

Nuclear power is carbon-free, and gas is significantly less polluting than coal. Countries in the European Union had until midnight Friday to suggest modifications.

After that, the Commission -- taking these suggestions into account -- must "rapidly" publish a final text that will be definitely adopted four months later.

Passage in its current form seems more than likely: it would take a majority of deputies in the EU parliament or 20 of the 27 members states to derail it, and critical mass is lacking in both cases.

A letter to the executive European Commission from some European Parliament deputies protesting that the period for suggesting changes was too short has fallen on deaf ears.

And among EU member states, a dozen have backed France's position and the Commission's proposed taxonomy.

Many are central European nations looking to switch from carbon-intensive coalfired power to natural gas.

"Nuclear is a decarbonised energy," French environment minister Barbara Pompili told journalists in Amiens.

"We cannot deprive ourselves of it at the same time that we need to very rapidly reduce our carbon emissions.'

Despite the strong headwinds, anti-nuclear resistance has not subsided.

"It is neither sustainable nor economic", countered Germany environment minister Stefan Tidow. "It is not a green energy."

Luxembourg and Austria have gone even further, threatening to take the case to court if nuclear is certified as sustainable, citing the risk of accidents and the as-yet unresolved problem of nuclear waste.

"It would be greenwashing," Luxembourg's environment minister, Carole Dieschbourg, told AFP.

Global Energy Transition To Cause Short-Term Economic Pain

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - The transition to clean energy required to prevent temperatures from rising swiftly could shave 2 per cent off global GDP by 2050 but is likely recoverable before the end of the century, a report by natural resources consultancy Wood Mackenzie said.

While investments in technologies like solar and wind farms, advanced batteries will generate jobs, the transition will also likely cause a loss of jobs and tax revenues in fossil fuel production, said the report called "No Pain, No Gain: The economic consequences of accelerating the energy transition".

"It's by no means a way to say that we shouldn't pursue transition or slow it down," said Peter Martin, WoodMac's chief economist. "This pain in the shortterm will pay off in the long-term."

Benefits from limiting the rise in temperatures to 1.5 degrees Celsius, as called for by the United Nations, could boost global GDP, on aggregate by 1.6 per cent in 2050, the report said. But actions required to spur the transition to keep temperatures from going above that level could cut 3.6 per cent from GDP in 2050, resulting in the 2 per cent hit, the report said.

The impacts will not be felt evenly. China will feel about 27 per cent of a cumulative US\$75 trillion (RM313 trillion) economic hit to global GDP by 2050, while the United States will see about 12 per ent, Europe will experience 11 per cent and India

These days, unfortunately, this attempt has been accompanied by the West's unreasonable support. The Zionist regime is now an inheritor and flag bearer of the two evil temperaments," it said.

"The regime's racist approach has been clarified in numerous international documents, and despite the strong will of the international community, Israel remains the only racist regime with an expansionist ideology. The Islamic Republic has always condemned genocide under any circumstances and considered it unjustifiable. That is why during World War II, Iran hosted refugees from some European countries, while the fake Zionist regime has constantly tried to use World War II victims and the Jews as an excuse for its shameless and aggressive actions."

The Iranian Foreign Ministry also denounced the crimes committed by Tel Aviv against the Palestinians

"By violating international law over the past seven decades, this regime and its leaders have committed all kinds of crimes, especially crimes against humanity, against the Palestinian people and the people of the countries in the region. Genocide, assassination, racial cleansing, house demolition and siege are among the atrocities that the Zionist regime is constantly perpetrating," it added. "And it would send a very bad signal: it is not a transition energy, it takes too long," she added, alluding to the lag time for building nuclear reactors.

Her Austrian counterpart, Leonore Gewessler, said labelling nuclear power as sustainable will "undermine the credibility of the taxonomy" because it does not fulfil the legal criterion of "not causing damage to the environment"

The EU Commission has proposed a measure requiring financial products to specify what percentage of the activities financed involve nuclear energy, a transparency measure that would allow investors to steer clear if they wanted to.

Berlin has expressed reservations about joining Vienna and Luxembourg in a legal challenge.

"For now, we're working on our response, and when the Commission presents a new text we'll analyse it from a legal standpoint," said Germany state secretary for economic affairs and climate action Sven Giegold.

Austria has also objected to tagging gas as sustainable, with The Netherlands -- which backs the label for nuclear energy -- arguing "there is no scientific reason to include" gas.

Polish undersecretary of state for the environment Adam Guibourge-Czetwertynski disagreed. "Gas replacing coal because there's nothing better in the short term, that makes sense," he said.

Rio Vows to Revitalize Two Crime-Racked Slums

RIO DE JANEIRO (Dispatches) - The governor of Brazil's Rio de Janeiro state announced plans Saturday for massive investments aimed at revitalizing two long crime-infested slum districts.

The announcement came just three days after 1,300 police swept through the Jacarezinho and Muzema favelas in a "reconquering" operation that authorities said aimed to wrest control back from organized crime groups. Governor Claudio Castro told reporters the state would spend 500 million real (about \$90 million) over coming

weeks to attack social problems in the two districts after decades of governmental neglect. "It's a program to reconquer the territory and return it to its rightful owners: the people of these favelas," Castro said.

He promised efforts both to improve sewage in the two favelas and to establish social and educational programs aimed primarily at young people and families.

Castro told reporters that work on other favelas would come only after the revitalization effort in Jacarezinho and Muzema is "functioning fully."

Iran, Iraqi Red Crescent Societies Sign MoU

TEHRAN (IRNA)- Iranian and Iraqi Red Crescent Societies inked an MoU with emphasis on good neighborliness and in line with developing joint humanitarian cooperation.

The MoU is mainly aimed at creating a framework for joint cooperation and bilateral coordination between Iranian and Iraqi Red Crescent Societies in training, exchanging rescue experiences, rehabilitation and health field

The MoU will be valid for 10 years and in seven articles.

about 7 per cent.

Economies such as Iraq that do not have financial reserves to invest in non-fossil fuel sectors could suffer the biggest losses in economic output, it said. Wealthy economies with deep capital markets that

An Iranian administrative government that took office in early August has boasted of its ability to tame inflation by introducing tighter fiscal and monetary policies while relying more on home-grown capacities of the Iranian economy through encouraging more manufacturing and non-oil export activities in the country.

The annual inflation rate reported by the SCI in late August was around 45.2%, up one percentage point against the month to late July.

The Iranian government has promised inflation rate will drop further in the near future as the economy finds new ways of coping with the American sanctions and the economic impacts of the coronavirus pandemic.

Peyman-Pak pointed to the increase of export incentives and the number of commercial attachés in target markets as other measures set to be taken by the Trade Promotion Organization to increase non-oil exports.

The TPO head further referred to the president's recent visit to Russia, and said: "We have planned to increase our non-oil exports to Russia to \$7.5 billion by [the Iranian calendar year] 1404 (begins in March 2025)." Russia imports \$250 billion to \$300 billion of commodities annually, of which our share has always been less than \$500 million, the official regretted, adding: "This year we plan to increase this figure to \$750 million."

According to Peyman-Pak, considering Russia's imports in various areas including import of \$8 billion of agricultural products, \$44 billion of foodstuff, \$1.5 billion of marine industry equipment in addition to other imports like tiles, ceramics, cement, petrochemicals, bags, shoes and textiles, Iran can easily realize the target of \$7.5 billion of exports to Russia.

Elsewhere in his remarks, Peyman-Pak pointed to the facilitation of the process of re-injecting export revenues into the country's economic system, and noted: "In the last quarter, with the diversification of the ways for returning foreign currency and the alignment of forex and trade policies, the rate of export revenue return has increased by 15-10 percent."

During these few months, we have tried to accelerate the growth trend of exports by facilitating the process of export revenue returns and supporting exporters, while moving towards the export of goods that have a better competitive advantage and more added value.

He noted that various measures were taken during this period to improve the trade balance and increase non-oil exports, including the special attention of senior government officials to export and trade issues through reviewing the problems of traders and solving challenges by holding various meetings with other officials and with traders.

"We tried to make decisions in coordination with the representatives of the chambers of commerce, guilds, cooperatives, unions and associations, and this process while creating empathy with exporters, also had a positive effect on the country's foreign trade balance," he said.

Touching upon the Industry Ministry and TPO's plans for increasing exports to the neighboring countries, Peyman-Pak said: "Despite the challenges in the two markets of Afghanistan and Turkey, with the follow-up and cooperation between the government and exporters, exports have accelerated in recent months, and we hope that this upward trend will continue." He also referred to the TPO's programs for diversification of export methods, saying that 620 cases of barter trade have been sent to the Central Bank of Iran (CBI).



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Brazil to Stop Unvaccinated Footballers

SAO PAULO (Dispatches) - The Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) said players must be vaccinated against Covid-19 to take part in this year's league championship, The CBF said it was in constant contact with health bodies and had sent an updated list of requirements to member clubs. "One of these is the obligation to present a full vaccination certificate against Covid-19 to the CBF's Medical

Commission," it said in a statement. The top four national divisions kick off in the second week of April.

Medvedev, Tsitsipas March Into Last 16 i Australian Open MELBOURNE (Dispatches) - World number two and title favourite Daniil Medvedev won over the Australian Open crowd as he eased into the last 16 along with Stefanos Tsitsipas. OVET

After the drama of yesterday, when defending champion Naomi Osaka exited Melbourne in the third round, the women's seeds were also mostly untroubled on day six.

Second seed Aryna Sabalenka overcame the serving yips and Simona Halep was an emphatic winner, the former number one now playing self-described "dinosaur" Alize Cornet on Monday for a place in the quarter-finals.

Russia's Medvedev, the de facto men's top seed after the deportation of defending champion Novak Djokovic on the eve of the Grand Slam, said some fans at Melbourne Park had a "low IQ" after they booed him in his second-round victory over Australian showman Nick Kyrgios.

The reigning US Open champion needed four sets and a large dose of composure to see off Kyrgios and silence Rod Laver Arena, but it was altogether more comfortable as he dismissed unseeded Dutchman Botic van de Zandschulp.

The 25-year-old Medvedev kept his cool in sweltering conditions on Margaret Court Arena to roll through 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 in 1hr 55min and faces American Maxime Cressy in the fourth round.

"I'll put it this way, it's easier to play a guy from the Netherlands than a guy from Australia in Australia in Melbourne," said Medvedev, who has a similar love-hate dynamic with the crowd in New York.

Lakers Get Needed Win Over Magic

OS ANGELES (Dispatches) - The Lbeleaguered Los Angeles Lakers bounced back from an embarrassing loss to the Indiana Pacers with a 116-105 NBA victory over the Magic in Orlando. Superstar LeBron James scored 29 points, his last two coming on an alleyoop dunk off a pass from Russell Westbrook to seal the victory.

Carmelo Anthony added 23 points off the bench, 19 of them in the second half for the Lakers, who opened the third quarter on a 19-2 scoring run and outscored the Magic 31-16 in the period.

Westbrook, who was benched late in Wednesday's loss to Indiana -- in which the Lakers blew a 15-point lead -- scored 18 points with 11 rebounds and seven assists. "Russ is a high-character guy, we knew

he was going to respond," Lakers coach Frank Vogel said.

Westbrook said he had no trouble moving on. "My job as a player and professional is to do what's asked of me and continue to

Greek fourth seed Tsitsipas, who is chasing a maiden major, was also largely untroubled in a 6-3, 7-5, 6-7 (2/7), 6-4 win over unseeded Frenchman Benoit Paire and plays American Taylor Fritz next.

Tsitsipas's serve was the foundation. He did not drop a service game despite losing a set and sent down 21 aces.

Medvedev and Tsitsipas, two of the

generation coming up fast behind the "Big Three" of Djokovic, Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer, could meet in the semi-finals.

Felix Auger-Aliassime sent home the last Briton left standing, the 21-year-old Canadian thrashing Dan Evans 6-4, 6-1, 6-1.

There is an intriguing clash later Saturday between fifth seed Andrey Rublev of Russia and 2018 Melbourne Park finalist Marin Cilic of Croatia that has the potential to be a late-night classic on Margaret Court Arena.

Cilic pushed Roger Federer — who is injured and not in Melbourne — to five sets in the final four years ago and the big-serving 27th seed is capable of upsetting anyone. In the women's draw, Halep swatted aside Danka Kovinic - conqueror of US Open champion Emma Raducanu — 6-2, 6-1 in just 64 minutes to set up a date with Cornet of France.

The fit-again Halep came into the tournament full of confidence after her first title in 16 months earlier this month at a Melbourne warm-up event and was always in charge.

"I feel great that I can play the fourth round again. I always love to play in Australia so that's why maybe I play good matches," said Halep, seeded 14.

Unseeded Cornet celebrated her 32nd birthday by slugging it out with Slovenia's 29th seed Tamara Zidansek for a 4-6, 6-4, 6-2 victory.

The crowd serenaded her by singing happy birthday.

World number two Sabalenka overcame the serving problems that have been plaguing her early season, but still needed three sets to get past 31st seed Marketa Vondrousova. The Belarusian had served 70 double faults in her previous four matches in 2022, but only tallied 10 as she beat the Czech 4-6, 6-3, 6-1.

Italian Goggia, who is also defending World Cup downhill champion, took the honors on home snow with a time of one minute, 6.98 seconds, 0.20sec ahead of Austria's Ramona Siebenhofer.

Czech Ester Ledecka completed the podium, a further 0.06sec back.

Goggia, who has now won four of this season's five downhill races, took the lead with her run at seventh in the schedule, overtaking and staying ahead of early leader Siebenhofer despite a run which was far from textbook.

The 29-year-old threw herself down a piste shortened due to windy conditions in the Dolomites in a wild, at times raggedy effort which nonetheless gives her a significant lead at the top of the downhill standings.

She has 400 points, 136 more than Siebenhofer, who jumps above Breezy Johnson after the American was forced to sit out the race following a training run fall.

Goggia sits third in the overall standings on 769 points, although she is way behind leader Mikaela Shiffrin and defending champion Petra Vlhova, neither of whom took part in Saturday's run who both have over 900 points.

Xavi Maintains Tough Barcelona Stance on Dembele

Dembele wrote he would not "give in to blackmail" after Xavi left him out of his squad to face Athletic Bilbao in the Copa del Rey on Thursday night, following a breakdown in talks over a new deal.

The winger's contract expires in the summer, when he will be able to leave Barcelona for free. The club's director of football Mateu Alemany said on Thursday morning "it seems following 10 months absent with a knee problem. obvious to us that the player does not want to continue at Barcelona" and "therefore we "He is very upset, it's a difficult situation," said Xavi.

hope that a transfer will take place before January 31".

"Dembele's situation hasn't changed. He knows what the options are and he has to decide," Xavi said in a press conference ahead of Sunday's game away at Alaves.

"There is no alternative. There are still days left (in the transfer window)," Xavi added. It remains to be seen if Barcelona can find an exit for Dembele mid-season, either for a transfer fee or on loan. Shifting the 24-year-old's wages would help free up space for signings.

"We are working to bring players in. We'll see what we can do," Xavi said. With Dembele exiled, Barcelona could have done without Ansu Fati picking up a

hamstring injury against Athletic on Thursday, with reports suggesting the 19-year-old could be out for two months.

Fati has only just returned after two months out injured, having come back in September

Ryding Makes British History With Kitzbuehel Win

KITZBUHEL (Dispatches) - Dave Ryding, who honed his early skiing on a dry slope, pulled off a massive shock when he won Britain's first World Cup race with victory in the men's slalom in Kitzbuehel.

Ryding clocked a combined total of 1min 41.26sec, finishing 0.38sec ahead of Norway's Lucas Braathen, with his teammate and two-time Olympic medallist Henrik Kristoffersen in third (+0.65).

"This place is a special place for me," said Ryding, whose second-placed finish on the same Ganslern course in 2017 had matched Britain's previous best alpine skiing result achieved by Konrad Bartelski in the 1981 Val Gardena downhill.

Ryding didn't start ski race training on snow until he was 21, honing his technique instead on dry slopes in the north of England and content with the family's annual ski holiday.

"It takes us (Britons) longer, I didn't grow up on snow, but on a plastic slope that took 11 seconds to ski down," he recalled.

A hugely popular fixture on the World Cup circuit he was last week named in the British team for the upcoming Beijing Olympics, which will be his fourth.

"I'm 35 now but I never stopped believing, I never stopped trying," said the slalom specialist who finished 27th at the 2010 Vancouver Games, 17th in Sochi four years later and ninth in Pyeongchang in 2018.

Nigeria's Super Eagles To Face Ghana in 2022 World Cup Play-Offs

AOUNDE (Dispatches) - Nigeria, the top performers so far in the ongoing Africa Cup of Nations in Cameroon, were paired with arch rivals Ghana in the African World Cup play-offs draw in Douala.



Ghana will have home advantage first and both legs will be played between March 21 and 29 with the aggregate winners securing a place at the 2022 World Cup in Qatar. Egypt face Senegal, Cameroon meet Algeria, the Democratic Republic of Congo play

Morocco and Mali tackle Tunisia in the other ties

Only Mali among the 10 contenders have never qualified for the world football showpiece while Cameroon hold the record for appearances by an African team with seven between 1982 and 2014. Nigeria brushed off a troubled build-up to the Cup of Nations, including the sacking of German coach Gernot Rohr, to be the only team among the 24 in Cameroon to win all three group matches. While the Super Eagles look forward to a last-16 clash with Tunisia on Sunday, Ghana were shock first-round casualties, finishing bottom of a group after a stunning 3-2 loss to minnows the Comoros.

Serbia-born Ghana coach Milovan Rajevac, who guided the Black Stars to the 2010 World Cup quarter-finals, insisted he would not resign after the humiliating loss.

"My primary ambition from the time I took over as coach last October was to qualify Ghana for the World Cup in Qatar," he said, amid rumours that he faces the sack.
