India's Exports To Iran Drop 43%

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - India's economy ministry reported a 43 percent drop in exports to Iran in 2021 compared to the previous year. India's total exports to iran last year were about \$1 billion and \$284 million.

The 43 percent drop in Indian exports to Iran occurred while the same year. India's total exports to foreign countries grew by 42 percent from 2020 to \$394 billion. India's imports also grew by 53 percent to \$572 billion.

Iran's exports to India also reached \$409 million last year, according to statistics from India's ministry of economy published this week. Thus, the trade balance between the two countries has been severely detrimental to Iran.

Before the U.S. oil embargo and in 2018, India's exports to Iran were about \$2.8 billion and imports from Iran were \$14.8 billion. In total, Iran had a share of less than half a percent in India's foreign trade last year.

No Direct Talks With U.S. in Vienna

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - Iran has not held any direct negotiations with the Americans in the course of Vienna talks on the revival of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), an MP quoted Iran's top negotiator Ali Baqeri as saying.

Speaking to Tasnim, the spokesman for the Iranian Parliament's National Security and Foreign Policy commission gave details of a Tuesday meeting that the commission members have held with Iran's lead nuclear negotiator Ali Baqeri.

According to Mahmoud Abbaszadeh, Baqeri has made it clear that the Iranian and American teams have not held any direct talks in Vienna so far.

Bageri has also pointed to the positive trend of the nuclear negotiations and reaffirmed Iran's goodwill and determination in the talks, the lawmaker added.

He noted that what can be concluded from yesterday's meeting at the Parliament is that the fruitfulness or the definite results of possible direct talks with the US are not clear under the current circumstances. Although the Vienna talks are making progress, there are major outstanding issues that need to be negotiated and agreed upon, Abbaszadeh said.

Last week. Ali Shamkhani, the secretary of Iran's Supreme National Security Council, also said in a tweet that "contact with the American delegation in Vienna has been through informal written exchanges, and there was no need, and will be no need, for more contact, so far.'

Nation's Maximum Resistance Overcomes U.S. Maximum Pressure

TEHRAN - President Ebrahim Raisi says the United States' maximum pressure policy against the Islamic Republic has failed in the face of Iran's maximum resistance campaign.

Raeisi made the remarks on Wednesday morning, during a visit to the mausoleum of the late founder of the Islamic Republic. Imam Khomeini. on the occasion of the 43rd anniversary of the Islamic Revolution. He said even U.S. officials themselves have admitted to the failure of the maximum pressure policy, which was initiated

by former U.S. president Donald Trump in 2018 and has been maintained under the new administration of Joe Biden. "When the Americans officially acknowledge that they have failed in maximum pressure (policy), an ignominious failure, this is a victory for the Iranian nation," the Iranian president stated.

"Today, the nation's maximum resistance to seditions and sanctions has borne fruit and the maximum pressure has failed," he added.

According to Raisi, whenever Iran resisted against the enemy, including during the era of Iraq's imposed war and other conspiracies hatched against the country, "divine victory accompanied us."

He said every success that has been attained in the country was made possible only where people were enabled. "Wherever we succeeded, it was because we had handed the field over to the people, and wherever we did not define a significant presence for the people, we did not succeed," the president said.

Further highlighting the ideals of the Islamic Revolution of 1979, Raisi said relying on God and engaging people were two basic principles invoked by the "great reformer of the century" to lead the Iranian nation toward the Revolution.

"Imam's advice to support [ordinary] people and hut-dwellers was a truth and was drawn from a belief," he noted. "Attending to people is a principle for all administrations, [including] our administration ... We need to take lessons from the Imam's political view," Raisi added.

Raisi said, "The field of justice requires men and women who exercise justice and one of the central points of change in society is that people should be fair, have a fair law and make fair judgments".

The President pointed out, "At a time when everyone was fleeing from justice in word and deed, the late Imam taught us that in this society, change can be made in the name of religion and justice, and he himself raised the banner of justice".

Raisi said: "In the last 40 years, very good actions and services have been done in various fields, but the enemies

Tehran Calls for Acceleration of ECO Gate Project

TEHRAN (MNA) - In the 11th Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) transport ministerial meeting which is hosted by Turkey, the ECO member states emphasized promoting ECO's intra-regional and inter-regional connectivity.

Iran Minister of Transport and Urban Development, Rostam Ghasemi, in his speech at this meeting, pointed to the necessity of improving economic development in the ECO region through infrastructural development, updating trade and transit procedures, and increasing traffic.

Ghasemi stressed accelerating the implementation of the project for a common gateway among ECO member states known as the 'ECO Gate Project' which will help the landlocked developing countries (LLDCs) to better access the high seas.

Iran proposed the ECO Secretariat and Pakistan to attract investments from banks and international organizations to construct Quetta-Taftan Railway Line and equip the fleet.

Iran also pointed to the importance of financing the projects along the Kyrgyzstan-Tajikistan-Afghanistan-Iran (KTAI) Corridor and continuing the test run along road corridors of KTAI and ITI under the TIR Convention in order to identify and remove the barriers. See Page 7

Iran to Modernize Airports With Russian, **Chinese Help**

TEHRAN (PressTV) - An official says Iran plans to expand and refurbish its airports according to international standards with the help of China and Russia.

"Projects will be for the next 20-25 years, because existing airports will meet the needs of the industry for the next 15 years, but in the long run we need a number of world class international airports," Managing Director of Iran's Airports Company (IAC) Siavash Amirmokri said.

He touched on Iran's stepped-up cooperation with Russia and China, saying detailed information in this regard will be released in due time after technical and specialized discussions are completed.

'Given our interactions with China and Russia, the plan is to build new airports in accordance with the needs of the country in some regions," Amirmokri said. The official cited Ardabil airport in northwest Iran which lies on the crossroads of Eastern Europe and South Caucasus near the border with Azerbaijan. See Page 7

U.S., Israel "True Enemies' of Muslims"

SANAA (Dispatches) - Leader of the Yemeni popular Ansarullah resistance movement has called the United States and the Israeli regime "enemies number one" to Muslims around the world.

"Americans and Israelis try to abuse the problems that lie within the [international Muslim] Ummah (Nation) towards furthering their own plots," Abdul-Malik al-Houthi said on Tuesday while receiving tribal delegations from across war-torn Yemen.

"Israel and its mercenaries consider the Yemeni nation to be their common enemy," he added.

Al-Houthi was referring to the regional Arab states that have entered US-backed normalization agreements with the Israeli regime and have, ever since, been trying to ingratiate themselves to the occupying regime by aligning their positions with it. "The [adversarial] positions that the United Arab Emirates, the Zionist regime, and Saudi Arabia [adopt] against the Yemeni people during their meetings is very clear," the Houthi leader noted. The UAE was one of the regional states that normalized its relations with the Israeli regime via the Washington-mediated so-called "Abraham Accords" in August 2020.

Several other regional states followed suit. Saudi Arabia has not yet clinched any explicit normalization agreement with Tel Aviv, but has once received the occupying regime's former prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu and recently opened its airspace to a UAE-headed flight that was carrying Israeli President Isaac Herzog.

Al-Houthi attacked Riyadh's double-standards in dealing with the occupying regime and the Yemeni people, asking how the kingdom would open up its skies to the Israeli officials' plane, but at the same time would forbid the Yemeni people from travelling within the kingdom. See Page 7

Iraqi Resistance Fighters Warn Turkey Over Airstrike on Makhmour

BAGHDAD (Dispatches) - The secretary general of Iraq's Asa'ib Ahl al-Hag movement, which is a part of Popular Mobilization Units (PMU) or Hashd al-Sha'abi, says resistance fighters will give an adequate response to the latest Turkish military aggression on the Arab country.

Qais al-Khazali, in a tweet published on his Twitter page on Wednesday, condemned Turkey's repeated violations of Iraqi sovereignty, warning that the Ankara government "is going too far with targeting civilians."

"Amid the government's deplorable silence, flagrant violation of the Iraqi sovereignty continues by Turkish occupation forces, after they established military bases in northern Iraq. The situation has exacerbated and ordinary citizens are now being targeted under flimsy claims and pretexts," Qazali wrote. He underlined that Iraqi resistance fighters will teach Turkish forces a tough lesson.

'We condemn in the strongest terms the aggression against our people, the bombardment of a refugee camp and increasing the suffering of [internally] displaced persons. We affirm that the barbaric Turkish moves will not go unanswered, and will be dealt with when the time is ripe. We will force them to withdraw from the Iraqi soil, as we did with respect to American occupation troops," Khazali pointed out.

Main Issues Remain in Vienna Talks

TEHRAN (MNA) - Despite the positive and forward-looking negotiation process, there are still important issues that need to be negotiated and agreed upon, said the Spokesman for the Parliament National Security and Foreign Policy Commission. Referring to the meeting of Iran's top negotiator at the Vienna talks Ali Bagheri Kani with the members of the Parliament's National Security and Foreign Policy Commission, Mahmoud Abbaszadeh Meshkini said that Bagheri Kani positively assessed the negotiation process and stressed the goodwill and seriousness of the Islamic Republic of Iran in the talks.

According to Bagheri Kani said Iran has not had any direct talks with the US so far, said Abbaszadeh Meshkini.

Nuclear Tech Driving Force Behind Iran's Development

TEHRAN (PressTV) - The head of the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) has called on Iranian officials to pave the way for faster advances in new technologies, saying nuclear technology is the "driving force" behind the country's development.

Mohammad Eslami made the remarks on Tuesday while paying a visit to the family of prominent nuclear scientist Mohsen Fakhrizadeh, who was assassinated near Tehran on November 27, 2020, in a terrorist attack widely attributed to Israel.

He said hegemonic powers cannot stand Iran's power and spare no effort to hinder the country's progress.

"Our officials should take heed of paving the way for the development of science and knowledge, especially new technologies, without fear and with confidence. Whenever we decided to enter a field and get involved in it, we emerged victorious and proud," Eslami said.

He said a source of power is development in new technologies, in which, he continued, Iranian scientists have reached significant achievements, including Iran's recognition as a nuclear energy power in the world.

"From the point of view of the global arrogance (hegemonic powers), the presence

of the Islamic Iran among powerful countries is considered forbidden," he said. The chief Iranian nuclear official further said that thriving in new technologies, for the sake of creating wealth and power, would free Iran of the domination of hegemonic powers. "This is not something they want," he added.

"The important point is that today, nuclear technology is the driving force behind the country's development, and the impact of this technology on other industries and different aspects of people's lives will be manifested soon, God willing," Eslami said.

He explained that Iran's nuclear industry aims to produce electricity and improve the health, agriculture, food, and environment sectors.

"Our scientists' advances in the rapid movement toward new technologies should not stop. Our scientists proved that they will conquer the peaks of scientific progress, which was unimaginable for the world, without relying on others," he added.

In a message to Chinese President Xi Jinping on Tuesday, Raisi offered his sincerest congratulations to him and the noble people of China on the Spring Festival, commonly known in English as the Chinese New Year.

"I am delighted that at the beginning of the New Year, diplomatic relations between the two nations have entered their second fifty years and the implementation of a 25-year comprehensive cooperation plan has been announced," he added. He expressed hope that Iran and China would witness further promotion of bilateral regional and international cooperation in all areas.

Undoubtedly, the Iranian president stated, the world would witness the successful holding of the Beijing Winter Olympics 2022 under Xi's wise leadership.

Iran and China signed a landmark agreement in March last year in defiance of the US's unilateral sanctions, in a move aimed at bolstering their longstanding economic and political alliance.

Beijing has long sought to boost ties with Tehran, with President Xi describing Iran as "China's major partner in the Middle East" on a rare visit to the country in 2016.

Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian and his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi signed final documents to announce the start of the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership between the two countries in January.

TEHRAN (MNA) - Government Economic Coordination Headquarters, in a meeting on Wednesday, approved a proposed plan for supporting domestic production and eliminating barriers in this regard, the portal of Iran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (ICCIMA) reported.

Chaired by President Ebrahim Raisi, the mentioned meeting also dealt with various issues regarding the regulation of the basic goods market.

During the meeting, a report on the situation of the major foodstuff market was presented, which was approved by President Raisi. Raisi further asked Agriculture Minister Seyyed Javad Sadati-Nejad to take the necessary measures for managing the price of foodstuff items.

The attendees also approved the government's proposed package that is aimed at removing obstacles and supporting the production and service sectors after several review sessions and it was decided to review it immediately in a cabinet meeting to be notified to the executive bodies for implementation after finalizing.

This package includes removing barriers to production, supporting Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs), and providing financial facilities to manufacturing and service enterprises.

Supporting domestic production has become a major goal of the Iranian government over the past two years as the Leader of the Islamic Revolution Seyed Ali Khamenei has repeatedly stressed the need for promoting domestic production and cutting reliance on foreign sources.

Earlier in January, the Iranian parliament (Majlis) had also approved the general outlines of a bill on supporting the country's factories and production units.

Gov't Imposes Restrictions Amid Surge in COVID Deaths

TEHRAN (IFP) - The government has imposed fresh restrictions on movement between cities amid a surge in the number of deaths and infections caused by the coronavirus.

Iran's health ministry announced that 15 major cities across the country had been designated as "red" in a color coding system meant to indicate the severity of coronavirus disease in various regions.

The ministry said that some 61 cities were in "orange" or medium-high risk status while the rating in 274 cities was "yellow" or low-risk.

The red cities included the capital Tehran where local authorities said primary schools will shift to online classes for a week starting Wednesday to prevent the spread of the Omicron variant of the coronavirus.

That comes as figures published on the website of the Iranian

health ministry showed that the number of coronavirus deaths recorded in the country since Monday afternoon had topped 50, more than double figures from earlier this week.

The daily number of infections also rose to 35,070 on Tuesday while coronavirus patients in need of intensive care reached a total of 1,703.

Iran's health minister Bahram Einollahi urged people to get booster vaccines to prevent a new peak in the number of deaths and infections in Iran.

Einollahi said the number of referrals to Iranian hospitals for coronavirus had risen by several times within the past week. He insisted that a majority of those hospitalized were people who had failed to receive the full two doses of coronaviurs vaccines needed to get an acceptable level of immunity against the disease.

Gov't Approves Plan to Support Domestic Production

Iran, Qatar Discuss Afghanistan

TEHRAN (Tasnim) – Special envoys representing Iran and Qatar weighed plans for cooperation between the two countries on the issues relating to Afghanistan. Iran's special representative for Afghanistan Hassan Kazemi Qomi and the special envoy of Qatar's foreign minister for counterterrorism and mediation in conflict resolution, Mutlaq bin Majed Al Qahtani, held talks at a meeting in Doha.

According to the Iranian envoy, their talks have revolved around the cooperation between Iran and Qatar on the affairs relating to Afghanistan.

The Iranian officials say they stay in contact with all Afghan groups, including the Taliban, calling for the formation of an inclusive government in Afghanistan. In an address to an emergency session of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), held in Islamabad in December 2021, Iranian Foreign Minister Hossein Amirabdollahian warned that delay in the formation of an inclusive government in Afghanistan will give the enemies of Afghan people the chance to activate an extensive network of social criminals through spreading the terrorism of Daesh and creating economic hardships.

Jalili Recommends JCPOA Withdrawal

TEHRAN (IFP) - The Leader of the Islamic Revolution's envoy to Iran's Supreme National Security Council Saeed Jalili has written a letter to Ayatollah Seyed Ali Khamanei calling for Tehran to abandon the 2015 nuclear deal and enrich uranium to over 90% purity before holding direct talks with the United States, an informed source has said. According to the source quoted by Iranian daily Shargh, in his letter, Jalili explicitly expresses his opposition to the current path of negotiations in Vienna and stresses that Iran must withdraw from the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action now.

Jalili, who served as the lead nuclear negotiator under former President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, predicts that the other side will face legal problems in pursuing the snapback of the main nuclear sanctions against Iran.

According to the source, Jalili believes that any snapback of sanctions will require a referral to the UN Security Council, but Russia and China will use their veto powers and block the efforts of the Europeans and the United States. The former nuclear negotiator believes when Iran pulls out of the JCPOA and intensifies uranium enrichment, it can sit down for talks with the U.S. and secure the removal of all sanctions.

The source says Jalili wrote the letter after he failed to convince Foreign Minister Hossein Amir Abdollahian and lead negotiator Ali Bagheri Kani to abandon the current path of negotiations. Jalili has yet to comment on this report.

Minister Announces Registration of Iranian Medicines in Syria



TEHRAN (IP) - Minister of Health said that Tehran would be ready to stand by Syria in fight against terrorism and in health and treatment sector. Following decades of war in Syria and U.S. and some Western sanctions against the country, the Syrian health sector has been severely damaged and disrupted.

Bahram Einollahi, Minister of Health, Treatment and Medical Education of Iran, during a meeting with Shafiq Dayoub, the Syrian Ambassador to Iran, referred to the improvement of relations between the two countries in the field of medicine, adding: "With the implementation of the Syrian president's order to register Iranian-made drugs in that country, medicine produced by Iranian pharmaceutical companies will be exported to Svria." Einollahi said: "Unfortunately, due to the sabotage of terrorists in Syria, the health infrastructure of this country has been damaged and the Islamic Republic of Iran is ready to help the Syrian people in the field of health and treatment." The Minister of Health, Treatment and Medical Education of Iran further stated that there is no border between the two countries, saying the Islamic Republic of Iran, as in the past, stands by the Syrian government and people in all areas, as well as in the fight against terrorist outfits. Biotechnology Companies Account For 60% of Iran's Medicinal Exports

TEHRAN (IP) - 60% of Iran's exports in the field of medicine goes to knowledge-based companies active in the field of biotechnology.

Mostafa Ghanei, Secretary of Iran's Biotechnology Development Headquarters, said that the most expensive drugs, such as the ones suitable for fighting against cancer, hemophilia and coronavirus, are related to biotechnology. "With the support of Iranian officials from knowledge-based companies in the field of biotechnology, the outflow

of 1 billion and 800 million dollars of foreign currency for the import of drugs is now prevented," he added Ghanei stated that in the field of biotechnology, considering that the Iranian scientists have entered the field of medicine only, Iran ranks third in Asia.

The secretary of Iran's Biotechnology Development Headquarters said that the biotechnology department has guaranteed the country's security in the field of medicine.

'We made the Corona Diagnostic Kit on a quarterly basis, and Iran is the second country after the United States to manufacture a drug to reduce pneumonia," he concluded.

468 Industrial, Mining Projects to Be Inaugurated During Ten-Day Dawn

TEHRAN (MNA) - Some 468 industrial and mining projects worth 626 trillion rials (about \$2.2 billion) are scheduled to be inaugurated in Iran during the Ten-Day Dawn (February 1-11), which marks the 43rd anniversary of the Islamic Revolution, Deputy Industry, Mining, and Trade Minister Mehdi Niazi announced.

According to Niazi, the mentioned projects are going to create direct job opportunities for over 22,800 people across the country, IRNA reported.

Niazi said 172 of the mentioned projects are large-scale industrial and mining projects which will benefit the country at a national level. Most of the said projects will be put into operation in East Azarbaijan, Khorasan Razavi, Yazd, and Alborz provinces, the official said.

Of the total number of projects ready to be inaugurated, 296 are related to the small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) that have been established with a total investment of about 2.6 trillion rials (about \$93.1 million) and will create jobs for about 5,800 people, Niazi added.

Every year, during the Ten-Day Dawn celebrations, which mark the victory of the Islamic Revolution in Iran, numerous infrastructure projects are inaugurated or commenced to mark the development of the country after the revolution.

Last week, Transport and Urban Development Ministry had announced the plan for the inauguration of numerous port development, maritime, and transport projects during the Ten-Day Dawn.

Landslide in Quito Kills At Least 14, Injures 32

QUITO (Dispatches) - At least 14 people died and another 32 were injured in a landslide in the north of Ecuador's capital Quito, the country's emergency response office said on Tuesday, as firefighter rescue crews continue searching homes and streets covered by mud.

Torrential rains on Monday night caused a build-up of water in a gorge near the working class neighborhoods of La Gasca and La Comuna, sending mud and rocks down on residences and affecting electricity provision.

"The figure of deceased people rises to 14, that of destroyed homes to 3 and affected families to 3," the Ecuador Office for Risk and Emergency Management said on Twitter. Authorities said late on Monday nine people were missing and 32 were injured.

Ukraine Plans to Boost Army; **U.S. Demands Russian De-Escalation**



KIEV (Dispatches) - Ukraine's president signed a decree to boost his armed forces by 100,000 troops over three years, as European leaders lined up to back him in a standoff with Russia and the United States demanded immediate Russian de-escalation.

President Volodymyr Zelenskiy urged lawmakers to stay calm and avoid panic, saying he had ordered the increase "not because we will soon have a war... but so that soon and in the future there will be peace in Ukraine". Russia has massed more than 100,000 troops near Ukraine's borders. It denies plans to invade but says it could take unspecified military action if demands are not met, including barring Ukraine from ever joining NATO. The United States and its allies say any invasion would trigger tough sanctions.

Speaking to Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov by phone, U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken reiterated Washington's readiness to continue dialogue, but called for "immediate Russian de-escalation and the withdrawal of troops and equipment from Ukraine's borders", the State Department said. Ukraine's armed forces number about

250,000, compared to Russia's overall strength of around 900,000. Russian troops have been holding drills in Belarus and in a breakaway region of Moldova, potentially making it possible to attack from

several directions. Ukraine said it was working with Poland and Britain to strengthen cooperation "in the context of ongoing Russian aggression".

On a visit to Kyiv, Polish Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki said Warsaw would help Ukraine with gas and arms supplies, as well as humanitarian and economic aid.

"Living close to a neighbor like Russia, we have the feeling of living at the foot of a volcano, said Morawiecki, promising Ukraine artillery ammunition, mortar bombs, portable air-defense systems and surveillance drones. British Prime Minister Boris Johnson also visited Kyiv on Tuesday in a Western show of support intended to convince Russian President Vladimir Putin he would pay a high price for any aggression. "We urge Russia to step back and engage in dialogue to find a diplomatic resolution and avoid further bloodshed," Johnson said in remarks released ahead of his arrival. Some countries have removed nonessential embassy staff from Kviv and Washington advised on Tuesday against travel to Belarus because of "an increase in unusual and concerning Russian military activity near the border with Ukraine." The West last week formally rejected Russian demands to bar Ukraine from ever joining NATO and pull out NATO forces from Eastern Europe. Western countries say they are still willing to talk about arms control and confidence-building measures.

Norwegian Mass Killer's Parole Application Rejected

OSLO (Dispatches) - A Norwegian court has rejected mass killer Anders Behring Breivik's parole application, it said in a ruling on Tuesday, ordering that he must stay in prison.

Breivik, an anti-Muslim neo-Nazi, killed 77 people in Norway's worst peacetime atrocity in July 2011. He killed eight with a car bomb in Oslo and then gunned down 69, most of them teenagers, at a Labor Party youth camp. On the first day of the parole hearing last month, Breivik made a white supremacist sign with his fingers before raising his right arm in a Nazi salute to signal his far-right ideology as he entered the court. "The risk of violence is real and significant and equal to what it was when (Breivik) was first sentenced," the district court in Telemark said in a unanimous verdict.

Amnesty Accuses Israel of Enforcing Apartheid **On Palestinians**

TEL AVIV (Dispatches) - Amnesty International accused Israel on Tuesday of subjecting Palestinians to a system of apartheid founded on policies of "segregation, dispossession and exclusion" that it said amounted to crimes against humanity.

The London-based rights group said its findings were based on research and legal analysis in a 211-page report into Israeli seizure of Palestinian land and property, unlawful killings, forcible transfer of people and denial of citizenship.

Israel said the report, the second by an international rights group in less than a year to accuse it of pursuing a policy of apartheid, "consolidates and recycles lies" from hate groups and was designed to "pour fuel onto the fire of antisemitism". It accused Amnesty UK of using "double standards and demonization in order to delegitimize Israel".

U.N. Urges Taliban to Release Information About Missing Journalists

KABUL (Dispatches) - The United Nation's mission to Afghanistan called on the Taliban administration to release details on the detention of two Afghan ournalists who disappeared the previous day.

A Taliban administration spokesman, Bilal Karimi, said it was investigating the men's abduction and denied they had been arrested.

"Mounting concern about restrictions on media & free expression. UN urges Taliban to make public why they detained these ... reporters & to respect Afghan's rights," said the U.N. Assistance Mission to Afghanistan (UNAMA) in a Tweet.

Ali Asghari, news manager at local broadcaster Ariana News, said that on Monday afternoon two of its journalists were taken, but the identity of the abductors was not clear.

Fears for the safety of vocal opponents of the Taliban and prominent women have risen since the Islamist group took over the country in August as foreign forces withdrew. Many civil society and women's rights activists fled the country. Also on Tuesday, the UN's human rights spokesperson gave a briefing in Geneva expressing major concern over the disappearance of six people last month in connection with women's rights protests.

"We are gravely concerned for their well-being and safety," said U.N. human rights spokesperson Ravina Shamdasan, adding there were other reports of other house searches of activists.

"These reports have also brought into focus what appears to be a pattern of arbitrary arrests and detentions.

Another Taliban administration spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid rejected the JN human rights spokeswoman's assessment, saying it was investigating the situation involving the abducted women.

The Taliban says they have an amnesty for any previous opponents, including Afghan military members, and that they respect women's rights in line

with Islamic law and customs, but many human rights advocates and foreign diplomats remain skeptical.

Palestinians praised the report. "The United Nations Security

Council and the General Assembly are obliged to heed the compelling evidence presented by Amnesty and other leading human rights organizations and hold Israel accountable for its crimes against the Palestinian people, including through sanctions." the Palestinian foreign ministry said in a statement.

Amnesty said Israel was enforcing a system of oppression and domination against Palestinians "wherever it has control over their rights", including Arab citizens of Israel, Palestinians in Israeli-occupied territory and refugees living abroad.

The measures included restrictions on Palestinian movement in territory occupied in the 1967 Middle East war, underinvestment in Palestinian communities in Israel, and preventing the return of Palestinian refugees.

Alongside forcible transfers, torture and unlawful killings, which Amnesty said were intended to maintain a system of "oppression and domination", they constitute "the crime against humanity of apartheid".

Japan Parliament Adopts Resolution on Human Rights in China

TOKYO (Dispatches) - Japan's parliament adopted a rare resolution on what it called the "serious human rights situation" in China, and asked the government to take steps to relieve the situation.

Japan has already announced it will not send a government delegation to the upcoming Beijing Winter Olympics, following a U.S.-led diplomatic boycott over concerns about China's human rights condition, although Tokyo avoided explicitly labelling its move as such.

Since taking office in October, Prime Minister Fumio Kishida has said on multiple occasions that Japan would not mince words with China when necessary, and in November appointed former defence minister Gen Nakatani as his aide on human rights.

Two Babies Freeze to Death In IDP Camps in Idlib

DAMASCUS (Dispatches) - Two children died overnight, including a seven-day-old baby, in tented displacement camps in Syria's Idlib province due to severe cold weather, drawing attention to the dire humanitarian condition in the region.

"When I touched her, she felt like ice," Mohamad Al-Hassan told Al Jazeera. His seven-day-old daughter Fatima passed away overnight at he Al Rahman hospital in Idlib, which is home to millions of Syrians who have fled the decade-old war.

"We were able to prepare a little bit for the winter," said Al-Hassan, "but we couldn't get everything we need. It's hard to secure work and an income."

Dr Fadi Hallak of the Al-Rahman hospital said that Fatima was blue and bleeding from the nose and mouth by the time she reached the hospital. "She was born here a week ago without any complications," Hallak told Al Jazeera. "But she, unfortunately, died because of the freezing cold in recent days."

Freezing cold weather over the past two weeks has swept northwest Syria, where more than 4 million displaced Syrians live. About 1.7 million of these internally displaced persons (IDPs) live in tented settlements after fleeing the forces of President Bashar al-Assad. The enclave is the last opposition stronghold in the war-torn country.

Amina Salameh, a two-month-old who lived with her family in the Al-Jabal displacement camp in northern Idlib, also passed away this morning. She had a pulse when she arrived at Al-Rahman, but doctors couldn't keep her alive.

"She was blue and had a slow pulse," said Dr Hallak. "We tried to keep her warm and nourish her".

At least three other children have died in the cold in the past two weeks. International humanitarian agency Save the Children in a statement called the deaths "avoidable and tragic".

"It is incomprehensible that any child should face the winter scared for their life," Sonia Khush, the director of the Save the Children Syria Response Office, said in a statement.

"Almost 11 years after the crisis in Syria started, it feels like the world has forgotten about children in North West Syria."

Exxon Posts Best Results in Seven Years

HOUSTON (Reuters) - Exxon Mobil Corp on Tuesday reported a fourth-quarter profit of \$8.87 billion, its largest in seven years, as the top U.S. oil producer benefited from strong energy prices. The company slashed spending after fuel demand cratered two years ago and, since then, earnings have topped pre-pandemic levels. On Monday, Exxon also disclosed a business shakeup to accelerate a \$6-billion cut to operating expenses set in motion last year.

The revamping will "position us to lead in cash flow and earnings growth, operating performance, and the energy transition," Chief Executive Darren Woods said in a statement. Exxon reported a profit of \$2.08 per share, above analysts' forecast of \$1.94 as the bottom line benefited from soaring oil and gas prices, higher volumes and asset sales. In the same quarter a year ago, Exxon posted an adjusted profit of 3 cents a share.





Qatar Seals Boeing Freighter Deal With Surprise 737 Order

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - Qatar Airways handed Boeing Co a record launch order for 34 new 777X freighters and a surprise purchase of 737 MAX passenger jets on Monday, in a \$30 billion-plus package as President Joe Biden hailed the Persian Gulf state as a major U.S. ally. The deal, signed at the White House during a visit to Washington by Qatar's ruling emir, boosted Boeing at a time when the U.S. planemaker faces chronic industrial and financial constraints. The order drove Boeing shares up to close 5.1% higher.

The deal for 25 of the largest version of the MAX, the 737-10, plus 25 further options, widened the fallout from a dispute between Qatar Airways and Airbus.

The European planemakerearlier this month revoked a contract with Qatar Airways for 50 competing A321neo jets as part of a spiraling dispute that began with disagreements over the

severity of flaws on long-haul A350 jets. Qatar Airways Chief Executive Akbar Al Baker said Qatari

and U.S. aircraft and engine negotiators had "lost a lot of sleep" in the intervening two weeks to shape an alternative deal, and contrasted that with a recent plunge in relations with Airbus.

"We like to build long-term relationships with trusted partners where both parties work together towards a common purpose,' he told a White House signing ceremony attended by leaders from Boeing and engine maker General Electric Co. Airbus declined comment.

The total order included 34 of a newly launched freighter version of the 777X passenger plane, plus 16 options, and two more of the current-generation freighter, the 777F. Reuters reported the 737 MAX deal earlier on Monday.

The freight part of the deal represents the first order for a cargo spin-off of the 777X, the world's largest twin-engine passenger plane whose entry to service has been delayed more than three years to late 2023 or beyond.

Boeing said the freighter would enter service in 2027.

It is banking on sales of the new twin-engined juggernaut to defend its dominance of the cargo market and head off a challenge from a new Airbus A350 freighter.

"(The 777X) will be an absolute world-beater," Boeing Chief Executive Dave Calhoun said.

To win the freighter order, Boeing agreed to convert a third of Qatar's existing order for 60 777X passenger planes, for which there is currently less demand, to the cargo version.

Al Baker played up support for the U.S. economy from Qatar Airways, which has faced trade complaints in the past from U.S. carriers over alleged subsidies - a practice it denies.

For Boeing, the deal marks a respite from a recent safety crisis over the MAX and delays with the 777X passenger jet

and 787 Dreamliner, and a chance to win points for its own economic contribution after intense regulatory and political scrutiny. Qatar Airways had criticized the MAX and urged Boeing to design an all-new jet after crashes led to a lengthy grounding, but sales have rebounded since it was re-cleared in late 2020.

The Airbus A321neo continues to dominate sales in the part of the market served by the largest MAX variant, however. Boeing said the freighter order would sustain more than 35,000 U.S. jobs with an annual economic impact of \$2.6 billion.



LONDON (Dispatches) - The eurozone's unemployment rate fell to a historic low in December, official figures showed Tuesday, as hiring in Europe rode a solid recovery and shrugged off the explosive spread of the Omicron coronavirus variant.

The seasonally adjusted jobless rate stood at seven percent in December, the lowest level since the official Eurostat statistics agency began compiling data in April 1998.

In the 27-member European Union, which includes countries such as Poland not in the single currency bloc, unemployment fell to 6.4 percent in December, also a low since records began.

"The eurozone ended 2021 -- the year after the worst recession since World War II -- with its lowest ever unemployment rate. A testimony to the success of our collective response to this crisis," said Paolo Gentiloni, the EU economics affairs commissioner.

Previously, the lowest unemployment rates for both the 19 countries sharing the single currency and the EU-27 -- of 7.2 percent and 6.5 percent respectively -- had been recorded in March 2020. Year-on-year, the picture also improved significantly, with a drop from 7.5 percent in the eurozone, equating to 1.8 million fewer people seeking work.

The positive development on the labor market represents a marked difference from the eurozone debt crisis, in which the bloc struggled for years to bring unemployment down to pre-crisis levels.

EU officials attribute the difference to a radical change in approach in which the EU jointly agreed on a massive spending push at the worst of the crisis, instead of the austerity path chosen in 2010-2015.

This would also help explain Europe's economic burst in 2021, in which the eurozone economy grew by a record 5.2 percent.

OPEC + Output Misses Cost Almost \$21b in Lost Revenue in 2021 Eurostat said that some 13.6 million people were

MOSCOW (Dispatches) - OPEC+ missed its oil production target by more 800,000 barrels per day (bpd) on average last year, missing out on billions of dollars in revenues and hurting members of the group which have struggled to raise cash to invest, data seen by Reuters showed.

Based on the average price of \$70 a barrel for OPEC's crude basket, 800,000 bpd in lost output about half Britain's daily consumption - equates to about \$21 billion in lost earnings for the group in 2021, Reuters calculations show.

After its record output cuts in 2020, OPEC+, which groups the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and allies led by Russia, has been gradually relaxing its curbs as demand recovers from the worst impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

But not all producers have kept up with the rising output goals, especially West African producers Nigeria

Even as others matched production targets - which have recently been rising at a rate of 400,000 bpd a

Spare capacity, production which can switched on at short notice, is a vital cushion to protect the market from any shock, smoothing out price volatility and spikes.

"Spare capacity remains critically low, with concerns around Russia's, Kuwait's, and Iraq's productive capacity likely to materialise by summer, when demand seasonally ramps up and international travel reopens," Goldman Sachs wrote in a note.

OPEC+ is expected to stick to its previously agreed plan to raise March output by 400,000 bpd when it meets on Vednesday, although two OPEC+ sources told Reuters the surge in prices might prompt the group to consider other steps. Benchmark Brent traded above \$90 a barrel this month at a more than seven-year high. It was \$88.85 at 202 GMT, more than \$20 higher than the average price in 2021.

A Reuters OPEC production survey on Tuesday found that in January the group overall had undershot the output rise it had planned by even more than in December.

"There is very little the ECB can do against the current inflation drivers, but once inflation expectations start to move up and wage growth accelerates, a rate hike will no longer be far away," said Carsten Brzeski of ING bank.

A rise in rates would be bad news for the eurozone's most indebted governments, such as Italy, France, Greece and Spain, as it would put added strain on their budgets.

They will back Lagarde in her belief that inflation is a short-term phenomenon and that the eurozone remains economically fragile and needs the ultra-low borrowing price and stimulus.

India to Launch State-Backed Digital Rupee, Tax Crypto

MUMBAI (Dispatches) - India will introduce a state-backed "digital rupee" and impose a 30 percent tax on profits from virtual currencies, the government announced Tuesday.

ISTANBUL (Dispatches) - Turkey's tourism revenues doubled to almost \$25 billion last year and the country's trade deficit narrowed, according to data on Monday reflecting a recovery from the initial wave of COVID-19 pandemic measures in 2020.

President Tayyip Erdogan has presented a shift to a current account surplus as a centrepiece of his government's sweeping new economic policy, which is focused on low interest rates and stronger exports and credit - despite soaring inflation.

Income from tourism has also grown more important as the central bank seeks to boost reserves and execute market interventions to defend the lira, which lost 44% of its value to the dollar last year amid a December currency crisis.

Last year as a whole tourism revenue climbed 103% to \$24.482 billion, Turkish Statistical Institute (TUIK) data showed. In the fourth

quarter, revenues rose 95% to \$7.6 billion, only 3% below the level in October-December 2019 - the last quarter before the coronavirus began having an impact.

However, the revenues last year as a whole were still well off the \$34.5 billion recorded in 2019.

It was TUIK's first publication following Erdogan's dismissal of its Chairman Sait Erdal Dincer at the weekend, less than a year after his appointment.

The move comes after opposition parties and some economists raised questions over the credibility of the agency's inflation data - concerns that TUIK has dismissed - and ahead of key January CPI data due on Feb. 3.

The new TUIK head, Erhan Cetinkaya, was deputy chairman of the BDDK banking watchdog since 2019.

Separately, Tourism Ministry data on Monday showed foreign arrivals jumped 94% to 24.7 million last year.

The foreign trade deficit shrank 7.5% year-on-year to \$46.13 billion in 2021, separate TUIK data showed on Monday, with exports jumping 32.8% and imports rising 23.6%.

However there was a deterioration in December when the deficit surged 49% from a year earlier to \$6.79 billion, as exports climbed 24.9% and imports rose 29.9%

The lira was some 1.4% stronger at 13.34 against the dollar after



the release of the figures. The currency has steadied this

year after the slide in late 2021 took it to a record low of 18.4 against the dollar, fuelling a surge in inflation, before the government took steps to boost the lira including forex market interventions.

According to the calculations of bankers and economists, the central bank has scaled back its interventions but still spent as much as \$1 billion in one week in January to keep the lira steady after last month's volatility.

They make India the latest major emerging economy to rein in the sector, after China went even further in outlawing all cryptocurrency transactions last September.

"There has been a phenomenal increase in transactions in virtual digital assets," finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman told parliament, adding that the growth necessitated a proper tax framework.

Profits made trading cryptocurrencies and other digital assets will be taxed at 30 percent, while any losses from digital transactions will not be granted offsets against other income.

A one-percent tax will be deducted at the source for all digital asset transactions above an as-yet-unspecified threshold.

Sitharaman also said the central bank would introduce a "digital rupee", based on blockchain technology, by the end of March 2023.

"Introduction of central bank digital currency will give a big boost to (the) digital economy. Digital currency will also lead to a more efficient and cheaper currency management system,' she said.

Cryptocurrencies have been under scrutiny by Indian regulators since first entering the local market nearly a decade ago, with a surge in fraudulent transactions leading to a central bank ban in 2018.

India's Supreme Court lifted the ban two years later and the market has surged since, growing by nearly 650 percent in the year to June 2021 -- second only to Vietnam, according to research by Chainalysis.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi last year warned that Bitcoin presented a risk to younger generations and could "spoil our youth" if it ended up "in the wrong hands"

The government soon proposed banning "all private cryptocurrencies", but ultimately held back

Tuesday's budget also included plans to ramp up infrastructure spending to support the economy's post-pandemic bounceback as officials grapple with rising inflation and unemployment.

Spending will be directed to roads, railways, defense, housing and energy, as the government eyes important state polls in the coming weeks.



Chinese, French Oil Majors Seal Deal for Uganda Megaproject

KAMPALA (Dispatches) - Chinese and French oil giants sealed a landmark \$10-billion deal on Tuesday to develop Uganda's energy resources and build a vast regional oil pipeline, a megaproject that has incensed environmental groups.

The so-called Final Investment Decision was announced at a ceremony in Kampala by the heads of France's TotalEnergies and the China National Offshore Oil Corporation (CNOOC).

"Today is the day we commit to invest \$10 billion in the Tilenga and Kingfisher projects and the 1,443-km long pipeline," TotalEnergies chairman and CEO Patrick Pouyanne said in a statement.

The project aims to exploit the huge crude oil reserves at Lake Albert, a 160-kilometre (100-mile) natural border between Uganda and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The oil would be pumped from landlocked Uganda through a 1,443-kilometre (900-mile) heated pipeline -- said to become the longest of its type when completed -- through Tanzania to the Indian Ocean port of Tanga.

Pouyanne described the controversial pipeline as a "masterpiece" of a project, although critics charge that it threatens livelihoods and fragile ecosystems in the heart of Africa.

"From today with the FID, the project will fully enter into the construction phase," he said

CNOOC Uganda president Chen Zhuobiao said: "Achieving FID is a first step towards achieving first oil and unlocking opportunities for investment and development of Uganda and the whole region.

The ceremony was also attended by Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni and Tanzania's Vice President Philip Mpango.

Lake Albert lies atop an estimated 6.5 billion barrels of crude, of which about 1.4 billion barrels are currently considered recoverable.

In Uganda, the drilling is located in several natural reserves, one of which extends to Murchison Falls, the country's largest national park.



TotalEnergies, formerly Total, said last year it had taken steps to reduce the project's impact on people and the environment, but conservation groups charge it will be devastating.

The pipeline project would be "displacing thousands of households, endangering water resources for millions of Ugandans and Tanzanians, devastating vulnerable ecosystems and pushing the world further into climate chaos," campaign group 350Africa.org's regional director Landry Ninteretse said in a statement.

A consortium of Ugandan and French NGOs filed a lawsuit in 2019 against the French company accusing it of failing to abide by its legal obligations to protect the environment and the rights of the people affected by the project.

In December, the Court of Cassation, France's highest, ruled that the case should be heard in a civil court rather than assigned to a commercial tribunal, in what the activists said was an important victory.

U.S. Manufacturing Sector Slows in January



WASHINGTON (dispatches) - A measure of U.S. manufacturing activity fell to a 14-month low in January amid an outbreak of COVID-19 infections, supporting views that economic growth lost steam at the start of the year.

The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) said on Tuesday that its index of national factory activity dropped to a reading of 57.6 last month. That was the lowest reading since November 2020 and followed 58.8 in December.

A reading above 50 indicates expansion in manufacturing, which accounts for 11.9% of the U.S. economy. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast the index dropping to 57.5.

The economy hit a soft patch in December, which appeared to have persisted into early 2022 as coronavirus infections, driven by the Omicron variant, raged across the country. The ensuing disruptions at businesses and schools have led economists to anticipate a sharp slowdown in job growth in January.

The economy grew at a 6.9% annualized rate in the

Climate Change, Population Threaten Staggering U.S. Flood Losses by 2050

PARIS (Dispatches)

Climate change is on track to ramp up the annual cost of U.S. flood damage more than 25 percent by 2050, according to new research Monday that warns disadvantaged communities will likely bear the brunt of the financial burden. The study published in

the journal Nature Climate Change used new flood models to map out the present and future impact of sea level rise, tropical cyclones and changing weather patterns.

Losses include destruction projected to hit homes and businesses. Researchers warned that even more people are expected to move into areas at growing risk of inundation.

"Climate change combined with shifting populations present a double whammy of flood risk danger and the financial implications are staggering," said lead author Oliver Wing, of the University of Bath's Cabot Institute for the Environment.

Wing said the findings should be a "call to action" for both a reduction in emissions and efforts to adapt to accelerating climate risks "to reduce the devastating financial impact flooding wreaks on people's lives."

Researchers used nationwide property asset data, information on communities and flood projections to estimate flood risk across the U.S.

The study showed that poorer communities with a proportionally larger white population currently face the steepest losses.

But future growth in flood risk is expected to have a greater impact on African American communities on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts. "The mapping clearly indicates Black communities will be disproportionately affected in a warming world, in addition to the poorer White communities which predominantly bear the historical risk," said Wing. "Both of these findings are of significant concern."

Average annual flood osses were forecast to increase by 26.4 percent. from \$32 billion currently, to \$40.6 billion in 2050, based on

would still be the same. They also warned that expanding populations in the U.S. would also significantly increase the flood risk, eclipsing even the impact of climate change.

With inundations expected to intensify in areas where populations are also increasing, the researchers said average annual exposure of the U.S. population to floods is expected to grow to more than seven millions by 2050, a 97-percent increase from current levels.

It said increases in climate-enhanced exposure was particularly concentrated along the US East Coast, with existing Texas and Florida residents seeing a roughly 50-percent increase in flood exposure by 2050.

In terms of increased flood risk due to population growth, the researchers highlighted intensified development on existing floodplains, which they said was "relatively severe in the currently sparsely populated central Prairie States and the Deep South".

The study said even developments currently considered low risk may be in areas expected to see a heightened flood risk in the coming decades.

"Current flood risk in western society is already unacceptably high, yet climate and population change

Relying on knowledge-based companies, Iran has provided most of the equipment needed in its airports from domestic production in recent years, he said.

"Recently, we have had projects such as the contract for the purchase of advanced radar, switching and navigation aid systems and runway lighting system at Ardabil airport, in which we have reached self-sufficiency."

Due to its size. Iran has 53 airports and domestic air travel is rising even though the country has long struggled to replenish its fleet in the face of sanctions. Iran had placed orders for purchases of 20 ATR 72-600 planes from the Franco-Italian aircraft manufacturer for internal travel, but only 13 of them were delivered.

COPENHAGEN (Dispatches) - Greenland's immense ice sheet has lost enough ice in the past 20 years to submerge the entire United States in half a metre of water, according to data released this week by Danish researchers.

The climate is warming faster in the Arctic than anywhere else on the planet and melting ice from Greenland is now the main factor in the rise in the Earth's oceans, according to NASA.

Since measurements began in 2002, the Greenland ice sheet has lost about 4,700 billion tons of ice, said Polar Portal, a joint project involving several Danish Arctic research institutes.

This represents 4,700 cubic kilometers of melted water -- "enough to cover the entire U.S. by half a meter" -- and has contributed 1.2 centimeters to sea level rise, the Arctic monitoring website added.

Polar Portal's findings are based on satellite imagery from the US-German GRACE program (Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment), which showed the ice melt to be most severe near the coasts of the Arctic territory, at the edge of the ice sheet.

In these peripheral zones, "independent observations also indicate that the ice is thinning, that the glacier fronts are retreating in fjords and on land, and that there is a greater degree of melting from the surface of the ice", the website said.

The west coast of Greenland is particularly affected, according to the data.

Climate change is particularly alarming in the Arctic, which scientists say is warming at a rate three to four times the global average.

Nike Suspends Relationship With Greenwood

ONDON (Dispatches) - Nike have Lususpended their relationship with Manchester United's Mason Greenwood, the sportswear giant said after accusations surfaced online that the 20-year-old forward had assaulted a woman.

United said on Sunday they were "aware of images and allegations circulating on social media" and later confirmed Greenwood would not return to training or play for the Old Trafford club until further notice.

"We have suspended our relationship with Mason Greenwood. We are deeply concerned by the disturbing allegations and will continue to closely monitor the situation," a Nike spokesperson told Reuters.

Premier League Clubs Spend Nearly £300m In Transfer Window

ONDON (Dispatches) - Premier League clubs splashed out nearly £300 million in January -- the second-highest amount ever spent in the winter transfer window -- boosted by a flurry of late big-money moves.



The arrivals of Luis Diaz, Bruno Guimaraes and Rodrigo Bentancur in the last few days of the month lifted the league's gross spending to £295 million (\$398 million) according to figures from finance company Deloitte.

January 2018's figure of £430 million remains the record but this year's outlay is more than four times higher than last year's figure of £70 million, when the coronavirus crisis hit budgets.

The clubs' net expenditure -- player purchases less player sales -- of £180 million is the highest since the January transfer window was introduced in 2003.

The five clubs currently at the bottom of the Premier League spent around £150 million, more than 50 percent of the total.

Among the big moves, Liverpool signed Porto's Colombia winger Diaz for a reported initial fee of £37.5 million while Newcastle paid an initial £35 million for Lyon's Brazilian midfielder Guimaraes

Newly wealthy Newcastle also paid Burnley £25 million for New Zealand international striker Chris Wood and signed England defender Kieran Trippier for £12 million from Atletico Madrid. Dan Jones, head of Deloitte's sports business group, said: "This transfer window indicates that the financial pressures of Covid on Premier League clubs are easing, with spending firmly back to pre-pandemic levels and remarkably among the highest we've ever seen in January.

To Be Part of **Dominant Big Three**

MADRID (Dispatches) - Rafa Nadal said he was lucky to be part of an era of tennis that included Roger Federer and Novak Djokovic after the Spaniard won a men's record 21st Grand Slam title at the Australian Open to move one ahead of his two great rivals.



Nadal roared back from two sets down to edge Daniil Medvedev 2-6 6-7(5) 6-4 6-4 7-5 in a classic final on Sunday, only months after fearing his glorious career might be over because of a niggling left foot injury.

He then paid tribute to Federer, who missed the year's first Grand Slam to continue his rehabilitation from knee surgery and Djokovic, who was deported following a dispute over Australia's Covid-19 entry requirements and his unvaccinated status.

"At the end of the day, it's just a game and in some way we achieved more than what we ever dreamed of when we were kids," Nadal told reporters. "It doesn't matter that much if one is 21, one is 20, or the other finished 23 and the other with 21.

"I think we did very important things for our sport and we achieved our dreams and we enjoy it. I feel lucky to be part of this era that has been very special for our sport."

The 35-year-old, who pulled out of Wimbledon, the Tokyo Olympics and the US Open in 2021 and returned to competitive action last month, said the satisfaction of winning his second Australian Open crown was impossible to describe. "It's amazing to have this trophy with me," Nadal said. "I tried hard during my career here in Australia, finally, it was probably the most unexpected year for me to achieve, one more time this beautiful trophy so I'm super happy." Nadal said he was not thinking about his next tournament.
