Finance Minister Calls Off Visit to U.S. **Over Visa Delay**

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran has boycotted an IMF/ World Bank Group Spring Meetings planned to be held in Washington next week over United States' delay in issuing visas for finance minister Ehsan Khandouzi and his accompanying delegation.

Ministry of Economic Affairs and Finance said in statement that Khandouzi had decided to call off his planned visit to the U.S. after authorities in the country said they would issue visas for the Iranian delegation only in the days within the start of the IMF/World Bank event.

"This is not a first time that the U.S. government is violating its obligations towards international institutions like the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund and is stonewalling the attendance of a delegation from our country in international summits," said the statement.

It criticized the United States for having an opportunistic approach to the presence of some international institutions on its soil by forcing them to apply political pressure on member countries. The Ministry said those pressures have deprived Iran of the ability to enjoy its rights in international organizations. See Page 7

Gov't Diplomacy Successful in **Unfreezing Foreign Assets**

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Strong economic diplomacy adopted by President Ebrahim Raisi's administration has been fruitful in unfreezing Iran's assets in other states, an Iranian member of parliament said.

A member of Program and Budget Committee of Majlis (the Parliament), Mehrdad Guoodarzvand Chegini, said that since the beginning of the Raisi administration, the cabinet has taken significant measures in economic diplomacy and succeeded in collecting some assets frozen overseas and that the authorities continue consultations in order to retake other assets.

The MP went on to say that unfreezing the foreign assets seems to be an appropriate opportunity for the Islamic Republic to invest the money in knowledge-based production in different provinces with the aim of implementing guidelines of Supreme Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei for the current Iranian year. Ayatollah Khamneni designated 1401 (March 21, 2022 to March 20, 2023) as the year of "Production: Knowledge-Based and Job-Creating."

Transfer of Centrifuge Machines To Natanz for Security Reasons

TEHRAN - A senior Iranian nuclear official says the country has transferred its centrifuge machines to a safe location nearly one year after an act of sabotage at TESA Karaj Complex, a centrifuge component manufacturing workshop near Tehran, damaged cameras at the site.

"Given their high significance, centrifuge machines were moved to a safer location and are now in operation," the spokesman for the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI), Behrouz Kamalvandi, said in an exclusive interview with Iran's al-Alam TV on Saturday.

He added that Iran has plans to develop and manufacture centrifuge machines and to boost their security.

"Following the terrorist operation against TESA Karaj Complex, we had to tighten security measures. We moved a significant part of these machines and transferred the rest to Natanz and Isfahan," Kamalvandi said. He noted that the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) has presented two reports; one when the machines were being transferred and the other one at the time that the cameras installed at Natanz facility became operational. Given the ambiguities that have been raised in the reports, Iran explained that all the measures taken have been in line with the agreements reached with the IAEA, the AEOI spokesman noted.

He, however, emphasized that the UN nuclear agency will have no access to data recorded by its surveillance cameras until Iran and the P4+1 group of countries reach an agreement on the revival of the 2015 deal, known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA).

On Thursday, Iran's acting ambassador to the IAEA Mohammad Reza Ghaebi said the latest report by the agency confirms that Iran had informed the IAEA on April 4 that all the machines for centrifuge production had been transferred from Karaj to Natanz, letting the inspectors verify, on the same day, that the machines were not operating. "The Agency will have no access to information recorded on the memory of its cameras and as long as Iran has not returned to full compliance with the JCPOA, that information would not be made available to the Agency and will be stored in Iran," Ghaebi added.

In a statement on January 31, the IAEA said Iran has informed the agency that it will move the production of centrifuge rotor tubes and bellows from TESA Karaj Complex to the central city of Isfahan.

The IAEA confirmed that Iran has informed the agency that it can adjust its surveillance and monitoring measures accordingly, noting that the production of centrifuge rotor tubes and bellows at TESA Karaj Complex has been ceased.

Yew **Muslims** Need to **Rise Against Zionists**

The Zionist regime continues its crimes and bloodshed in the Occupied Lands while the world is busy with what is going on in Ukraine or countries are struggling with their own domestic affairs and the international bodies as usual are indifferent to the Palestinian issue. On Friday, Israeli regime forces violently cracked down on demonstrations held by Palestinians in the occupied West Bank on Friday in solidarity with worshippers assaulted inside the al-Aqsa Mosque, leaving at least 344 injured.

The Palestine Red Crescent Society (PRCS), a national humanitarian organization, said in a statement that its medics attended to 344 injured people following Israeli forces' attacks in several cities on Friday.

It added that the Israeli army also targeted PRCS personnel and hindered their work in providing medical aid to the wounded Palestinians.

Reacting to these crimes, just in few countries people and some officials condemned these crimes or at least they tried to show sympathy with Palestinians but as usual, the major powers and international bodies remained silent or reacted softly to this crime.

The Islamic Republic of Iran has once again showed its true support of Palestinians and once again lashed out at the Israeli regime for desecrating al-Aqsa Mosque, urging Muslim nations to stand united behind the Palestinian cause. In a post on his Twitter account on Saturday, Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh expressed outrage over the Israeli regime's new atrocities in al-Aqsa Mosque and warned against the consequences of some Arab countries' move to normalize relations with the Tel Aviv regime.

"Reminder that normalization with apartheid regime of Israel only encourages the oppressor to double down on its brutality," Khatibzadeh said.

As Khatibzadeh said. Muslim world should be united against the Zionist crimes and should rush to the assistance of Palestinians in order to show that Palestinians are not alone.

More Palestinians Injured as Israeli Forces, Settlers Raid Aqsa Mosque

BEIRUT (Dispatches) - At least 17 Palestinians have been injured in clashes as Israeli settlers stormed the al-Aqsa Mosque compound in the occupied Old City of al-Quds under the protection Israeli military forces, in the latest act of provocation against the sacred site.

The settlers entered the compound on Sunday morning amid a heavy military deployment of Israeli soldiers to mark the Passover holiday and perform Talmudic prayers.

The Jewish religious occasion coincides with the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan at a time when thousands of Muslims, predominantly Palestinians, usually stay at the holy site for worship day and night.

Videos circulating online showed Palestinians throwing rocks and firecrackers and Israeli forces firing tear gas and stun grenades.

The Palestine Red Crescent Society (PRCS) said its medics treated at least 17 injuries following the Israeli raid on the holy site, of whom three were admitted to hospital.

The official Palestinian Wafa news agency reported that the attacking Israeli forces chased the worshipers and fired stun grenades and teargas randomly to empty the holy site of its Muslim worshipers in order to allow the entry of settlers wishing to celebrate Passover inside the courtyards of the al-Aqsa Mosque.

At least three arrests were reported among the Palestinian worshipers.

In a statement, the Gaza-based Hamas resistance movement warned Israel against the repercussions of its atrocities in al-Aqsa Mosque.

"Al-Aqsa Mosque is a red line and the occupying Israeli regime is responsible for assaults on worshipers and allowing occupiers to desecrate the site. We hold Israel responsible for attacks against worshipers inside al-Aqsa Mosque and the inevitable consequences," Hamas also said in a statement. See Page 7

Russia Can Reportedly Use Iran Experience to Evade Sanctions

TEHRAN (MNA) – As Russia faces unprecedented sanctions on virtually all sectors of its economy, it may have to turn to Iran which has more than four decades of experience with Western embargoes, a report by a western media says.

The CNN has published a report on how Russia can copy or is already using Iran's experience to circumvent and neutralize the western sanctions.

The piece has conducted several interviews with commentators and Iran experts on the ways Tehran is using to sell its crude oil in the world markets with Washington can do anything.

It quotes the Russian transport minister Vitaly Savelyev as saying that his country is "studying the case of Iran" to help it deal with sanctions on maintenance and spare parts.

The report also cites different reports by Reuters and Bloomberg to say that Iran has in the past hidden millions of oil barrels off little-known ports in Asia to escape Western sanctions. Barrel transfers in the dead of night from one vessel to another allowed Iran to masquerade under different flags, selling its oil to keen Asian buyers without catching the eye of Western monitors.

TEHRAN - "We are doomed to success," President Seyed Ebrahim Raisi said, noting that restoring public hope and trust is possible through action, saying, "We are not allowed to stop or retreat; but we are doomed to success".

Speaking in a meeting with a group of clerics on Saturday evening, President Raisi said that he personally considers communication with clerics a precious opportunity for the government, adding, "The government has tried to communicate with the clergy at various levels, and take advantage of their opinions".

Pointing out that today, thanks to God, there is a positive hope and expectation from the government, which should be established and promoted through action, the President added, "Promoting this hope means turning it into participation, vitality and social ".

Raisi said that the transformation of hope into social capital depends on the correct narration of the actions taken and said, "Today is a war of narratives and the enemy is trying to leave its distorted narrative of the 40-year path of revolution in people's minds, but the best and fairest narrative is available in the Declaration of the Second Step of the Islamic Revolution".

Pointing out that the discourse of the Popular Government is the same as the discourse of the late Imam and the Supreme Leader, the President stated, "The government will pursue the administration of justice in all areas and at all levels".

Referring to the importance of paying attention to culture, Raisi said, "Economic and cultural policies should be pursued both side by side".

The President added, "Today, all institutions of the Islamic Republic are operating under the supervision of the Supreme Leader and with a single rhythm, and even in the field of foreign policy, the revolutionary institutions and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs are fully coordinated".

Army Chief Warns of Iran's Intense Response to Threats

TEHRAN (Tasnim) – Commander of the Iranian Army Major General Abdolrahim Mousavi reminded the enemies that their strategic depth is within reach of Iran, warning that any threat to the Islamic Republic will be met with great force.

In a message released on Sunday on the occasion of the National Army Day, Major General Mousavi warned the enemies that any action against Iran will cost them dear.

The enemy should bear in mind that its strategic depth is within reach of Iran's military equipment and clout, the commander added.

He said the Iranian Army has gained considerable experience of real battle under all geographical conditions, stressing that it will respond to any threat with the highest degree of power.

The general also noted that the Iranian Army is prepared to counter any threat by boosting its military capabilities and updating the combat methods proportional to the modern warfare.

In comments in December 2021, President of Iran Ebrahim Raisi cautioned the enemies that any bellicose move will draw such a decisive response from the Iranian military forces that it will bring about a significant change in strategic equations.

Navy Breaks Sanctions and Threats

TEHRAN (IP) - Iran's navy chief stressed that despite sanctions, threats, and lack of access to up-to-date equipment, the navy was able to meet its needs with the help of scientists and craftsmen.

TEHRAN (MNA) – Foreign Ministry Spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh condemned the desecration of the Holy Quran in Sweden, saying that Sweden must deal with the perpetrators of this insulting act and prevent such acts from happening again.

Khatibzadeh blamed the deliberate repetition of this insulting act during the holy month of Ramadan for hurting the feelings of Muslims in Sweden and around the world. "This insulting act is a clear example of creating sedition and contrary to freedom of speech and should be condemned."

"While holding the Swedish government accountable, it also must deal with the perpetrators of this insulting act immediately, strongly and explicitly and take clear and practical measures to prevent the recurrence of such acts," the spokesman said.

"The actions of the insulting person and his supporters increasingly necessitate the unity of Muslims and Islamic countries against the conspiracies of the enemies of Islam," he added.

The Danish leader of the far-right Stram Kurs party has burned a copy of the holy Quran in a heavily-populated Muslim area in Sweden. Rasmus Paludan, accompanied by police, went to an open public space in southern Linkoping on Thursday and placed the Muslim holy book down and burned it while ignoring protests from onlookers.

About 200 demonstrators gathered in the square to protest. The group urged the police not to allow the racist leader to carry out his action. After the police ignored the calls, incidents broke out and the group closed the road to traffic, pelting stones at the police.

Gov't Imposes 18% Tariff on Exports of Raw Steel, Cement

IRAN NEWS ECONOMIC DESK

TEHRAN - Ministry of industry, mine and trade has imposed a tariff of 18% on exports of raw steel, cement and some key metals to prevent supply shortages and price rises that could cause problems for local industries.

Deputy trade minister Alireza Peymanpak said that Iran's Market Regulation Headquarters (MRH) had decided to impose the duties following a surge in overseas shipments over the winter that had been caused by a series of international developments, including the war in Ukraine.

"Given the crisis in Ukraine and the surge in oil prices since January, we witnessed a jump of prices of export commodities ... thus the MRH imposed the 18% duty on export of commodities to maintain the domestic market balance and to avoid a potential shortage," Peymanpak was quoted as saying by the IRIB News.

The official said that the tariffs have been applied mainly to exports of raw steel, cement and some key metals.

He said the tariff may increase to comply with price hikes in the international commodities market although he insisted that some tariffs may be reduced or removed to enable Iranian traders to swap commodities with foreigners.

Iran has reported successive periods of growth in exports of metals and mining products since 2019 when the country decided to provide more support to the sector to compensate for losses suffered in crude exports because of American sanctions.

Overseas shipments have increased both in value and volume terms since February when supplies from two main metals exporters Russia and Ukraine started to decline because of a military conflict between the two neighboring countries.

Iranians Top Property Buyers in Turkey

TEHRAN - A new report by the Turkish Statistical Center shows that during the first quarter of this year, Russian citizens' purchases of homes grew dramatically and Iranians remain at the top of the list of foreign home buyers.


Russian citizens bought about 1,535 housing units in Turkey in the first quarter of this year, 64 percent more than in the same period last year and more than twice as much as in 2020.

Turkey dramatically increased the amount of property investment to get citizenship on April 13, from \$250,000 to \$400,000, following an increase in demand for housing purchases by Russian and Ukrainian citizens in the country.

An estimated 300,000 Russian citizens have emigrated from their homeland in less than two months since the Ukraine war and western sanctions.

Iranian citizens continue to be the top buyers of housing in the country and bought 2,256 housing units in turkey in the first quarter of this year.

The next categories are citizens of Iraq, Russia, Germany, Kazakhstan, Afghanistan, Kuwait, Ukraine, Yemen and Jordan. The total sales of housing to foreigners in Turkey during the mentioned period were about 14,491 units, a 44 percent increase from the same period last year.

Transport, Agriculture **Ministries Sign Cooperation MoU**

TEHRAN (MNA) – Roads and Urban Development Ministry and Agriculture Ministry signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) in order to cooperate for facilitation of the imports of basic goods into the country.

The MOU was signed by Transport and Urban Development Minister Rostam Qasemi and Agriculture Minister Javad Sadatinejad on Sunday in a ceremony at the place of Transport and Urban Development Ministry in the presence of the two ministers' deputies.

Addressing the mentioned ceremony, the minister of transport and urban development underlined the high capacities of the country in the field of transportation, especially in the maritime and rail sectors, and emphasized the need to use them efficiently and effectively to supply basic goods from their countries of origin and distribute them in a balanced way. Iran imported 30.9 million tons of basic goods in the past Iranian calendar year 1400 (ended on March 20), an official with the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs

Administration (IRICA) told ISNA. Foroud Asgari, the deputy head of IRICA for customs affairs, said that the imported goods were in 25 commodity groups.

New Vaccinations

TEHRAN (IFP) - A virologist at Shahid Beheshti University of Medical Sciences in the Iranian capital Tehran has called for a campaign of vaccinations, especially among students, as the new Omicron XE variant of the coronavirus takes hold globally.

The director of the university's Center for Virology Research says XE is a result of the combination of Omicron's BA1 and BA2 variants. Alireza Naji told ISNA that the new variant has a higher transmissibility than BA2 variant, but there is no information yet on the severity of illness or how much immunity previous vaccinations entail against it.

Naji said the XE variant's spread might be wider than currently reported, stressing that Iran should strengthen its monitoring of new variants, which may occur but may not be traced by regular screenings.

The virologist also criticized the decision to reopen schools and universities immediately after the Nowruz holidays, which, he says, is itself expected to lead to a surge in the Covid cases.

He said the sixth wave of coronavirus is now on the decline in Iran but a surge is expected in the coming weeks, therefore time is ripe to begin administration of second booster jabs.

Dozens Dead After Boat Capsizes Off Libya

NEW YORK (Dispatches) - A migrant boat has capsized off the Libyan coast, leaving at least 35 people dead or presumed dead, the U.N. migration agency said Saturday.

The shipwreck took place Friday off the western Libyan city of Sabratha, a major launching point for the mainly African migrants making the dangerous voyage across the Mediterranean, said the International Organization for Migration.

The IOM said the bodies of six migrants were pulled out while 29 others were missing and presumed dead. It was not immediately clear what caused the wooden boat to capsize.

Russia Claims Its Forces Clear Most of Mariupol



KYIV (Dispatches) - Russian missile strikes hit Ukraine's capital Kyiv and other cities on Saturday, as Moscow said its troops had cleared the urban area of Mariupol and only a small contingent of Ukrainian fighters remained inside a steelworks in the besieged southern port.

Russia's claim to have all but taken control of Mariupol, scene of the war's heaviest fighting and worst humanitarian catastrophe, could not be independently verified. It would be the first major city to have fallen to Russian forces since the Feb. 24 invasion.

"The situation is very difficult" in Mariupol, President Volodymyr Zelenskiy told the Ukrainska Pravda news portal. "Our soldiers are blocked, the wounded are blocked. There is a humanitarian crisis ... Nevertheless, the guys are defending themselves."

As Russia launched more long-range attacks following the sinking of its Black Sea fleet's flagship, Moscow said its warplanes had struck a tank repair factory in Kyiv. An explosion was heard and smoke rose over the southeastern

Moscow Bars Entry to Russia For Johnson, Truss, Wallace

MOSCOW (dispatches) - Russia's foreign ministry said on Saturday it had barred entry to the country for British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, Foreign Secretary Liz Truss, Defense Secretary Ben Wallace and 10 other British government members and politicians.

The move was taken "in view of the unprecedented hostile action by the British Government, in particular the imposition of sanctions against senior Russian officials," the ministry said in a statement, adding that it would expand the list soon. The Kremlin has described Johnson, who has been one of Ukraine's staunchest backers, as "the most active participant in the race to be anti-Russian".

Opponents of French Far-Right Protest

PARIS (Dispatches) - Thousands of anti-far right protesters marched across France as opponents of presidential candidate Marine Le Pen seek to form a united front to prevent her from winning an election runoff against incumbent Emmanuel Macron on April 24.

Macron, a pro-European Union centrist, won the presidency in 2017 after easily beating Le Pen when voters rallied behind him in the runoff to keep her far-right party out of power.

This year, the first round of voting last Sunday set up the same battle, but Macron is facing a much tougher challenge. In central Paris, thousands of people gathered chanting anti-far right slogans and warning of democratic upheaval if Le Pen were to win. One banner read: "Against the far-right. For justice and equality, not Le Pen at the Elysee," referring to the French president's official residence.

"If the far-right is in power we will see a major collapse of the democratic, anti-racism and progressive camps," Dominique Sopo, president of SOS Racism, which along with dozens of rights groups, unions and associations called

Fuel-Laden Ship Sinks Off Tunisia Coast

TUNIS (Dispatches) - A tanker carrying 750 tons of diesel fuel from Egypt to Malta sank today in the Gulf of Gabes off Tunisia's southeast coast, sparking a rush to avoid a spill.

"The ship sank this morning in Tunisian territorial waters. For the moment, there is no leak," local court spokesman Mohamed Karray said.

A disaster prevention committee would meet in the coming hours "to decide on the measures to be taken", he added.

The Equatorial Guinea-flagged Xelo was headed from the Egyptian port of Damietta to the European island of Malta when it requested entry to Tunisian waters on Friday evening due to bad weather.

The tanker is 58 metres long and nine metres wide, according to ship monitoring website vesseltracker.com.

It began taking water around seven kilometres (over four miles) offshore in the Gulf of Gabes and the engine room was engulfed, according to a Tunisian environment ministry statement.

It said Tunisian authorities evacuated the seven-member crew.

Environment Minister Leila Chikhaoui was travelling to Gabes "to evaluate the situation... and to take necessary preventive decisions in coordination with the regional authorities", a ministry statement said.

Authorities have activated "the national emergency plan for the prevention of marine pollution with the aim of bringing the situation under control and avoiding the spread of pollutants".

Court spokesman Karray said the Georgian captain, four Turks and wo Azerbaijanis were briefly hospitalised for checks and were now in a hotel. The defense, interior, transport and customs ministries were working to avoid

"a marine environmental disaster in the region and limit its impact", the environment ministry said.

Before the ship sank, the ministry had described the situation as "alarming" but "under control".

The Gulf of Gabes was traditionally a fishing area but activists say it has suffered from pollution due to phosphate processing industries based near the city of Gabes. for the protests, told Reuters. "People need to realize that despite their anger towards Emmanuel Macron and his policies, there is no equivalence between a liberal, conservative candidate and a far-right candidate."

Police had warned of possible incidents as demonstrators convened in some 30 cities, but the protests ended peacefully.

Macron, who held a rally in Marseille as he tries to convince left-wing voters to pick him on April 24, is slightly ahead in opinion polls.

"The far-right is a risk to our country," he told supporters overlooking the Mediterranean port city, which put far-left candidate Jean-Luc Melenchon first on April 10. "Don't heckle them! Beat them!," he said.

Prior to the first round of the election Le Pen successfully tapped into anger over the cost of living and a perception that Macron is disconnected from everyday hardships. That saw her finish with 23.1% of votes compared to 27.85% for Macron.

However, she has appeared more rattled this week as the focus has turned to her manifesto and opinion polls have shown Macron extend his lead. An IPSOS-Sopra-Steria poll on Saturday showed the president winning the runoff with 55.5% of votes.

There was no immediate reaction from Kyiv to the Russian claims.

The governor of Kharkiv province in the east said at least one person had been killed and 18 were injured in a missile strike. Earlier on Saturday, protesters in New Delhi shouted slogans against Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government saying Muslims were violently targeted by authorities in the aftermath of Hindu-Muslim clashes in parts of three states ruled by Modi's Hindu nationalist party. The clashes last Sunday during a religious festival prompted police to impose a curfew in one town and ban gatherings of more than four people in parts of the states. Local authorities tore down the homes and shops of suspected Muslim rioters in central Madhya Pradesh

Muslims in states that it rules.

Leaders of 13 opposition parties have issued a joint statement calling for peace and harmony and after the religious clashes.

"We are extremely anguished at the manner in which issues related to food, dress, faith, festivals and language are being deliberately used by sections of the ruling establishment to polarize our society," the leaders said.

Police in India's most populous state of Uttar Pradesh on Friday arrested nine people from a hardline Hindu group suspected of torching the home of a Muslim man who married a Hindu woman.

The previous speaker and his deputy, both Khan allies, had attempted to block and then delay the vote, only for the country's top court to deem their actions illegal.

The lower house of parliament eventually voted in favor of removing Khan from office tomorrow.

The new ruling alliance has already elected their candidate, Shehbaz Sharif as the new prime minister.

The new speaker is Raja Pervaiz Ashraf, a former prime minister who belongs to the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), part of the new ruling alliance. He was elected unopposed in the absence of Khan's party, which resigned en masse from the house on Monday.

"Raja Pervaiz Ashraf took oath as the 22nd Speaker of the National Assembly of Pakistan," said a Twitter account run by the staff of Pakistan's National Assembly, the lower house of parliament.

The resignations are yet to be fully processed. If accepted, Pakistan faces the prospect of close to 100 by-elections within two months, a major distraction for Sharif and his coalition partners and a potential platform for Khan to mobilise support.

Sharif is expected to name his cabinet in the coming days with a number of policy challenges facing the new government, in particular dealing with an economy in deep trouble.

Russia Wants Rouble Rate To Be Determined by Market

MOSCOW (Dispatches) - The Russian central bank has imposed foreign exchange controls to support liquidity but aims to preserve market pricing principles and a rouble exchange rated determined by the market, the bank's first deputy governor said.

Ksenia Yudayeva said the Russian economy and its financial sector were in good shape before Feb. 24, and now many companies were experiencing the need to find new suppliers and logistics. The Russian financial sector and economy have taken a hit from sweeping western sanctions imposed over what Moscow calls a "special military operation" in Ukraine.





Pakistan New Gov't Not to Roll Back Fuel, Power Subsidies

ISLAMABAD (Dispatches) - Pakistan's new government decided not to roll back billions in fuel subsidies for the time being despite the strain on public funds, citing the possible backlash if it were to raise fuel prices just days after taking power.

Former premier Imran Khan, who was ousted in a confidence vote earlier this week, announced a cut in petrol and electricity tariffs in February, despite soaring global prices, in a bid to win back popular support.

That measure, estimated at 373 billion Pakistani rupees, has stretched government finances in a way that cannot be sustained, the finance ministry's top civil servant said. It has also endangered an ongoing International Monetary Fund rescue program.

"I have ... decided not to hike fuel prices in the public interest," Shehbaz Sharif, the new prime minister, said at a dinner in Islamabad last night. People would curse the new government just three days after

it came to office if it took such a step, he said.

Earlier, officials had warned of the fiscal fallout of continuing the subsidies.

"The relief package will add to the fiscal deficit which we cannot afford at the moment," Finance Secretary Hamed Yaqoob Sheikh told Reuters.

"Either it has to be rolled back or compensating reductions in other expenditures would be required to ensure that the primary balance agreed with the IMF is achieved."

The primary budget balance excludes debt repayment obligations. The fiscal deficit could go as high as 10 per cent of gross domestic product, according to new Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's top economic adviser Miftah Ismail, widely expected to be named finance minister.

"We have been discussing this before (with the previous government) and are discussing it again with the new government as well," a finance ministry official told Reuters, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

The officials are proposing spreading the rollback of the subsidies over two to three months to soften its impact, he said, adding that the decision was now with the new political leadership.

Pakistan is in the midst of a US\$6 billion IMF bailout program and has yet to clear its seventh review, which would release over US\$900 million and unlock other funding that depends on the fund's clearance.

The seventh review started in early March, but no agreement had been reached before the collapse of Khan's government.

A reversal of the fuel subsidies will be politically sensitive for a new government trying to shore up popular support at a time when inflation is running at 12.7 per cent.

"Either the new government can raise prices, which will be politically costly, or they could cover the deficit by reducing other nondevelopment expenditure, which will prove politically difficult," said Kaiser Bengali, a Pakistani economist who has previously held a number of government advisory roles.

Turkey to Provide Loan Relief to Export, Tourism Sectors –

ANKARA (Dispatches) - President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan announced that Turkey would provide cheaper loans for export and tourism sector investments that earn foreign revenues.

Addressing a gathering of small business owners in the capital Ankara, Erdoğan said that export-related loans would have rates as low as 9%. Funding of TL 100 billion (\$6.8 billion) would be freed up for exporters and TL 50 billion for the tourism sector.

The industry welcomed the announcement, saying it would make a positive contribution at such a challenging time. "If we want to bring Turkey to a good point, if we want to increase exports, financing costs had to be reduced," said Mustafa Gültepe, head of the Istanbul Apparel Exporters' Association (IHKIB).

"This incentive will have a very positive impact on investment," Gültepe told private broadcaster Bloomberg HT. He added that making such incentives long-term and continuous will be positive for all companies that want to invest and will definitely make a positive contribution to the investment.

For his part, Dalaman, Ortaca and Köyceğiz Tourist Hoteliers and Tourism Business Association (DOKTOB) Head Yücel Okutur stressed the importance of the package that comes just as the tourism season is entering a new season.

"I find the loan support very positive, it will provide a serious and important opening," Okutur said. Erdoğan has supported monetary easing to boost credit and exports and to reverse current account deficits.

In September, the Turkish central bank embarked on an easing cycle, which saw its policy rate being slashed by 5 percentage points to 14%.

The easing had come as the government endorsed a new economic program that prioritizes low borrowing costs, a current account surplus, growth, exports, credit and employment.

Erdoğan pointed to the recent price developments, saying "exorbitant" price rises were due mostly to energy and commodity markets and currency instability.

He reiterated that those who unfairly raise prices would be punished.

Led by energy costs and food prices, Turkey's annual inflation rose to 61.14% in March, a new 20-year high.

FDI Inflow to India May Touch \$100b in 2022-23

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) inflow to India is expected to reach \$100 billion in FY2022/23 supported by various economic reforms and increased ease of doing business, the PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PHDCCI) said in a report Friday. The industry body also said it expected India's FY22/23 economic growth to be among the highest in the world.

PHDCCI president Pradeep Multani said he expected FY22/23 real GDP growth of over 8 per cent, which is nearly a full notch above the 7.2 per cent projected by the Reserve Bank of India.

international financial institutions and multilateral fora." "Behind the scenes work is underway in the IMF and World Bank to limit or even expel Russia from the decision-making process," Siluanov wrote. He did not elaborate on obstacles to Russian participation in those institutions, and his allegations could not be independently verified.

The letter, which made no mention of the war in Ukraine, was dated March 30 and relayed to the Brazilian minister by Russia's ambassador in Brasilia on Wednesday.

"As you know, Russia is going through a challenging period of economic and financial turbulence caused by sanctions imposed by the United States and its allies," the Russian minister said.

Asked about the letter, Erivaldo Gomes, the Brazilian Economy Ministry's secretary of international economic affairs, indicated that Brasilia would like Russia to remain part of discussions at multilateral organizations.

"From Brazil's point of view ... keeping open dialogue is essential," he said. "Our bridges are the international bodies and our assessment is that these bridges have to be preserved." U.S. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said last week that the United States would not

participate in any G20 meetings if Russia was present, citing the invasion.

Almost half of Russia's international reserves have been frozen and foreign trade transactions are being blocked, including those with its emerging market economy partners, Siluanov said.

"The United States and its satellites are pursuing a policy of isolating Russia from the international community," he added.

Siluanov said the sanctions violate the principles of the Bretton Woods agreements that set up the IMF and the World Bank.

"We consider that the current crisis caused by unprecedented economic sanctions driven by the G7 countries might have long-lasting consequences unless we take joint action to resolve it," he wrote to Guedes.

Brazil's far-right President Jair Bolsonaro, who visited Moscow just days before the invasion, has kept Brazil neutral in the Ukraine crisis and has not condemned the invasion, drawing criticism from the Biden administration.

SEOUL (Dispatches) - South Korea decided Friday to join a mega free trade agreement involving 11 Asia-Pacific nations as

The plan to join the CPTPP was approved at an economy-related ministers' meeting Friday, and the government will submit an official application after completing domestic procedures, including a report to the National Assembly, officials said.

"The envisioned entry carries significance, as it would help us better respond to fast-changing global circumstances and ensure stable supply chains in the Asia-Pacific region," Trade Minister Yeo Han-koo said.

The CPTPP, launched in December 2018, has been signed by 11 countries, including Japan, Australia, Canada, New Zealand and Mexico.

The member nations had accounted for around 15 percent of the world's total trade volume of US\$5.2 trillion as of 2020, i according to government data.

The CPTPP is the renegotiated version of the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) led by the former U.S. President Barack Obama administration.

In 2017, then U.S. President Donald Trump withdrew from the TPP, widely seen as a key counterweight to China's growing economic clout. The government has said it plans to submit the CPTPP application before President Moon Jae-in's five-year term ends on May 9.



The incoming government of President-elect Yoon Suk-yeol is expected to take on negotiations for the country's membership, which is expected to take at least one year.

"The government has carefully reviewed joining the CPTPP over the past eight years, and the entry decision was made after considering its economic and strategic values," the trade ministry said.

The CPTPP accession would boost trade and investment for South Korea, increasing its gross domestic product by 0.33-0.35 percent, the state-run Korea Institute for International Economic Policy estimated.

Farmers and fishermen, however, have opposed the move, citing its potential damage to the agricultural and fishery sectors.

It is, however, in line with the World Bank, which this week cut for India forecast citing worsening supply bottlenecks and rising inflation risks caused by the Ukraine crisis. The PHDCCI report also suggested a ten-pronged strategy to strengthen national economic growth and achieve the target of becoming a \$5 trillion economy in the next five years.

The suggestions include speedy infrastructure investments, inclusion of more sectors under the PLI scheme, increase in public investments in agriculture sector, addressing the high commodity prices and shortages of raw materials, news agency PTI reported.

Last month finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman said FDI inflow had crossed \$500 billion under prime minister Narendra Modi, and that it was more than the sum received in the 10 years of the Congress-led United Progressive Alliance government.

FDI inflow in 2020/21 was a record \$81.71 billion and it was \$74.9 billion the previous year.

The government told parliament last month that these figures are an endorsement of the country's status as a preferred investment destination amongst global investors. hikes to tackle inflation, Kuroda will have the task of explaining why he is insisting on staying wedded to stimulus when the BOJ itself sees price growth at the fastest pace in decades.

The governor, now in his 10th and final year at the helm of the central bank, will need to calibrate his messaging to minimize giving the impression that the BOJ is close to accomplishing its inflation mission, a view that could fuel speculation the BOJ will adjust policy this year.

"The BOJ will try to make it clear that it won't pivot even with an upgrade of its inflation forecast," said Eiji Kitada, chief economist at Hamagin Research Institute. "It's just natural to upgrade the inflation outlook after energy prices have soared. What's important is how they judge its sustainability."

Police Busts 1.4 Tons of Illicit Drugs in Isfahan

TEHRAN (MNA) - The police commander of Isfahan province announced that during an operation, members of two smuggling groups were detained and 1.4 tons of narcotics were busted. A total of 1,400 kg of narcotics, including 1,230 kg of opium and 170 kg of hashish were seized from the smugglers, according to the report.

5 vehicles, including a truck and 4 cars were confiscated during the operation as well.

Three of the eight arrested smugglers were shot by the police officers who are currently being treated in the hospital, and the rest were handed over to the judicial authority after filing a case.



China's Space Dream: A Long March to the Moon and Beyond

BEIJING (Dispatches) - The return to Earth of three astronauts on Saturday after six months at China's new space station marks a landmark step in the country's space ambitions, ending its longest crewed mission ever.

The world's second-largest economy has put billions into its military-run space program, with hopes of eventually sending humans to the Moon

China has come a long way in catching up with the United States and Russia, whose astronauts and cosmonauts have decades of experience in space exploration. Here is a look at the country's space program, and where it is headed:

Soon after the Soviet Union launched Sputnik in 1957, Chairman Mao Zedong pronounced: "We too will make satellites."

It took more than a decade, but in 1970, China launched its first satellite on a Long March rocket.

Human spaceflight took decades longer, with Yang Liwei becoming the first Chinese "taikonaut" in 2003.

As the launch approached, concerns over the viability of the mission caused Beijing to cancel a live television broadcast at the last minute.

But it went smoothly, with Yang orbiting the Earth 14 times during a 21-hour flight aboard the Shenzhou 5.

China has launched seven crewed missions since.

Following in the footsteps of the United States and Russia, China began planning to build its own space station circling the planet.

The Tiangong-1 lab was launched in 2011.

In 2013, the second Chinese woman in space, Wang Yaping, gave a video class from inside the space module to children across the world's most populous country. The craft was also used for medical experiments and, most importantly, tests intended to prepare for the construction of a space station.

That was followed by the "Jade Rabbit" lunar rover in 2013, which initially appeared a dud when it turned dormant and stopped sending signals back to Earth.

It made a dramatic recovery, however, ultimately surveying the Moon's surface for 31 months -- well beyond its expected lifespan.

In 2016, China launched its second orbital lab, the Tiangong-2. Astronauts who visited the station have run experiments on growing rice and other plants.

Under President Xi Jinping, plans for China's "space dream" have been put into overdrive.

Beijing is looking to finally catch up with the United States and Russia after years of belatedly matching their milestones.

China has been carrying out experiments in a lab simulating a lunar-like environment in preparation for its long-term goal of putting humans on the moon Besides a space station, China is also planning to build a base on the Moon, and

the country's National Space Administration said it aims to launch a crewed lunar mission by 2029.

But lunar work was dealt a setback in 2017 when the Long March-5 Y2, a powerful heavy-lift rocket, failed to launch on a mission to send communication satellites into orbit.



That forced the postponement of the Chang'e-5 launch, originally scheduled to collect Moon samples in the second half of 2017.

Another robot, the Chang'e-4, landed on the far side of the Moon in January 2019 - a historic first.

This was followed by one that landed on the near side of the Moon last year, raising a Chinese flag on the lunar surface.

The unmanned spacecraft returned to Earth in December with rocks and soil -- the first lunar samples collected in four decades.

And in February 2021, the first images of Mars were sent back by the five-tonne Tianwen-1, which then landed a rover on the Martian surface in May that has since started to explore the surface of the Red Planet.

A trio of astronauts docked successfully in October with the core Tianhe module of the Chinese space station, which was placed in orbit in April 2021.

The astronauts stayed at the station for six months before returning safely to Earth on Saturday, ending China's longest crewed mission to date.

The Chinese space station Tiangong -- meaning "heavenly palace" -- will need a total of around 11 missions to bring more parts and assemble them in orbit.

Once completed, it is expected to remain in low Earth orbit at between 400 and 450 kilometres (250 and 280 miles) above our planet for at least 10 years -- realising an ambition to maintain a long-term human presence in space.

While China does not plan to use its space station for global cooperation on the scale of the International Space Station, Beijing said it is open to foreign collaboration. It is not yet clear how extensive that cooperation will be.

ATHENS (Dispatches) - Greece is at the center of interest among European buyers looking to acquire a second home in the country.

According to Giorgos Gavriilidis, CEO and founder of Elxis - At Home in Greece, demand for a second home in Greece from foreign buyers looks to be stable. Investor interest from countries, such as the Netherlands, Germany and Belgium, remains strong, focusing on Crete and the Ionian islands. This is keeping prices high as inflationary pressures drive construction costs upwards in a trend seen continuing this year. We expect prices to advance by about 10 percent in 2022 despite the uncertain conditions." Gravriilidis told the Athens-Macedonian News Agency (ANA). Scholz Under Pressure to Speed up Weapons Exports to Ukraine

Young Scores 38 as Hawks Beat Cavs

LEVELAND (Dispatches) - Trae Young scored 32 of his 38 points in the second half and the Atlanta Hawks overcame losing center Clint Capela to a knee injury to beat the Cleveland Cavaliers 107-101 in the play-in, earning the Eastern Conference's No. 8 playoff seed.

Young started slowly for the second straight game, but "Ice Trae," as he fancies himself, heated up when it mattered most.

The All-Star guard scored 16 points in third quarter to rally the Hawks from a 10-point halftime deficit, and added another 16 in the fourth to finish off the Cavs, whose inexperience showed throughout the second half.

Bogdan Bogdanovic added 19 points for Atlanta, which will play No. 1 seed Miami in the first round. Game 1 is Sunday in South Florida.

The Hawks, who made it to the conference finals a year ago, may have to go forward without Capela. The 6-foot-10 center hyperextended his right knee late in the first half, had to be helped from the floor and couldn't return.

Lauri Markkanen scored 26 points and Darius Garland had 21 for the young Cavaliers, whose unexpected season fell just shy of a playoff berth.

Cleveland hasn't been to the playoffs since 2018, and the Cavs haven't been to the postseason without LeBron James on their roster since 1998.

Poland, Italy, Spain And Kazakhstan **Cruise Into BJK Finals**

PARIS (Dispatches) - Poland, Italy, Spain and Kazakhstan booked their places in the Billie Jean King Cup finals as they took unassailable 3-0 leads in their ties.

World No. 1 Iga Swiatek, crushed Romania's 324th-ranked Andreea Prisacariu 6-0 6-0 in 45 minutes to seal victory for hosts Poland in Radom.

In Sardinia, Italian Camila Giorgi also won 12 successive games as she dispatched Harmony Tan of France 6-2, 6-0 to give Italy a 3-0 advantage.

Spain were the only away team to win as Sara Sorribes Tormo sealed their place in the finals by beating Arantxa Rus 6-0, 6-4 in s-Hertogenbosch in The Netherlands.

Elena Rybakina had to work harder to clinch Kazakhstan's surprising victory over Germany, winning 4-6, 6-3, 7-5 in Nur-Sultan

"Really proud of us," Swiatek told the competition web site. "It's been a long journey. It took us a few years, step by step to progress and qualify finally.

Cavs had no answer defensively for Young. As the final seconds ticked off, Young waved goodbye as the Cleveland crowd thinned

out and headed to the exits.

Those who stayed saluted the Cavs, who weren't expected to get this far after winning just 22 games last season. While they've been relegated to lottery picks and losing since James left after a four-year run to the NBA finals four years ago, the future in Cleveland is bright.

With the season on the line, Cleveland got a huge emotional and defensive lift by the return of All-Star center Jarrett Allen, who missed the previous 19 games because of a broken finger on his left hand. Allen finished with 11 points.

The Hawks were in big trouble late in the third quarter before Young finally heated up. Ignoring some vulgar chants by Cleveland fans, the dazzling guard made a pair of 3-pointers and scored Atlanta's final 12 points in the quarter as the Hawks closed with a 17-8 run over the final 3:48 to tie it 84-all going into to the final 12 minutes.

Markkanen made four 3-pointers and Cleveland hit six shots from long range in the first 12 minutes to open an 11-point lead.

Atlanta helped with some sloppy play and committed seven turnovers, four by Young. But once he started taking care of the ball and making shots, there was no stopping him.



MANCHESTER (Dispatches) -Manchester United midfielder Nemanja Matic said y he will leave the Premier League club at the end of the season, bringing an end to his five-year spell at Old Trafford.

Serbian international Matic, who is under contract at United until 2023, has made 26 appearances across all competitions for the club this season.

The 20-year-old swept past 123rd-ranked Mihaela Buzarnescu 6-1, 6-0 in just 55 minutes on the back of five service breaks as the Poles opened a 2-0 lead over Romania in their qualifier in Radom.

Swiatek went into the qualifier on a hot streak, putting together 17 successive wins on her way to titles in Doha, Indian Wells and Miami. Magda Linette earlier fought off the challenge of

experienced Irina-Camelia Begu 6-1, 4-6, 6-2. US Open champion Emma Raducanu helped Britain level their tie against 11-time champions Czech Republic 1-1 with a 7-5, 7-5 win against Tereza Martincova.

Raducanu, playing on a clay court for the first time as a professional, wrapped up victory in just over two hours.

The 19-year-old showed no ill effects from losing her toenails in training on the demanding surface earlier in the week.

The Czechs, playing without two-time Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova and former world number one Karolina Pliskova, had taken a 1-0 lead thanks to Marketa Vondrousova who defeated Harriet Dart 6-1, 6-0.

Kazakhstan also have one foot in the finals after opening a surprise 2-0 lead over Germany in Nur-Sultan.

Yulia Putintseva recorded a national record 15th singles win in the rebranded Fed Cup tournament by defeating Angelique Kerber 3-6, 6-3, 6-2. "For me, it's always tough to play the first matches of

He appeared fresher than Olympic champion Zverev who had also drawn deep on his reserves on Friday to beat Jannik Sinner in a 3hr 07min guarter-final.

Zverey was the more under-powered of the two.

Tsitsipas broke in the ninth game of the opener before reeling off four games in a row from 2-2 in the second set. The contest was over inside 75 minutes.

Davidovich Fokina, ranked at 46, reached his first career ATP final with a 6-4, 6-7 (2/7), 6-3 win over Grigor Dimitrov.

"It was a difficult match. I had my chances in the second set, but Grigor played well and I was tired," said the 22-year-old Spaniard, who knocked out Djokovic on Tuesday. "I kept fighting, I wanted to see where my limits were."

It was a roller-coaster afternoon for Davidovich Fokina who was a set and then 4-2 and 5-3 ahead in the second.

But he won just three of the next 12 points with two double faults as Dimitrov hit back.

Man City's Treble Bid

ONDON (Dispatches) - Liverpool reached the FA Cup final as Sadio Mane's double inspired a 3-2 win over Manchester City that kept alive their quadruple bid and shattered their rivals' treble hopes.

Jurgen Klopp's side are chasing an unprecedented clean-sweep of the four major trophies in a single season.

They remain on course to achieve that incredible target after a scintillating first half display in Saturday's semi-final at Wembley.

Ibrahima Konte put Liverpool ahead and Mane doubled their lead thanks to a blunder from City keeper Zack Steffen.

Senegal forward Mane struck again before half-time and, although Jack Grealish and Bernardo Silva netted after the interval, City were unable to complete a remarkable revival. Liverpool will make their first FA Cup final appearance since 2012 on May 14 when they face Chelsea or Crystal Palace, who meet in Sunday's semi-final.

The Reds, into the FA Cup final for the 15th time, haven't won the competition since 2006, while Klopp has yet to lead them to a domestic knockout trophy.

Trailing Premier League leaders City by just one point with seven games left, Liverpool have already won the League Cup and have also reached the Champions League semifinals, where they will play Villarreal.

Despite Klopp's protestations that the quadruple is an impossible dream, this was another step towards football immortality.

For City, fatigued physically and mentally, it was a game too far as Liverpool handed them a first defeat in 11 games.

Both league meetings this season had ended in 2-2 draws, including a pulsating clash at the Etihad Stadium last weekend.
