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Tehran, Caracas Sign **Agreements on Oil, Gas**

TEHRAN - The memorandums tackle the development of oil and gas fields and the reconstruction and renovation of Venezuelan oil refineries.

Iran and Venezuela signed a number of memorandums of understanding on the development of oil and gas fields, the reconstruction of refineries and petrochemical complexes, and oil trade.

According to the news agency, the documents were signed in the presence of Iran's Oil Minister Javad Owii and Venezuela's Vice President Delcy Rodríguez and Oil Minister Pedro Rafael Tellechea in Caracas.

It added that the memorandums tackled the development of oil and gas fields and the reconstruction and renovation of Venezuelan oil refineries with the aim of maximizing their capacity.

On Thursday, Owji landed in Venezuela at the head of a delegation that was welcomed by Venezuelan officials. The Iranian minister's visit is aimed at promoting Tehran-Caracas cooperation in the downstream

and upstream sectors. See Page 7

Tehran Blasts Desecration of Holy Qur'an

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Foreign Ministry spokesman has strongly condemned the latest instance of desecration of Muslims' holy book in Denmark, describing it as another flip side of Takfiri extremism and violence.

Nasser Kanaani made the remark after a Danish group burned a copy of the Holy Qur'an during a demonstration in the capital Copenhagen. According to media reports, the group also burned Turkey's flag during the same demonstration.

"This act of desecration, which was done by an extremist group during the holy month of Ramadan ... is an insult to the divine religion of Islam and a blatant affront to all Muslims of the world," Kan'ani said.

Noting that this insulting measure was taken on Friday, which coincided with the International Quds Day, when all free-thinking people of the world were calling for the liberation of al-Quds from the Zionist regime's occupation, the Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman added, "This is the most appalling way to demonstrate the claim that the West calls freedom of expression." Enemy "Vincible" Despite Its Apparent Calculations

TEHRAN - Supreme Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei says that the enemy is defeatable despite all its seemingly solid calculations and military power.

Ayatollah Khamenei made the remarks in a meeting with the commanders and officials of the Iranian Armed Forces on Sunday

He has lauded the great achievements and continuous progress in the Iranian Armed Forces over the years and described as "absolutely necessary" the readiness of the Armed Forces for deterring enemies and their vigilance against the behind-the-scene plotters.

Describing these forces as the strong fences for the country and the nation, he emphasized, "This very big position brings heavy responsibilities that, thank God, the armed forces are busy with fulfilling their duties.'

Referring to the verse of the Holy Quran, Ayatollah Khamenei described constant preparation as a command of God and a source of fear for the enemies of God and the nation, and added, "Threat will never disappear completely, so you should increase your preparations as much as you can.'

The Leader of the Islamic Revolution also considered the readiness of the armed forces for deterring enemies and vigilance against the behind-the-scene planners absolutely necessary.

Referring to the words and possible actions of the weak elements, he said, "We should not focus our minds on such actions and words, but should see the main designers behind the scenes."

Referring to the war-mongering evil international forces in different regions of the world, Ayatollah Khamenei said, "Arrogance starts a conflict from behind the scenes wherever it sees benefits."

Focusing on the enemy's long-term plans was another important point that the Leader of the Islamic Revolution stressed. "It is good and necessary to pay close attention to the enemy's five- or ten-year plans, but his mid-term and long-term plans should be considered and monitored.'

Avatollah Khamenei also referred to the two wars that the U.S started in the east and west of Iran about two decades ago and added, "The Americans had interests in Iraq and Afghanistan, but their ultimate goal was the Islamic Republic of Iran, which, due to the very strong foundations of the Islamic revolution, they failed their ultimate goal.

"Therefore, the enemy with all his seemingly solid calculations and military power can be defeated," he further pointed out. He considered the current situation of the Zionist regime as another example of such failures and continued, "The Zionist regime's anti-Palestinian operation in the month of Ramadan last year did not have a particular reaction in the

Iran Oil Output Down Slightly In March to 2.567m bpd

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Figures by The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) show that Iran's oil output in March was almost unchanged from February. The figures covered in a report by the ILNA news

agency showed that Iran had produced an average of 2.567 million barrels per day of crude oil in March, down by 8,000 bpd from February.

The decreased output mirrored a month-on-month decline of 0.29% in OPEC oil production in March. The average price of Iranian Heavy crude grade reached \$78.8 per barrel in March, down from \$81.88 per barrel reported in February, showed OPEC tables. OPEC forecasts showed that global demand for crude oil will reach an average of 101.89 million bpd, up by 2.33% from the average demand reported last year.

Iran Inks MoU with 30 Countries **In Aviation Field**

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - The head of Iran's Civil Aviation Organization (CAO) on Sunday announced the signing and sealing of memoranda of understanding (MoUs) in the field of aviation with 30 countries in the administration of President Ebrahim Raisi.

Mohammad Mohammadibakhsh said his organization has taken giant strides in the current Iranian calendar year of 1402 (started March 21, 2023) to develop air transportation fleet and to boost the flight network, which has been put atop the agenda.

He went on to say that the CAO has inked memoranda of understanding (MoUs) with 30 countries over the past one and a half years, adding that the country has launched direct flights to 60 destinations worldwide.

Given the above issue, the Civil Aviation Organization has gained salient achievements in the international arena, Mohammadibakhsh highlighted.

The CAO chief noted that his organization has made its utmost efforts to materialize most of the objectives of the aviation industry in the current year.

Indian Tea Exporters Remain Cautious Due to Iran Issue

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - According to trade insiders, the increase in shipments was on track, with exporters taking advantage of the turmoil in Sri Lanka to push more Indian teas into the global market. However, exporters are concerned about the evolving situation in Iran, one of the largest purchasers of Indian orthodox teas, and have stated that it may have an impact on shipments in the current fiscal year. According to Anshuman Kanoria, chairman of the India Tea Exporters Association, the increase in exports was expected and was mostly due to a lower Sri Lankan yield. "The blow that Sri Lanka took created some opportunities, which we were able to capitalize on. With the Iran issue still looming, overall export prospects for this year are not as bright as they were last year," Kanoria added. Iran accounts for more than half of India's conventional exports. "No one knows what is going on in Iran. They have not filed new contracts in over three months, and the orthodox market has opened relatively muted. Shipments have been made, but payments for them have been delayed to arrive. According to Deepak Shah, Chairman of the South India Tea Exporters Association, Russia has been buying actively, and with the rupee exchange taking place, exports are expected to grow. However, Iran remains a source of concern because the payment problem persists and new contracts are not being signed. "The Iranian government is required to register import contracts, which they are not doing for unknown reasons," he claimed. See Page 7

Ansarullah, Saudi-Backed Presidential Council Complete Prisoner Swap

SANAA (Dispatches) - Yemen's Ansarullah resistance movement and the Saudi-backed Presidential Leadership Council (PLC) have freed scores of prisoners on the last of a three-day exchange of nearly 900 detainees, raising prospects for nationwide peace in a country embroiled in a devastating Saudi-led war.

The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), which is managing the prisoner exchange, said on Sunday that planes carrying released detainees took off at the same time from the capital city of Sana'a and the energy-rich northern city of Ma'rib.

"The first flight from Ma'rib and the first flight from Sana'a have left," ICRC media adviser Jessica Moussan told AFP news agency.

She added, "Forty-eight former detainees were on board the Ma'rib-Sana'a flight, while 42 others were on the Sana'a-Ma'rib flight." Three other flights during the day were to complete the deal, the senior official from the Geneva-based humanitarian organization noted.

Four journalists sentenced to death by the Ansarullah movement are part of the exchange, PLC negotiator Majed Fadail said. Mahdi al-Mashat, head of Yemen's Supreme Political Council, said the next round of talks with Saudi Arabia would start after the Eid al-Fitr holiday, which is expected on April 21 and marks the end of the holy Muslim fasting month of Ramadan, Yemen's official Saba news agency reported.

The last talks ended hours before 318 prisoners were transported on four flights on Friday between the southern Yemeni port city of Aden and Sana'a, reuniting detainees with their families. See Page 7

Iran to Dispatch 89K Pilgrims To This Year's Hajj

TEHRAN (IRNA) - As many as 89,000 Iranian pilgrims will attend this year's annual Hajj which will be sent to Saudi Arabia by Iranian flag carrier Iran Air, according to an Iran Air spokesman.

The Iranian pilgrims will go to Hajj from 21 airports across the country, Hesam Qorbanali said, adding that some 387 flights will carry the Iranian pilgrims to Saudi Arabia as of May 24, 2023.

Qorbanali added that Iran Air has allocated 387 flights to the return of the pilgrims which will take the Iranian pilgrims back home by July 25.

Tens of thousands of Muslims gather together from all across the world each year in the holy city of Mecca to perform Hajj pilgrimage.

Mashhad-Jeddah to Resume Flight Soon

MASHHAD (IRNA) - The direct flight between Mashad and Jeddah will be resumed after updating agreements, said Head of Iran's Foreign Ministry office in Razavi Khorasan Province.

Mohammad Beheshti Monfared said that the flight will be resumed after finalizing negotiations between Iranian and Saudi officials in the aviation sector.

Earlier, a technical delegation from Saudi Arabia traveled to Mashhad to visit the Saudi Consulate General and review ways to reopen it.

The Saudi delegation visited its diplomatic places and embassy in Tehran in the past few days and traveled to Mashhad on Friday (April 14).

Nasser bin Awad Al-Ghannoum, the head of the Saudi delegation expressed hope that the revival of ties between Riyadh and Tehran would lead to further cooperation among regional countries and bring about prosperity to the region. Meanwhile, Beheshti said that the previous premises of Saudi Arabia's Consulate General in Mashhad has not been used for seven years.

Iran Oil Sales to China on Track Despite Sanctions



TEHRAN (IFP) - The Chinese ambassador to Tehran says the sales of Iranian oil to China is on track "without any problem," despite the harsh US sanctions in place against the Islamic Republic's energy sector. Speaking to reporters, Chang Hua said China is not like those countries that freeze Iranian assets in line with America's pressure policy against Tehran. "We are not under the domination of other countries," said the Chinese diplomat.

He said Iran and China should make efforts to remove the existing obstacles in the way of their financial transactions.

The main obstacle, he added, are the "unjust sanctions" imposed on both countries.

Iran and China have been expanding their trade ties in recent years despite all the sanctions. China is Iran's largest oil buyer.

The two countries have signed a 25-year strategic partnership deal, under which they agreed to significantly boost ties in a variety of areas besides economy.

IRIAF to Stage Aerial Parade on National Army Day

TEHRAN (Tasnim) – Various fighter jets of the Islamic Republic of Iran Air Force (IRIAF) will take part in an aerial parade over Tehran's sky on April 18 to mark the National Army Day.

A whole host of the Iranian Army forces are scheduled to attend nationwide parades on Tuesday morning to mark the country's National Army Day.

Air Force Commander Brigadier General Hamid Vahedi announced on Sunday that over 40 various fighter jets will perform aerial maneuvers during the military parades over the capital.

The aircraft in the parade will include Saeqeh (Thunderbolt), Kowsar, F-7, F-14, F-4, MiG-29 and Sukhoi fighter jets and bombers, he added.

In the capital, the ceremony will be held at the mausoleum of the late founder of the Islamic Republic of Iran, Imam Khomeini.

A host of Army units are going to put their latest achievements on display during the parades, believed by many military experts as an annual showcase for Iranian Army's latest weaponry and military progress.

The military parades will involve units from the Ground Force, Navy, Air Force and Air Defense Force displaying a broad range of advanced equipment such as missiles, tanks, armored vehicles, rifles, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs), fighter jets, radar systems and air defense missile systems.

Tehran, Kabul Discuss Cooperation, Tax Facilities

TEHRAN (MNA) – Afghanistan's Deputy Finance Minister Mawlavi Ahmadullah Zahed met with Gholamreza Najjari, Iran's deputy ambassador in Kabul, the Ministry of Finance said.

The ministry said an agreement between Afghanistan and Iran regarding the non-receipt of additional taxes, tax facilities and the establishment of infrastructure in the customs ports of the two countries was discussed at the meeting, Ariana News reported.

The ministry added that Najjari pledged to help reduce taxes and ease transactions with Afghan businessmen in Iran. Ahmadullah Zahed, the deputy finance minister, said Afghanistan welcomes and supports all measures and solutions that bring prosperity to both sides.

This comes after Afghanistan's Chamber of Commerce and Investment said in its latest report that the current value of trade exchanges between Tehran and Kabul was over \$1 billion.

ACCI announced that Afghanistan's trade relations with Iran are on an upward trajectory and the road has been paved for promoting joint investment in the near future. The current annual value of trade between Tehran and

Kabul has surpassed \$1 billion, it said.

IRGC Seizes Foreign Tanker Smuggling Fuel in Persian Gulf

BUSHEHR (IRNA) - A commander at the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) naval forces has announced that the force has seized a foreign tanker in the Persian Gulf loaded with 1.45 million liters of smuggled diesel. Round-the-clock observation of the Persian Gulf through state-of-the-art equipment led to the operation, Brigadier General Ramezan Zirrahi, the commander of the IRGC second naval region, said.

Tehran Calls for Restraint In Sudan to End Fighting

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran has expressed its concern over the ongoing violence in Sudan, urging the opposing sides to show restraint and engage in dialogue to end the unrest in the country.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran expresses its concern over what is taking place in the Muslim and brotherly country of Sudan," Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Nasser Kanaani said.

He urged Sudan to overcome the current worrying situation through dialogue.

The Iranian spokesperson expressed confidence that the Sudanese-Sudanese dialogue and internal consensus on a national initiative are the sole solution to the current crisis. Fierce exchanges of gunfire as well as massive explosions hit the Sudanese capital of Khartoum on Saturday as columns of smoke bellowed from various places and soldiers were deployed on the streets.

The clashes came following days of tensions between the army and the powerful paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) that threatened to turn into a full-blown battle for control of the African country.

Sudan's paramilitaries said they are in control of several key sites, including the presidential palace in central Khartoum. Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates also on Saturday called for dialogue in Sudan to end the ongoing clashes. Zirrahi noted that providing the security of the Persian Gulf is among the most important missions of the country's naval forces.

The smuggled fuel was destined for one of the Persian Gulf littoral states, the commander said.

He went on to say that the crew members of the vessel were arrested.

According to Zirrahi, the IRGC naval forces clutched 1.6 million liters of bootleg fuel in the Persian Gulf region last year.

Half of Inactive Industrial Units Face Lack of Liquidity

TEHRAN (MNA) - Half of the inactive industrial units in the country have the problem of lack of liquidity, based on a report released by the Iran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines, and Agriculture (ICCIMA).

According to the managers of the stagnant economic enterprises of the country, 50 percent of inactive units have the problem of lack of liquidity, 15 percent have the problem of lack of demand and market, four percent have the problem of lack of raw materials, four percent have the problem of partner dispute, two percent have infrastructural problems, one percent have legal problems, one percent have the problem of providing machinery, and 22 percent have other problems, the ICCIMA report shows.

The head of Iran Small Industries and Industrial Parks Organization (ISIPO) has stressed that reviving idle production units is the main approach that the government is currently following in the industry sector.

The government is seriously pursuing its programs to resolve production units' problems in collaboration with the private sector; Very good planning has been done in this regard, Ali Rasoulian has stated.

As announced by the ISIPO head, 1,714 idle production units were revived in the country during the past Iranian calendar year 1401 (ended on March 20).

Referring to the Leader's emphasis on knowledge-based employment last year,

Rasoulian said: "We have formulated a coherent operational package to support knowledge-based companies and considered incentives and advantages for giving land to such companies."

He added: "Last year, we gave land to more than a hundred knowledge-based companies, and we managed to meet 107 out of 378 technological needs of these companies, which were previously met from abroad, inside the country."

Pointing out that a good relationship has been established between knowledgebased companies and large enterprises, the deputy industry, mining and trade minister announced that 120 companies were added to the list of knowledge-based companies last year.

"We agreed with the Technology Department of the Ministry of Science to establish knowledge-based parks in industrial estates so that companies can take advantage of these parks", he added.

Referring to this year's slogan, which is "Inflation Control, Production Growth", Rasoulian said: "We must control inflation and increase production because these two have serious effects on each other."

He called providing industrial infrastructure and supporting small industries as requirements for production growth and said: "Supporting small industries and providing their financial resources and involving the private sector are our goals."



Caretaker for Agriculture **Ministry Announced**

TEHRAN (Dispatches) - President Ebrahim Raisi appoints a caretaker for the Ministry of Agriculture days after announcing a decision to reshuffle his cabinet.

In a decree, President Raisi named Seyyed Mohammad Aghamiri as the caretaker of the Agriculture Ministry, temporarily replacing Javad Sadatinejad.

Besides the agriculture minister, Raisi also replaced the vice president and head of the planning and budget department, Massoud Mirkazemi, with Davood Manzour, a former deputy at the department.

The cabinet shake-up comes amid widespread criticisms of the Raisi administration's economic performance.

The latest statistics show that the production of two major automakers of the country has reached about 30,000 cars, which shows a 21 percent increase, as compared to the same period of time last year, IRNA reported.

Earlier, the director general of Iran's Industry, Mining and Trade Ministry's Automotive Industry, Abdollah Tavakoli Lahijani had said that Iran ranked 19th in terms of car production in the world last year, which due to production growth could be promoted to 14th by the end of the current Iranian year (March 21, 2024).

Many Countries Send Aircraft to Iran **For Repairs**



TEHRAN (IRNA) - Iran's transportation minister Mehrdad Bazrpash says the country is now capable of repairing aircraft parts, in spite of long-running sanctions aimed at hampering Iran's development. Bazrpash said that Iran was once not capable of repairing aircraft parts, but it now repairs the aircraft for many countries.

"Before, we were not capable of repairing a single part, but today, many aircraft parts are repaired inside the country," he said.

"Also, many countries send their aircraft to our country for maintenance, which is a good thing, and this [trend] should be accelerated," he added. Earlier this month, Russia's largest air carrier sent one of its planes to Iran for repair, as part of an agreement on cooperation in civil aviation between the two countries amid Western sanctions on

NGL 3200 Plant Launch a Big Step **Toward Collecting Associated Gases**

Iranian Exports of Medicinal Plants Worth \$600m First Plug-in Hybrid to Hit Market by March

TEHRAN (IFP) - More than 8.000 different types of plants grow in Iran. of which about 450 species are have medicinal usage. Plants whose export can have a high added value for the country.

Thanks to favorable weather conditions and the country's long record in the production of medicinal plants, exports of such products inject considerable profit into the Iranian economy.

Currently, about 90% of medicinal plants are produced inside the country, but Iran's share of export and sales of the plants in the world market is insufficient. Statistics show the value of official exports of medicinal plants and herbal products has surpassed 660 million dollars in one decade.

The Science and Technology Development Staff of the Department of the Medicinal Plants and Traditional Medicine at the Iranian Vice-presidency for Science. Technology and Knowledge-Based Economy has defined various programs with the cooperation of other relevant institutions for expanding scientific and technological cooperation at the international level and providing more opportunities for exporting products to other countries.

TEHRAN (PressTV) - Iran's second largest carmaker Saipa says its first plug-in hybrid electric vehicle (PHEV) will hit the market in the calendar year to late March 2024.

Saipa's CEO Mohammad Ali Teymouri said that delivering a first batch of PHEVs to buyers in the Iranian market will enable the company to develop a hybrid version of its popular model. Arva.

Teymouri's statement comes some five years after Saipa unveiled a prototype of its first PHEV under the brand name of Saina EV. The company announced at the time that the car was a joint project between Saipa and Iran's Khajeh Nasir University of Technology.

That comes as Saipa's rival the IKCO, which is Iran's largest carmaker in terms of output, had announced plans for commercial launch of its all-electric model Tara EV this year. The company has also unveiled Electric RANA for delivering to buyers in the Iranian market.

US sanctions imposed on Iran since 2018 has led to growth in Iran's home-grown automotive industry as carmakers have benefitted from a larger share of the domestic market as well as a major increase in supply of steel and other raw materials from local plants.

TEHRAN (ISNA) - An Iranian official has warned about shortage of antidepressants saying that even IV fluids and cold syrups are also in the list of "urgently needed supplies".

Ali Fatemi, Vice President of Iranian Pharmacists Association said that there is shortage of neuroleptics, antidepressants, and medicines for patients with special diseases.

According to him, the government still imports IV fluid from abroad and even cold syrups are on the list of imported medications

Meanwhile, Hossein-Ali Shahriari, Head of the Health Commission of Iranian Parliament said Wednesday that if subsidies are not paid to pharmaceutical companies, "the country will face a 40-50% price rise for medicines."

Despite the warnings, Minister of Health Bahram Einollahi claims that "most medicines are available, and there will be no problem regarding the supply of pharmaceuticals this year."

Japan PM Resumes Campaigning **After Blast Incident**

TOKYO (Dispatches) - Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida resumed campaigning after being evacuated unharmed from the scene of an apparent "smoke bomb" blast.

The incident in western Japan's Wakayama came less than a year after the assassination of former prime minister Shinzo Abe, which traumatised the country and forced a security shake-up for public officials.

Kishida was in the city to deliver remarks in support of a ruling party candidate at a local port when a disturbance rippled through the crowd gathered to hear him speak. Footage from national broadcaster NHK showed the prime minister turning to look backwards as a person was detained by security and people moved away, some shrieking.

Deadly Fighting Rocks Sudan as Army Battles Paramilitaries



KHARTOUM (Dispatches) - Three civilians died Saturday in battles between Sudanese paramilitaries and the regular army, which said it launched air strikes against them, sparking global calls for calm in a country which has seen decades of unrest. The paramilitaries said they were in control of the presidential place as well as Khartoum airport, claims denied

by the army, as civilian leaders called for an immediate ceasefire to prevent Sudan's "total collapse".

The doctors' union reported the three civilian deaths, including at Khartoum airport and in North Kordofan state. At least nine others were wounded, the medics said.

Violence erupted after weeks of deepening tensions between military leader Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and his deputy, paramilitary commander Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, over the planned integration of Daglo's paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) into the regular army.

The integration was a key element of talks to finalise a deal that would return the country to civilian rule and end the political and economic crisis sparked by their 2021 coup in one of the world's poorest countries.

Created in 2013, the RSF emerged from the Janjaweed militia that then-president Omar al-Bashir unleashed against non-Arab ethnic minorities in the western Darfur region a decade earlier, drawing accusations of war crimes.

US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said he was "deeply concerned" and urged both sides to "stop the violence immediately", a call echoed by the United Nations, African and Arab regional blocs, and the European Union. Russia's foreign ministry said there was "serious concern in Moscow," which called for urgent steps toward a ceasefire.

The army said it carried out air strikes and destroyed two RSF bases in Khartoum. The latest deaths, during the Muslim holy fasting month of Ramadan, came after more than 120 civilians had

already been killed in a crackdown on regular pro-democracy demonstrations since the coup.

The RSF said its forces had taken control of Khartoum airport, after witnesses reported seeing truckloads of fighters entering the airport compound, as well as the presidential palace -- where Burhan is officially based -- and other key sites.

The army, however, said the airport and other bases remain under their "full control". It published a photograph of black smoke billowing from what it said was the RSF headquarters.

Saudi Arabia's flag carrier Saudia said it had suspended all flights to and from Sudan until further notice after one of its planes, with passengers and crew aboard waiting for departure, was "exposed to gunfire damage".

Repubblica cited the Milan court's reply to Nordio's investigation as saying the justice minister had the authority at any time to impose tougher restrictive measures on someone in extradition proceedings.

Thai PM Prayuth Lags Rivals in Opinion Polls

BANGKOK (Dispatches) - Thai Prime Minister Prayuth Chan-ocha is still lagging behind the main opposition party, latest opinion polls showed, ahead of the Southeast Asian country's general election next month.



The May 14 election will be a battle between parties aligned with the conservative pro-military establishment and the billionaire Shinawatra family-backed Pheu Thai party, led by Paetongtarn Shinawatra, the 36-year-old daughter and niece of two ex-premiers. The Pheu Thai party was ahead with 38.89% in a nationwide survey by local media Matichon and Daily News conducted last week, followed by the Move Forward Party, headed by opposition politician Pita Limjaroenrat, on 32.37%.

Prayuth's United Thai Nation Party was in third place with 12.84%.

NATO Member Finland Breaks Ground On Russia Border Fence

IMATRA (Dispatches) - The construction of barbedwired fence along Finland's long border with Russia primarily meant to curb illegal migration - has broken ground near the southeastern town of Imatra less than two weeks after the Nordic country joined NATO as the 31st member of the military alliance.

The Finnish Border Guard on Friday showcased the building of the initial three kilometer (1.8 mile) stretch of the fence to be erected in Pelkola near a crossing point off Imatra, a quiet lakeside town of some 25,000 people. Finland's 1,340 kilometer (832 mile) border with Russia is the longest of any European Union member.

Construction of the border fence is an initiative by the border guard that was approved by Prime Minister Sanna Marin's government amid wide political support last year. The main purpose of the three-meter (10-foot) high steel fence with a barbed-wire extension on top is to prevent illegal immigration from Russia and give reaction time to authorities, Finnish border officials say. In 2015-2016, Moscow attempted to influence Finland by organizing large numbers of asylum-seekers to northern Finnish

U.S. Urged to Stop Encouraging War in Ukraine

BEIJING (Dispatches) - Brazil's president said Saturday that the United States should stop "encouraging war" in Ukraine, as he wrapped a state visit to China in which he has strengthened economic ties with his country's main trading partner.

Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva used his trip to push the message that "Brazil is back" as a key player on the global stage -- and to warn that the South American country's deepening relations with China were non-negotiable.

Lula was headed on Saturday to the United Arab Emirates for a oneday official visit, and will meet his counterpart Sheikh Mohamed bin Zaved Al-Nahvan.

During the trip to China, the left-wing leader lashed out at the power of the JS dollar and the IMF, and met representatives from Chinese tech giant Huawei, which has been effectively shut out of the US market.

"The United States needs to stop encouraging war and start talking about peace. The European Union needs to start talking about peace," Lula told reporters in Beijing.

In that way, the international community will be able to "convince" Russian President Vladimir Putin and Ukrainian leader Volodymyr Zelensky that 'peace is in the interest of the whole world", he said, before leaving for the United Arab Emirates.

Lula, who returned to power in January after serving two terms between 2003 and 2010, met his Chinese counterpart Xi Jinping on Friday.

The leaders called on developed countries to keep their promise to provide 00 billion dollars a year to the poorest countries to fight against the effects of climate change.

Lula is carrying out a delicate balancing act as he also seeks closer ties with Washington. His visit, which included an economic agenda in Shanghai and a

more political one in Beijing, came after a meeting with US President Joe Biden in February.

Russian Strike Kills 11 In Eastern Ukraine KYIV (Dispatches) - The death toll from a Russian strike on a block of flats in the eastern Ukrainian city of Sloviansk

In southern Ukraine, a 48-year-old woman and her 28-year-old daughter were killed Saturday in Russian shelling in the city of Kherson, the regional administration said on Telegram.

Sloviansk lies 45 kilometres (27 miles) northwest of the frontline hotspot of Bakhmut, the scene of the longest and bloodiest battle of Russia's invasion.

Russian troops have been battling since last summer to capture the town in eastern Ukraine, which has taken on huge symbolic importance even though analysts say it has little strategic value.

Kyiv has said the battle for the town is key to holding back Russian forces along the entire eastern front and Sloviansk is one of the cities that will be at risk if Kyiv loses the battle.

Al Can Evaluate Your Heart Health Easily

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - Artficial intelligence is better than humans at assessing heart ultrasounds, the main test of overall cardiac health, the most rigorous trial yet conducted on the subject was found last week.

While previous research has illustrated the potential power of AI models for reading medical scans, the authors of the new US study said it is the first blinded, randomised clinical trial for heart health.

"There's a lot of excitement around AI," but rigorous evaluation remains critical, the study's senior author David Ouyang told AFP.

This successful trial "really strengthens the argument that now we're ready for primetime," added the cardiologist at the Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles.

Heart ultrasounds, also known as echocardiograms, are carried out on patients by sonographers, who usually give an initial assessment of the scan before handing it over to a cardiologist.

The new study, published in the journal Nature, pitted an AI model against sonographers to see who would give the most accurate initial assessment.

Both assessed the ultrasound for what is called left ventricular ejection fraction, which measures the heart's ability to pump blood out to the body in the space of a heartbeat.

The test is the main way to measure how well a heart is functioning. It is used to tell if patients have had a heart attack or if they will be able to undertake serious treatments such as implanting a defibrillator.

For the study, nearly 3,500 heart ultrasounds were randomly split between sonographers and the AI model.

Their assessments were then evaluated by cardiologists, who did not know which ones came from humans and which from the AI model.

- 'Exciting' - The cardiologists made a substantial change in more than 27 percent of the sonographer assessments, and in nearly 17 percent of those done by the AI model, the study found.

"The AI was faster, more precise, and indistinguishable by the cardiologists," Ouyang said. There is a "tremendous shortage" of sonographers in the United States and across the world, and this would save them valuable time, he added.

The AI model, called EchoNet-Dynamic, was trained on nearly 145,000 echocardiograms and uses what is called deep learning to process large amounts of data.

The researchers are currently applying for the method to be approved by the Federal Drug Administration, and hope to do the same in the European Union and elsewhere soon, Ouyang said.

Patricia Pellikka, a cardiologist at the Mayo Clinic in the United States not involved in the research, told AFP the study was "exciting" and that the integration of AI tools will increase efficiency and standardisation.

French cardiologist Florian Zores said that the study was well conducted but the technology would not be as useful in France, where cardiologists give the initial assessments of heart ultrasounds.

Study Reveals Cancer's Infinite Ability to Evolve

LONDON (Dispatches) - An unprecedented analysis of how cancers grow has revealed an "almost infinite" ability of tumours to evolve and survive, say scientists.

The results of tracking lung cancers for nine years left the research team "surprised" and "in awe" at the formidable force they were up against.

They have concluded we need more focus on prevention, with a "universal" cure unlikely any time soon. Cancer Research UK said early detection of cancer was vitally important.

The study - entitled TracerX - provides the most in-depth analysis of how cancers evolve and what causes them to spread.

Cancers change and evolve over time - they are not fixed and immutable. They can become more aggressive: better at evading the immune system and able to spread around the body.

A tumour starts as a single, corrupted cell, but becomes a mixture of millions of cells that have all mutated in slightly different ways.

TracerX tracked that diversity and how it changes over time inside lung cancer patients and say the results would apply across different types of cancer.

"That has never been done before at this scale," said Prof Charles Swanton, from the Francis Crick Institute and University College London.

More than 400 people - treated at 13 hospitals in the UK - had biopsies taken from different parts of their lung cancer as the disease progressed.

"It has surprised me how adaptable tumours can be," Prof Swanton told me.

"I don't want to sound too depressing about this, but I think - given the almost infinite possibilities in which a tumour can evolve, and the very large number of cells in a late-stage tumour, which could be several hundred billion cells - then achieving cures in all patients with late-stage disease is a formidable task."

Prof Charles Swanton says challenge of tumours evolving inside our body means we need to focus on preventing cancer.

Prof Swanton said: "I don't think we're going to be able to come up with universal cures.

"If we want to make the biggest impact we need to focus on prevention, early detection and early detection of relapse."

Obesity, smoking, alcohol and poor diet all increase the risk of some cancers. Tackling inflammation in the body is also being seen as a way of preventing cancer. Inflammation is the likely explanation for

air pollution causing lung cancers and inflammatory bowel disease increasing the risk of colon cancer. The evolutionary analysis has been published across seven separate studies in the journals Nature and Nature Medicine.

Highly aggressive cells in the initial tumour are the ones that ultimately end up spreading around the body. Tumours showing higher levels of genetic "chaos" were more likely to relapse after surgery to other parts of the body.

Analysing blood for fragments of tumour DNA meant signs of it returning could be spotted up to 200 days before appearing on a CT scan.

The cellular machinery that reads the instructions in our DNA can become corrupted in cancerous cells making them more aggressive. The researchers hope the findings could, in the future, help them predict how a patient's tumour will spread and to tailor treatment.

GD Growth ina's P **201** Seen Rebounding to 4.0%

BEIJING (Dispatches) - China's gross domestic product likely perked up in the first quarter of the year, a Reuters poll showed, as the end of strict COVID-19 curbs helped lift the world's second-largest economy out of a crippling pandemic slump.

GDP growth was seen speeding up to 4.0% in the first quarter from a year earlier, from 2.9% in the previous three months, according

to the median forecast of 70 economists polled by Reuters. That would be the fastest growth since the first quarter of last year. For 2023, growth was expected to pick up to 5.4%, the poll showed, from 3.0% last year - one of its worst performances in nearly half a century due to strict COVID-19 curbs.

Recent data shows the economy is staging a gradual but uneven recovery, led by consumption, services and infrastructure, but slowing inflation and surging bank savings raise doubts over the strength **Hungary Quits Russian Bank**

of a pick-up in domestic demand. "We have seen dividends from COVID policy shift on consumption and investment, including stronger than

expected exports," said Zhang Yiping, economist at China Merchants Securities in Shenzhen. "Domestic demand is improving but the strength of the

recovery is not sufficient."

Policymakers have pledged to step up support for the world's second-largest economy, which is rebounding after disruptions caused by a sudden lifting of COVID-19 curbs in December.

The government has set a modest target for economic growth of around 5% for this year, after badly missing the 2022 goal. Growth is then expected to moderate to 5.0% in 2024, the Reuters poll showed.

The government is due to release first quarter GDP data, along with March activity data, at 0200 GMT on April 18.

China's exports unexpectedly surged in March, data showed this week, but analysts cautioned the improvement partly reflects suppliers catching up with unfulfilled orders after last year's COVID-19 disruptions.

New bank lending hit an all-time high in the first quarter, but consumer inflation slipped to an 18-month low and factory-gate deflation deepened in March, raising the odds for more easing to inject momentum into the economic recovery.

Households added a staggering 9.9 trillion yuan in bank deposits the first quarter alone, more than half the 17.8 trillion yuan for the whole of 2022. On a quarterly basis, the economy is forecast to grow 2.2% in January-

MOSCOW (Dispatches) - Russia's economy ministry revised higher its 2023 gross domestic product (GDP) forecast to 1.2% growth from a 0.8% contraction, but lowered its forecast for 2024, mirroring a wider trend that envisages more sluggish longer term prospects. The International Monetary Fund this week also raised its forecast for Russia's 2023 economic growth, but said the country may see a sharply wider budget deficit and a smaller current account surplus this year. It said Russia's global isolation and lower energy revenues could harm its growth potential for years.

JPMorgan Sees Turkey Lira Diving Towards 30 Per Dollar - . After Elections LONDON (Dispatches) - Turkey's lira

is likely to drop sharply and could near 30 to the dollar following next month's elections, bankers at JPMorgan have

predicted, if it looks like only modest changes will be made to its unorthodox economic policies. Turkey's tightly contested presidential and parliamentary elections on May 14 are perhaps the most consequential in the century-long history of the republic.

They mark a fork in the road for both Turks battered by an inflation-driven cost of living crisis and for international investors, many of whom have bailed out of the country amid recurring bouts of market turmoil in recent years.

JPMorgan's analysts said that macro adjustments were expected regardless of the results but laid out two scenarios based on the degree of commitment to more orthodox policies, such as interest rate rises to cool inflation. In a "strong commitment" scenario they predicted the lira would initially fall to 24-25 to the dollar and to 26 by year end compared to around 19 currently. Benchmark government bond yields, which drive borrowing costs in the economy, would jump to 25%.

"Initially, lira depreciates, driven by pent-up pressures of the large stimulus ahead of the elections. As financial repression is relaxed, locals increase FX portfolios, while foreigners wait for better valuation entry points."

If the shift towards more orthodox polices looks like being more modest, however, the lira could drop to close to 30 to the dollar by year end albeit with a slower initial drop while bond yields were unlikely to adjust much in this scenario.

"A tactical assessment will therefore be needed and we expect elevated volatility," JPMorgan's analysts said.

They cautioned that, even with best intentions, the path to disinflate the economy will be protracted, while it was likely that the central bank

would also aim to rebuild its FX reserves.

They added that only a modest return to orthodox macroeconomic policies, including a slower pace of credit growth, some lower levels of financial repression and some path to rebuilding FX reserves, was "unlikely to inspire capital inflows" meaning the lira would "likely remain on a more protracted depreciation path". They estimated the lira's real effective exchange rate

(REER), which takes into account prices and measures its value against other currencies whose countries Turkey does a lot of trade with, was now about 32% below its "fair value". "A scenario of a return to orthodox macroeconomic

policies could set lira on a real appreciation trend back towards its fair value," JPMorgan said.

"However, initial real appreciation will be driven primarily by prices, with little scope for FX spot appreciation.'

BOJ Warns of Extremely High Uncertainty Over Japan's Economy



WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - Bank of Japan Assistant Governor Tokiko Shimizu said there had been "extremely high" uncertainty regarding Japan's economy, as slowing global growth and recent financial market stress cloud its outlook.

"The BOJ deems it necessary to conduct monetary easing and support the economy, and provide a favorable environment for firms to raise wages,' Shimizu told a seminar hosted in Washington by the

The economy ministry forecast GDP growth of 2% in 2024, down from 2.6% when it last provided macroeconomic forecasts in the autumn.

Russia's economy defied early expectations for a double-digit economic contraction in 2022, in forecasts made soon after Moscow sent troops into Ukraine in February of that year, but a return to prosperity remains a long way off as the government directs more spending towards the military.

The Russian economy shrank 2.1% in 2022. Before Moscow began what it calls a "special military operation" in Ukraine, the government had expected 3% growth.

The ministry, focused on bringing about a recovery in consumer demand, raised its forecasts for retail sales, real wages and real disposable incomes in 2023, but lowered them slightly for 2024. Unemployment is set to remain at a record low of 3.5% through 2026, the ministry estimates. "Demand will recover both as the population's propensity to save is normalised and as consumer lending grows," Economy Minister Maxim Reshetnikov said.



Russia's current account surplus is shrinking sharply, down around 73% in the first quarter of 2023. Robust oil and gas exports had combined with collapsing imports to push the surplus to a record high in 2022. The ministry almost halved its forecast for the current account surplus in 2023 to \$86.6 billion from \$157.6 billion previously and slashed its trade balance forecast by around a third to \$152.1 billion. Economists from the Institute of International Finance said Russia had a large "excess" current account surplus in 2022, with a surplus above and beyond the normal seasonal path in 2021 and 2022.

"This amounts to a windfall of roughly 13% of GDP, which contributed to flush liquidity in Russia's financial system that - in turn - buffered growth,' the IIF said in a report published on Thursday.

"precautionary measure" and in a monthly oil report published on Thursday OPEC cited downside risks to summer oil demand from high stock levels and economic challenges. Meanwhile Russian oil exports in March hit their highest levels since April 2020 on robust oil product flows, the IEA said, despite a seaborne import ban from the European Union and a price cap sanctions policy spearheaded by the United States.

Rapid interest rate hikes by U.S. and European central banks could eventually depress global growth, which was among risks discussed at this week's International Monetary Fund (IMF) meetings, Shimizu said.

"More recently, financial market stress is drawing attention," she said. "Taking these risks into account, it's necessary to pay due attention to developments in the financial sector" and the impact on Japan's economy and prices.

The remarks came after the IMF on Tuesday trimmed its 2023 global growth outlook and warned that a severe flare-up of financial system turmoil could slash output to near recessionary levels.

Reflecting rising raw material costs and a tightening job market, more Japanese firms are raising prices and wages in a sign of change in the public's longheld deflationary mindset, Shimizu said.

Many big firms have accepted union demands for pay increases with some smaller companies following suit, she said.

Despite such positive signs, broader wage hikes are needed for Japan to hit the BOJ's 2% inflation target in a stable, sustainable manner, Shimizu said. Shimizu is among BOJ officials accompanying new central bank governor Kazuo Ueda on a visit to Washington for this week's IMF and G20 finance leaders' meetings.

Germany Closes Last Nuclear Plants

BERLIN (Dispatches) - Germany will pull the plug on its last three nuclear power stations by Saturday, ending a six-decade programme that spawned one of Europe's strongest protest movements but saw a brief reprieve due to the Ukraine war.

The smoking towers of Isar II, Emsland and Neckarwestheim II reactors were to shut forever by midnight on Saturday as Berlin enacts its plan for fully-renewable electricity generation by 2035.

Following years of prevaricating, Germany pledged to quit nuclear power definitively after Japan's 2011 Fukushima disaster sent radiation spewing into the air and terrifying the world.

But the final wind-down was delayed last summer to this year after Moscow's invasion of Ukraine prompted Germany to halt Russian fossil fuel imports. Prices soared and there were fears of energy shortages around the world - but now Germany is confident again about gas supplies and expansion of renewables.

Germany's commercial nuclear sector began with the commissioning of the Kahl reactor in 1961: eagerly promoted by politicians but met with scepticism by companies.

Seven commercial plants joined the grid in the early years, with the 1970s oil crisis helping public acceptance.

Expansion, however, was throttled to avoid harming the coal sector, said Nicolas Wendler, a spokesperson for Germany's nuclear technology industry group KernD. But by the 1990s more than a third of electricity in the newly-reunited Germany came from 17 reactors

The next decade, a coalition government including the Greens - who grew out of the 1970s anti-nuclear movement - introduced a law that would have led to a phase out of all reactors by about 2021.

Former Chancellor Angela Merkel's conservative-led governments went back-and-forth on that - until Fukushima.

Arnold Vaatz, a former lawmaker for Merkel's Christian Democrats (SPD), said the decision was also intended to sway a state election in Baden Wuerttemberg where the issue was playing into the hands of the Greens.

"I called it the biggest economic stupidity by the party since (it was first in government it) 1949 and I'm sticking to that," Vaatz, one of only five conservative lawmakers who opposed the exit bill, told Reuters.

The last three plants contributed only around 5% of electricity production in Germany in the first three months of the year, according to the economy ministry. And nuclear power made up just 6% of Germany's energy production last year,

compared to 44% from renewables, data by the federal statistics office showed. Still, two thirds of Germans favour extending the lifespan of reactors or connecting

old plants back to the grid, with only 28% backing the phase-out, a survey by the



Forsa institute showed earlier this week.

"I think this is certainly fed to a large extent by the fear that the supply situation is simply not secure," Forsa analyst Peter Matuschek told Reuters.

The government says supply is guaranteed after the nuclear phase-out and that Germany will still export electricity, citing high gas storage levels, new liquid gas terminals on the north coast and renewable energies expansion.

However, nuclear power proponents say Germany will have to go back to nuclear eventually if it wants to phase out fossil fuels and reach its goal of becoming greenhouse gas-neutral across all sectors by 2045 as wind and solar energy will not fully cover demand.

"By phasing out nuclear power, Germany is committing itself to coal and gas because there is not always enough wind blowing or sun shining," said Rainer Klute, head of pro-nuclear non-profit association Nuklearia.

With the end of the atomic power era, Germany has to find a permanent repository for around 1,900 highly radioactive casks of nuclear waste by 2031.

"There are still at least another 60 years ahead of us, which we will need for the dismantling and the long-term safe storage of the remnants," said Wolfram Koenig, head of the Federal Office for the Safety of Nuclear Waste Management.

The government also acknowledges that safety issues remain given that neighbours France and Switzerland still depend heavily on nuclear power.

"Radioactivity does not stop at borders," said Inge Paulini, head of Germany's Radiation Protection Office, noting that seven plants in neighbouring countries were less than 100 km (62.14 miles) from Germany.

Asia Rushes to Buy

Spot Oil Cargoes

After OPEC+ Cuts

LONDON (Dispatches) - The biggest oil importers in Asia have been busy buying June-loading spot crude cargoes from the Middle East since top OPEC+ producers announced additional cuts beginning in May and after Saudi Arabia hiked again the price of its term cargoes going to Asia.

Customers from China, Japan, and Thailand have been snapping spot cargoes from Middle Eastern producers such as the United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Qatar, traders told Bloomberg on Thursday. The higher demand for spot Middle Eastern supply

has pushed up the regional Dubai benchmark, according to the traders.

Russia's crude is also a favorite with some Asian refiners, with spot offers for the ESPO grade also on the rise, the traders told Bloomberg. The biggest OPEC producers in the Middle East and several other members of the OPEC+ pact announced early this month a total of 1.16 million bpd of fresh production cuts. Saudi Arabia, OPEC's de facto leader and top global crude exporter, will cut 500,000 bpd and said that the move was "a precautionary measure aimed at supporting the stability of the oil market." The voluntary production reductions include big cuts, beginning in May and lasting through the end of 2023, from the top Middle Eastern producers who typically export sour and more heaver varieties of crude. Saudi Arabia has signaled that it will keep supplying at least several refiners in North Asia with full contractual volumes of crude in May despite the Saudi production reduction.

Biden Administration Ggreenlihts LNG Exports From Alaska Project

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - The Biden administration approved exports of liquefied natural gas from the Alaska LNG project that one day could help the United States compete with Russia to ship natural gas from the Arctic to Asia.

The Department of Energy approved Alaska Gasline Development Corp's (AGDC) exports of LNG

from the project to countries with which the United States does not have a free trade agreement.

Backers of the roughly \$39 billion project hope it will be operational by 2030 if it gets investments and all required permits. The LNG would be exported mainly to countries in Asia.

Frank Richards, president of Alaska-owned AGDC, said the company will review the 51-page decision as it develops the project, which will "provide Alaskans and U.S. allies with a significant source of low-emissions, responsibly produced energy consistent with international environmental priorities."

AGDC has not yet reached a final investment decision on the project. The Department of Energy did not evaluate the long term viability of the project, and only approved only its exports, a spokesperson said. Alaska LNG includes a liquefaction facility on the Kenai Peninsula in southern Alaska and a proposed 807-mile (1,300-km) pipeline to move gas stranded in northern Alaska across the state. The project, for which exports were first approved by the administration of Donald Trump, has been opposed by environmental groups. The Biden administration undertook an environmental review of Alaska LNG, concluding it has

Asian Refiners to Raise Gasoline Output

SINGAPORE (Dispatches) - Several Asian refiners are likely to maximize gasoline output from May and reduce gasoil output, cashing in on higher profits for the motor fuel ahead of the peak summer driving season, industry sources and analysts say.

The adjustments come after margins for gasoil and jet fuel slumped on rising supplies as China boosted exports, while the arbitrage window to Europe has been shut since early 2023 due to ample supplies on the continent. Meanwhile, gasoline profits have rebounded as traders build supplies ahead of a seasonal travel demand boost from April through September.

By adjusting production, the oversupplied gasoil market in Asia could tighten again and support prices.

At Taiwan's Formosa Petrochemical Corp, one of Asia's largest oil products exporters, the company plans to cut gasoil output from some units, such as the delayed coking unit, and ramp up gasoline production from its residue fluid catalytic cracker, spokesman KY Lin told Reuters. "Our gasoil production volumes will be

down around 5%, with gasoline production yield up 2-3% for May compared with the original production plan," said Lin.

Refiners who can switch have been slowly making adjustments in the past few weeks, said a person working for a southeast Asia refinery who declined to be named due to company policy.

If the cracks continue to converge, there is a possibility of a production switch, a source at an Indian refinery said.

Complex refinery margins in Singapore, the bellwether for Asian refining margins, have more than halved to \$3.17 a barrel - the lowest since October 2022 - from an average of \$7.56 in March.

The extent to which Asian refiners can change production yields between light distillates - gasoline and naphtha - and middle distillates - gasoil and jet fuel - is limited on feedstock and catalyst reasons, estimated at between 3% and 5% on average, according to industry sources.

Butler, Strus Lead Heat Rast Bulls And Into Playoffs MIAMI (Dispatches) - Jimmy Butler and the Miami Heat caught fire down the stretch to beat the Chicago Bulls 102-91 and reach the NBA playoffs, as the Minnesota

Timberwolves dominated the Oklahoma City Thunder to book their postseason berth. Miami, smarting from a loss to the Atlanta Hawks on Tuesday, clinched the Eastern Conference's eighth and final seed to set up a meeting with the top seeded Milwaukee

Bucks starting on Sunday. Minnesota meanwhile will face Western Conference top seeds Denver in the first round of the playoffs after a comprehensive 120-95 blowout of Oklahoma City.

While Minnesota romped into the postseason, Miami's clash with Chicago went down to the wire before Butler, helped by the three-pointers of Max Strus, secured victory for Erik Spoelstra's team.

Butler put up 31 points, a tally matched by Strus who shot 7-12 on three pointers, including a crucial 26-foot jumper with 1:14 left that put Miami 96-91 up.

For Strus, who grew up as a Bulls fan in the suburbs of Chicago and was released by them before joining Miami, it was a sweet night.

"It's huge. It doesn't really matter who we're playing - we had to win this one, no matter what. It was win or go home and we're not done yet.

"So we want to keep playing and it's good to get that one. But it does feel a little bit better against them, I'm not gonna lie," he said.

Strus secured the win with three free throws after he was fouled by Alex Caruso as he tried to make a throw from the corner. The Heat had been 14 points up in the first quarter but a 12-2 run from the Bulls in the third levelled the game up at 56-56.

A Zach LaVine dunk then put Chicago up for the first time since the opening basket of the game and three three-pointers early in the fourth from Coby White ensured the Bulls were 90-87 with three minutes to go.



But then Butler and Strus took control.

Butler was fouled while making a lay-up and then Bam Adebayo, who grabbed 17 rebounds, sank two free throws after he was fouled by Nikola Vucevic to make it 93-90. Butler set up Strus for a three pointer before he then made sure of the victory from the free-throw line.

The Heat had found themselves in the elimination game after losing their opening playin game to the Atlanta Hawks and faced the prospect of being the first divisional winner not to make the playoffs.

"I don't think any of us felt any type of pressure. We went out, we competed, we played the right way, corrected some things, and did what we were supposed to do," said Butler. DeMar DeRozan top scored for the Bulls with 26 points and nine assists.

There is little time for Miami to savor the victory however as their playoff series against the Bucks begins in Milwaukee on Sunday.



ONDON (Dispatches) - Manchester United defender Lisandro Martinez will miss the remainder of the season due to a fractured metatarsal bone in his foot, the Premier League club said.

Martinez was carried off during United's 2-2 draw with Sevilla in the Europa League on Thursday after he fell to the ground clutching his right foot with no opponents nearby.

Fellow centre-back Raphael Varane, who was also injured and substituted at halftime during the quarter-final, first leg at Old Trafford, is expected to be out for a few weeks.

United said Argentine World Cup winner Martinez would make a full recovery in time for the start of next season.

"Everyone at Manchester United sends Lisandro and Rapha our best wishes for a speedy recovery," the club said in a statement.

Rybakina Sends Kazakhstan Into BJK Cup Finals


PARIS (Dispatches) - Wimbledon champion Elena Rybakina beat Poland's Magda Linette to send Kazakhstan into the Billie Jean King Cup Finals, with France, Spain and the Czech Republic also qualifying.

Rybakina won 6-4, 6-2 in the third rubber in Astana having also won Friday against Weronika Falkowska when teammate Yulia Putintseva defeated Linette.

"I'm delighted that Kazakhstan will be able to fly our flag on this big stage once again," said Rybakina after the tie against a Polish side missing injured world number one Iga Swiatek.

World number five Caroline Garcia gave France the winning point with a 6-1, 6-7 (10/12), 6-1 win over Britain's Harriet Dart in Coventry.

Britain, who reached the semi-finals last year, were missing Emma Raducanu, leaving 117th-ranked Dart as their top singles player. Meanwhile, Garcia and Alize Cornet had to play almost six hours between



Konstantinos Mavropanos received a second yellow card, but the hosts hauled themselves level in a dramatic finish.

Gio Reyna fired Dortmund back in front three minutes into injury time only for Stuttgart

to snatch a 3-3 draw courtesy of Silas, who scored with virtually the last kick of the game. The results left Bayern still two points clear of Dortmund at the top with six games to play.

Bayern came into their match after a tumultuous week, forward Leroy Sane sporting a visible mark on his upper lip after a confrontation with Sadio Mane, which saw the latter suspended.

With Mane out and striker Eric Maxim Choupo-Moting missing due to a knee complaint, Bayern defender Pavard gave his side an early lead, tapping in from close range after 17 minutes.

With Bayern in cruise control, coach Thomas Tuchel took off Sane, Leon Goretzka and Kingsley Coman, with Wednesday's return leg against Manchester City in mind.

Hoffenheim took the initiative and equalised after 71 minutes, Kramaric curling a perfect free-kick from well outside the box and past Yann Sommer.

Pavard looked to have scored a second just two minutes later to regain the lead for the home side, but the goal was disallowed for offside.

Bayern Held to a 1-1 Draw by Hoffenheim

MUNICH (Dispatches) - Borussia Dortmund failed to take advantage of Bayern Munich's 1-1 home draw against Hoffenheim, blowing a two-goal lead against 10-man Stuttgart before conceding a lastgasp equalizer.

Bundesliga leaders Bayern led through a first-half goal from Benjamin Pavard, but had to settle for a point as Hoffenheim equalised in the second half through an Andrej Kramaric free-kick.

Dortmund were 2-0 ahead in Stuttgart when

them to edge out Katie Boulter 6-7 (2/7), 7-6 (7/4), 7-6 (7/2) and Dart 7-6 (8/6), 7-6(7/3) respectively.

The Czech Republic saw off Ukraine, with Marketa Vondrousova sealing the winning point against Katarina Zavatska 6-3, 6-4, after former French Open champion Barbora Krejcikova lost 3-6, 6-1, 6-4 to 38th-ranked Marta Kostyuk.

TETAFE (Dispatches) - Xavi Hernandez Ubelieves young Barcelona midfielder Gavi would be happiest staying at the club, amid speculation he could leave in the summer, the Catalan coach said.

Gavi signed a contract renewal with Barcelona until 2026 in September but because of the club's financial difficulties, they have not been able to register it with La Liga.

That means Gavi remains on his previous deal, which is set to expire in June, allowing him to sign for free for any other side.

Chelsea and Bayern Munich have been linked to Gavi in recent weeks, but Xavi said the 18-year-old should stay at Barcelona.

"I don't know what other people are thinking, but I think that Gavi would not be as happy at any other team than he is at Barca," Xavi told a news conference.

"He has everything here, we value him, he's a starter at 18, he's decisive for the team. "He's a very important player and he's a player that excites me. He's a marvellous footballer, and I think his future lies at Barca -- he would not be as happy elsewhere."

Gavi has established himself as an important figure both for Barcelona and the Spanish national team over the past two years, after coming through his club's La Masia youth academy.

The team will travel by high-speed train to Madrid for the match instead of flying, which Xavi said was an effort to reduce pollution.

"We hadn't done it before because it's a bit longer," added the coach.

"It's about pollution and we think it's the ideal time to do it because the game is at four in the afternoon.

"It won't affect us, it's something we're open to."

MONTE CARLO (Dispatches) -Andrey Rublev moved into his third Masters final after fighting back from a set down in Monte Carlo to beat American Taylor Fritz 5-7 6-1 6-3 at the picturesque Court Rainier III.

The pair have met regularly in Masters tournaments and Fritz had the upper hand with a three-match win streak against Rublev, but it was the Russian who prevailed in an encounter that was suspended for nearly two hours in the final set due to rain.

"It was really tough against Taylor to whom I lost three times. Very tough for me mentally to play against him," fifth seed Rublev told reporters.

"But I started to feel I will have chances. And then we had a great match and I was able to win."

Fritz started poorly and was broken in the first service game as the American stared quizzically at the surface he seemed to have mastered when knocking out defending champion Stefanos Tsitsipas, who was in the stands to watch the semi-final.

Fritz quickly found himself 2-0 down and even smashed his racquet in frustration, but he turned things around by engaging Rublev in long rallies to set up searing winners to level the set at 3-3 and then again at 5-5 as the pair traded breaks.

Rublev had the opportunity to serve for the set but Fritz converted his fourth consecutive break point to take the opener as his rattled Russian opponent requested a bathroom break before the second set.

But as the sky grew overcast, Rublev was unstoppable in the second set as he fired 11 winners while Fritz lost his range and failed to convert any break points, making 17 unforced errors as the Russian forced the match into a decider.

It was Rublev who broke in the first game after they returned to hold the advantage while a frustrated Fritz's unforced error count only rose after the restart.
