Call for National Cooperation to Counter Enemy's Hybrid War

TEHRAN - The chief commander of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) says Iran's enemies have waged a full-scale hybrid war against the country, which can only be countered through the participation and cooperation of the entire nation.

Major General Hossein Salami made the remarks on the sidelines of a ceremony in Tehran on Monday as he pointed to various types of warfare the West and certain European governments have over the years waged against the Islamic Republic.

The invasion that the enemy has launched against us has a completely global aspect; the enemy has waged war against the Iranian nation by using all it has in power, including media, communication, political, economic, intelligence and psychological tools, and has orchestrated hybrid warfare against the Iranian nation,"

"The hybrid warfare against the Iranian nation is a full-scale war as it encompasses all the features of the past wars in one compact form," he added. See Page 7 See Page 7

Tehran, Cairo on Way to **Upgrade Tourism Ties**

CAIRO (Dispatches) - Iran and Egypt have agreed to extend mutual tourism as they are on track to restore diplomatic relations and reopen their respective embassies.

Tehran and Cairo hope to draw a roadmap for their tourism collaborations later this month as part of ongoing efforts to normalize relations between the two nations, The National reported.

According to Egyptian sources, a delegation from Egypt's Tourism and Antiquities Ministry was due to travel to Tehran to finalize details with their Iranian counterparts.

A new Egyptian tour operator is to be established aimed at being solely responsible for handling Iranian tourists, the report said.

Based on initial arrangements, Iranians will be allowed to visit Egypt on organized tours of the Red Sea resorts in the southern region of the Sinai Peninsula.

In addition, further agreements may be reached for Iranian travelers to extend their visits to religious temples in Egypt. See Page 7

TEHRAN - Finance Minister and Spokesman of the economic team of the government says with recent visit of President Seyed Ebrahim Raisi to three African states doors for new exporting markets were opened.

Speaking in a press conference, Ehsan Khandouzi said that with the visit of President Raisi to three African countries new markets were opened for Iran exports that those markets had been ignored by the Iranian economic activists in the past.

He noted that African market is the land of new opportunity which had been neglected for over 11 years, adding that this market has capacity of 1200b dollars and Iran just accounted for \$600m of that figure during the previous government in Iran. He added that this figure has been increased to \$1.2b during this government and in the upcoming months it will grow.

Khandouzi also rejected fixed prices for petrochemical products and said: The price of petrochemicals should have a formula to include all local and international ups and downs.

"The price can be calculated for the next three years so economic units can predict their profits," Iran's government economic spokesman stressed.

According to Khandouzi, Iran's economic delegation visited China in the past few days, and the ministries of Iran and China confirmed the implementation of the agreed projects. He said: 24% of Iran's trade is with China as the largest trading partner.

Referring to President's past visit to China, Khandouzi said: The strategic agreements of the President's visit were brought up and the ministries were supposed to agree on the projects and their implementations.

He added: Projects between ministries in the field of energy, industry, and trade (industrial, basic goods) were finalized. Khandouzi emphasized: During this trip and in the meeting with China's Minister of Commerce, some obstacles were examined and in the meeting with the Deputy Prime Minister of China, we talked about the implementation of 25 years Iran, china document of cooperation.

He stated: During this trip, some Chinese companies that have shares in the Iranian market had proposals that were resolved in the economic meetings.

We also had a meeting with the Iranian activists in the Chinese market to remove the barriers to their economic activity. Referring to the visit of the economic delegation of Iran to China, Khandouzi said: "Holding the joint commission on cooperation between Iran and China took place during this trip, and good agreements were reached for the agreed projects.

He also reiterated that the unemployment rate in 25 provinces of the country has dropped and in 24 provinces it has become single-digit. U.S. Deploying F-35s to Persian Gulf Despite Stern Warning From Iran

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - Pentagon says it plans to send additional fighter jets and naval assets to the Persian Gulf region to increase U.S. military presence in the region, a move that comes against the backdrop of Iran's stern warning. Addressing a briefing on Monday, Deputy Pentagon Press Secretary Sabrina Singh claimed the deployment would be an effort to counter Iran, citing a number of "alarming" events in the Strait of Hormuz earlier this month.

On July 10, an Islamic Revolution Guard Corps (IRGC) commander announced that the U.S. made "unprofessional and risky" attempts to impede the seizure of a foreign oil tanker smuggling Iranian fuel in the Persian Gulf last week, but the IRGC successfully confiscated the vessel.

According to IRGC's Rear Admiral Ramazan Zir-Rahi, the vessel carrying contraband fuel had arranged military backing from U.S. military forces in the area but was still seized by Iran's naval forces.

He further elaborated that the Navy attempted to intervene as IRGC naval forces moved in to intercept the oil tanker involved in smuggling one million liters of Iranian oil and gas. Singh, however, alleged that Iran is conducting destabilizing activities that "threaten the free flow of commerce"

through the strategic Strait of Hormuz "of which the world depends on for more than one-fifth of the world's oil supply." "The Secretary of Defense has ordered the deployment of the destroyer USS Thomas Hudner, F-35 fighters and F-16 fighters to ... defend US interests and safeguard freedom of navigation in the region," she told reporters.

She did not give details about the date the fighter jets and guided-missile destroyer would be sent to the region, or how long the new deployment would last but emphasized that the move would help to monitor and secure "vital waterways."

Iran-China Non-Oil Trade Hits \$7.8b in 01

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - The president of the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs Administration (IRICA) put the non-oil trade exchanges between Iran and China in the first three months of the current Iranian calendar year (March 21 to June 22, 2023) at \$7.8 billion.

While describing the \$30 billion trade exchanges between Iran and China last year (ended March 20, 2023). Mohammad Rezvanifar said that Iran exported \$3.5 billion worth of non-oil goods to China from March 21 to June 22, 2023.

In this period, Iran imported \$4.3 billion worth of products from China, he added.

Speaking in an interview with Fars news agency, Rezvanifar stated that Iran exported 35.5 million tons of non-oil goods, valued at \$12.5 billion, in the first quarter of the current Iranian calendar year.

Iran's import of products in the first three months of the current Persian calendar year registered a 1 and 5.9 percent growth in weight and value respectively, the IRICA chief noted.

Iran imported 8.6 million tons of goods, valued at \$14 billion, from March 21 to June 22, 2023, he continued. See Page 7

Pakistan Can Benefit From Iran's Huge Energy Resources

KARACHI (Dispatches) - The Consul General of Iran in Karachi Iranian Hassan Noorian has expressed his belief in the deep-rooted and brotherly relations between Pakistan and Iran.

During a meeting with the delegation of Karachi Press Club (KPC), the Iranian Consul General emphasized the potential for strengthening these ties through cooperation in various fields.

The delegation from the Karachi Press Club, led by their President Saeed Sarbazi, had the opportunity to engage in discussions with the Iranian Consul General. It included Vice President Mushtaq Sohail, Secretary Shoaib Ahmed, and Joint Secretary Aslam Khan.

During the meeting, the Consul General said that Iran imports basmati rice, meat, and other commodities from various countries, presenting ample trade opportunities for Pakistani businessmen. He also stressed the potential for promoting cooperation between the two nations in multiple sectors. Notably, Iran's abundant energy resources can greatly benefit Pakistan, exemplified by the ongoing Pakistan-Iran Gas Pipeline project.

Iran Reportedly Ready to **Give Special Priority to India on Crude Oil**

NEW DELHI (Dispatches) - Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister for Political Affairs, Ali Bagheri said that his country wants to use Indian Rupee and Iranian Rial to boost trade and economic exchanges and added Tehran also prioritize the supply of crude oil to New Delhi, if it allows it. Speaking to news agency ANI, he underscored that increased investment from India at the Chabahar would advance the completion of the port. "Any increase in the investment by the Indian party could play an important role in the advances, the progress and the completion of the Chabahar Port. We welcome any initiative by India for further investment in this project," said Bagheri.

He emphasized that since Iran is the biggest oil supplier in the world, it is ready to give priority to India if the Indian Government also shows "willingness". "We, as one of the biggest suppliers of oil in the world, are ready to give special priority to India but India should show willingness," he said.

On the trade, he said that it is on the Iranian Government's agenda that the trade between the two countries takes place in the national currencies of India and Iran. See Page 7

Iran Not to Tolerate Any Interference Regarding Its Territorial Integrity

TEHRAN - Foreign Minister Hossein Amirabdollahian says the Islamic Republic will never tolerate any interference when it comes to its territorial integrity amid recent claims about the three Persian Gulf islands of Abu Musa, the Greater and Lesser Tunbs.

Addressing a joint press conference with his Omani counterpart Sayyid Badr Albusaidi in Tehran, Amirabdollahian said Tehran would never pull any punches with any party over the country's national sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity.

The top Iranian diplomat made the remarks in reaction to a joint statement issued last week by the Persian Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) and Russia that challenged Iran's sovereignty over the three islands.

In their statement, the ministers said the issue should be settled through bilateral negotiations or the International Court of Justice, in accordance with the rules of international law and the United Nations Charter.

"After the Russian ambassador was summoned by the [Iranian] Foreign Ministry, we received certain explanations from Russian officials, but we do not consider them to be sufficient and we do not tolerate the repetition of such an approach by Russia or any other side in issues pertaining to Iran's territorial integrity," Amirabdollahian told the presser.

The three Persian Gulf islands of Abu Musa, the Greater and Lesser Tunbs have historically been part of Iran, proof of which can be found and corroborated by countless historical, legal, and geographical documents in Iran and other parts of the world.

However, the United Arab Emirates has repeatedly laid claim to the islands. The Iranian FM has blasted a recent joint statement by the Persian Gulf Cooperation

Council (GCC) and the Russian Federation about the three Persian Gulf islands of Abu Musa, the Greater and Lesser Tunbs.

Elsewhere in his remarks, Amirabdollahian further noted that Iran and Oman have been following up on the implementation of the agreements previously signed between the two countries.

Over the past 22 months, the volume of trade transactions between Tehran and Muscat have more than doubled, which is a remarkable record, he said.

The top Iranian diplomat added that a meeting of the two countries' joint economic committee would be held in Tehran to accelerate the promotion of bilateral cooperation.

"We believe that the neighboring countries can increase their relations constantly, and this is what our region needs [to achieve] for sustainable development, security and stability," he emphasized.

He urged the Persian Gulf littoral states to promote cooperation based on dialogue which is a leading factor in achieving peace, security and sustainable progress.

The Iranian foreign minister said Iran's initiative to hold a meeting with the eight Persian Gulf states plus Yemen has been welcomed by these countries and expressed hope the session would be convened in the future.

He pointed to the "strategic and consolidated" relations between Tehran and Muscat and commended Oman's contribution towards facilitating negotiations among the regional countries to bring their stance closer to one other.

Amirabdollahian also hailed Oman's diplomatic efforts to help remove unilateral sanctions against Iran and said Muscat would proceed with its role in lifting cruel sanctions against Tehran.

Referring to the ongoing talks in Yemen, the Iranian foreign minister expressed hope that the intra-Yemeni negotiations would put an end to the war, establish lasting peace, remove the humanitarian blockade and boost development and progress.

Elsewhere in the presser, Amirabdollahian reiterated Iran's support for the territorial integrity of the countries engaged in the war in Ukraine in accordance with international law and stressed the need to end the war through political approaches.



The Omani foreign minister, for his part, said his country has always been following a policy to promote peace and security through a strong will.

Albusaidi added that firm political determination would result in proper solutions to all problems.

Referring to his fruitful talks in Tehran on issues of common concern, he noted that the sides discussed a possible agreement on preferential tariff.

The Omani foreign minister arrived in Tehran earlier on Monday to hold talks with senior Iranian officials about the latest mutual, regional and international developments.

68 Semi-Finished Projects to Go on Stream By Mid-March 2024

TEHRAN – Oil Minister said 68 semi-finished projects worth \$15 billion will be put into operation by the end of the current Iranian calendar year (March 19, 2024).

Javad Owji, who made the announcement in the inauguration ceremony of Gachsaran olefin plant in the southwestern province of Kohgilouyeh and Boyer-Ahmad, added 130,000 barrels of oil and 40 million cubic meters of gas will be added to the country's output when the projects come on stream.

Projects of Phase 2 of Abadan Refinery-Integrated Petrochemical Plant, refinery of Phase 14 of South Pars gas field, and associated petroleum gas (APG) collection were among those inaugurated in recent months, mentioned the minister, continuing the third olefin plant of the country was also put into operation today after long years.

He explained that APG of oil fields in southern Iran are processed at Persian Gulf Bidboland Gas Refinery and the produced ethane is transmitted to Gachsaran Petrochemical Complex.

He referred to the lengthy construction of Gachsaran Petrochemical Complex, lasting for 17 years, adding his ministry accelerated the implementation of the project in the past



two years and managed once again to develop the country's petrochemical value chain. Owji said five more petrochemical projects will be inaugurated within the next eight months. He also said South Pars Phase 11 will be ready soon for official inauguration in the presence of the president after a two-decade hiatus.

Shahin Mustafayev, who co-chairs intergovernmental economic commission between Iran and Azerbaijan, said on Monday that Baku seeks to complete joint border projects with Iran to help boost trade between the two countries.

Mustafayev made the remarks in a meeting held in the Iranian border city of Astara with Iranian transportation minister and co-chair of Iran-Azerbaijan joint economic commission Mehrdad Bazrpash.

"Azerbijan believes in expanding continued and stable cooperation with Iran," he said, adding that some 2,452 Iranian companies are currently operating in Azerbaijan as a result of growing economic ties between the two countries.

Mustafayev and Bazrpash toured an unfinished bridge on the Astarachay river on the border between Iran and Azerbaijan. The project seeks to facilitate the movement of cargo trucks between the two countries. Senior government officials

from the two sides, including regional governors, were present in the Monday meeting in Astara.

The meeting comes some five months after Baku decided to evacuate its embassy in Tehran following an attack on the mission which Tehran blamed on personal motives of the attacker.

Iranian and Azerbaijani officials sought to repair their ties during a recent summit of the Non-Aligned Movement in Baku.

The two countries have stakes in a major international transport corridor project that passes through their territories.

Tehran and Baku have also expanded their energy cooperation in recent years under a gas swap arrangement that also involves Turkmenistan

Iran Becomes 5th Country Mastering Pneumonia Vaccine Technology

TEHRAN (MNA) - An Iranian official says the Islamic Republic has become the fifth country in the world to master the technology that is required to produce pneumonia vaccine.

The announcement was made on Monday by Mostafa Qane'i, the secretary of the Knowledge-Based Health Economics Development Headquarters, which is affiliated with the Iranian Vice Presidency for Science, Technology and Knowledge-based Economy.

"The technology used to produce this vaccine is complicated. It was previously exclusive to four countries and the Islamic Republic of Iran has become the fifth country to master this technology," the official said. "The production of pneumonia vaccine for children is currently going through its final stages," he added.

Noting that the country has to prepare vaccine doses for as many as 1.5 million newborns every year and that every newborn needs three doses, Ghane'i said domestic production of this vaccine will reduce its imports from other countries and, as such, will greatly contribute to cost reduction in this field.

The country is also in the final stages of producing a childhood diarrhea vaccine and is in the process of producing a cervical cancer vaccine for women, the official stated.

'We are also planning to produce a quadrivalent vaccine for cervical cancer, which will be offered at a lower price compared to its foreign counterpart. A bivalent vaccine for cervical cancer is currently available on the market and the Vice Presidency for Science, Technology and Knowledge-based Economy is planning to produce a quadrivalent vaccine in cooperation with knowledge-based companies, which will be as effective as its foreign counterpart," Qane'i said.

"During the coronavirus pandemic, we managed to produce and supply the vaccines that the country needed and we are now in possession of necessary infrastructure and technologies to produce this vaccine," he said.

Iran Private Sector Highly Inclined to Interaction With Saudi Arabia

He added that the country plays a significant role in the development of the international supply chain because of its geographical position.





Moscow Halts Grain Deal in What UN Calls a Global Blow



KYIV (Dispatches) - Russia halted participation in the year-old U.N.-brokered deal that lets Ukraine export grain through the Black Sea, spreading fear in poorer countries that price rises will put food out of reach.

Hours earlier, a blast knocked out Russia's bridge to Crimea in what Moscow called a strike by Ukrainian sea drones. Russia said two civilians were killed and their daughter wounded in what Moscow cast as a terrorist attack on the road bridge, a major artery for Russian troops fighting in Ukraine.

The Kremlin said there was no link between the attack and its decision to suspend the grain deal, over what it called a failure to meet its demands to implement a parallel agreement easing rules for its own food and fertilizer exports. "Unfortunately, the part of these Black Sea agreements concerning Russia has not been implemented so far, so its effect is terminated," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters on a conference call.

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres signalled that Russia's withdrawal meant that the related pact to facilitate Russia's grain and fertilizer exports was also terminated.

"Today's decision by the Russian Federation will strike a blow to people in need everywhere," he told reporters. Moscow said it would consider rejoining the grain deal if it saw "concrete results" on its demands but that its guarantees for the safety of navigation would meanwhile be revoked.

In Washington, the White House said Russia's suspension of the pact "will worsen food security and harm millions". Ukraine and Russia are some of the world's biggest exporters of grain and other foodstuffs and any interruption could drive up food prices across the globe, especially in the poorest countries.

Shashwat Saraf, the emergency director in East Africa for the International Rescue Committee (IRC), said the impacts would be far-reaching in Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya, which have been facing the Horn of Africa's worst drought in decades.

"We're from Texas and it's really hot there, we thought we would escape the heat but it's even hotter here," Colman Peavy, 30, said as he sipped a capuccino at an outside terrasse in central Rome with his wife Ana at the start of a two-week Italian vacation. The mercury was due to hit 40C after noon on Monday in Rome, where some 15,000 braved the temperatures the previous day to hear Pope Francis lead prayers, using parasols and fans to keep cool.

Death Toll in Kenya Starvation Cult Case Passes 400

NAIROBI (Dispatches) - The death toll in an investigation linked to a Kenyan cult that practiced starvation to "meet Jesus Christ" has exceeded 400 after 12 more bodies were found on Monday, a senior official said.

"Total death Toll - 403," Coast Regional Commissioner Rhoda Onyancha told AFP in a message, following the latest round of exhumations in the Shakahola forest, where cult leader Paul Nthenge Mackenzie allegedly urged followers to starve to death.

"Exhumation continues tomorrow," Onyancha added, as investigators search for more graves in the forest, where the first victims -- some dead, others alive but weakened and emaciated -- were discovered on April 13.

According to government autopsies, starvation appears to have been the main cause of death, although some victims, including children, were strangled, beaten or suffocated.

Mackenzie, a former taxi driver-turned-preacher, has been in police custody since mid-April. On July 3, a court in the port city of Mombasa extended his detention by a month pending investigations.

State prosecutors have said he is facing terrorism or genocide-related charges, but he has not yet been required to enter any plea.

The self-proclaimed pastor and father of seven set up the Good News International Church in 2003.

Questions have been raised about how he managed to evade law enforcement despite a history of extremism and previous legal cases.

It has also drawn President William Ruto to weigh in on the sensitive subject of Kenya's homegrown religious movements -- and failed efforts to regulate unscrupulous churches and cults that have dabbled in criminality. There are more than 4,000 churches registered in the East African country of around 50 million people,

according to government figures.

Mackenzie fell foul of the law in 2017 after he was accused of urging children not to attend school, claiming the Bible did not recognise education.

He was arrested again in March, after two children starved to death in the custody of their parents but was subsequently freed on bond.

Priest François Mbemba said he was "sweating like hell" under his black robes, adding that it felt hotter in St Peter's Square than in his Democratic Republic of Congo diocese.

Erdogan Is Open to Meeting With Syria's Assad



ISTANBUL (Dispatches) - Turkey's President Tayyip Erdogan said that he was open to a meeting with Syrian President Bashar al Assad, but that setting the withdrawal of Turkish troops from Syrian territory as a precondition for talks was "unacceptable"

Turkey has been the biggest military and political ally of the Syrian opposition, which controls the last rebel bastion in northwest Syria. Ankara has set up dozens of bases and deployed thousands of troops in northern Syria, preventing the Russian-backed Syrian army from re-taking the region.

Speaking to reporters in Istanbul ahead of his departure for a three-day visit to Saudi Arabia, Qatar and United Arab Emirates, Erdogan said that Turkey has never "shut the door" to discussions with the Syrian government.

"We can hold a four-party summit (with Syria, Russia and Iran), and I am also open to a meeting with Assad. What matters here is their approach toward us," Erdogan said.

Damascus' condition of a complete withdrawal of Turkish forces for such a meeting was "unacceptable", he added.

Erdogan first said earlier this year that he may meet Syrian President Assad as part of a new peace process, but Assad said in March that there was no point in a meeting with Erdogan until Turkey's "illegal occupation" ended.


"We are fighting against terrorism there. How can we withdraw when our country is under continuous threat from terrorists along our border... We expect a fair approach," Erdogan said.

The defence ministers of the two countries met late last year for the highest-level talks between the two neighbours, whose governments have been at odds since 2011, when the Arab Spring uprisings reached Syria and plunged the country into war.

The foreign ministers of the two countries also met in Moscow in May ahead of Turkish elections as part of talks overseen by Russia.

Alzheimer's Diagnosis Revamp Embraces Rating Scale Similar to Cancer

LONDON (Dispatches) - Alzheimer's disease experts are revamping the way doctors diagnose patients with the progressive brain disorder - the most common type of dementia - by devising a seven-point rating scale based on cognitive and biological changes in the patient.



The proposed guidelines, unveiled by experts on Sunday in a report issued at an Alzheimer's Association conference in Amsterdam, embrace a numerical staging system assessing disease progression similar to the one used in cancer diagnoses. They also eliminate the use of terms like mild, moderate and severe.

The revamp - replacing guidelines issued in 2018 - was prompted by the increased availability of tests detecting key Alzheimer's-related proteins such as beta amyloid in the blood and new treatments that require confirmation of disease pathology prior to use.

The new system is designed to be more accurate and better reflect a person's underlying disease, according to Dr. Clifford Jack of the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, lead author of the report sponsored by the Alzheimer's Association and the National Institute of Aging, a part of the U.S. government's National Institutes of Health.

The change comes at a time when doctors are preparing to identify and treat patients with Eisai (4523.T) and Biogen's (BIIB.O) drug Leqembi, which won Food and Drug Administration approval this month, and Eli Lilly's experimental drug donanemab, which is now under FDA review.

"We really are getting into an era of much more personalized medicine, where we're starting to understand that there are certain biomarkers that are elevated to certain degrees in people in different stages," said Dr. Maria Carrillo, chief scientific officer for the Alzheimer's Association.

Under the new diagnostic approach, patients would receive a score of 1 to 7 based on the presence of abnormal disease biomarkers and the extent of cognitive changes. The system also includes four biological stages ranked a, b, c and d. For example, Stage 1a is when a person is completely asymptomatic but has abnormal biomarkers.

"Stage 1a is really the beginning of evidence that someone has the disease," Jack said.

In Stage 2, an individual may have abnormal biomarkers and very subtle changes in cognition or behavior. Stage 3 is roughly equivalent to the current presymptomatic stage known as mild cognitive impairment, while stages 4, 5, and 6 are equivalent to mild, moderate and severe dementia.

The new scale also includes a Stage 0 for people who carry genes that guarantee they will develop Alzheimer's. This category includes people with Down Syndrome, 75% of whom develop Alzheimer's as adults.

Noting the new system's similarity to cancer stages, Jack said, "There's no such thing as mild breast cancer. They're numeric stages." Jack also noted that many other conditions can cause dementia but not all dementia is Alzheimer's disease.

The proposed guidelines are intended for doctors to use in clinical practice as many face the prospect for the first time of offering patients treatments that can slow the course of the disease, rather than just treat symptoms.

The draft guidelines are open for expert review and comment and will be revised later to reflect that input, according to a spokesperson for the Alzheimer's Association.

Alzheimer's, which gradually destroys memory and thinking skills, is characterized by changes in the brain including amyloid beta plaques and neurofibrillary, or tau, tangles that result in loss of neurons and their connections.

5 Things Neuroscientists Do To Keep Their Brains Healthy

LONDON (Dispatches) - Neuroscientists explain how they keep healthy brains with regular exercise, enough sleep, and more.

Keeping your brain healthy is important for delaying neurodegenerative conditions like Alzheimer's.

Neuroscientists' additional advice includes keeping close friendships and trying new things.

In a viral TikTok video with more than 10 million views, neuroscience PhD student Emily McDonald discusses three things she does each day to protect her brain — stay off her phone in the morning, think positive thoughts, and avoid processed foods.

The advice McDonald gives in her video isn't bad advice, two neuroscientists told Insider. But there's a lot more to keeping the brain healthy and the science behind it.

Jason Shepherd, an associate professor of neurobiology at the University of Utah, and Talia Lerner, an assistant professor of neuroscience at Northwestern University, told Insider what they do to keep their brains healthy.

1. Catch some zzzz's

Practicing good sleep hygiene and getting six to eight hours of sleep each night is one of the best things you can do for your brain health, Shepherd told Insider. He aims to get about six to seven hours of shut-eye a night.

Sleep helps the brain process new information, form memories, reinforce new concepts and ideas, and remove toxic buildup of proteins known as amyloid plaques that commonly accumulate in the brains of people with Alzheimers's.

Sleep also helps boost brain plasticity, the brain's ability to adapt to new situations and experiences. And the more your brain can adapt to new challenges, the more you can improve and preserve your cognitive function as you age, research has shown.

2. Get your heart pumping

Shepherd said he also exercises daily to keep his brain healthy, since regular exercise increases blood flow to the brain and a strong heart helps pump enough blood to the brain to keep it performing optimally.

Research shows that people who exercise regularly have a lower risk of developing Alzheimer's and exercise may also delay cognitive decline as people age.

The official recommendation from the CDC is 150 minutes a week of moderate exercise, but however and whenever you can get your body moving is better than nothing, Shepherd said.

For him, this usually means walking his dogs a couple miles once or twice a day and refereeing rugby games on the weekends.

3. Go to lunch with a friend

Loneliness can harm a person's mental health, emotional wellbeing, and brain health, so it's important to stay connected to others, Lerner said.

"In general, people with strong social networks tend to live longer," Lerner said. "Spending time with other people is good for your emotional life, which is good for brain health."

Studies show strong social connections can also lower the risk of depression and anxiety, and help people cope better with hardships.

But staying connected to others can be a challenge, especially as you age, Lerner said. With friends scattered across the country, Lerner said she uses social media and messaging apps to help her stay in touch with loved ones.

She also regularly volunteers at her kids' school as a way to meet other parents in her community. "Even if you don't have kids, volunteer work is rewarding and good for you," Lerner said.

Study Sheds Light on Treatments to Prevent Cancer, Infectious Diseases



PARKVILLE (Dispatches) - Researchers have figured out how one particular sort of immune cell, which defends the body against disease and infection, originates in the body. Additionally, a recent study suggests that the discovery may aid in the creation of other preventative medicines.

The study, which was co-led by Federation University Australia and the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, has revealed how these specialized white blood cells function and can trigger an immunological response.

Understanding the role of these cells, according to associate professor Dan Pellicci, could enable the prevention of cancer and other highly contagious diseases as COVID-19, Strep A, and tuberculosis.

The study, which was published in Science Immunology, included samples from heart surgery patients up to the age of 16 that were given to the Melbourne Children's Heart Tissue Bank. The 'gamma delta T cells' were examined by the researchers from these samples in the context of the thymus gland, a tiny organ situated within the chest, close to the heart.

Associate Professor Pellicci said the study showed for the first time how this organ produced these infection-fighting immune cells.

"We have large numbers of these specialised cells in our blood and tissues, which accumulate as we become adults. Until our study, it was unclear how these cells develop in the body," he said.

"We have shown how these cells are trained over three stages, similar to receiving a primary, secondary and tertiary education, and fully formulate within the thymus. Following this education, the cells are ready to enter the rest of the body and are completely capable of fighting infections."

Canada Expected to Allow Medically Assisted Deaths

OTTAWA (Dispatches) - Canada is expected to allow medically assisted death soon for the people already distressed with their medical conditions and evaluate death as a better alternative.

The new mental health provision will make Canada one of the most expansive countries in the world when it comes to medical assistance in dying (MAID), according to an expert panel report to Canada's parliament

More than 30,000 people have died with medical assistance in Canada since 2016, more than 10,000 of them in 2021 when the law was expanded to people whose deaths were not "reasonably foreseeable." Even after the change in the legislation, about 98% of the assisted deaths in 2021 were people deemed near their natural death, according to Health Canada data.

The procedure is only available to people covered by a Canadian healthcare program. It requires a written application and assessments from two independent medical practitioners, including at least one specialized in their condition if the applicant is not near their natural death. The procedure frequently involves an injection administered at home.

Canadian federal government is considering recommendations from a parliamentary committee to allow advance requests and "mature minors" - people under 18 deemed capable of making this decision - to access assisted death.

Quebec passed a law June 7 that would allow people to make advance requests for assisted death that would go into effect when they reach a predetermined point of incapacity due to Alzheimer's or similar conditions.

The vast majority of assisted deaths in Canada conformed to the legal rules but provincial authorities deemed a small number worthy of investigation, according to previously unreported provincial government data. Provinces and territories are responsible for health care in Canada.

But Georges L'Esperance, president of the Quebec Association for the Right to Die with Dignity, said it could take up to two years for the provision to go into effect.

Dying With Dignity Canada has organized nearly 10,000 letters this year to government officials seeking to legalize advance requests across Canada, spokesperson Sarah Dobec said.



Has Humanity Defeated Ageing?



LONDON (Dispatches) - Scientists have achieved a major breakthrough in combating ageing and age-related diseases. The study by the researchers from Harvard Medical School and Massachusetts Institute of Technology was published in the journal Aging-US.

Humanity's attempt to prevent ageing: What is the breakthrough?

The researchers have introduced a chemical method through a 'single pill' to reprogram body cells, following which the cells effectively return to a younger state.

This achievement represents a significant advancement, as previously only gene therapy could achieve similar results.

The researchers reportedly built upon the Nobel Prize-winning discovery in 2012 that certain genes, known as Yamanaka factors, could transform adult cells into pluripotent stem cells which have unlimited capacity to divide, self-renew and differentiate into cells of early primary germ cell layers, namely mesoderm, endoderm, and ectoderm.

The key challenge was to reverse cellular ageing without triggering cancerous growth.

Lead scientist David A. Sinclair, a Professor in the Department of Genetics at Harvard, expressed the significance of this achievement, stating that while aging could previously only be slowed down, it can now potentially be reversed.

"This new discovery offers the potential to reverse ageing with a single pill, with applications ranging from improving eyesight to effectively treating numerous age-related diseases," Sinclair said.

He noted that this breakthrough eliminates the need for gene therapy, which had limited accessibility.

China's Frail Q2 GDP Growth Raises Urgency for More Policy Support BEIJING (Dispatches) - China's economy grew at a frail pace in the second quarter as demand weakens at home and abroad, with the

post-COVID momentum faltering rapidly and raising pressure on policymakers to deliver more stimulus to shore up activity.

Chinese authorities face a daunting task in trying to keep the economic recovery on track and putting a lid on unemployment, as any aggressive stimulus could fuel debt risks and structural distortions.

Gross domestic product grew just 0.8% in April-June from the previous quarter, on a seasonally adjusted basis, data released by the National Bureau of Statistics showed on Monday, versus analysts' expectations in a Reuters poll for a 0.5% increase and compared with a 2.2% expansion in the first quarter. On a year-on-year basis, GDP expanded 6.3% in the second quarter, accelerating from 4.5% in the first three months of the year, but the rate was well below

the forecast for growth of 7.3% The annual pace was the quickest since the second quarter of 2021, but it was heavily skewed by economic pains caused by stringent COVID-19 lockdowns in Shanghai and other

major cities last year. "The data suggests that China's post-COVID boom is clearly over," said Carol Kong, economist at Commonwealth Bank of Australia in Sydney.

"The higher-frequency indicators are up from May's numbers, but still paint a picture of a bleak and faltering recovery and at the same time youth unemployment is hitting record highs.'

Some economists say China could miss its modest 5% growth target for this year if the decelerating pace doesn't ease off.

More timely June data, which was released alongside the GDP numbers, showed China's retail sales grew 3.1%, slowing sharply from a 12.7% jump in May. Analysts had expected growth of 3.2%.

Industrial output growth unexpectedly quickened to 4.4% last month from 3.5% seen in May, but demand remains lukewarm.

Private fixed-asset investment shrank 0.2% in the first six months, a sharp contrast to the 8.1% growth in investment by state entities, suggesting weak private business confidence.

Recent data showed a rapidly faltering post-COVID recovery as exports fell the most in three years due to cooling demand at home and abroad while a prolonged downturn in the key property market has sapped confidence.

The weak overall momentum and a global recession risks have raised expectations policymakers will need to do more to shore up the world's second-biggest economy. Authorities are likely to roll out more stimulus steps including fiscal spending to fund big-ticket infrastructure projects, more support for consumers and private firms, and some property policy easing, policy insiders and economists said.

But a quick turnaround is unlikely, analysts say.

All eyes are on an expected Politburo meeting later this month, when top leaders could chart the policy course for the rest of the year.

U.S. corporations want to see an environment where they could "invest and thrive in China", Yellen said.

Washington will continue to cut off Russia's access to military equipment and technologies that Moscow needs in the invasion of Ukraine, Yellen said.

"One of our core goals this year is to combat Russia's efforts to evade our sanctions. Our coalition is building on the actions we've taken in recent months to crack down on these efforts," she added.

India, which chairs the G20 this year, has sought a largely neutral stance on the war, generally

declining to blame Russia for the invasion Moscow launched in February last year, urging a diplomatic solution and sharply boosting its purchases of Russian oil even as Western nations seek to squeeze Moscow.

Yellen said she would continue to push hard at the G20 meeting, in Gandhinagar in the northwestern Indian state of Gujarat, for "full and timely participation of all bilateral official creditors on pending debt restructurings".

She said she discussed Zambia's restructuring with her Chinese counterparts and, although it took too long to negotiate, differences were overcome.

'We should apply the common principles we agreed to in Zambia's case in other cases – rather than starting at zero every time. And we must go faster," Yellen said, adding she hoped debt treatments for Sri Lanka and Ghana could be finalized quickly so the International Monetary Fund (IMF) could move forward with initial loan program reviews this fall.

Indonesia Upbeat on 5% Growth Despite Gloomy China Outlook

JAKARTA (Dispatches) - Indonesia Finance Minister Sri Mulyani Indrawati said she was optimistic about the 5% economic growth target this year despite the darkening global outlook, especially from China.

"We are optimistic for 2023 because we see the figures on the first half," Indrawati said on Sunday in an interview with Bloomberg Television's Haslinda Amin ahead of the G-20 finance chiefs' meetings in India. Southeast Asia's largest economy flashed another round of warning signs on Monday, with exports plunging 21% in June due to the sharp drop in global commodity prices. More worryingly, soft domestic demand pushed imports down 18% last month, lower than all the forecasts in a Bloomberg survey of economists.

"The second half, there is a positive side from our own side, explicitly on household consumption," Indrawati said, adding that elections next year will spur the economy thanks to extra spending from the government as well as political parties.

Her comments came as finance chiefs from the world's largest economies grapple with the risk of a global ecession, brought about by high interest rates and still-elevated inflation. Indrawati said Indonesia was looking to strengthen its ties with India as both economies look for ways to shield against the impact of

"Their economic growth is remarkably very strong. And that's why they need quite a lot of imported commodities from Indonesia," she said in reference to India. "We're here trying to discuss on the partnership which is going to be much benefiting both sides."

Bangladesh Will Again Seek Duty Benefits in U.S.

DHAKA (Dispatches)- Bangladesh will again urge the U.S. for duty-free access as the tariff imposed on exports from the country is one the highest faced by goods entering the western nation, according to Senior Commerce Secretary of Bangladesh Tapan Kanti Ghosh.

Ghosh told The Daily Star that he would raise this demand at the sixth edition of the Trade and Investment Cooperation Forum Agreement (Ticfa).

Kazakhstan Increases Oil Exports Via Azerbaijan



ASTANA (Dispatches) - Kazakhstan is increasing the export of crude oil through non-Russian routes, as part of its diversification strategy

The country's major oil transporter KazTransOil revealed that the flow of Kazakh oil to European markets through Azerbaijan increased in April-June. Citing a source from the energy company, Trend reported on Thursday that the flow of Kazakh oil from the Tengiz field through the Baku-Tbilisi-Ceyhan oil pipeline reached 347.100 tonnes in the second quarter of this year. In Q1 2023, the company exported only 19,200 tonnes of Tengiz oil via this route -- approximately 18 times less than Q2.

KazTransOil also experienced a notable surge in the volume of oil transported through its main pipeline network during O1 2023. The remarkable growth was achieved as the total volume reached 10.3 million tonnes, marking a 591,000-ton increase compared to the same period of the previous year.

The transportation of Kazakh oil for export to European markets through Azerbaijan increased on the back of a master agreement signed earlier between Azerbaijan's SOCAR and Kazakh national energy company KazMunayGas. The document provides for transporting 1.5 million tons of oil annually from the Tengiz field, through the Baku-Tbilisi-Ceyhan pipeline.

In 2022, Kazakh President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev emphasized the significance of fully leveraging the potential of the Trans-Caspian International Transport Route (TITR), also known as the Middle Corridor, which stretches from China to Europe covering Central Asia and South Caucasus.

The Trans-Caspian route matters to Kazakhstan's economic security and has grown more important, as exports through Russian territory are becoming increasingly difficult due to the fallout from Moscow's Ukraine war.

UK Joins Trans-Pacific Trading Bloc in Biggest Post-Brexit Deal

LONDON (Dispatches) - The United Kingdom formally signed a treaty to join a major Indo-Pacific bloc, which the country's government hailed as its biggest trade deal since Brexit.

Business and Trade Secretary Kemi Badenoch signed the accession protocol for the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP) in New Zealand.

It makes the United Kingdom the first new member and first European nation to join the bloc since it was created in 2018. The CPTPP comprises the U.K.'s fellow G-7 members Canada and Japan, plus long-standing allies Australia and New Zealand, alongside Brunei, Chile, Malaysia, Mexico, Peru, Singapore and Vietnam.

It has been seen as a bulwark against Chinese dominance in the region, although Beijing has applied to join.

Badenoch said in an interview with Sky News that the deal showed the U.K. "looking outwards toward the world." "We have a seat at the table in the fastest-growing region, countries are queuing up (to join)," she added.

"I'm really excited that we've brought home the biggest trade deal since we left the European Union."

London has been pushing a "Global Britain" strategy since formally severing nearly 50 years of ties with its nearest neighbours in the European Union three years ago.

Sunday's signing at a CPTPP meeting in Auckland was the formal confirmation of the agreement for U.K. membership after nearly two years of talks. The government said it will cut tariffs for UK exports to CPTPP countries, which with U.K. membership will have a combined gross domestic product (GDP) of 12 trillion pounds (\$15.7 trillion), and account for 15%



of global economic output. It will give British businesses trade access to a market of more than 500 million people and access to the wider region, it added.

The agreement is expected to come into force in the second half of next year, after parliamentary scrutiny and legislation.

U.K. accession to the CPTPP - the successor to a previous trans-Pacific trade pact that the United States withdrew from in 2017 under president Donald Trump - has, however, been met with a mixed reception.

For Brexit supporters, it has been seen as a chance for the U.K. to join other trading blocs with faster-growing economies than those closer to home - and boost the country's international geopolitical and economic clout.

Dust Storm Brings Iran Megacity of Mashhad to Standstill

TEHRAN (IFP)- A heavy dust storm brings businesses and sports activities to a halt in Iran's northeastern city of Mashhad, the capital of Khorasan Razavi Province.

According to the Iranian weather authority, the air quality in Mashhad decreased because of the dust storm to a "dangerous" level for all age groups, promoting officials to close down businesses and advise against sports activities on Tuesday. People, especially the elderly and those suffering from heart and lungs complications, have been advised to stay indoors. Health sources say dozens of people have sought aid at hospitals for breathing problems.



India Blasts Chandrayaan-3 Lander Toward Moon's South Pole

BENGALURU (Dispatches) - India's space agency launched a rocket on Friday that sent a spacecraft into orbit and toward a planned landing next month on the lunar south pole, an unprecedented feat that would advance India's position as a major space power.

The Indian Space Research Organisation's (ISRO) LVM3 launch rocket blasted off from the country's main spaceport in the southern state of Andhra Pradesh on Friday afternoon, leaving behind a plume of smoke and fire.

About 16 minutes later, ISRO's mission control announced that the rocket had succeeded in putting the Chandrayaan-3 lander into an Earth orbit that will send it looping toward a moon landing next month.

If the mission succeeds, India would join a group of three other countries that have managed a controlled lunar landing, including the United States, the former Soviet Union and China.

The Chandrayaan-3 spacecraft would also be the first to land at the lunar South Pole, an area of special interest for space agencies and private space companies because of the presence of water ice that could support a future space station.

The rocket blasted off from India's main spaceport at 2:35 p.m. local time (0905 GMT). Over 1.4 million people watched the launch on ISRO's YouTube channel, many offering congratulations and the patriotic slogan "Jai Hind" (Victory to India).

India's much-awaited moon mission Chandrayaan-3 has been scheduled for launch on July 14, 2023.

In 2019, ISRO's Chandrayaan-2 mission successfully deployed an orbiter but its lander and rover were destroyed in a crash near where the Chandrayan-3 will attempt a touchdown.

Chandrayaan, which means "moon vehicle" in Sanskrit, includes a 2-metre-(6.6-foot)-tall lander designed to deploy a rover near the moon's south pole, where it is expected to remain functional for two weeks running a series of experiments. The lunar landing is expected on Aug. 23, ISRO has said.



The launch is India's first major mission since Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government announced policies to spur investment in space launches and related satellite, based businesses

Modi had earlier said on Twitter that the moon mission "will carry the hopes and dreams of our nation".

"As Mother India enters into the next 25 years, she pledges to play a leading global role in the emerging world scenario," Deputy Minister of State for Science and Technology Jitendra Singh said in an event at the spaceport to celebrate the launch. Since 2020, when India opened to private launches, the number of space startups has more than doubled. Late last year, Skyroot Aerospace, whose investors include Singapore's sovereign wealth fund GIC, launched India's first privately built rocket.

A Mild Winter Could Cut Europe's Natural Gas Prices in Half

LONDON (Dispatches) - Europe's natural gas stockpiles are at elevated levels and on track to be full sooner than planned. This gives governments and industries confidence that last year's energy crisis will not be repeated.

The benchmark natural gas prices are one-tenth of the records seen last summer when Russia slashed pipeline supply to Europe.

Volatility, however, will continue as prices and demand ahead of and during the coming winter will depend on two factors that are out of EU control—the weather and the contribution of renewable energy sources to the mix depending on the weather.

Thanks to milder winter weather, reduced EU consumption, and demand destruction in industry due to the high energy costs, Europe made it through the 2022/2023 winter without gas shortages or gas rationing.

Ahead of the 2023/2024 winter, Europe can only hope for another winter of milder temperatures without prolonged periods of freezes that would boost demand for heating and for gas-fired power generation. In case of another mild winter – which is possible but far from certain – Europe's gas prices could plunge from current levels and halve to \$16.85 (15 euros) per

"If weather is persistently warm and renewables perform strongly," the benchmark gas prices could crumble to the levels from the end of 2020, Morgan Stanley analysts wrote in a research note this week, as carried by Bloomberg.

3 Persian Gulf Islands Linked to mainland With Fiber Optics

TEHRAN (IRNA) - Minister of Communications and Information Technology of Iran Issa Zarepour has said that for the first time, his ministry has connected the Persian Gulf islands of Abu Musa, the Lesser Tunb, and the Greater Tunb to the Iranian mainland with the use of fiber optics.

Answering questions on his performance at the Iranian parliament on Tuesday, Zarepour noted that more than 150 kilometers of cable was laid under the sea to this end, and fortunately, people of the three islands have access to stable internet.

The minister further referred to the launch of 600 sites with fifth-generation internet, saying that for the first time, the ministry sets the record of 6.5 terabits per second for domestic traffic, so people increased their usage of domestic platforms over the past year.

Nowadays, domestically-developed messengers became popular, he stated, arguing that over 40 million Iranians are utilizing domestic messengers. The ministry also designed a safe internet service for children.

Zarepour also mentioned that the progress of the national information network reached 62% from 23% at the beginning of the administration of President Ebrahim Raisi. Touching on his ministry's efforts to dodge the US-imposed sanctions on internet services, he said that Washington banned 100k widely used internet services for Iranian users, but the ministry tried to nullify the sanction; thus, the Iranian elite and programmers could utilize the services without requiring VPN service.

Crushing Medical Debt Is Turning Americans Against Their Doctors

NEW YORK (Dispatches)- For Emily Boller, it was a \$5,000 hospital bill for a simple case of pink eye that took four years to pay off. For Mary Curley, it was the threatening collection letters from a lab that arrived more than two years later, just as her husband lost his job and the family was fighting to save their home.

For Cory Day, it was a \$1,000 fee he was charged at an emergency room outside Los Angeles, even though he only checked in and then left before being seen. "I feel like the hospital is a predator," Day said. "This is a place that's supposed to be looking after you."

The experience offered a stark lesson, he said: "Don't trust the system."

Reporting on medical debt over the past two years, I've spent hundreds of hours on the telephone, in the living rooms and at the kitchen tables of patients like Boller, Curley and Day. They are among the 100 million people in America who have been driven into debt by medical and dental bills.

Many of my conversations with patients have revealed a deep and disturbing disillusionment with our healthcare system. Medical providers ignore this at their peril — and at a high risk to Americans' health.

Doctors and hospitals have long held an exalted position in American life, retaining public confidence even as the public has steadily lost trust in other institutions such as government, law enforcement and the media. Growing up, I shared this faith. My father was a physician who never hesitated to get up in the middle of the night and drive to the hospital to operate on a sick child in his care. But as a journalist covering healthcare the past 15 years, I've seen patients' faith shaken.

They're tired of shocking medical bills they didn't expect and can't afford. And they're disgusted by the collection notices, the threatening phone calls and appointments they can't get because they owe money.

Many Americans say they simply no longer trust their medical providers. This is borne out by a nationwide poll conducted by KFF as part of an investigation of medical debt. Just 15% of people with healthcare debt said they have a lot of trust that providers have patients' best interests in mind. That's about half the rate as among people without such debt.

Many caring people who work in healthcare understand this. I've met countless compassionate physicians, nurses and others who see firsthand the toll that debt is taking on their patients.

But I've seen a lot more denial and finger-pointing by healthcare leaders. Hospitals and doctors blame the government for underpaying them and blame insurers for selling plans with unaffordable deductibles. Insurers blame providers for obscene prices. Everyone blames drug companies.

And so, the suffering of patients deepens.

In a project on medical debt with NPR, KFF Health News documented cancer patients forced to hold off debt collectors while fighting off nausea and other toxic side effects of chemotherapy; older workers whose retirement savings were obliterated; 30-somethings unable to buy a home because their credit was ruined by healthcare debt; new mothers forced to take on extra work; parents unable to buy Christmas gifts for their children; and seniors who cut back on food because of medical debt.

That our healthcare system would do this to people should be reason enough for hospital executives, insurance CEOs and senior physicians to stop the blame game and look in the mirror.

If nothing else, this should be a flashing red light: the simmering resentment of growing numbers of patients who feel victimized by this system.

"This is on our agenda, using our national currencies in our trade, commercial and economic exchanges particularly the example of India. We have made good progress in this...Hopefully, this could take new momentum and we could see widespread use of our national currencies in this process," the Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister said.

It is worth mentioning Russia emerged as the largest single supplier of crude oil to India ever since the Ukraine war escalated in February last year. Earlier, Iraq and Saudi Arabia were its primary suppliers in the past decade, as well as the UAE and the US. However, since Moscow offered oil at a discounted rate, it

remained on the top list for the eighth consecutive month in June.

Earlier in March, Iran reiterated India to buy crude oil from Tehran as it purchased from Russia by evading Western pressure. The Ambassador of Iran to India, praised New Delhi's effort to continue buying oil from Moscow, keeping in mind the benefit of the Indian economy and people. He asserted buying oil from Iran is in favor of New Delhi. "As India resisted the pressure for buying oil from Russia, we believe that India could and we hope that for the benefit of the Indian economy and people, the Indian government will start importing oil," said Elahi.

To buttress tourism, direct flights between Iran and Egypt will be resumed in the coming weeks if a detailed agreement is reached. Moreover, it is discussed that Iranian tourists will be offered entry visas upon arrival in Egypt.

In addition to helping to normalize relations, attracting Iranian tourists will provide financial benefits to Egypt, which is grappling with an economic crisis in part as a result of the Russian-Ukraine war, the report said.

Officials from Cairo and Tehran have recently held several rounds of talks in Baghdad to discuss normalizing relations, which soured following Iran's 1979 Islamic Revolution.

Iran expects to reap a bonanza from its numerous tourist spots such as bazaars, museums, mosques, bridges, bathhouses, madrasas, mausoleums, churches, towers, and mansions, of which 26 are inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list. The Dane has spent the past two weeks insisting he never thinks about his rival. But will he be able to do that with the swashbuckling Slovenian out ahead of him on what is a truly challenging course?

Three years ago Pogacar bamboozled Primoz Roglic in a similar situation by riding flat out from start to finish, to rip the title from his grasp at the last gasp.

Vingegaard, however, seems less sensitive to provocation.

China Wins More Diving Gold At World Championships

FUKUAKA (Dispatches) - Chinese divers continued their dominance at the world championships in Japan on Monday, winning another two gold medals to make it seven out of seven so far.

Chang Yani and Chen Yiwen won the women's 3m synchronized springboard before compatriots Lian Junjie and Yang Hao took gold in the men's 10m synchronised event.

China won every diving gold at last year's world championships in Budapest and have so far maintained a perfect record in the southern Japanese city of Fukuoka.

Chen, who picked up a fourth world championships gold medal, said she preferred diving in pairs events because it gave her "a sense of security".

Guardiola Stunned as Mahrez Agrees to Join Saudi Club

Manchester City star Riyad ONDON (Dispatches) -Mahrez has reportedly 'agreed personal terms' with Saudi club Al Ahli, who are considering a £30m bid for the winger.

Pep Guardiola has overseen significant changes to his front line in recent years. Leroy Sane,

and Erling Haaland being brought in to replace them. Mahrez would definitely be one of the biggest losses of all. The Algeria international has scored 78 goals and made 59 assists in 239 appearances for Man City since joining from

Leicester back in 2018. He hasn't shown any signs of slowing down, either. Last term, he scored 15 goals and assisted 13 times in 47 appearances across all competitions.

Mahrez played a key role in a historic treble-winning campaign for the Cityzens and has now won 11 major trophies during his time at the Etihad.

But he now looks set to become the latest superstar to ditch the Premier League for Saudi. According to transfer journalist Ben Jacobs, Al Ahli have reached an agreement on personal terms with Mahrez.

Reports suggest the Saudi club have offered the attacker a contract worth a staggering £25m per season (approx. £480,000 a week). As mentioned, they are tipped to submit a bid of £30m to Man City.

If he completes the move, he could be playing alongside Liverpool icon Roberto Firmino next season, who signed for Al Ahli in early July.

Transfer journalist Fabrizio Romano has insisted that there is work still to be done on the deal.

"Al Ahli are pushing to sign Mahrez. The agreement with the player is almost done, but not yet with Man City," Romano told his YouTube channel. "City still don't have an official bid, so they will get back to work on Monday and start


conversations with Mahrez to understand the state of his conversations with Al Ahli.

"Then they'll negotiate with Al Ahli if the player gives the final greenlight. So we're not yet at the done deal stage, but Al Ahli are pushing for Mahrez.'

"If other clubs want to talk about our contracted players, that's more of an issue for them than us. "There are a lot of people that know Harry better than me but he's not going to get fazed by anything."

Son Would Rather Play for Spurs Than Move to Saudi Club

ONDON (Dispatches) - Tottenham →Hotspur forward Son Heung-min said he would have moved to Saudi Arabia to continue his career if he wanted to but opted to stay with the Premier League club to redeem himself after a disappointing 2022-23 campaign.



Son won the Premier League Golden Boot for most goals in the 2021-22 season with 23 strikes but injuries and a loss of form saw the South Korea international score only 10 times last season as Spurs finished eighth.

The 31-year-old had been linked with a lucrative transfer to Saudi Arabia but at a press conference in Perth ahead of a pre-season friendly against West Ham United, he vowed to stay with the north London side.

"Probably if I wanted to go there (Saudi Arabia) I would be out there, not here," he said with a laugh. "I love playing football. Obviously money is also important, but I dream of playing in the Premier League and still a lot of things to do.

"Especially last season I suffered physically. This is not the Sonny that I know. So I want to prove that this season that I'm the Sonny that we all know. I want to prove that to myself

and I want to give back to the club where I belong. "Saudi, obviously most people are going at the moment which is really, really interesting. But the Premier League is still a dream for me to play (in) and I'm looking forward to this season."
